Early Season Insect Control Is Urged

College Station. — 1950 was a bad year for the cotton grower from the standpoint of production because of acreage restrictions, insects, and unfavorable growing seasons. However, where early season insect control was practiced, McLeilan county cotton growers produced more lint cotton in 1950 than they did in 1949.

County agent I. C. Patterson reports that 15 farmers in the Bolten Bend community had an average yield of 304 pounds of lint cotton per acre in 1950, while their average yield was 287 pounds in 1949. Their total 1950 acreage was limited to 517 acres, but this produced 157,411 pounds of lint. Their total yield in 1949 was 139,945 pounds from 616.5 acres.

Records of the cotton produced on these farms were kept by the Farm and Home Administration and the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine.

On six untreated check plots of 204 acres in the Bolten Bend community, the average yield per acre was only 192 pounds of lint. This is an average loss of 112 pounds of lint cotton per acre from insect damage.

An average yield of 502 pounds per acre was obtained on 1542 acres of early season treated cotton in the Asa community of McLennan county. The yield was only 289 pounds per acre on 425 acres of untreated cotton in the same community. This shows an increase of 213 pounds per acre from practicing early season control.

The average increase from insect control in both communities was 204 pounds of lint cotton per acre.

Patterson estimates that an average increase of at least 125 pounds of lint per acre was obtained by practicing early season insect control on one half or 50-

000 acres of McLennan county cotton.

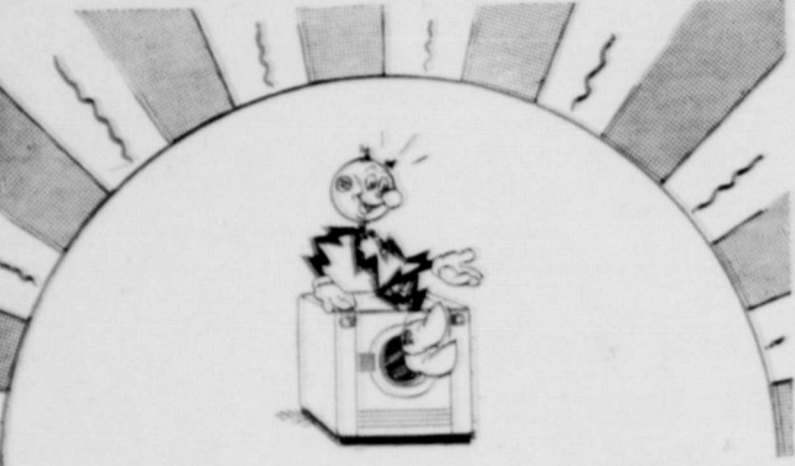

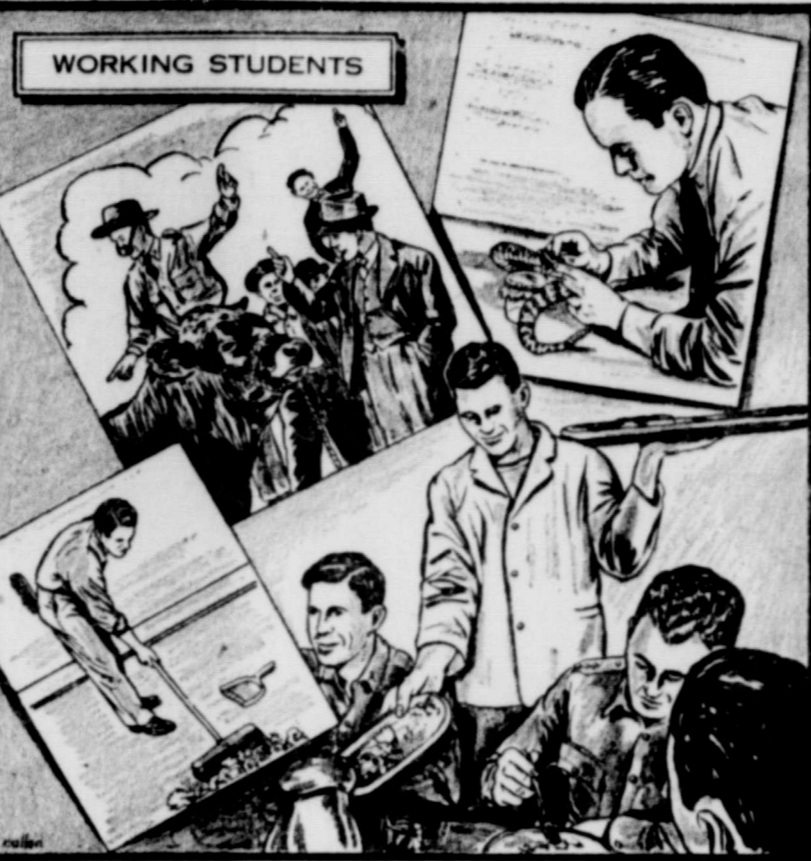
County Council Has First Meeting

That is the opinion of Senator Kilmer B. Corbin of Lubbock, based on his study of population figures and poll tax payments in the 24 counties.

Senator Corbin is a co-author with Senator Rogers Kelley of Edinburg of the senatorial redistricting bill filed as Senate Bill 1 in the 52nd Legislature.

A House of Representatives redistricting bill was scheduled for introduction as soon as the House started taking bills. Separate bill must be passed for re-vamping Senatorial and House districts.

Senator Corbin pointed out that the Senate bill, as introduced, does not yet specify what counties would make up the various districts in what is now his 30th Senatorial District. Only single-county districts (Jefferson, Dallas, Tarrant, Bexar and Harris) are specifically mentioned, with the exception of Senator Kelley's own district which the bill specifies would include three Lower Rio Grande Valley counties.

"In that way, the people and their representatives can have their say as to what counties should be included in the various districts," the former Dawson County Judge, who was elected to the Senate in 1948, explained. "We are not in the position of having an author of a bill trying to tell us just how we should redistrict but are given a chance to work it out for ourselves."

While House redistricting must be done on the basis of population, the Constitution provides that Senatorial districts are to be divided according to the number of qualified voters. On the basis of last year's poll tax payments and exemptions, Senator Corbin estimates that the present 30th District is entitled to nearly two Senators instead of one. And on the basis of the House redistricting, the counties are entitled to seven or eight representatives instead of their

present three or four. Because of overlapping districts, it is impossible to say definitely just how many representatives the district now has.

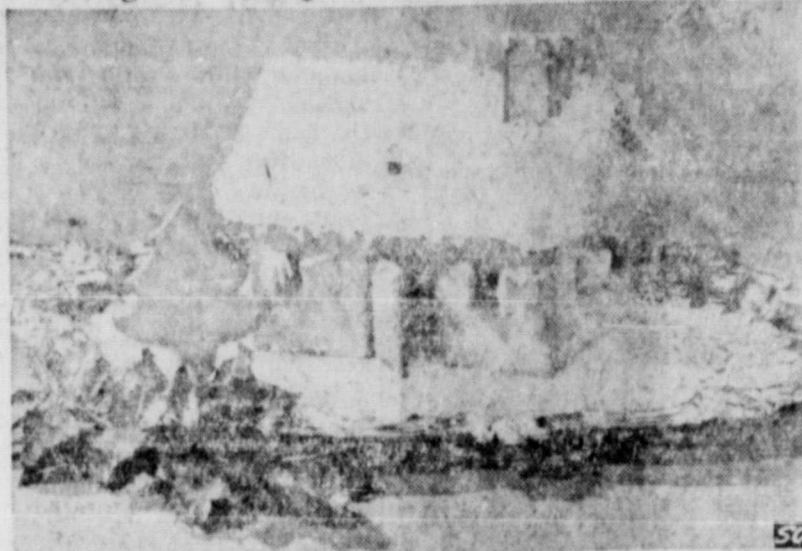

AN ORDINANCE

Prohibiting the discharge or shooting of Firearms within the City of Lockney, Texas; regulating the shooting of air-guns; and prescribing a penalty for violation.

Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Lockney, Texas:

Section 1. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to fire-off or discharge any gun, pistol, rifle or other firearms of any description within the corporate limits of the city of Lockney, Texas.

Section 2. The preceding section shall not apply when such firing is done in the necessary and lawful protection of one's person, premises or property, unless such firing be recklessly or negligently done.

Section 3. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to shoot or discharge any air-gun or air-rifle of any description in, or on or across, or near to any public place, park, street or alley within the corporate limits of the city of Lockney, Texas.

Section 4. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars.

This ordinance is to become effective March 1st, 1951.

**Reservists Protected
From Lawsuits, Etc.**

Austin.—Army reservists ordered to active military service, either voluntarily or involuntarily, are entitled to protection from civil lawsuits, evictions as well as reemployment rights, under the provisions of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Civil Act, Colonel C. M. Culp, Chief of the Texas Military District, stated today.

Personal affairs officers will be available at training centers to assist individual reservists with their problems. In cases where whole units are called into service, arrangements have been made to place members of the Judge Advocate General Department reserve officers on temporary duty to assist reservists with legal problems, prior to departure from their home stations, Col. Culp said.

While this relief law has been in effect since 1940, and was extended and broadened by the Selective Service Extension Act of 1950, some reservists have been applying for delays and deferment from military service because of personal obligations which the act covers.

In general the law provides that neither personal nor real property can be repossessed from an individual ordered to active military service without a court order. If court action is resorted to by the lender, the serviceman may be represented by a dependent if he is unable to attend the hearings or the court will appoint a qualified attorney to represent his interest. The court may stay proceedings if the serviceman's ability to make payments according to the original contract has been affected by his entry into military service.

Also, foreclosures of mortgages and deeds of trust may be stayed by the court. This provision includes property purchased under the GI Bill of Rights as well as other mortgage loans. If court action is started by the lender involving the payment on loans, mortgages on real or personal property or other installment obligations, the court if it sees fit, may lower the payments or declare them suspended until three months after honorable discharge.

It is not the purpose of the act to make military service a refuge for anyone attempting to avoid legitimate obligations where the entry into the armed forces does not affect the ability of the person to properly discharge such obligations. Therefore, throughout the act, such expressions as, "such other disposition of the case as may be equitable to conserve the interest of all parties," "discretion of the court," "ma-

Soil Conservation News

Bert Bobbitt, chairman of the board of supervisors of the Floyd County Soil Conservation District, urges all landowners in the Southeast division of the district to vote in the election of a board member next Saturday, January 27, at 2 p. m. This is a special election to fill the unexpired term of W. H. Nelson, who has resigned because of ill health. The supervisor elected Saturday will serve until October 1952, when a regular election will be held.

The Lubbock highway is the boundary of sub-division four on the west, the Matador highway is the north boundary from the town section out to the west side of section 69; going north one mile to take in the next seven sections and coming back to the highway on the east side of section 75 and continuing with the highway to the east line of the County. The County lines form the east and south boundaries.

This board represents the local landowners; making it possible for farmers to take advantage of the technical assistance of the Soil Conservation Service.

The supervisors have State and National organizations in order to have a broader knowledge of the one interest common to all—conservation of the nation's soil and water resources.

Representatives of the local board, Bert Bobbitt and R. G. Dunlap, attended the statewide meeting of supervisors in Mineral Wells January 18 and 19. They reported an enjoyable trip and a beneficial meeting.

More than 2,000 farmers and ranchers are expected to attend a three-day conference in Oklahoma City February 20, which is the annual convention of the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts.

Slated at a time when the American citizens is openly concerned about the prospect of world conflict and what it could mean, the convention promises to be a brass tacks, "do something" affair. Waters S. Davis, Jr., association president, and other officers have arranged a varied and comprehensive program which includes speeches by Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan and Dr. H. H. Bennett, chief of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service.

The work of soil conservation

districts in developing a more dependable wartime agriculture, the speeding up of the job of protecting and improving the nation's productive land, and water conservation are among the problems to be discussed by the convention delegates.

Commented President Davis, "I am counting on every delegate to roll up his sleeves and help us plan working policies. With the present international situation, these policies will help gain recognition of soil conservation districts and their program as one of the most important elements of our long range national planning."

Health Talks

The rises and falls of the temperature of the body during an illness may be a significant clue as to what's ailing you. Certain diseases are marked by definite up and down trends in fever, others just go up and stay there.

Infections are certainly the most common causes of fever and certain kinds of infections have the word "fever" attached to their names. Rheumatic fever, scarlet fever, yellow fever, and all the rest of the "fever" diseases are so-called because of the elevation of temperature which accompanies the illness. Hay fever doesn't really belong in the fever family.

In typhoid fever the rise in temperature may be gradual or rapid. It may fluctuate at 2 to 4 hour intervals from near normal to 104 degrees or 105 degrees in the first week, but shortly thereafter it hits a high level and stays there for 4 to 6 weeks, after which it starts going down. The foregoing is true in the case of untreated typhoid fever, but today with many new drugs at the doctor's disposal the fever period is sharply decreased. Typhus fever usually reaches a high level in 3 or 4 days and stays up almost exactly two weeks. On the 13th or 14th day it often falls abruptly to normal or may even go to subnormal levels.

Malaria is noted for the brand of fever that plays hide and seek, registering an elevation of temperature for a certain period, then a set period without fever, then back again, then gone again. Relapsing fever does the same way, but the fever periods are usually longer than in ma-

And some diseases are marked by these hectic fevers which cause chills and sweating. Head injuries, both inside and out, may be a cause of fever and in this instance, the degree of fever is frequently a sign of the seriousness of the injury. A slight concussion from a blow on the head or a slight bleeding of the blood vessels of the brain or some obstruction of those vessels will usually create a slight rise in the temperature whereas a bad concussion or a heavy bleeding into the brain such as apoplexy may send the temperature up very high and very quickly.

When the spinal cord suffers injury, there will usually be a change in the temperature of the body, depending upon which part of the spinal cord is injured; one

part may account for a very high irregular fever whereas another will create an abnormally low body temperature.

Anxiety and excitement may be obscure causes of an elevation of the temperature of the body, and more concrete causes may be tumors, thyroid disease, peptic ulcer, blood diseases, some medicines, and many others. It is not always easy to locate the cause of fever, some cases eluding every attempt of medical detective work, but the cause should certainly be sought before the fever is "treated."

One of the best treatments for fever, once the cause has been found, is water, outside and inside. In fever, the water balance of the body is upset. It sounds screwy but despite the fact that you are retaining fluids in your body during fever you are still getting drier all the time. With fever you normally throw off

less urine and less sweat but you're thirsty and your body feels dry. So water as your thirst dictates will increase the amount of urine excreted, throwing off some of the poisons of the infection. Water on the outside in the form of sponge baths will also encourage the kidneys to act as well as stimulate the circulation of the body which is usually desirable. Sponge baths are usually of special value in the case of delirium with fever because you certainly do not force water on a delirious or an unconscious person.

And since there are some causes of fever in which water, either inside or out, may not be advisable, you get back to the medical hesitancy to brand any type of treatment as good for any broad symptoms of illness as fever may be. That applies to every day life as well as health, of course; generally, you fight fire with water, but if gas or oil is aflame, water does no good. Generally, you help a feverish person with water, inside and out; but in some instances, the water may not be good. That's why a fever requires medical attention.

badly diseased limbs should be cut off and burned as soon as they are discovered. Sometimes hail storms injure plants or large animals, such as cows, will run over shrubs and damage them. To promote well-shaped growth, these injured branches should be cut off. Limbs that chafe or rub across each other should be removed, as well as those which tend to sprawl out awkwardly regardless of the season. The Florida jasmine, abelia and similar plants can be made to grow compactly if the tender tips of the limbs are pinched out now and then.

Late summer, fall or early winter is not a good time to prune, Miss Hatfield warns. The shrubs might start growth which would not have time to harden before the cold weather arrives. Right now is not a good time to prune plants that will bloom in early spring because there is the danger of cutting the flowers off. Bridal wreaths, flowering peach,

Japonica or flowering quince, primrose jasmine, redbud, azaleas, and wisteria should not be pruned now.

Red cedars, arborvitae and large growing junipers are difficult to prune at any time. For this reason, the specialist suggests that they be planted only where large growth is needed.

Prune, Fertilize Shrubs And Trees Now, Specialist Says

College Station. — Right now is the height of the season for pruning, watering and fertilizing shrubs and shade trees, says Sadie Hatfield, homestead improvement specialist with the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service. Shrubs that bloom in late summer such as crape myrtle, vitex, flowering willow, salt cedar, oleander, althea, elaeagnus should be pruned now.

Of course there are cases where pruning should be done, regardless of the time of year, Miss Hatfield says that dead or

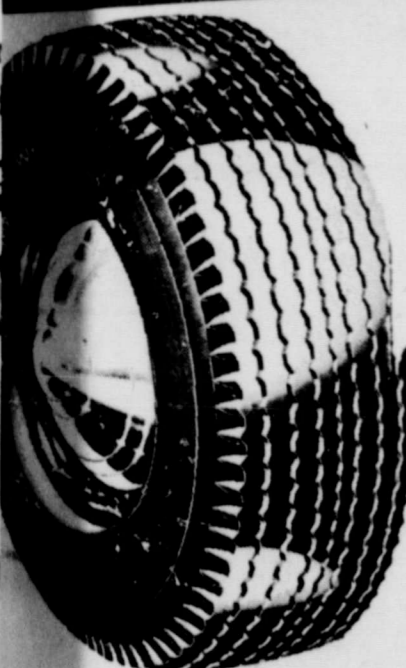

Final Week For Cotton Insurance

In Floyd County, the final week of the sales campaign of the Federal Crop Insurance program for cotton got under way this week. On Monday the sales were brisk and every indication was that the county would qualify under the program.

Ray S. McEntire, Adm. Officer of PMA, said: "We must have 200 units covered if the insurance is to be in effect. At the rate that the sales are now coming in, the county will qualify; however, those farmers who have not signed the contracts and are interested are reminded that their failure to sign may be the one contract that we need to qualify the county."

The cotton crop insurance policy provides protection of the cotton crop investment with the farmer paying a premium for this protection against the unknown—against what can happen to any crop any year that crop disaster strikes.

Crop disaster can strike any farm. It may not, but it can. Like other insurance, crop insurance for cotton protects against what might happen. It is a program of protection and the individual who considers it in terms of his chances of collection does not understand the purpose of insurance.

In Floyd County, January 31, 1951 is the deadline for writing this all-risk insurance on cotton. Full details of the program are available at the PMA Office.

In an appropriation of \$1,000 for the administration of the Compact, Corbin pointed out. In that connection, he cited his vote against a change in legislative rules to prevent consideration of special appropriation measures, pointing out that nevertheless the rule was adopted, 28-2.

The rule change prohibits consideration of any appropriation bills except the major money bills for state departments, education, institutions auxiliary for 75 days of the year.

"Even then, the money legislation is interpreted to mean until the 'big four' Corbin declared, that unless we can get a dispensation we're in a difficult time with the bill."
