The changes made affect all three classes - swine, sheep and cattle - and rule out all breeding stock except open classes and dairy cattle.

The plan is to make the show a fat stock show in fact as well as in name, giving the breeding stock a chance to be shown in the fall at the county fair.

Reporting on the changes aopted county agent Bill Rodgers said that in the swine division en gilts may be shown in a eight range of 160 to 250 pounas, and that a top weight of 250 pounds has been set for the heavy division in each breed.

In the fat lamb division the lamb class has been divided to provide-for a fine wool competition and a medium wool, the two types of animals to compete for the grand and reserve championship. Only ewe lambs to be shown will be in a new class added -ewe lambs with lamb
