





# Storing Grain

College Station .-- Much of the bumper crop of grain sorghum being produced in Texas this year will be stored on the farm. J. A. Deer, assistant extension entomologist of Texas A. & M. College, recommends that farmers give special attention to controlling insect infestation in the stored grain.

Thorough cleaning of the bins is necessary to prevent the new crop of grain being mixed with old grain which is already infested. If the bins are constructed of wood, apply a residual spray to the falls and floor at the rate of two gallons of spray per 1000 square feet of surface area. Spray steel bins around the door frames and other places where the insects may be concealed.



## **Children Should Have Health Check Before School**

Austin. - Parents, has your hild had a physical examination this summer? Next month he will be starting to school, and if he is in good health he will have a happier, more profitable year. It's up to YOU to give HIM a healthful send off, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer

After he has his check-up by the family doctor, be sure to take him to the family dentist. Teeth are mighty important, and decayed ones often cause a heap of trouble. They may start infection in other parts of the body. Strong, healthy teeth add attractiveness to appearance and personality. Help your child to grow up with good teeth . . see that he has a dental examination twice a year.

Sometimes children need glases and their parents don't realize it. An examination by an eye specialist is important. A child who needs glasses, if taken to an eye physician now, will have time to get used to them before school starts.

When children are grouped together in a classroom, they exose each other to communicable diseases. Has your child been immunized against diptheria and smallpox? Does he know he should use only his own drink. ing glass? Does he know he should avoid boys and girls who are victims of colds? Do you keep your child at home when he shows signs of a cold?



## **Education Cost Less Back In Twenties**

Lubbock. - Students who registered at Texas Tech back in 1925 when the college was opened paid \$8 for their registration fee and could get their board and room for \$25 a month.


The 914 students who marticul ated during the first term in September, 1925, also paid a health fee of \$1.75 and a library fee of \$1. Tickets to the athletic contests and the artist course series cost another \$5.50, but this was optional.

Today the students pay a \$25 registration fee, and another \$15 for health and activity fees. Board and room in college dormitories costs \$60 a month.

On the other hand, the Tech faculty has increased from 38 members to a staff of over 350. From one building in 1925 the campus has mushroomed into a swarm of structures ranging from million dollar dormitories to the Jones stadium, which seats 16;500 spectators. A \$4,000,000plus building program is now in progress.

From the 914 students in 1925 the enrollment spiralled to the post-war peak of 6,689 in 1947-48. This past year the enrollment levelled off to 6,511.



Hay fever, an affliction of some ,500,000 Americans, is caused by an allergy, or sensitivity, to pollen. Its victims are easy to spot -with their inflamed and running eyes, "stuffed up" noses, and sudden and sometimes proonged paroxysms of sneezing.

Even victims of mild cases of hay fever are as miserable as they look. Hay fever in a mild form is not a serious illness, although it may cause great discomfort and cut down on the sufferer's sleep and his appetite. Severe hay fever, allowed to go untreated, can lead to asthma, a

Poorly ventilated, sunless or unsanitary calf barns are also linked with sick calves, Scours and pneumonia likewise rank as calf killers, while parasites tep come as a close second. Recent studies have proved just ing a long history of high calf mortality, veterinarians and herdsmen have worked out housing systems which have brought a marked decline in the number of calf deaths.

In avoiding sick and dead calve a little prevention is ever so much better than attempts at salvaging animals already sick. Before the neat calf crop is due, the farmer should survey his calf nursery. He should be sure that the calf quarters are sanitary, well ventilated and with access to sunlight.

All new-born calves should get the colostrum, or "first mik", but should not be overfed.

Colostrum is highly fortified vitamins and minerals. It with was designed by nature to give young animals the best possible start in life. Ordinary milk cannot take its place.

If previous losses from scours or pneumonis have occurred, it may be a wise caution to have serum given to each new-born calf. If any calves scour or breathe heav ily, a veterinarian should be called promptly, as these are sign that denote real danger.

**Cream Peas Are Best To Freeze** 

College Station .--- Varieties and selections of peas in the cream group produced the more attractive packs when experimental freezing trials were conducted with varieties and selections of Southern peas grown at College Station.

These freezing trials were conducted by Thomas S. Stephens and W. H. Brittingham of the department of horticulture, Texas A. & M. College.

The group of cream selections and varieties were of excellent appearance when they were removed from the freezer at the end of three months and allowed to thaw at room temperature prior to opening the container. One cream selection was slightly chalky in appearance.

The researchmen say that the brightness along with a light color which the cream group possessed could give them the advantage of "eye appeal" and consumer acceptance.

that a pasture may contain poisonous forage, he can cut down his risk by allowing one of his least valuable animals to graze there.

If the animal is unaffected after 10 days or two weeks, the pasture probably is safe. But as a double check, the owner should keep close watch on the animals. He should also keep antidotes on hand which he can give as first aid before the

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This is a partial report on the activities of your County Judge for the past eighteen months that I have been your County Judge. When I took over the office on January 1, 1949 one of the first things I did was check up on the amount of insurance on the different properties of the county. I found there was only \$70,000.00 insurance on the courthouse building. I recommended to the Commissioners Court that the insurance be increased to \$200,000.00, which the Court readily agreed to, and the policies then in force written with Frank Perkins and E. P. Nelson were endorsed to that amount. The Courthouse burned on March 11, 1949. As a result of the increase in the insurance the county recovered \$105,000.00 for the loss. We recovered approximately \$70,000.00 in insurance money more than we would have as it was originally written.

We have constructed 37 miles of paved farm-to-market roads. We now have under construction 101/2 miles of paved road. Plans are approved and now in the making, and contracts will be let soon for 24 more miles of farm-to-market roads. Other roads designated for improvement during the next two years amount to about 40 miles.

We have disposed of 111 misdemeanor cases, 11 civil cases, 4 mental illness cases, 63 probate cases, besides numerous probate orders, and juvenile matters, and innumerable minor matters constantly coming before the County Judge to be disposed of.

The Courthouse construction job requires considerable attention from the Commissioners Court and County Judge. The Commissioners Court has charge of all the business matters of the County, the County Judge presides over their deliberations and has no vote except in case of a tie. The County Judge hasn't had to untie a single vote during this eighteen months.

In view of the above record, I feel that I have earned a second term in this office, it being a custom of the Democratic Party to elect a man to a second term in any office unless he has been dishonest or incompetent in his first term and I have not been guilty of either. I solicit your vote on August 26, on my record which I am proud of.
