

SANCTIFICATION

Sanctify means "to make holy" or "purify as from sin." This is a dictionary definition of the word and we shall see that God's definition is the same. Let us note first the word 'purify." I Peter 1:22 "Seeing that you have purified your souls by obeying the truth . . . "Here we note that obedience to something is necessary in the purifying process and that something is the truth. Let this be remembered as we turn to John 17:17 "Sanctify them through thy truth: thy word is truth." Here we see that the truth sanctifies and that truth is the word of God. Thus, obedience to the word of God brings sanctification or purifying from sin. Now what obedience is involved in this process? In I Cor. 6:10. ll we find our answer "Nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners, shall inherit the kingdom of God. And such were some of you: but ye are washed, but ye are sanctified, but ye are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God." Note that washed, justified, and sanctified are used together and are the same process. Keeping this in mind and also remembering that sanctification is "purifying from sin." let us see if "washing" and "purifying from sin" are ever used together in God's word as an act of obedience to the truth. In Acts 22:16 Saul of Tarsus is commanded by the preacher Ananias "And now why tarriest thou? Arise and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord." Where did Ananias get such a command as this? Could it not be that he remembered the command of Jesus "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved" (Mark 16:16), or the command of the Holy Spirit through Peter "Repent and be baptized everyone of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38). In Heb. 13:12 we find that we are sanctified by the blood of Jesus. That blood was shed in his death "Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father. even so we should rise to walk in newness of life" (Ro--Selected. mans 6:4).







DISTINGUISHED INDUSTRY?

A significant decision was handed down in a Lubbock District Court last week. The Court ruled that a cotton gin is a nuisance. Doubtless many ginners are alarmed at the decision, but they certainly should not be surprised. Whole sections of towns in Crosby County have been rendered almost uninhabitable during ginning seasons. And still are so. The ginners are not to be blamed. When the present cotton gins were built there were only a few people living in the lee of the continuous dust storm now prevaling. Furthermore, forty years ago cotton was picked and often a bale of cotton havled to the gin would not yield twenty pounds of dust. Today a bale is likely to yield 200 pounds. But as cotton processing has changed and ginning methods have improved, perhaps ginners have not looked carefully enough at the additional hardship a gin brings to a community. Several years ago a gin in South Texas got its name in the papers by installing dust collectors about its plant that made it no greater menace to the health of the community than a grocery store. Could be that dust collecting could make a distinguished industry of our ginning.






