Legion Will Meet In Hotel Lobby

The Lockney American Legion Post, No. 141, will meet in regular meeting Monday night in the Baker Hotel Lobby, Post Commander Wayne Bybee said this week. The meeting will begin at 8 p. m.

The Legion Home was gutted by a fire Tuesday morning of last week. Bybee said Wednesday that an estimator had set the damage to the building proper at \$13,265. Insurance in the amount of \$8,000 was carried on the building.

Insurance on the furnishings was in the amount of \$1200 and the Post expects to collect about \$1170, Bybee said, since most all the furnishings were destroyed or damaged. A few chairs escaped the fire.

Members of the post are considering plans for repairing the building but no steps have been taken yet.

Farmers Begin To Replant Cotton

Some farmers of the area were starting to replant cotton the middle of the week, while others were waiting anxiously for the ground to dry enough to get into the fields. Most farmers who had cotton in the ground will be able to save some of it, reports say, in spite of heavy rains, weeds and blowing sand, but most of them will also have to replant a part of their crop.

Hail has also taken its toll among the cotton crops of the area and some will have to be replanted on account of hail storms.

Moisture the past week totaled only 25 of an inch with 12 falling Thursday and 13 falling Sunday according to local Weather Observer Joe Holt's gauge. The rain was heavier Sunday north and west of town with as much as a half inch falling in that area.

The moisture now totals 8.13 inches for May which is more than half as much rain as fell here all last year. Only 72 of an inch had fallen previously this year that being measured in January. This brings the total measurable moisture for the year to 8.85 inches. Other nearby areas have had up to 12 inches.

County Tax Rate Is Set At \$1.28

The Floyd County Commissioners Court, in a recent session, set the county tax rate at \$1.28 on the hundred dollar valuation. The court levied the limit of 80 cents on constitutional funds, which is the same as it was last year. These include the general fund, the permanent improvement fund, the general road and bridge fund and the jury fund. The general fund was set at 35c of the total and out of this fund will come 5c for the operation of the Floyd County library. The re-allocation voted by citizens of the county last fall gave the Commissioners authority to change the various funds but not to increase the total.

Other constitutional funds include 20 cents for road and bridge fund, five cents for jury fund and 20 cents for permanent improvement fund.

Special funds voted by the county in bond elections include 15 cents for a special road fund, 25c for road bonds, and 10c for court house bonds for a total of 48 cents.

Memorial Services To Be Held Monday

Memorial Day services will be held Monday at the local cemetery immediately following the annual dinner on the ground, according to Mr. E. A. Carter, president of the cemetery Association.

Veterans will decorate graves with flags furnished by the Post Office. Rev. Raymond Spence will be the speaker for the services.

Businesses Open
Most local stores will not close on Memorial Day, a survey by The Beacon on Wednesday revealed. Only places which plan to close are Southwestern Public Service Co., Parker Furniture Co., the Post Office, Pioneer Gas Company and the County Library. All other stores will be open for the day here, as far as The Beacon could ascertain.

At Floy, the Courthouse will be closed all day Monday in observance of Memorial Day and will also be closed Saturday morning because of Old Settlers meeting at Floy. However most officials will be available if needed. County Clerk Margaret Collier said.

Jury Favors Defendant In Will Contest

A jury in 110th District Court at Floy Monday needed only 10 minutes to return a verdict in favor of the defendant in a case which contested the will of the late W. F. Faggard.

Faggard's children by his first wife, Dr. John Faggard of Poteet, Mrs. Ruth Ballew and Mrs. Charles Bell, both of California and Paula Faggard Trotti of San Antonio, joined in a suit contesting the will which left Mrs. Faggard sole beneficiary. They charged that Mr. Faggard was of unsound mind and was unduly influenced by his wife when he made the will on April 14, 1953.

Numerous witnesses from Lockney were called in the case. The plaintiffs admitted, before the case went to the jury, that Mr. Faggard was of sound mind and rested their case on the undue influence angle. The jury found against the contention, thereby leaving the estate to Mrs. Faggard as the will directed.

Another suit, seeking to set aside a divorce of Mr. Faggard from his first wife, is pending as is a cross action by the present Mrs. Faggard seeking damages for defamation of character.

John Stapleton represented the defendant in the suit and Richard Stovall represented the plaintiffs. Judge Alton B. Chapman was on the bench.

Legion Auxiliary To Sell Poppies

The American Legion Auxiliary will sell poppies on the streets here Saturday honoring the war dead and wounded.

The wounded veterans themselves made the poppies and this is their means of making a living. One third of the proceeds will go to the disabled Veterans Hospital and two-thirds will go for local child welfare.

Silverton Girl Is Much Improved

Little Mary Schott, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Schott of Silverton, is much improved and may be able to return to her home soon from an Amarillo Hospital. The little girl was seriously injured when struck by a car some time ago and was unconscious for several weeks. She has completely regained consciousness and all her mental facilities now and is responding well to therapy treatment.

Local Firemen Help Search For Drowned Man

Several members of the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department went to Burson Lake, northeast of Silverton Monday morning to aid in the search for the body of Bill Thomas, 26-year-old Plainview man, who drowned Sunday afternoon. They took grappling hooks and ropes and dragged the lake some time until the body was found by a skin diver, Sgt. Tommy Gurkin of Amarillo Air Force base.

Fire Chief R. L. Knox Jr. accompanied by Assistant Chief Lowell Bilbrey, Lloyd Paul Reece, Donald Reece, Curtis Williams and City Officer Alton May went to the lake. The local men were present when the body was found and helped in pulling it from 20 feet of water and carrying it to shore.

Thomas was drowned about 3:30 Sunday afternoon when a boat in which he and five others were riding capsized on the lake when it made a quick turn. The boat was chasing a tame duck. Thomas was wearing high top cowboy boots and had little chance to swim, observers said. Gurkin found the body after a 15 minute search on the bottom of the lake. Upon finding the body he came to the surface and took down a rope which he tied around the body to lift it.

Thomas' wife and children were in another boat nearby and watched helplessly as the boat overturned. All were saved except Thomas.

Funeral services for the deceased man were held Wednesday afternoon at Plainview.

Old Settlers In Annual Meeting Saturday All Day

Floyd County old settlers and some young settlers too will meet in the annual get-together Saturday at Floy. It will be an all-day meeting and into the night, with registration starting at 8 a. m. and a square dance closing out the meeting Saturday night.

County Clerk Margaret Collier will be in charge of registration and will set up her registration booth at the west steps of the courthouse or just inside the corridor, depending upon the weather.

Those who have been in the county 50 years or longer will receive a gold badge, those in the county 40 years or longer a blue badge and those in the county 25 years or longer will receive a white badge. Also those who have been in the county 40 years or longer will be given a free meal at noon at the Legion hall in Floy and will receive their ticket to the meal when they register. Between 300 and 400 are expected to qualify for the old settlers dinner.

Attorney H. A. C. Brummelt of Floy will deliver the annual speech at 11 a. m. on the Court House lawn where the meeting proper will be held. Mr. Brummelt has recently moved from Dickens to Floy and is the husband of the Floyd County Home Demonstration Agent.

The annual parade will begin at 1:30 and will form on South Main Street near the First Baptist Church. It will follow the usual route.

Following the parade, the formal meeting of old settlers will be held with speeches heard, election of officers and a memorial service read.

At the same time for the younger folks a matched roping will be held on the rodeo grounds in east Floy with Ras Ware of Cedar contesting Odell Blackwell of McAdoo starting at 2:30 p. m. Also a jackpot roping will follow.

A square dance will be held both Friday and Saturday nights on a platform on the courthouse square near the agricultural building.

ALL THE FUSS about co-operatives which has been going on for some time in this area boils down to the simple fact that some co-operatives are not paying their share of federal income taxes. A lenient law, written many years ago, exempted farm co-operatives from income taxes under certain circumstances. Now many large co-operatives are "riding a good horse to death" by using the income tax advantage to beat down competition. In other words the corporation pays an income tax ranging from 30 to 52 percent of its profits while the big co-operative pays no income tax and distributes its profits to members, or uses the profits to

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build up its business.

THERE HAVE BEEN cases where millionaires formed co-operatives just for the purpose of evading the income tax laws and gain an advantage over their competitors. It is this unfair aspect of the tax law which is causing all the complaints and there is room to complain, so it would appear.

LOCKNEY'S ONLY CO-OPERATIVE, the Consumers Fuel Association cannot be criticized for evading taxes, however, because the local co-operative does pay income taxes from its net book profits. This organization files an income report, just like any other corporation, and pays income tax upon its earnings which is the right and proper way to do it. If all other co-operatives were operated under a similar system there would be little reason for complaint.

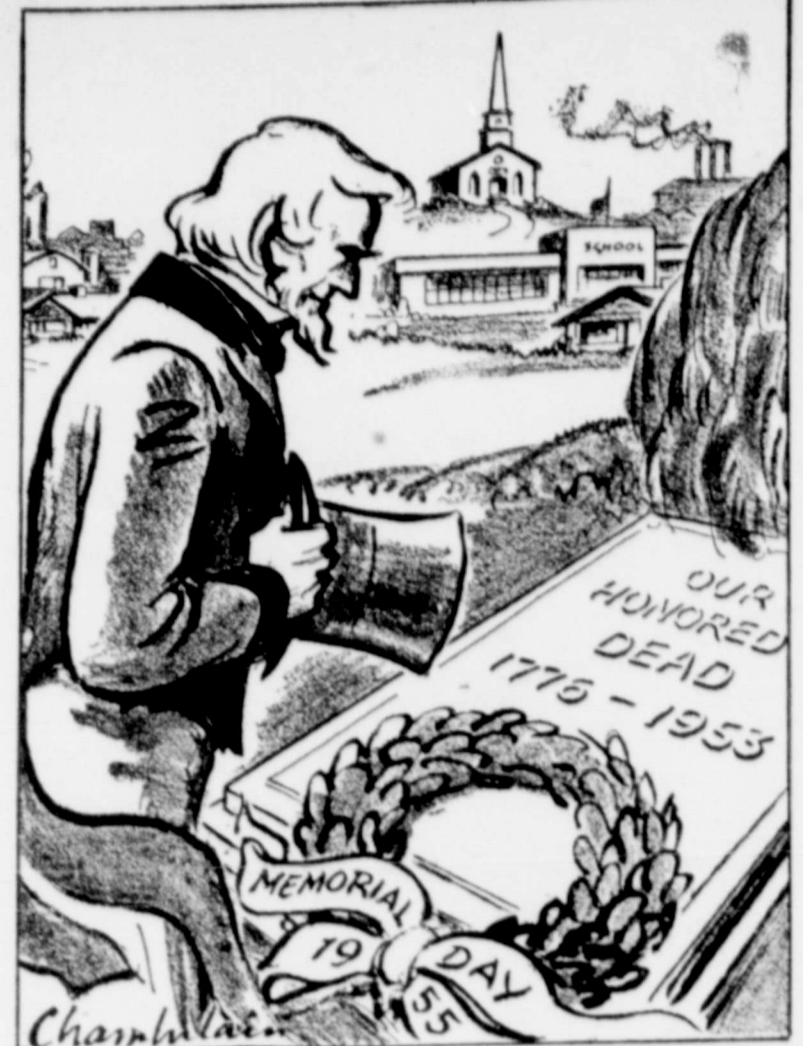

POOR PUMP PRIMING
In the midst of the uproar over the intention of the new Galveston Mayor to operate the town on a wide open basis, the comment of a beach hotel man is revelatory.

He is quoted as saying he is in favor of "anything that will bring business here," including "prostitution, gambling, and drinking." We hope he has been misquoted, but there are indications that this represents in some measure the point of view of others in the Galveston business community.

Business is not so precious a thing that it can shoulder aside all morality and community decency. Responsible business in America was built upon no such principle and repudiates it. If the preservation of vice is essential to the preservation of business in Galveston, the public might as well ask itself why there is any necessity for the existence of such business at all. A similar justification might have been made for vice in Alabama's notorious Phenix City, where the state militia finally took over.

We can not believe that Galveston must depend upon a similar cultivation of illegal activities for its economic existence. We are persuaded that the city can conform with the laws of the state and the moral code practiced by other Texas cities and remain an attractive resort city. It is possible that revenue lost from the absence of patrons of vice would be regained from tourists who may shun the city because of its reputation.

It is noteworthy that a considerable element of the Galveston population does not share the mayor's and the hotel-keeper's notions of what is good for Galveston, and that the proposal to reopen the old Post Office Street "light district" is running into resistance. If they fail, and if Galveston continues to operate upon the principle that vice is good for

BLANCO CANYON DAM

What about adequate water? Had you ever stopped to think that Crosbyton is probably the only town on the South Plains that can develop a large surface water supply, other than the towns and cities on the proposed Canadian River Dam project. Blanco Canyon has the largest runoff other than the Canadian of any stream cutting into the Texas Plains. This runoff isn't big enough, perhaps, to furnish cities like Lubbock with the water they need, but it would give Crosbyton a water supply unequalled by any other town on the South Plains. Is such a project impossible? Well, it was pointed out a number of times at the Clinic that it was not what a project cost — the question should be, how much does it cost to be without it? That dam in Blanco Canyon is going to be built. We don't know when, but we do know that with the cooperation of the people of Crosbyton it won't be too many years. You will be hearing more about this soon. — Trends in Crosbyton Review.

GOOD LAWMAKERS

The New Deal of the Democratic party is hopping out Lyndon Johnson for not raising more care about the Eisenhower administration and its program. The New Deal branch of the Democratic party is never satisfied unless they can do a lot of rabble rousing. 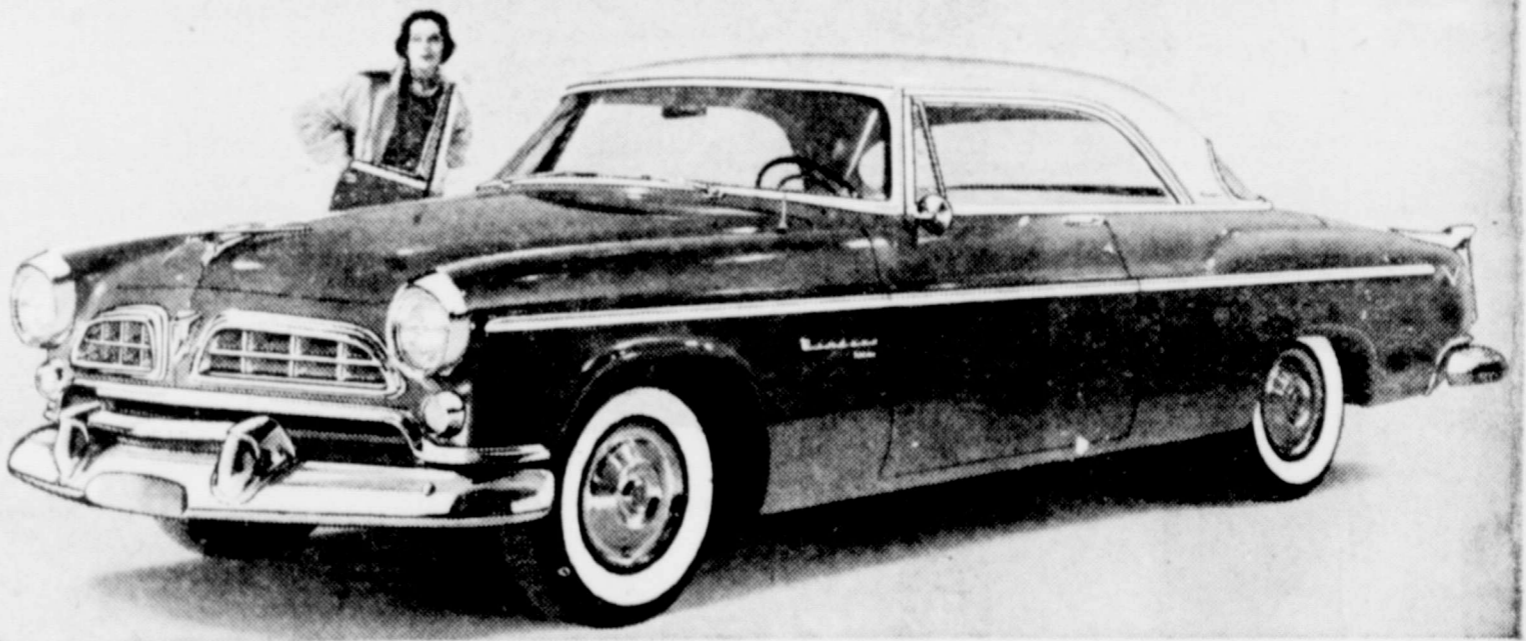

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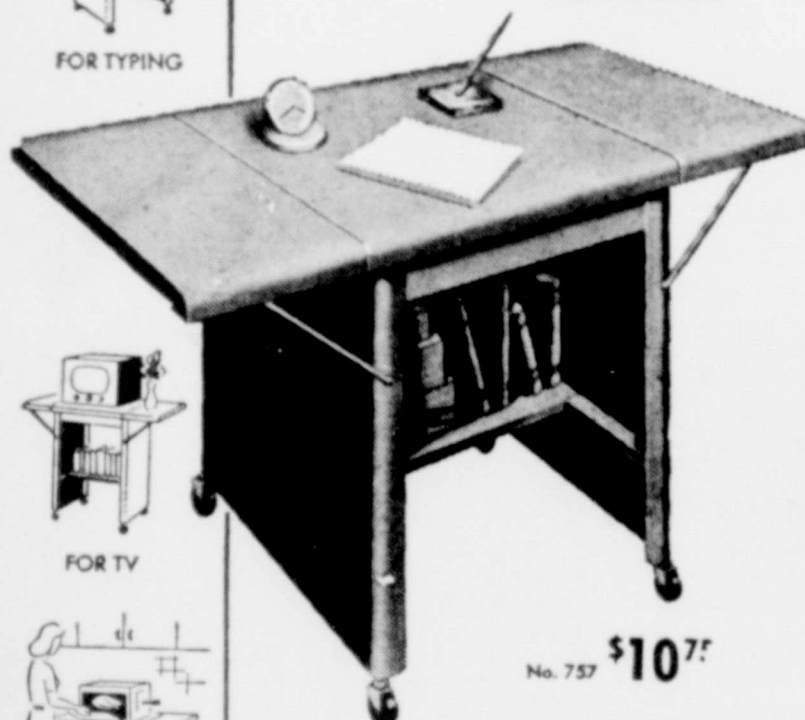

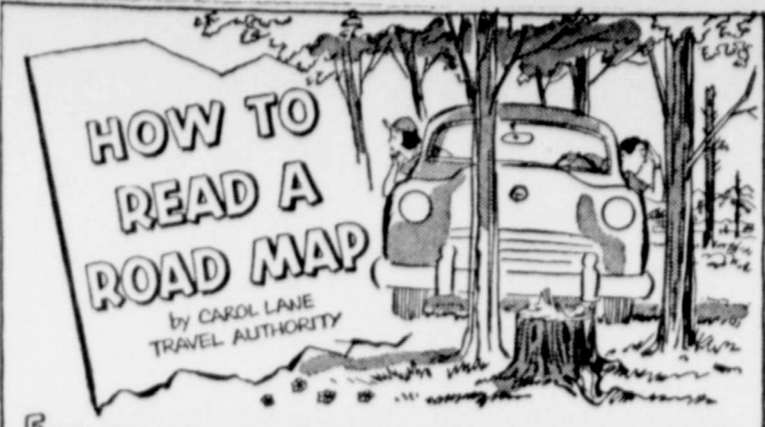

Lake Leveling Adds Acres In Co.

Field leveling of playa lakes on farms in the Floyd County Soil Conservation District has added over one thousand acres to the productive capacity of the area.

The beneficial results of this conservation practice was observed on several farms in the district following the heavy rains of a week ago. Fields which once were inundated by water now appear as choice, well drained, irrigated land. Land on which crops were seldom harvested, due to having drowned out, now has the productive capacity equal to our best farm land.

Sixty acres of land leveled on the Ralph Thayer farm near the Sandhill community eliminated a lake completely. Ralph said that previously water would have covered twenty acres following rains similar to those of last week. Now the field is completely leveled, well drained, and can utilize all of our normal rainfall without loss of crops or excessive erosion from runoff.

On the J. W. Gunter farm at Lone Star seventy-eight acres were field leveled. This eliminated a long lake that traversed the east side of the farm. Mark Martin, who farms this land, says the leveled area irrigates perfectly and gives an even distribution of irrigation water. No ponding was evident following the rain. "The expected increase in yields and saving on labor

and fuel the first year will more than compensate for the cost of leveling the land," said Martin.

Similar results were observed on numerous farms in the district where fields have been leveled. Approximately one thousand acres have been reclaimed by efforts of local farmers. Technical assistance and design information was worked out by personnel of the local Soil Conservation Service.
