### AN OPEN LETTER TO INDIFFERENT **CHURCH MEMBERS**

First, as already suggested, your own soul is at ake. "Be thou faithful unto death and I will give you crown of life" said Jesus. "If any man draw back, my ul shall have no pleasure in him."—(Heb. 10:38). If keep my commandments, ye shall abide in my love, nd These things I command you, that ye love one other" are the words of our Lord .- (John 15.) Have ou failed to add the Christian graces and become unttul, and forgotten the purging from your old sins?— (2 Pet. 1:1-12). 
