Farm Bureau at this meeting. TFB President J. H. West, in telegrams to Senators Lyndon Johnson and Ralph Yarborough called the recent directives issued by the Labor Department "completely unworkable."

West conferred with Governor Daniel June 27 in Houston on the Mexican labor program and other agricultural matters. He stated that Governor Daniel was working "very closely" with Farm Bureau to try to alleviate the present Mexican labor situation.

In the telegram Governor Daniel and the other governors sent to Secretary Mitchell, they said it is "apparent that new interpretations of Public Law 78 by Department of Labor are contrary to the intent of Congress and will bring econmic disaster to farmers in the state of Texas.

Daniel further stated that it as been definitely established that the farmers are willing to give all available domestic farm labor first preference and that domestic labor will be employed before use is made of bracero labor. He added that farmers are willing to pay braceros prevailing wages in each locality for similar work by domestic farm laborers and to comply with all other provisions of the Mexican farm labor law.

"However", Governor Daniel declared, "the Department of Labor's new proposal to set minimum wage on piece-work is grossly unfair and unwork-

able.' The Texas Governor explained that crop harvesting has been traditionally paid for by the piece-work method, such as cotton picking per one hundred pounds picked, etc. He added that domestic workers per form piece-work harvesting on this basis and "strongly" recommended that this method of payment be permitted for craceros doing similar work

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
