## Uranium Lode Found Near Quataque; Coring Drills At Work

Quataque. — Rumors have been circulating from the report given by Jim Allison, field geologist for the Atomic Energy Commission, who came from Alton, Mo., that a uranium lode was found recently in the Caprock country five miles north of Quataque. Two veins of the uranium ore are being drilled by two recently formed companies, the Briscoe County Uranium Company, composed of Vernon Saul, and Doyle Saul, and the Saul Brothers Uranium Company, composed of the Saul brothers and Jack Kraus. Operations of moving the ore are temporarily at a standstill at the present time as there is no road leading to the site, however, a road is being made at this writing and as soon as it is completed the Dallas men associated with the Saul brothers plan to bring in heavy machinery and begin work in "them that hills".

### Claud Holley Named Exec. V. P. Of First National

Claud Holley of Graham, Texas, was elected Executive Vice-president of the First National Bank here in a director's meeting Wednesday night of this week. Mr. Holley is expected to assume his duties this morning (Thursday). Mr. Holley will be in charge of the bank on a temporary basis, until a sale of stock or other developments occur.

M. W. Wiley, president of the local bank for the past 6 1/2 years, announced his resignation last week. At that time Mr. Wiley stated that he expected soon to sell part of his stock and that a successor to him would be secured.

Mr. Holley is 52 years of age and is married. He has been connected with the banking business in Graham for a number of years and is an executive officer of a Graham bank. At present he has drilling interests, and is an official of the Graham city government. He is a member of the board of directors of an insurance company in Wichita Falls.

### Irrigation Demonstration Friday

An irrigation demonstration on length of run and water penetration will be held Friday, August 19 at 2:00 at Gilbert Fawber's farm, it was announced Wednesday by Bill Rodgers, county agent.

Mr. Fawber's farm is located 1 mile south and 1/2 mile east of the Baker community building. This demonstration is being sponsored by the Extension Service and the Soil Conservation Service.

Ralph Jones, irrigation specialist of Extension District 2, Lubbock, will be in charge of the demonstration. There will also be a soil scientist from the Conservation Service present to assist in this interesting demonstration, Mr. Rodgers said.

Mrs. Kittie Lantrip, who has served in the Lockney Public Schools for the past three years as a first grade teacher, tenured her resignation to School Superintendent W. C. Irons August 16. Mrs. Lantrip stated that she had accepted a similar position in the West Columbia School System in South Texas. The base salary schedule of West Columbia is \$500.00 above the state salary schedule and in addition to this incentive, Mrs. Lantrip will be co-ordinator and supervisor of the other four first grade teachers there.

### Widener, Holmes Awarded Scholarship

Jeanette Widener and Jerry Holmes, both 1955 graduates of Lockney High School, have been awarded scholarships as a result of tests taken by the two June 28 at Texas Tech in Lubbock. The tests given were the regular entrance examinations given all entering freshmen at Texas Tech. Jeanette and Jerry will both be freshmen at Tech this fall but will not have to take the tests again.

Jeanette was awarded the Dunlap Scholarship which is sponsored by the Dunlap stores. It is for \$150. She has not yet decided on her major.

A scholarship of this kind is given only one student out of each high school in counties surrounding Lubbock.

The Kuykendall scholarship was awarded to Jerry. It is worth \$200 and is given only after the student has proved himself worthy of it. He must have at least a two point average at mid-semester to receive the award. Only ten of these scholarships are given during the year.

### Two Students From Lockney In Baylor Grad.

Two students from Lockney, Felicia Louise Applewhite and John Stanley Conner, will be among the 289 students graduating from Baylor University August 18.

The summer graduating class commencement exercises will be held in the sanctuary of Seventh and James Baptist Church, adjacent to the campus, Dr. Charles W. Koller, a Baylor graduate and president of the Northern Baptist Theological Seminary in Chicago, will be the speaker.

Miss Applewhite, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. G. C. Applewhite, will graduate with a B. S. degree in Biology. She has minored in Art and English.

She has served as secretary of Kappa Pi, scholastic art organization, during her senior year. She has also served as vice-president of the same organization. She plans on spending the next nine months studying further science at West Texas State College in Canyon before enrolling in Southwestern Medical College in Dallas where she will do graduate study in Medical Illustration.

Stanley Conner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Conner, has attended Baylor University College of Medicine in Houston this past year, and will return there for his sophomore year in medical school.

While on the Waco campus Stanley was treasurer of Alpha Epsilon Delta, honorary pre-medical fraternity, vice-president of Beta Beta Beta, honorary biological fraternity, member of Alpha Chi. He was Regional Golden Gloves lightweight champion for the Baylor boxing team in 1953. Last year at Houston he served as pledge president of Phi Chi Medical fraternity, and next year he will be one of the 10 members of Interfraternity Council for the Medical College.

### Five Sentenced In Dist. Court

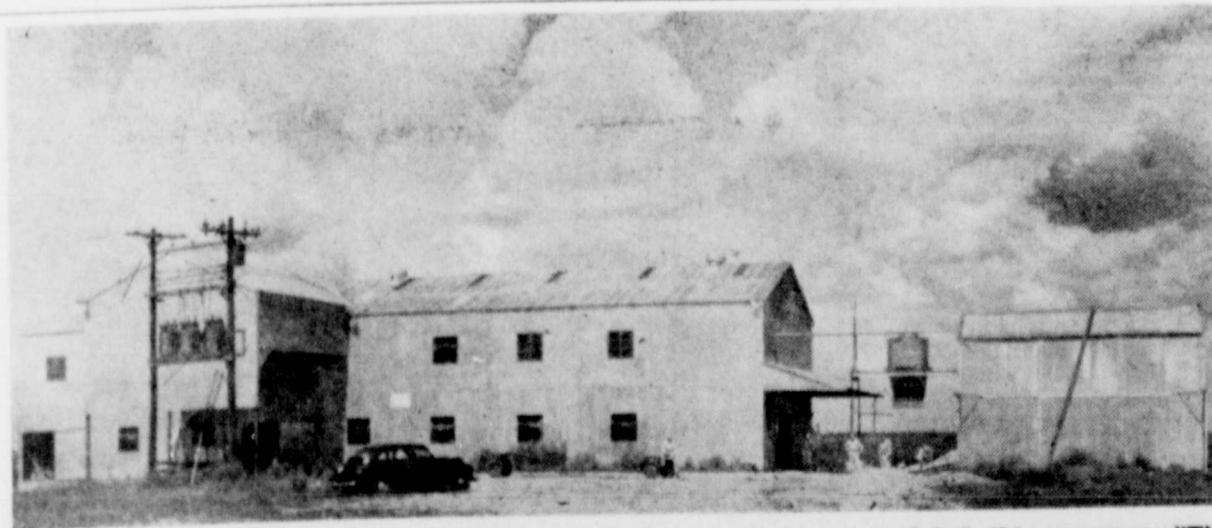
Five men received sentences in District Court, Wednesday, Aug. 17.

**YOU WILL FIND** in the classified section of The Beacon this week an innocuous looking little advertisement that could mean a lot to the city and community. The advertisement starts like this: "WANTED — Investor to build . . ." and goes on to say what is needed. No community has ever grown very much unless it had within its boundary citizens who had money to finance building and who had enough faith in the community to spend their money thusly. We trust that the person who is seeking this building will find an investor who will build what he wants. We understand the man says that he will employ 10 people if he can locate here. We would spend a lot of time and some money to get a factory here with a 10-man payroll. Wouldn't this be just as good? And wouldn't the return on the investment be safe? We believe that it would.

**MANAGER DICK WHITELEY** of the Lockney Chamber of Commerce is working his head off, so to speak, on getting the grounds and the old oil mill building ready for the forth coming Floyd County Fair. The trouble is that Mr. Whiteley is only one man and he needs help. Business men and farmers of this part of the county are needed to help in this big job. Some will have to donate money, some may loan machinery and others may donate some work, but it is a big job and it is going to take a lot of people to get it over. See Mr. Whiteley and tell him what you will do.

**AND WE WOULD** remind you again, if you haven't joined the Floyd County Fair Association please do so. The cost is \$10 for a lifetime membership and the association needs the money. You may do that also by seeing Mr. Whiteley or J. H. Cooper at Cooper Insurance, all in the same office building just south of The Beacon office.

**SCHOOL OPENING** is not far off and with it comes the ever present problem of lack of teachers and facilities. According to Changing Times, a new baby is born every eight seconds, which is faster than facilities can be built or teachers trained. This year the student enrollment in schools in this country is expected to increase more than one million. In some part of the country the schools work on a make shift basis. Some have schools in half-day sessions. Others will have large classes, too large for effective teaching.

**THE LOCKNEY SYSTEM** has just completed a building program and, as far as we know, have ample room for the present pupil load. The problem of the local school system, as we see it, is that we are not yet able to pay salaries above the state salary schedule. It is hard to keep good teachers unless the school can pay above the state schedule. It is hard to fill vacancies at the state salary schedule. We hope that some time not long off this district will be able to pay its teachers \$200 or \$300 per year more than the state affords. We believe that it will result in improvement in our entire system.

**ANOTHER PROBLEM** that must be faced sooner or later by the Lockney school system is that of desegregation. As far as we know the board of trustees of the Lockney schools have taken no action on the matter this summer and we presume that the negro school will operate this coming year in the same manner it did last year. Certainly we're not suggesting any other course. But the patrons of the school should ready themselves for a change in this arrangement because all schools will be forced into a desegregation program sooner or later.

**LOOK AFTER THE OLD**  
Personally, I've always contended that a community should be as solicitous of the welfare of its oldsters as it is of its youngsters. The problem, of course is different. In the case of the young people, we are concerned with their welfare because they are the men and women of tomorrow. But we shouldn't forget these oldsters who have helped build the community but who are now on life's downward slope, their usefulness past as far as gainful work is concerned.  
Offer you can see a group of these oldsters gathered on a bench on the east side of Graber's Grocery, spitting, whittling and reminiscing. They seem satisfied there, but their hours probably would seem less long if they had an appropriate shelter — something provided solely for their enjoyment.  
I don't know if it's still in use, but several months ago there was a shelter at the rear of a small cafe just south of Main Street, and many of these oldsters gathered there for games of dominoes and "42." The cafe itself wasn't the biggest and best in town, but its owners de-

serve a lasting word of thanks for being considerate enough of the town's oldtimers to provide them a shelter for a few hours of enjoyment.  
Yes, sir, there are many projects less worthy of a community's attention than one which has the welfare of its aged citizens in mind — Eddie Warren in Post Dispatch.

### A GOOD SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER

I've often wondered what it takes to make an ideal school board member and am duly thankful for enlightenment to a Harvard sociologist who says the ideal school trustee is a person who can act quickly and inexpensively, especially on matters he doesn't know anything about.

Neal Gross, head of the Harvard school of executive studies, told a University of Michigan conference that school board members should have the following qualifications:

1. A heart of gold, a mind of steel and a nervous system of elastic.
2. A built-in telephone holder over his left shoulder and a built-in tear absorber on his right.
3. An uncanny ability to make astute and penetrating policy decisions about which he has no knowledge.
4. Be a person who loves to be hooked by the glibly-gook or educational jargon.

6. Be able to buy aspirin at a 50 per cent discount.
7. Know how to increase teacher salaries and build new school buildings while lowering the tax rate.

The new bank, the fifth in Lubbock, was chartered as the Plains National Bank. Crow said this week that a tentative date for the opening of the new bank is September 15.

The new bank will have a total capital fund of \$500,000, with \$250,000 capital stock, \$150,000 surplus and \$100,000 undivided profits.

Fifty-two stockholders oversubscribed the capital, Mr. Crow said.

### Insect Report

(Note: Following is a report on a cotton insect survey for the South Plains as released by Walton H. Jones, district extension agent, of Lubbock. The report was compiled by G. T. Davis Jr., and W. L. Owens Jr., both connected with the Extension Service).

Weather conditions were generally favorable for cotton during the week. Scattered showers fell in some localities, greatly improving moisture conditions in dryland plantings.

Aphids were reported in medium to heavy infestations throughout the area. While insecticides were applied for control of the insects in some fields, many fields showed reductions in population.

Fleahoppers were found in fairly heavy infestations in some fields in Bailey, Crosby, Floyd, Hale, Howard and Parmer counties. Except possibly in very late planted fields the insects should not cause excessive shed of small squares.

Bollworm infestations increased somewhat over that of the previous week with sufficient

worms to require control in an increasing number of fields. The heaviest infestations were reported in Crosby, Dawson, Howard, Lubbock, Lynn, Scurry, Terry and Yoakum counties. Bollworm moths continue to deposit eggs on all parts of plants so squares and bolls should be checked for presence of small worms even when eggs or small worms are not found on plant terminal.

Cabbage loopers and yellow striped armyworms occurred in medium to heavy infestations in a number of fields in Bailey, Crosby, Dawson, Lubbock, Lynn, Martin and Yoakum counties. The most generally used insecticides for bollworm control will generally reduce infestations of small loopers. Endrin will effect best control.

Leafworms have been found in small numbers in a few fields in Howard and Terry counties and in one field in Lubbock County.

Spider mites were reported on cotton in a number of fields in

Crosby and Lubbock counties. Infestations were sufficient to warrant control in a few fields. In other fields the spider mites were found only inside the bracts of squares.

Information contained in the cotton insect situation release has been compiled from reports received from county agents, vocational agriculture teachers, personnel of the Texas A & M College System, various branches of the U. S. Department of Agriculture Cotton Inspectors, chemical companies and others.
