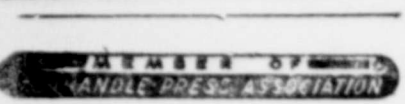

TOO OFTEN, when a man does a good job on a civic project, he doesn't get the credit or praise he deserves, due mostly to the indifference of his fellowman. THE CONDITION of the cotton crop is the chief topic of conversation in many gatherings these days. Just how much cotton will be produced in this community as well as in the county is a matter of guess work so far, but it is one in which farmers and business men both are intensely interested. Some say the late cotton is loaded up well while others say the joints are too far apart and they look for a slim crop. We say that, weather conditions favorable and a normal frost somebody is going to be surprised about how much cotton we make, we bethcha.

A RECENT TRIP down state proved to this writer that this is going to be a good crop year in many sections that have been suffering from drought conditions. Most all the way to Austin we saw good feed and cotton crops. The feed, of course, was much further along than feed in this area. Some of the dry land grain sorghums already had well developed heads and in some places the combines and row binders were running. Cotton was blooming and looked as good as any irrigated cotton in this area. We may not make a bumper cotton crop on the plains this year but taking the state as a whole we would say that the crop will be larger than in previous years. And this is written without benefit of the government forecast.

VACATIONS ARE WONDERFUL things if you can afford them. Many people of this area have already had their vacation this summer and some have had two. We're in favor of vacations and just wish we could afford two or three a year. But that's too many for anyone engaged in the newspaper business. We're hoping maybe we can take our first one next week. If we do we'll have someone here to get the paper out as usual and probably you'll notice little differences. At any rate we'll appreciate your co-operation with The Beacon force while, and if we're gone and we know you'll help them all you can.

Appointment of Congressman George H. Mahon as one of 25 U. S. Senators and Representatives composing the American delegation to the Inter-Parliamentary Union meeting in Helsinki is a compliment to Mr. Mahon. But it also will be of future benefit to this district from which he serves.

In these modern days, a Congressman must not only know the problems of his district and the nation, but, to some extent at least, those of the wide world, as well. The experience in Helsinki will further broaden Mr. Mahon's perspective, as will his following inspections of American military facilities and military aid operations in France, England, Germany and possibly Spain and French Morocco.

The south Plains Congressman is one of the dozen most important members of the Lower House. Previous journeys to the far corners of the world, in his capacity of chairman of the Armed Services Appropriations committee, have given him an insight into global affairs which is highly valuable to the Congress. There is every reason to believe that the Helsinki and kindred travels will be just as valuable.

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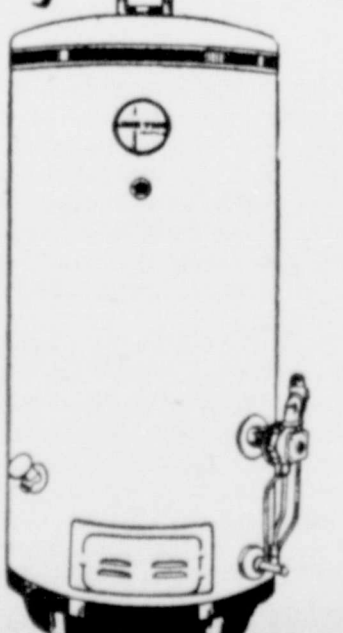

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

(Editor's Note: Herewith we reproduce a letter received from Mrs. Lee Tomme, a former resident of Lockney, who now resides in California. She still has many friends and some relatives here who will be glad to hear from the family.)

Inglewood, Calif.
Mon., Aug. 1, 1955.

Dear Mr. Hays:
Please stop sending the Lockney Beacon until you hear from me again. We have moved back to Inglewood from Gilroy and if our plans work out O. K. we will be in Lockney in a few days to see about selling our place there and fixing papers up on it. Also we plan to have rest of our furniture shipped out here. I guess we will make California our home. I love it, so does Betty and Billy, but I am not sure about Lee.

I wish everyone could come to California and see all the pretty sights I've seen. It really means so much to me being deaf and have to go only by sight, sometimes I feel if I was just meant to come out here and see the many interesting sights I've seen. The Los Angeles and San Jose California rose gardens are so very pretty, Knotts Berry Farm,

near Bleena Park, California is very interesting. They have 40 acres of free parking space. They say 8700 guests have been served in a day in Mrs. Knotts dining room. The Wayside Chapel, Solid Glass Church house, up in the hills near Long Beach is so very pretty and one can see so many kind of fish and shells, at Hermosa Aquarium at Hermosa Beach, Calif. and in March I went to University of San Francisco to see if my hearing could be restored. Church of Christ at Gilroy had made arrangements for me to go on Sunday and attend church service there and visit in a church members home until it was known if the Doctors could help me or not. My appointment was not until Tuesday a. m. so Sunday evening the couple I was to stay with drove me around most of the afternoon and showed me the Golden Gate and Bay Bridge, University building and also we went up on Twin Peaks park and down by Shore Blvd. Freeway. Then on Monday we spent most of the day at the Golden Gate Park. One could never dream of the beautiful things it is to see there. It's just out of this world.

Now back to about the University of San Francisco and my deafness. The doctors told me no operation or hearing aid could ever help me and I was 99% deaf and they were very impressed how well I speak. Said most people with my trouble could not understand and said my lip reading was excellent, to the fact I had never been to a lip reading school, and bragged on how well I faced my handicap with a smile. The Doctor told me my deafness was called nervous deafness and it ran in my family. He said there was nothing wrong with my ears or ear drum, it was only that the nerves are not strong enough to carry the sound to my inner ears and was almost always the same trouble with everyone where more than one member of the family was hard of hearing. When I left the Doctor gave me a tight hand grip and encouraged me to go on

and lead a happy, useful life and told me if ever I felt he could be of any further help to me to feel welcome to come back anytime. I do not feel too bad about it, for that is something I can not help, neither can the Doctor help me and I felt that God in Heaven sees its best for my life to be as it is. What I want most of all is to live a Christian life and help others in to it. I still attend church services three times regular a week with rest of my family, yet I hear no sound, no one can know of the faith and joy I get from going to church and how sad to think of all the thousands of little children in this world with normal hearing who's parents never take them to Bible School and church services. God is love, and love is the greatest thing on this earth. James 4:8. "Draw Nigh to God, and He will draw nigh to you. Cleanse your hands, ye sinners; and purify your heart, ye double minded."

It's time for the postman so I must close Mr. Hays. I hope to see you soon. If not you will hear from me with the money to renew my Lockney Beacon. Hello to all you Lockney friends and I love you.

Insect Report

(Note: Following is a report on a cotton insect survey for the South Plains as released by Walton H. Jones, district extension agent, of Lubbock. The report was compiled by G. T. Davis Jr., and W. L. Owens Jr., both connected with the Extension Service.)

Weather conditions have been favorable over the area for the growth and fruiting of cotton during the past week. While fruiting was generally satisfactory some very rapidly growing cotton was slow in setting squares.

Aphid infestations increased in many fields throughout the area. While some cotton showed reductions in populations due to increased beneficial insect activity, other fields had sufficient infestations to show honeydew on plants. Control applications have been made in limited areas.

Damaging fleahoppers infestations were reported in some fields of late planted cotton. In practically all cases such populations were found on cotton

where insecticides had not been used.

Bollworm activity increased somewhat over last week. Heaviest infestations were reported in Dawson, Garza, Howard, Martin, Mitchell, Terry & Scurry counties. Infestations were sufficient to require control in a number of fields in Crosby, Cochran, Hale, Lubbock and Swisher counties. Since bollworm moths are appearing in larger numbers in cotton fields and since conditions are favorable for development of the insect, frequent checks should be made for presence of eggs and small worms. As damaging infestations develop, good control can be secured when plants are thoroughly covered with proper dosages of recommended insecticides.

Lygus bugs were found in light to occasional fairly heavy infestations on cotton in Bailey, Deaf Smith, Garza and Lamb counties. The insects were generally found in greater numbers on cotton near alfalfa.

Cabbage loppers appeared in larger numbers in many fields throughout the area. In many cases infestations were not sufficient to warrant control.

Soil Conservation District News

Diversion Terraces And Waterways
Heavy rains in the Floyd County Soil Conservation District have shown what damage can be done by water erosion. The damage is more noticeable on irrigated farms where many small gullies have washed across beds and furrows, making it very hard to make a furrow that will carry irrigation water. However, a greater damage is caused by sheet erosion which is hard to see because only thin layers of soil are carried away.

One method of controlling water erosion is to direct the runoff from heavy rains by the use of a diversion terrace. A diversion terrace may be either level or graded. The purpose of a diversion terrace is to intercept the runoff water and carry it to a suitable outlet where no damage can result from water erosion. It is desirable to empty a diversion terrace onto pasture land or a lake. If this cannot be done, a waterway with vegetative cover should be established before constructing the terrace. This provides a protected place to empty the terrace into. The waterway should be so designed and constructed to carry safely the expected runoff. It should be level from side to side so that the water will spread evenly over it, and not concentrate. It is also more desirable to use a permanent type vegetation, such as alfalfa or native Buffalo and Blue Grama grasses.

Federal aid is available through the local ASC (PMA) office in Floydada for the construction of diversion terraces and waterways. Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service will give assistance in the layout, design and checking of these conservation practices. It is the desire of the Supervisors of the Floyd County Soil Conservation District and technicians of the Soil Conservation Service that each farmer use each acre of his land within its capabilities and treat each acre according to its needs for protection and improvement.

Amendments Make Some Families Eligible For SS

Families of individuals who died before September 1, 1950, may be eligible for monthly social security insurance payments now, according to John G. Hutton, district social security manager. This provision of the 1954 Amendments to the Social Security Act, Hutton said, applies if the worker died after July 1, 1940, and before September 1, 1950, even though the family's original claim for survivors benefits was denied.

Recent changes make it possible to provide an insured status under the law in such cases if the worker had at least six quarters of coverage at the time of his death. This special provision, however, will affect only monthly benefit claims, Hutton added.

Survivors who might qualify for these monthly payments are widows who are 65 or older, children who are not yet 18, and, in case of worker left no widow or children, parents who were receiving at least one-half of their support from the deceased when he died.

Hutton urges anyone who feels this provision may affect him to get in touch with the district social security office at 1616-19th St. in Lubbock or meet our representative who will be in Lockney at the post office on August 16 at 1:30 p. m.

REGULATING DANCE HALLS AND PERMITS IN THE CITY OF LOCKNEY, TEXAS REQUIRING REGISTRATION AND FIXING A FINE FOR THE VIOLATION OF THE TERMS OF THE CITY OF LOCKNEY.

The term "public dance hall" in this ordinance shall mean any dance hall to which admission can be had for a fee, or for possession or use of a ticket or token for which a charge is made for other property or which may gain admission with or without the same.

The term "public" as used herein shall mean any room, building or place in which a public dance hall shall be held.

It shall be unlawful for any person to hold a public dance or public hall in violation of the provisions of this ordinance, until the dance or hall has been duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.

City Secretary, and the fee therefor shall be paid at the time of the issuing of the license. An annual license fee for each public dance hall shall be required in the amount of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars.

Section 3. No license for a public dance hall shall be issued until it shall be found by inspection that such a hall complies and conforms to the health and fire regulations of the City; that it is properly ventilated and supplied with sufficient toilet conveniences and is a safe and proper place for the purpose for which it is used, as determined by regulations heretofore or hereafter adopted by the City Council.

Section 4. In addition to the "public dance hall" license provided for in Section 2, there shall be required a "public dance" permit. No person, persons, societies, clubs or organizations, shall hold a public dance or public hall until a permit shall be issued therefor by the City Secretary of the City of Lockney, Texas, and application for such permit shall be upon a form furnished by the City and shall be filed with the City Secretary at least forty-eight hours before the dance or hall is to begin, and said permit shall be issued by the City Secretary when all the provisions of this ordinance and other ordinances in reference thereto are complied with and upon payment of the dance permit fee, which fee shall be one (\$1.00) Dollar.

Section 5. No license or permit issued under the provisions of this ordinance shall be transferred, unless approved, by the City Secretary of the City of Lockney upon application.

Section 6. All public dance halls shall be kept at all times in a clean, healthful and sanitary condition and all rooms connected therewith shall be kept open and the entire place shall be well lighted. Any member of the Police Department shall have the power, and it shall be their duty to cause the place, hall or room where any dance or ball is held or given, to be vacated whenever any provision of this ordinance is being violated or whenever any indecent act shall be committed, or when any disorder of a gross, violent or vulgar character shall take place therein. It shall be unlawful for any person in charge of said public dance hall to permit any boisterous or disorderly person to enter, be or remain in or to assist in any such public dance hall or public dance; and it shall be unlawful for any person to conduct himself in a boisterous or disorderly manner in any public hall or public dance. No intoxicated, gross mannered or vulgar person or indecent character shall be permitted in any dance hall and no person or persons shall be permitted who conduct themselves in a gross or vulgar manner. No indecent, freak or immoral dances are to be allowed. Any one interested or affected by the ruling of the City Council is hereby given the right of appeal from said ruling to the mayor of the City of Lockney, provided said notice of appeal is filed with the City Secretary within

five days from the ruling of said City Council.

Section 7. The City Secretary shall examine all applications for dance hall licenses and dance permits and make recommendations with reference to applications for dance hall license and dance permits, as provided in Section 4 hereof. The City Council and police officers of the City of Lockney are hereby empowered, in the case of any and all dances, to enforce all rules, regulations and ordinances relating to public dances and public dance halls, and are hereby empowered to revoke any dance permit at any time when any provision of this ordinance is not being complied with.

Section 8. The provisions of this ordinance shall in no way interfere with private dances given at the private homes of reputable people or with dances given by reputable people or with dances given by reputable and permanently organized clubs, societies or corporations, where the attendance is restricted to the members of the society, club or corporation and their guests; provided, however, that the terms of the ordinance shall apply to any and all instances where admission or entry is had by the purchase, possession or presentation of a ticket or token, or in which a charge is made for carrying for clothing or other property, or to which the public generally may gain admission with or without the payment of a fee.

Section 9. Any person, persons, society, club or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be

deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined not less than Ten (\$10.) Dollars nor more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for each such offense.

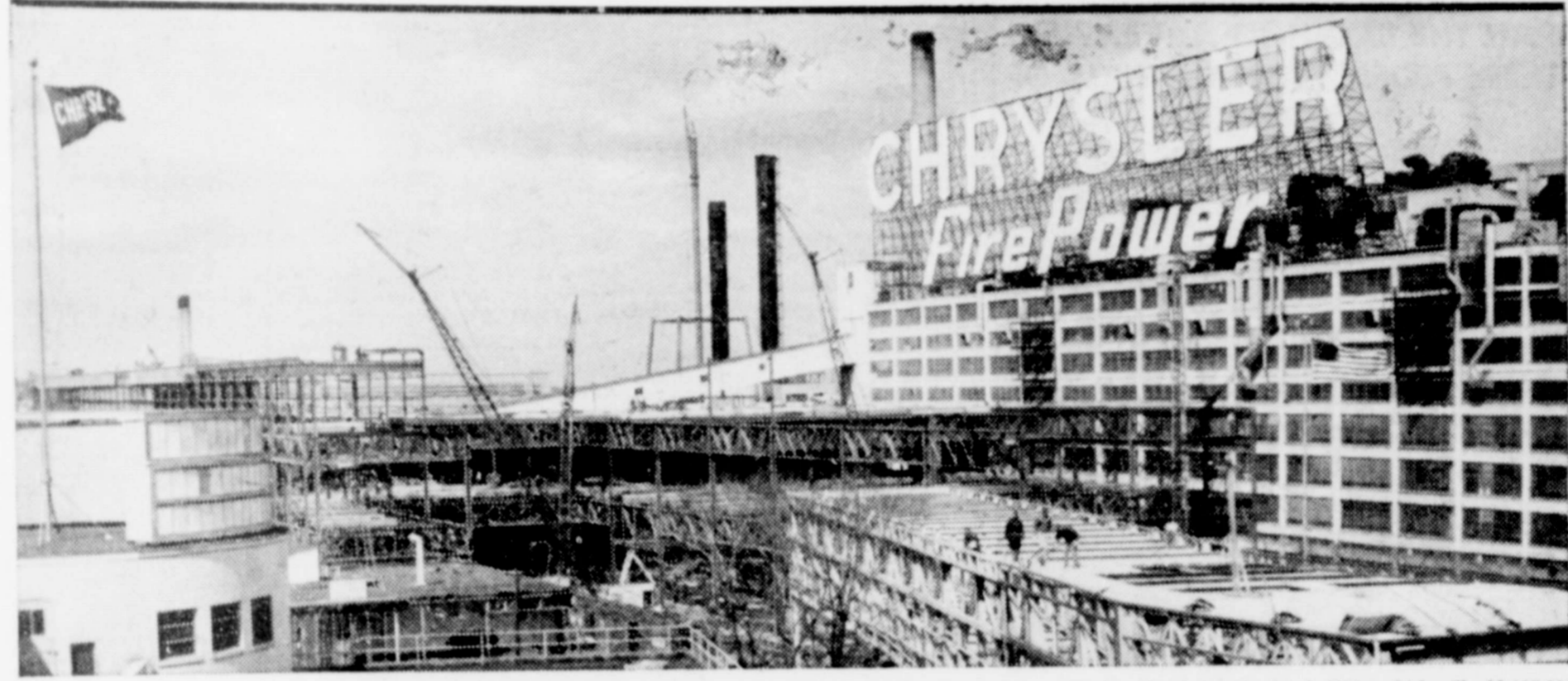

MR. AND MRS. T. H. BOEDEKER TO CELEBRATE GOLDEN WEDDING

Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Boedecker of the Prairie Chapel community will observe their golden wedding anniversary on Wednesday, August 17th. The couple were married by a judge at Anderson, Grimes County, on that date in 1905.

In celebration of the event the children of the couple will be hosts at open house at the family home eight miles northwest of Lockney Sunday, August 14th from three to six o'clock.

The couple have six children, all of whom expect to be present for the celebration. They are Edwin Boedecker, Lubbock; Charlie Boedecker, Lockney; E. W. Boedecker, Levelland; Mrs. Jimmy Hodel, Lockney; Mrs. Robert McDonald, Lockney; Mrs. A. G. Bontke, Kress. They also have 13 grandchildren. One child died in infancy.

The Boedeckers have an interesting family history. Both of Mr. Boedecker's parents were born in Germany. His father came from the province of Hanover and his mother from the province of Saxony. His father was the youngest of four brothers, each of whom came to this country upon the completion of his education in order to escape compulsory service in the Prussian Army. When Theodore Boedecker Sr. arrived in Texas the war between the States had begun. He was soon serving in the Confederate Army. Because of impoverished conditions in the Confederate Army, and for lack of sympathy for the Southern cause, he, together with other soldiers who felt as he did fell behind Union lines and he spent the remainder of the War in the Union Army. He served under the command of the distinguished cavalry general, George Armstrong Custer. He spent many nights as a guard outside the General's tent. A friendship arose between the Custers and this Immigrant German boy. After Mr. Boedecker returned to Texas following the war, he corresponded with the General, a correspondence which he continued with Mrs. Custer after the General's death at the Battle of the Little Big Horn.

T. H. Boedecker was born near Gay Hill in Washington County, Texas, in 1874. The house in which he was born still stands and is occupied by a half sister, Mrs. Willie Green and her family. A second story has been removed, otherwise it has been altered little. He last visited his boyhood home in the summer of 1954. Mr. Boedecker had eight brothers and sisters and four half brothers and sisters. He is the oldest living member of the eight out of the original 13 children. One brother, Leo Boedecker, lives in this area, northeast of Plainview.

Mrs. T. H. Boedecker was born in the province of Posen in Northern Germany near the Polish border in 1884. She does not

recall her life there since she came with her family to Texas at the age of four. They, too, settled near Gay Hill in Washington County. She was educated in a parochial school maintained by the Evangelical Church. Nearly all instruction was in the German language. She was one of five children and only she and a younger brother, O. W. Schmidt of Plainview, are still living.

Soon after their marriage the Boedeckers moved to Channing on the North Plains where Mr. Boedecker operated a meat market. Channing was then a thriving cattle town and the headquarters of the XIT Ranch were located there. Mr. Boedecker helped quarry stone from the Canadian breaks out of which the courthouse was built and which still serves as the county seat of Hartley county.

After two years on the plains they moved on a farm in Falls County near Marlin. In 1914 they came to Plainview and moved to a farm northeast of there. They lived in that area several years. In 1921 they bought the farm where they now reside.
