

But, hunters in this area will not be allowed to kill as many birds. While the general state law allows 12 birds per day and 36 per week in possession, those in the Panhandle can only legally kill 10 birds per day and have 20 in possession.

Other changes for the Panhandle fishing are limiting the crappie and channel cat bag limit to 15 per day or 30 in posession. Formerly, the limit on crappie and channel cat was 25 per day. The limit on black bass was set at 6 per day and 12 in possession, while it formerly was 15 bass of which not more than 10 could be of greater length than 11 inches. Trotline fishermen are restricted to one line. each limited to 20 hooks.

American servicemen totally disabled during the current fight ing in Korea may be eligible to have their National Service Life Insurance Premiums waived, if their total disability lasts six consecutive months or longer, according to an announcement made today by Robert W. Sisson, Manager of the VA Regional Office, Lubbock.

The waiver would go in effect, upon application, after the sixmonth period was over, and would remain in effect as long afterwards as total disability continued.

The waiver provision is not confined to those suffering total disability in action in Korea. Veterans who hold NSLI are eligible for waiver of premiums, if they become totally disabled before age 60 and while their policy is in force and remain so for at least six straight months.

"Total Disability," as defined in an NSLI Policy, is "any impairment of mind or body which continuously renders it impossible for the insured to follow any substantially gainful ocupation."

Waivers of premium payment are not granted automatically; instead, application to VA must be made-if possible, immediately following the six consecutive months of total disability. "A person who applies for

# Fish Are Good For You Too

According to Lucille Shultz, associate extension foods and nutrition specialist of Texas A. & M. College, fish ranks high among the For Lieutenant Governor: more nutritious foods.

> She points out that fish supplies the same high quality protein that is found in other meats and that it is easily digested. Most fish, she continues provide vitamins A and B and one of the more recently discovered vitamins, D, is present in some fish such has mackerel and salmon. Fish also score well on the nutritionists check sheet so far as minerals are concerned. Minerals are present in both quantity and variety in most fish. Salt water and shell fish are very rich sources of iodine and should be included regularly in the family menu, says Miss Shultz.

Now there is always a good chance that the fisherman will come home empty handed, so far as fish are concerned, but this situation can in most cases be taken care of by a visit to the grocery store. The frozen prepackaged fish that is today available in most markets makes it easy for families to have good fish just about any time they

want it. The specialist says there is little or no waste when you buy the boneless strips or fillets and

only a little more when fish steaks are the choice, but the waste is considerable when whole fish are purchased. Miss Shultz says it is best to purchase fish from markets which, insofar as you can determine, store their shipments of frozen products promptly after they receive them and keep their freezers at the correct temperature.

**Lions Plan Crippled Children Camp** 

Kerrville. - Clusters of ranch style bunk houses, filled with the laughter of physically handicapped youngsters, should dot the neighboring hills by the summer of 1951 if present plans of the Texas Lions League for Crippled Children materialize.

Jack Wiech, president of the League which was organized to raise funds for the construction and operation of the Melvin Jones camp for crippled children, said Wednesday he has hopes that the \$500,000 camp will be in full operation by next sum-

mer. The camp will be open to crippled boys and girls, from the ages of 7 through 16.

"No fee shall ever be charged or collected for the admission or maintenance of any children at the Melvin Jones camp," Welch explained.

"Any person or organization interested in the welfare of any particular crippled child or child. ren," he added, "shall have the privilege of making a contribution to the work of the League."

The camp will be constructed on a 504-acre tract of land, three miles from Kerrville, which was donated to the League by the federal government.

Children at the camp would come from various parts of Texas, selected by local Lions clubs. Occupational therapy will be available for the youngsters, as well as regular school.

Pony carts, horses and burros will be available for treks over the neighboring hills and through the nearby Texas State Park along the Guadalupe river.

Wiech said children will be selected on the basis of their personal need for such rehabil itation, regardless of the financial ability of their parents.

The physical plant will include a large administration building. craft shops, a swimming pool. six bunk houses and an auditorium with a seating capacity of 360







honorable. A further condition is that the widow must not have remarried following the veterans death. The new regulations further provide that VA, under certain

conditions, may restore the Loan Guaranty rights of veterans who already have used their entitle. ment to purchase property which they later lost through condem nation or by fire or other natural hazard, or for some other compelling cause "devoid of fault

In addition VA is drafting regulations to administer the provision of the law which enables VA to make direct loans to eligible veterans in certain areas where 4 percent financing is not available from other sources. This provision became effective July 19, 1950.

VA said that on or about July 19, 1950, its field offices will announce the list of designated areas eligible for direct loans. Application forms for veterans use will be available in the field office at that time.

VA and Federal Housing Administration already have taken

oint action under the law to limit fees and other charges which may be made against builders and veterans in connection with construction and sale of homes financed through GI and FHA loans. This joint action was announced June 28.

VA further has taken action under the law to terminate combination FHA-Va loans by October 20, 1950. This announcement was issued April 28, 1950. All of these actions were taken or will be taken under the Housing Act of 1950 signed by the President April 20, 1950, which contained several provisions amending the GI loan law.
