



One of the most astounding

One state had the good judgment to put 2,521 of these drivers off of the road as dangerous to public safety. But two other states took away the licenses of only 8 and 11, while the remainder did little better. it is terrifying to think that mental incompetents and habitual drunkards çan get a license to operate a high-speed motor vehicle in the first place. It becomes unbelievable to learn that a great many of them are given a second chance to kill and mains that they are driving cars by the thousands.

Then consider our attitude oward the drunken driver who kills. 

DOCTRINE VERSUS DOCTRINES

"Doctrine" is a good word even though it is detested by many religious people. Even preachers have registered their voices against doctrinal preaching. Doctrine simply means teaching, hence a sermon that is not doctrinal does

Both the singular and plural forms are found in the Bible. The singular is used many times with reference to Divine truth, but the plural always refers to that which is false. Jesus said, "In vain they worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men". (Mk. 7:7.) The Spirit said to the Hebrew Christians, "Be not carried about with divers and strange doctrines," (Heb. 13:9.) Paul said, "Some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits, and doctrines of devils," (1 Tim. 4:1.) Since there is no unity in Satanic teachings, it is proper to refer to such as plural. He makes no effort to be consistent, hence his system can conflict at many points. "He is a liar and the father of it." (Jno. 8:44.)

Christ is truth (Ino. 14:6) therefore His words must be harmonious. Since perfect unity inheres in the gospel it is proper to call it doctrine, rather than doctrines. Jesus said, 'My doctrine is not mine, but his that sent me," (Ino. 7:16.) The Jerusalem church "continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine," (Acts 2:42.) There were several apostles, but they all taught one doctrine. To Titus, Paul said, "Speak thou the things which become sound doctrine," (Tit. 2:1.) The apostle John said, "Whosoever transgresseth, and abideth not in the doctrine of Christ hath not God," (2 Jno. 9.)

Contrary to the truth, some insist that the Bible furnishes all the doctrines that are taught in the religious world today. Since it is impossible for God to lie (Heb. 6:18) He can not be the author of two conflicting tenets. Two preachers can not differ in doctrine and both be right. God abhors the doctrines of men, whether they are taught by one person or by many. If a preacher should stand before an audience and affirm that the "one baptism" is sprinkling: and the next moment say it is immersion, the people would have no confidence in him. If he should say that Christians can not fall from grace, then in the same sermon warn them against falling, his sincerity would be doubted. If he should urge people to become members of the "one body," and at the same time invite them to join the church of their choice, his influence would be nil. If it is wrong for one man to preach doctrines that conflict, it is just as wrong for a dozen men to do so. God's united truth must be found in one of His preachers, and it must be found in all. The apostolic injunction is "I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ that ye all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you, but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind, and in the same judgment." (1 Cor. 1:10.)

May the time come when men will turn from human organizations and doctrines, and walk according to the doctrine of the Blessed Redeemer.
