- Service stations will probably close a part of the day. Some other stores may close but were undecided Wednesday.

Plans for the establishment of a City Park here and the opening of the swimming pool are being made by a group representing Lockney and several surrounding communities, it was reported to The Beacon this week by Claude Brown, chairman of the committee.

An ambitious program to renovate and bath houses at the swimming pool, relight the pool and open it to the public along with the construction of tennis courts, the landscaping of the park area surrounding the city auditorium, the installation of eight or ten lights and the purchasing of several pieces of playground equipment are all included in the plans.

Meetings began to discuss the matter several days ago and the committee was set up. Since that time around \$800 has been donated voluntarily to the project and several pieces of equipment given or promised.

The Lockney Business & Professional Women's Club gave \$50 to the fund, the people of Irick community through the Jolly Stitches Club gave \$200 and a merry-go-round, the American Legion auxiliary gave \$250 and will probably give more. The Lockney Softball League has given around \$100, the First National Bank has given \$100, the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department has agreed to give at least \$100, and the Lions Club and Rotary Club of Lockney have both agreed to help.

The Lockney Garden Club has agreed to help with the landscaping and the American Legion has offered some labor in the building part of the project. The Lockney High FFA chapter will also help in the landscaping, according to MacLee Brewer, local agriculture instructor.

Estimate of the cost of fixing the swimming pool has been set at around \$900, Mr. Brown said. In addition a pump and motor with which to pump the water from the pool must be purchased and this will require an additional investment of \$500. The local City government has agreed to help to some extent on this item, it was reported.

The Southwestern Public Service Company has recently made a survey of the area and has laid out a lighting plan for the project. The City will pay for the lights when they are installed. The Beacon was informed.

Anyone who wishes to donate tables, playground equipment or money may do so and it will be appreciated, Mr. Brown said. Money may be left at Brown's Cleaners, the First National Bank or The Beacon office. Any one of these places should be notified if equipment is to be given.

Members of the committee other than Mr. Brown are R. C. Mitchell, Claude Hammond, Mrs. Vada Webster, Mrs. G. A. McClelland, Joe Smith and Joe Parrish.

Fire Dept. Has Slim Lead In Softball League

The Fire Department softball team held a slim lead in the Lockney Softball League this week amid confusing reports and uncertainty. Rumors of first one team and then another withdrawing from the league ended up this week with a report that Providence had withdrawn and joined the Plainview league but league officials were hopeful that the team would complete the schedule here.

The dissatisfaction among the teams came about over a pitcher used by the Providence team. The managers last week voted to ask Providence to forfeit their games because of the use of the pitcher but on Thursday night Commissioner Marvin Gilbert overruled the vote and allowed the Providence team to keep their games won but ask that they not use the pitcher in future games. At the time it was thought that this settled the disagreement but rumors this week left the status of the league in uncertainty.

South Plains and the Legion teams continued their winning ways with no games lost and the Aiken team, hard-luck team of the league, came through to defeat the league-leading Providence team to get into the win column.

Games last Thursday night were postponed due to the death of John Kendall. On Friday night the Legion team whipped the Baptists 12 to 5 and Aiken won over Providence 18 to 13 after spotting the Providence boys a long lead.

A make-up game on Monday night, found the Fire Dept. team defeating Aiken 18 to 11 but on Tuesday night the Fire Boys lost a game to South Plains 9 to 3. The Legion was scheduled to play Providence the second game Tuesday night but the Providence team did not show up and the game was forfeited to the Legion, league officials said.

In a practice game the Legion team won out over the Fire Dept. 15-0.

Operators To Swab Floyd Prospector

Drilling had reached 7,784 feet and operators were preparing to swab the 22-foot open hole with 500 gallons of mud acid at the Standard Oil Co. of Texas No. 1 Minnie Adams, southeastern Floyd County prospector.

The discovery is 1,980 feet from west and 700 feet from north lines of Section 32, P. D. Adams Survey, 8 miles southeast of Floydada.

H. Bryan Pass and Brinsmere Oil Co. No. 1 H. A. Krause, wildcat in southwestern Floyd County, was drilling below 6,828 feet in hard lime, after a 1½-hour drillstem test from 6,494-6,580 feet recovered 1,165 feet of salt water-cut mud and 1,260 feet of salt water. Projected depth is 8,000 feet to test the Ellenburger.

Location is 600 feet from north and west lines of Section 29, Block K, TPRR Survey, 12 miles southwest of Floydada.

Town Fogged And Sprayed Recently

The entire city has been fogged the past week end and has recently been sprayed with a residual type spray which leaves a film that will kill flies for 30 to 60 days, Public Health chairman J. H. Holt said Monday.

The City borrowed a fogging machine from Plainview to do the fogging and Floyd Barber Jr. of Lockney did the spraying. Officials have warned recently that fogging and spraying would not rid the city of flies and that fly breeding places must be eliminated to do a thorough job.

New Superintendent To Move Soon

W. C. Irons and family will move here probably this week end from Quitman, Texas. Mr. Irons is the new superintendent of the Lockney school system. He has purchased the former Fred Hall home on South West Third Street.

Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Reeves and son will move also this week end to Quitman where Mr. Reeves will assume the superintendency of that school. He has sold his home here to Claude Hammond.

Fire Truck Called To J. K. West Home

One of the trucks of the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department made a run to the J. K. West home, 12 miles northeast of Lockney Sunday afternoon in answer to a call. A feed stack was destroyed by fire and others threatened. The local firemen spread the feed out and extinguished the fire in the burning stack, preventing its spread to other stacks. Audvie Barnett, assistant chief, drove the truck.

Boots Bryant Dies At Muleshoe

H. M. (Boots) Bryant died suddenly at Muleshoe Friday morning of last week. He was found dead in his car in front of his office about 7 a. m. Death apparently was caused by a heart attack.

Mr. Bryant was manager of the Paymaster Gin and Elevator at Muleshoe. He had opened his office and turned on the radio before returning to his car where he suffered the attack.

Mr. Bryant was a former resident of Lockney, being connected with the Patterson Gin here for a number of years. He moved away in the early thirties. He was 51 years of age.

Funeral services were held at the First Methodist Church in Muleshoe Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. H. W. Hanks officiated.

Burial was in the Lockney cemetery at 4:30 Sunday afternoon. Ben McGhee of Lockney was an active pall bearer and honorary pall bearers included Jimmy Hodel, Bill Hodel, George Webster, Jesse Cox, and R. E. Patterson, all of Lockney. A large number of friends from Lockney attended the services.

Mr. Bryant was born at Moody, Texas Sept. 3, 1900. He was engaged in the ginning business at Silverton, Quitaque and Lockney and had lived in Amarillo before moving to Muleshoe. He was a member of the Muleshoe Lions Club and the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce.

Survivors include his wife and four children, Bo, Jane, Jim and Carol Ann, all of Muleshoe; four brothers and three sisters.

Funeral Services For John Kendall Friday

Funeral services for John E. Kendall were held last Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the First Baptist Church here. Rev. N. S. Daniel and Rev. J. R. Naylor conducted the services. Burial was in the Lockney Cemetery.

John was killed by a bolt of lightning late Wednesday afternoon of last week while working on the Hershel Carthel farm north of town. He was a 1952 graduate of Lockney High School and was 18 years of age.

Survivors include his father and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Kendall of Lockney, one sister and one brother.

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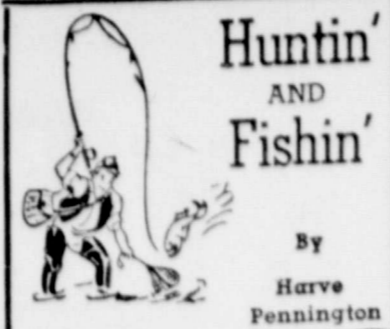

With the coming of the very warm days of midsummer game fish, especially bass, will seek out the deeper parts of the lake, deep-water bars and spring areas, when in such places the surface and wobbling lures will not draw and it will be necessary for the fisherman to go down to the fish if any are to be taken. Usually, too, the fish are not very active when in the depths and a slowly moving bait will be more attractive than a rapid moving spoon or plug. For this reason frogs and medium large minnows should be cast over bars and spring holes, well weighted so that they may be returned slowly just off the bottom.

Line bait, carefully cast, will often be the taking lure at this time, but a dead frog or minnow can be tip manipulated so that it will be equally attractive. This tip work is something difficult to describe, but consists of a mixture of tiny jerks, trembles, slow glides and stops, so placed and timed as to keep the bait in erratic action. It is not difficult, but there is just a bit of a knack in working it out. In plugs, wobblers may be weighted so as to run quite deep in the water but the best plug offering is the old fashioned underwater. The original wooden "minnie" we prefer that these be in natural food imitation such as the green or dark back with when below, the various scale finishes, the perch, club, reelin, pikie and other color combinations that make an attractive minnow-looking plug. These plugs should be cast, allowed to settle well to the bottom and then reeled in with the tip manipulation.

Get the last part of that advice, tip manipulation; that is just the difference between casting an underwater successfully and drawing a blank. We like an underwater. It gets fish for us, but we also know how unattractive a straight reeled plug usually is and how many fishermen have given up the old style plug entirely. Pork rind rings can well be cast in the depths.

State Road Funds Offered Floydada For Improvements

Austin. — The State Highway Commission has tendered the city of Floydada a proposal to spend almost \$80,000 for highway improvements in that city.

The commission offer will expire automatically within 90 days unless accepted by the city. Upon acceptance by Floydada and fulfillment of its requirements, the State highway department will proceed with plans and construction.

Floydada officials requested assistance on US 70, State 207 and FM 784 in the city, and the highway department analysis indicated that the work asked for would "materially aid traffic safety."

The State will spend an estimated \$79,600 for pavement widening on US 70 from the north city limit to the east city limit, approximately 2 miles; pave the middle section of boulevards on State 207 from US 70 to Fifth Street, approximately 1 mile.

The city is called upon to furnish right-of-way, immediate construction of curbs and gutters, utility adjustments, storm sewers, assume responsibility for construction of driveways and sidewalks when necessary, regulate traffic, provide for parallel parking and prevent encroachment upon the right-of-way.

Hale County School Consolidation Loses

Consolidation of the Plainview Independent School District and the Eastmound Rural School District was defeated in elections held Friday in the two districts.

Needing a majority vote in both districts, the proposition was voted down, 37 2/3 by the Eastmound district. Incomplete results from polling places in the Plainview district favored the consolidation, 42 1/3.

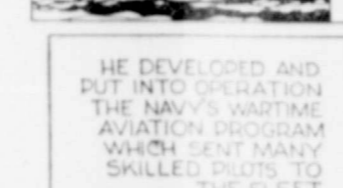
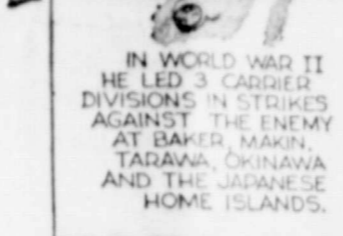

County Has Sent 22 To State Pen In Past 10 Years

Huntsville. - Floyd County in the past ten years has committed 22 prisoners to the Texas Prison System.

This was revealed recently in a study conducted inside the prison by graduate students at Sam Houston State Teachers College, under the supervision of Dr. Rupert C. Koeninger head of the college's sociology department.

In number of commitments per thousand population, the County ranked 119th in the State with 2.09 persons per thousand committed, the study further showed. Ten counties during the period, 1942 to 1951, representing 41.73 per cent of the total population based on the 1950 census, committed 50.27 per cent of the prisoners.

In the order of the number of commitments they were Harris, Dallas, Bexar, El Paso, Tarrant, Hidalgo, Jefferson, Travis, Cameron and Wichita. These counties committed 11,424 of the 22,705 total commitments.

Highest among them in percentage of population in commitments was El Paso County, which sent 5.77 men per thousand and ranks ninth in the State in percentage of commitments. Next was Hidalgo, which committed 4.51 per thousand, ninth in the State. Others and the number per thousand committed were Harris, 4.07, Wichita, 3.76, Dallas, 3.38, Cameron, 3.13, Jefferson, 3.18, Bexar, 2.87, Travis, 2.74 and Tarrant, 2.66.

In 1951, the order of number of commitments ran according to the ten year average, except that Nueces County was eighth. Over the ten years, Nueces County, which ranks seventh in population, is twelfth in number of commitments.

In number of commitments per thousand, Culberson County heads the list through the ten years, having sent an average of 14.25 Next is Sterling with 11.7. Dallam County is third with 10.21. Fourth is Hartley with 2.32; then Stephens with 6.98.

Two counties - Kennedy and Loving - have not committed

anyone to the prison in the ten years.

More persons were committed to the prison in 1951 than in any other year during the study. There were 3,056. The lowest year was 1943 when 1,579 were committed. The number has increased each year since, except in 1948 when the number fell below the 1947 mark.

The percentage of increase in number of commitments in 1951, however, fell below that of the previous four years. There were only two per cent more in 1951, as compared with a 13.7 increase in 1950.

Floydada. - Officials here are on the lookout for an 86-year-old Floydada man, Robert Lee Audrey, who has been missing since June 12.

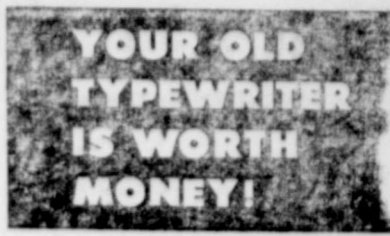

The challenging thing about the project is that the July

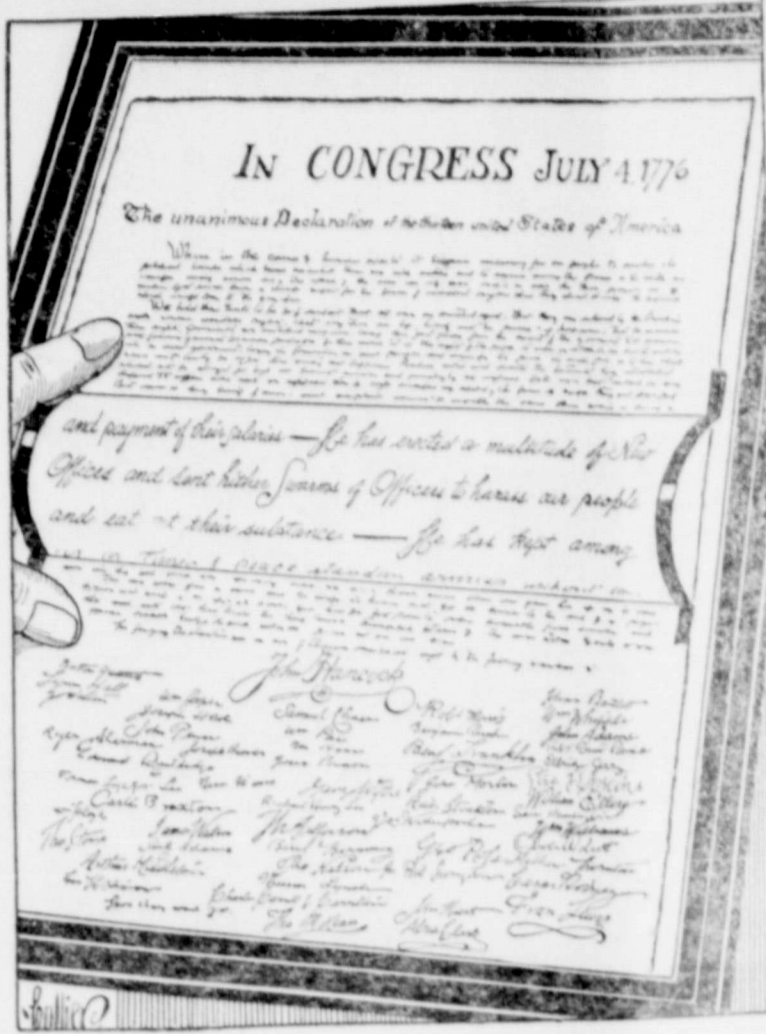

A NOTE OF WARNING

A note of warning to every West Texan was sounded at a recent meeting here of Area Two of High Plains Water District No. 1. A spokesman for the district said that unless West Texans awaken to the fact that they have such a district and that it is actively operating, Texas is faced with the threat of losing the Underground Water Conservation District Law passed by the 51st Texas Legislature.

Those attending the meeting were told that at every subsequent session of the Legislature attempts have been made to have other water conservation measures enacted which would do away with the present one. The bad thing about that, it was explained, is that the present law is the best possible one for this section of Texas. Some of the others, if passed, would practically sound the death knell for underground water conservation in this section of the state.

Plans are being made at these area meetings to launch a program of public education on the

water district in order to let the people know what is being done and what is to be done over a long period of time to conserve our underground water supply.

This water district was organized last year by a vote of the people. In some cases, it may be our only chance of insuring our supply of water. For that reason, we should meet the district officials at least half way in any program of education. We can do this by trying to learn all we can about our water district, what it is doing for us and what it plans to do in the future. That will make their task of "education" much simpler and give them more time to devote to the purpose for which the district was organized — conservation of our underground water. — Hackley County Herald.

The latest graduating class of famous Texas A. & M. College was addressed by the president of an oil company whose headquarters are in Houston. His subject was, "What Is Success?" He told the young men, many of

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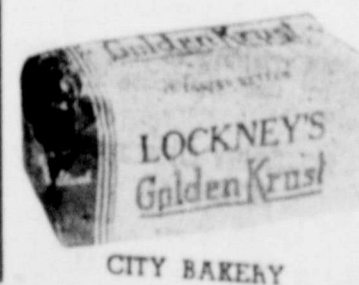

Bond Old No. 9 TL&D Well Abandoned

The ninth irrigation well which the Texas Land & Development installed in its vast program of development of irrigation on the High Plains of Texas is no longer producing, because of mechanical failure. It is No. 9 well, as designated by the company, drilled in 1913. Manager Winfield Holbrook of TL&D said, when asked about the history of the well. It was drilled years before he moved to Plainview.

The casing in this well caved in when effort was made to withdraw it to clean and repair the well. So Lockview Farms management decided to have a new well drilled nearby.

Elton Flake and H. O. Bogle's outfit were drilling away on a new well, 150 feet from the old location, when the rotary bit dropped into a void and circulation was lost. This cavity was where sand and clay had been pumped out of the old well through the years. At 150 feet distance from the old hole it was estimated as between 20 and 30 feet deep.

Lockview's manager, Harold

Loden, had the outfit moved 800 feet away to drill another hole. Identically, Lockview had several wells packed with gravel several years ago. The gravel didn't let the water and clay both through and these wells were abandoned, and new wells drilled nearby.

When the No. 9 well, which has been abandoned, was sunk, the practice was to dig by hand until water was encountered. This well has been variously improved from time to time. The present pump is being moved to the new well.

Asked about the behavior of water in that area, Loden said that of course the water table has declined under recent heavy pumping.

"How long will it last?" he was asked.

"Oh, there's no shortage of water. It will last indefinitely." He didn't seem perturbed about the longevity of Plains irrigation water.

Holbrook, long experienced in the Garden City, Kan., ground-water irrigation area before he came here, said that wells were frequently lost there through collapsed casing.

Teachers Continue To Improve Training

Austin. — Despite the fact that Texas teachers have not had an increase in their base salaries since 1949, they have continued to improve their professional training. They now rank among the five top states in the nation in teacher preparation, according to Charles H. Tennyson, executive secretary of the Texas State Teachers Association.

Tennyson said that figures available from the Texas Education Agency show that more than 95 percent of the state's 58,513 public school teachers now hold degrees from accredited institutions of higher learning.

During the school term just closed, only 2,299 or 4.5 per cent of the white teachers in the state did not have degrees. Only 146 or 1.84 per cent of the Negro teachers in Texas do not have degrees.

The school year 1951-52 also marked progress in another direction, Tennyson added. It was the first year in the history of the state that the schools did not have some people teaching who had less than a high school education. The previous year 34 such people were employed as teachers.

Abilene. — The thirty-fifth annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce will be held in Wichita Falls October 19, 20, and 21, President Frank H. Kelley of Colorado City announced today.

The WTCC convention program committee will be appointed shortly to plan for the largest and most constructive convention since pre-war days.

College Station. — Rural homemakers and girls in Texas are finding ways of doing housework more easily and in less time. This is the result of the work simplification program sponsored by the Agricultural Extension Service. The purpose of this program is to encourage interest in management of time, energy and equipment in the home so that work may be done simpler, easier, quicker and safer.

Figures from the annual report of the Extension home management specialists show that 83,305 homemakers and 4-H members in 1951 applied work simplification methods to the improvement of their homemaking jobs. The program commenced in 1946 when the specialists held training meetings for home demonstration agents and adult leaders in counties where interest was shown. Due to increased demands, it was necessary to limit training by specialists to 10 counties in each Extension district.

Last year in 134 counties, 28,558 families improved house-keeping methods. For example, it was found that house cleaning could be made easier if all members of the family were trained to hang up clothes; put articles back in proper places; clean washpans, lavatory and bathrooms; clean shoes before entering the house; keep waste paper and trash off the floor and help with all house cleaning jobs.

After the home management specialists gave a two day training meeting in Childress county to 15 leaders the home demonstration agent reported that these leaders gave 26 work simplification demonstrations to 410 people and helped 75 individuals who were not club members.

The people taught reported that they simplified their methods of setting tables; house cleaning; making beds; washing dishes; producing preserving and serving of food; caring for clothes and shoes; keeping the yard and washing and ironing.

Home demonstration club members have found that every motion counts and that work simplification rules need to be applied to each individual job. Mrs. A. B. Ward, Cook County, simplified her job of feeding chickens. Formerly, she made a trip to the feed bin for each of the eight pans of feed needed. Her solution of this problem was to fill one large container with feed and wheel it on a small wagon to fill the small pans. She has reduced the trips from 20 to six and takes care of the rabbits at the same time.

The jobs most commonly simplified by 4-H girls are setting the table, preparing and serving meals, sewing, caring for clothes and grooming. The assistant home demonstration agent, Bexar County stated, "Girls just love to learn and how they can simplify their jobs and save time for other activities they like to do." The statistical report of the home management specialists shows 733 junior and adult 4-H leaders trained. They in turn gave 615 demonstrations and taught 49,283 other people the principles of job management.

Mary Loy Fulp, 4-H'er from McLennan County, thinks doing

your work in the simplest way not only saves energy, but time as well. She learned to organize her work and omit all unnecessary parts of a job. Now she correlates work simplification with her active demonstrations in clothing, food preparation, canning and freezing foods, farm safety and home improvement.

All four performances will begin at 8:30 in the evening with a wide assortment of events and participating cowboys from all over the Tri-State area, Ohio and California.

Events include: calf roping, bull dogging, double mugging, saddle bronc riding, bare back bronc riding and a cowgirl sponsor contest.

Final performance, on the evening of July 17, will climax the Swisher County Old Settlers' Picnic — the 62nd celebration of the birthday of the county. Following the rodeo, a fireworks display will be run off.

Livestock for the rodeo are being furnished by Claud Hays of Weatherford, Okla., who furnished the same livestock for the Polio Benefit Rodeo in Oklahoma City last January.

The Tullia Rodeo is sponsored by the Tullia Rodeo Club. The Club recently added 1,000 seats to the spectators' area.

42 To Lose Lives During Holiday

Austin. — Most Texans are looking forward eagerly to the long three-day Fourth of July holiday this year but there is one group who eye the prospects with a tongue-in-cheek attitude. They are Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety and the personnel of his Highway Patrol Division.

Garrison pointed out today that while the Nation would be celebrating the birth of its independence Americans generally would find themselves "slaves" of the traffic menace, in Texas alone, he said, 42 persons will lose their lives in traffic accidents on July 4, 5 and 6.

The extra-long holiday period will flood the highways with additional automobiles filled with vacationists and pleasure seekers bound for beaches, resorts, ball games, parks, night spots and every conceivable place of recreation. Hundreds will be hospitalized as the result of traffic injuries and the morgue will claim the toll of 42.

In appealing to his fellow Texans to break the fetters of traffic "slavery" by cautious motoring, Garrison said: "There is no justifiable reason why intelligent people should slaughter themselves in their quest for a good time. We take no pride at all in the fact that our statisticians can predict with considerable accuracy the disaster on our highways. They know that lack of observance of the traffic laws is responsible for the vast majority of highway deaths and our best recourse as a preventive measure is to appeal directly to the drivers. We urgently plead

that you will practice a safe and sane Fourth behind the wheel of your car. And, remember... in driving, as in a ball game, it's not how many times you start that counts but how many times you reach home safely."

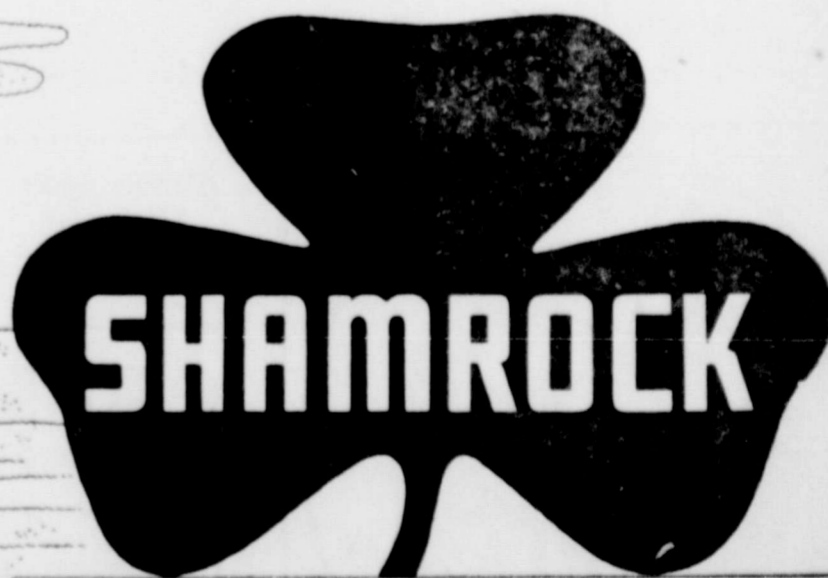
