## Hereford Is Grand Champion In Local Show

For the third year in succession Bobby Brown, a member of the Lockney Future Farmer chapter, showed the grand champion beef calf in the Lockney Junior Livestock Show, held here Saturday at the oil mill building. Bobby's calf this year was a milk-fed Hereford. He collected \$40 in prize money on this one calf, winning \$20 for first place in the milk-fed division and \$20 for grand champion. The calf was bred by J. W. Largent of Merkel, Texas.

Wilbur Adams, top showman of the local show for the past two years, FFA, showed the reserve champion beef calf, a beef type shorthorn, bred by R. C. Mitchell of Lockney. The calf won first place in the heavy steer class. Wilbur also showed the second place steer in the heavy division, a black Angus bred by Earl Kellison of Lockney.

Warren Mitchell, 4-H club boy showed the first place steer in the light weight class. It was a beef type shorthorn bred by his father, Chester Mitchell. Boland Watson, Lockney FFA, won second place in the milk fed division with a Hereford, also bred by Largent. Carroll Carthel won second place in the light weight steer division with a Black Angus bred by Herman Thornton of South Plains.

Donice Casey, Lockney FFA, showed the grand champion fat barrow, a Chester White which was bred on his own farm, northeast of Lockney. The reserve champion fat barrow was also a Chester White, owned by Gene Handley, FFA, last year's winner and bred on the Handley farm. Donice's barrow won first place in the heavy class while Gene's won first place in the light class.

Gene also showed the best pen of 3 barrows and Jerry Barham FFA showed the best gilt.

Eldon Fortenberry, Lockney FFA, carried off most of the sheep prizes. His Southdown won grand and reserve champion, first and second in the fat lamb division, first and second in the breeding ewes division and first place in the pen of 3. All the sheep were bred on the Fortenberry farm in the Cedar Hill community.

Warren Mitchell's shorthorn heifer won first place in the breeding heifer class. It was also bred by Chester Mitchell. Bobby Brown's shorthorn heifer won second.

In the baby beef class, Bobby Brown's calf won first, and Warren Mitchell's calves won second and third, all shorthorns.

**Black Angus Class**  
Money winners at the show were the boys who showed in the special Aberdeen-Angus class sponsored by Angus breeders of the area. Wilbur Adams's calf, which won second in the heavy steer division, won first place in this class bringing him \$100 in prize money. Carroll Carthel's calf won second prize of \$80. All other boys showing Angus.

## Joe Holt Heads Lockney C-C For Coming Year

Joseph H. Holt, medical technologist at Lockney General Hospital, was named president of the Lockney Chamber of Commerce in its annual meeting last Friday night at the American Legion Hall. Mr. Holt was unable to be present for installation due to illness.

Other officers named were Lowell Billrey, vice-president, and Bill McClaskey, temporary secretary-treasurer. Directors named were Marvin Cox, Edgar R. Hays, Oscar Golden, Bob Miller as retiring president automatically becomes a member of the board. Holdover members are R. L. Knox Jr. and W. O. Stuart.

A disappointing crowd of some 60 people were present for the annual banquet and meeting but the program was far from disappointing. Introduced as a guest from "Hackberry", Texas, a tall gangling man arose to stammer and stutter through a very amusing talk finally turning out to be Wayne B. Smith, manager of the Plainview Chamber of Commerce who ended his talk on the serious side with words concerning the building of a town.

Retiring president Bob Miller presided during the meeting and gave a summary of the accomplishments of the Chamber for the past year. Those included the acquiring of the Anderson-Clayton estate here for FFA use, the sponsoring of the junior fat stock show, aiding in staging the soil fertility school, sponsoring a sales school, giving a prize for the first bale of cotton.

Miller said that the membership and board had approved the hiring of a full time manager for the local Chamber and said that the budget goal for this year had been set at \$6,000.

A financial report from Secretary-Treasurer Bill McClaskey showed receipts for the year of \$1638.94, expenditures for the year of \$1681.06 with a balance on hand of \$1282.96. He reported 35 sustaining members during the past year but said Wednesday that others had been added since that time. Also the Chamber has 17 junior members, composed of High School students.

Vocal music was furnished for the occasion by The Chordettes, a girls trio from Lockney High composed of Joan Harris, Eldora Boone and Barbara Hays, accompanied by Ernestine Spradlin.

Out-of-town guests present included T. L. Holland, new president of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce and Mrs. Holland; O. M. Watson Jr., manager of the Floydada Chamber, and Mrs. Watson.

## City Police Radio Now In Operation

The Lockney city police radio, purchased recently along with a new police car for the city, is in operation. Mayor J. E. Cox said Tuesday, although it is operating under a Plainview police permit. Cox suggested that anyone within the city limits who needed a city officer at any time, need only to call the Plainview police station, and they would immediately short wave the local police car and notify them where they were wanted.

Some controversy developed over the use of the local radio unit the past week when County Sheriff Earl Cooper refused to allow the unit to be operated under the county permit. Cooper told The Beacon Wednesday that "I didn't see fit to allow the radio to operate under the county license under the present set-up and I will be glad to explain why to anyone interested."

City officials have asked for and received permission from the Plainview police to operate under their permit and the local unit will operate that way until further arrangements are made, they said this week. Meanwhile application has been filed for an individual permit for the city unit with the Federal Communications Commission, by city officials.

Incumbents Joe Holt and Lloyd Wofford are also offering for re-election for the office of alderman. Also seeking these posts are Jimmy Hodel, who filed some 10 days ago and Kelton Shaw, who filed last Saturday morning.

The election will be held at the city office.

## City Retains Good Fire Record Credit

The City of Lockney will retain its 20% good fire record credit for the coming year, according to a report issued recently by the State Fire Insurance Division. The city had a 20% credit the past year and the year previous to that held a 25% good fire credit.

Texas cities or towns may have from a 25% good fire credit to a 15% penalty on fire insurance premiums depending upon losses for the past year. The few fire losses sustained within the city during the past year is responsible for the good fire record credit.

Efficient work of the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department along with cleanliness of the city and carefulness to avoid fire hazards by local residents is responsible for the low fire losses here.

## Minute Editorials

Behold, the Lord's hand is not shortened that it cannot save.—Isaiah 59:1.

**THIS IS PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK.** The need for the public school never changes, but times and conditions may change or methods and practices of public education may change. This is inherent with anything that grows for growth is the result of change. Here are some facts regarding our public schools that affect the existence of every school in Texas: Each year one of every nine teachers leave the profession. One-sixth of present public school personnel are past 50 years of age. 34,899 students will be graduated from Texas schools in 1954-55. One out of every seven should enroll in higher education to meet the immediate need for new teachers.

**IF YOU HAVEN'T** done so take today to visit your public schools. They are a heritage of a free democracy and should not be taken for granted. You worked and fought and died that we may have free pub-

lic schools. Let us expend what ever effort is necessary to keep them free.

**DURING HIS LIFETIME** any man can contribute up to \$50,000 to his church — in terms of money and service. That striking thought comes from Robert W. Larson, editor of the Union-Republican, Alvia, Iowa, and a Lutheran lay leader. "If men were to give more time and money to their churches," he went on, "the influence of the Christian philosophy would rise in a dramatic and significant manner in our own community and throughout the world." Some church-goers who shove a five-dollar bill over the liquor store counter for a fifth of whiskey just can't seem to shake another five-spot from their fingers into their church treasuries. If ever a sorry world was in need of a Christian resurgence, this is the time. And that demands both money and manpower.

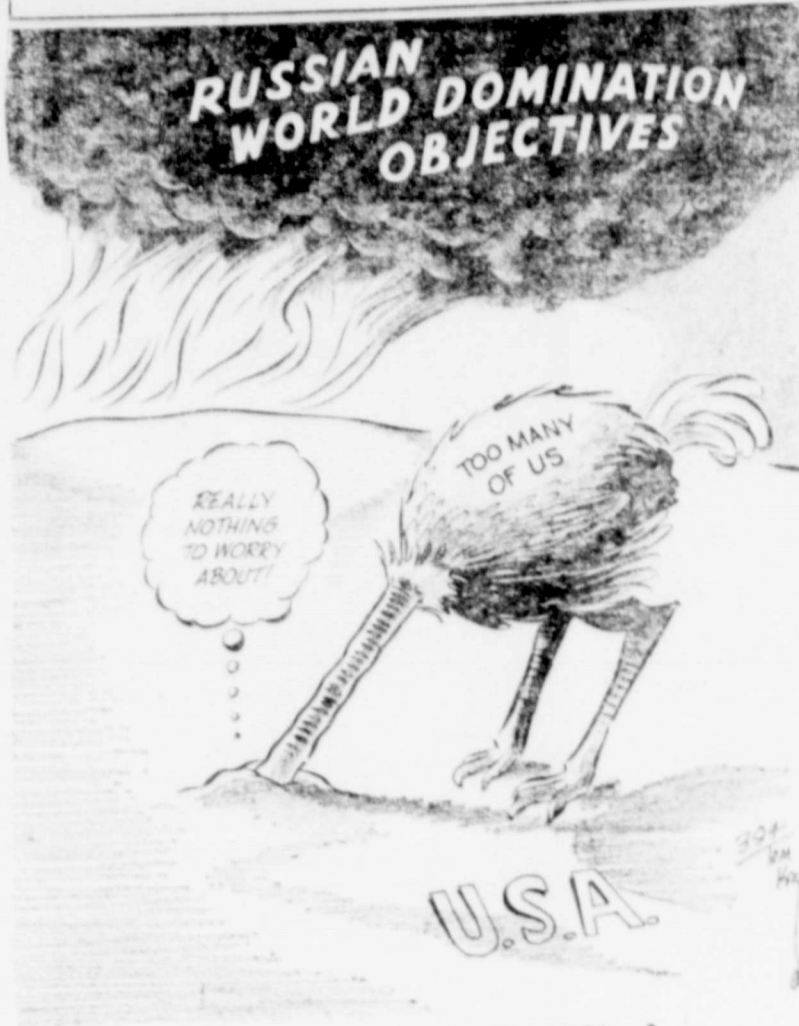

**KILL EACH OTHER**  
Apparently this is our own personal war. America's that is. I think we like it better that way. In the Korean mess, there were a dozen or more other nations involved with us, and the U. N. was always hollering about "sanctuary" and let's not make anybody mad at us, so we never came to victory. The announcement of orders to our Navy that there is to be no sanctuary, and the efficient and business-like shooting down of a couple of marauding MIGs last week have conveyed the impression that if we have a war of our own we don't have to ask too many people what to do next. It all adds up though to the fact that we are in a shooting war, and one of the inflexible rules of war is that participants are allowed to kill each other. — You Be The Judge in Crainston Review.

**THE EDITORS DILEMMA**  
A number of exchanges reaching my desk have carried the following item on editors, so I see no reason for me not picking it up, too.

If the editor makes a mistake, folks say he ought to be hung; if a lawyer makes a mistake, he appeals the case; when a doctor makes a mistake, they say nothing because they don't know Latin and they couldn't read his writing if they did.  
A doctor can use a word a mile long and it won't make any difference whether he knows what it means or not, for folks will think that he is educated, while an editor has to be able to spell any word he uses.  
If the doctor goes to see another man's wife, he charges for the visit, while if the editor goes, he gets shot. People that call the doctor and get well think

he's a great man. If they don't get well, they're dead and can't say anything.  
Two-thirds of the folks in town are sore at the editor either because the newspaper said something about them they didn't like or something nice about somebody else they didn't like either. — Eddie Warren in Post Dispatch.

### TOOTHLESS LAW

It's the law. Texas counties are required by statute to submit their budgets to the State auditor.  
Yet 104 counties didn't bother to comply last year. Why? Because the law has no teeth; the State auditor is given no power to force compliance.  
The great majority of the 104 counties did nothing with their funds that was objectionable. The fact remains, however, that they were not subject to scrutiny of an official who might have helped avoid some mistakes.  
Texas Commissioners' courts handled more than a billion dollars in assessed property taxes last year. Texas counties have debts totaling one billion five hundred million dollars.  
Business on this scale deserves the businesslike handling called for by law. — Lubbock Avalanche.

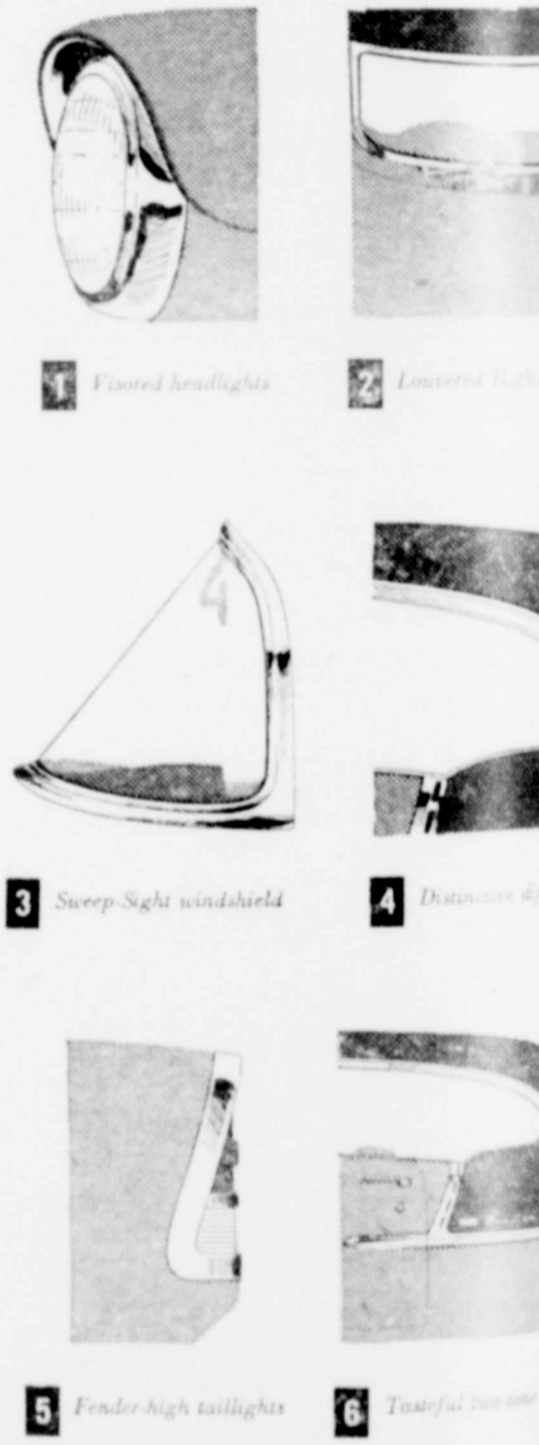

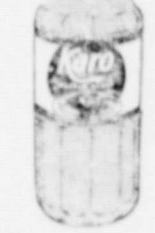

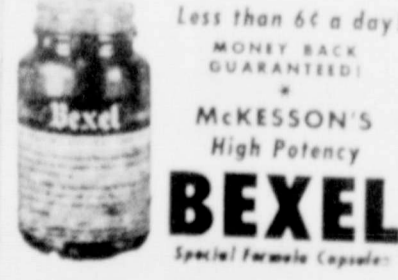

### Water District Seeks New Laws On Regulation

The directors and officials of the Floyd County Farm Bureau voted approval of an amendment to House Bill No. 404, which is legislation dealing with underground water, in a meeting with officials of the High Plains Water Conservation District No. 1 Tuesday night. Report on the meeting came from W. R. Puckett, Floyd County service agent. The meeting was held in the Farm Bureau office at Floydada.

Mr. Puckett said that the amendment to H. B. No. 404 concerned rights of the individual farmer to sue for damage if a well was drilled in violation of the law near his property. A hearing on the amendment was scheduled for Wednesday in the House of Representatives at Austin. After voting approval of the amendment Wednesday night, the board instructed Mr. Puckett to call state headquarters of the Farm Bureau Wednesday and notify them of the decision.

The Farm Bureau will furnish a free barbecue lunch on Thursday for FFA and 4-H club members who have livestock on exhibition at the Floyd County Junior Livestock Show.

Conforming with request of the High Plains Water Conservation District No. 1 and his Lubbock County constituents, Representative George Berry of Lubbock, has introduced House Bill No. 404, designed to strengthen the ground-water law, H. B. 162, Acts of the 51st Legislature.

The bill is an effort of the water district and proponents of ground-water regulation to give such districts power to control production of water. Under it no man within such a district can drill an irrigation well without express permission from the governing body of the district, nor can he alter or change a well or provide water at a higher rate than the district prescribes, re-

Under the amendments one who has interest in land can sue for damage against a violator of the rules, and production in excess of the limited amount is illegal, wasteful per se, and nuisance under the amendments proposed.

A land owner within a half mile of such an unauthorized well could take court action, coming into court with presumption of damage in his favor, and with the court instructed by the amended law to advance such suits for trial and determine as expeditiously as possible, with no postponements or continuances, including first motion therefor, shall be granted except for reasons deemed imperative by the court.
