





Insect Damage In Texas More Than 100 Million-Report

1950 cotton crop in Texas a- ers, and cotton industry leaders mounted to approximately \$107,- to plan an integrated program of 035,000, destroying 11 per cent cotton insect control for 1951. of the total harvest, according to an unofficial preliminary estimate compiled by the National Cotton Council, George G. Chance, chairman of the Texas unit of the Council, said here today.

"Insects kept approximately 456,000 bales of cotton and an estimated 187,000 tons of cottonseed off the market this year. Based on average prices, this lint would have brought Texas farmers some \$91,119,000 and the seed would have meant an additional profit of \$15,916,000," the Courcil spokesman said.

"Throughout the Cotton Belt," Mr. Chance said, "an estimated 16.5 per cent of the crop, valued at approximately \$598,565,000 was destroyed. In dollars and cents, losses in 1950 were second highest on record, exceeded only by 1949 when damage amounted to more than \$617 million."

In most areas, information on land suited to cotton is available, Merrill said, Landowners can make use of the help that oil conservation districts can give them in deciding what land can produce cotton profitably and without damage. In the Plains areas of Texas and Oklahoma, nearly 5 million acres of land now being cultivated are too shallow or unstable for cotton, a crop offering almost no resistance to the forces of eros-

It is seldom wise to follow cotton with another crop of cotton. Merrill pointed out. However, when it is done, a legume cover between crops of cotton will help to control erosion, increase productivity and reduce cotton root rot.

Farmers have been getting more grass-conscious in recent vears, the regional director said. More than 250,000 acres have been put in native grasses alone in Oklahoma and Texas during the last two years and still additional acreage is introduced grasses. On nearly all of this

Continenal cartridges are named for the Millimeter system, and one millimeter is equal to .0394 inch. Thus the 6.5 MM is a .256, and the 7.62 a 30, and the 9 MM a 35. The 7 MM is about a .28 and the 8 MM approximately a .32. Jood Food SAMAG In Littlefield, Arthur P. Duggan, jr., chief attorney for the High Plains association, declared that "this committee was originally created to study surface water laws and their revision exclusively, but their preliminary report issued Nov. 1 deals with 'all water resources' of the State of Texas."

"From start to finish, this report deals with all water resources of the State of Texas-it sets forth the objectives of conducting an inventory of all water resources, of reorganizing the administrative agency and vesting in it broader powers of regulation and control of all water resources; prevention of waste of all water resources, and so on."

The key paragraph cited by Duggan is a proposed constitutional amendment which is a revision of one introduced in the last session of the legislature. The original amendment dealt with surface water only. The revision brings in all water resources.

The newly-added subsection in the amendment reads:

"For the purpose of aiding and providing for the conservation and distribution for beneficial uses of the water resources of the state, including all waters of streams constituting a 'part of the state's boundaries, the Legislature shall be authorized to provide for the collection of use fees for the diversion or use of flowing fresh water by persons, by corporations both public and private, and by political subdivisions."

Duggan charged it would amount to a tax on ground water use to finance building of river dams and other surface water, projects. "In effect," the attorney de-

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
