## Hail Damages Crops, Roofs

Large hail stones, some as big as hen eggs, most about the size of golf balls, damaged crops and roofs in this section Thursday afternoon of last week. Also hail fell along the Floydada-Silverton highway Sunday afternoon and damaged crops. Rains accompanied both hails.

The Thursday hail covered the area around Lockney. The hail stones were large but were well scattered and therefore crop damage was not extensive. Most damage will come from a lower grade on the older cotton now on the stalk. The Beacon was told. The damaged tolls will produce spotted cotton and thereby bring a lower price on the market, cotton men pointed out. Feed was battered but was not damaged to any great extent.

Rains falling here Thursday afternoon totaled .55 of an inch of moisture. Up to one inch was reported in areas around Lockney.

On Sunday afternoon hail severely damaged cotton on the Lester McCormick farm, east of Lockney along the Silverton highway and also did some damage to crops of Carl F. Lamons. Rains fell in an area northeast of town and in another area southeast of Lockney with moisture reported as much as 1 1/2 inches. No rain fell here.

Insurance men report that adjusters are finding minor roof damage on some local buildings but that no roofs are badly damaged. Adjusters have been working here all week.

## Tractor Is Stolen From Mercer Farm In Briscoe County

Peace officers are alert, tractor dealers have passed the word around and Fred Mercer of Silverton is looking for a brand new No. 450 International Tractor, stolen from his farm last Saturday night.

The machine was in a field southwest of Silverton, having been used on irrigation ditches. At about 11 p. m. that night it rained.

The tractor was taken after that time. It had been pulled from the field and was tracked on unpaved road from the point six miles southwest of Silverton along a route five miles east to the pavement. There the trail was lost.

Neighbors have helped fix the time as between eleven p. m. and 1 a. m.

It is rare that a tractor has been reported stolen from the fields. Many peace officers have never before been asked to trace a stolen tractor.

Amateurs are certain to be nailed if the machine is in this area, peace officers believe. If it's a professional job and the tractor is removed to distant place, tracing is a more difficult task.

## C-C Directors Hear City Park Report Monday

Directors of the Lockney Chamber of Commerce heard a report from its city park committee, named committees for a 50th anniversary celebration and attended to routine business at their regular breakfast meeting Monday morning at Golden's Cafe.

"Rusty" Baucus, chairman of the park committee, reported to the group that school authorities were agreeable to continued use of the old park site as a city park when the ground was not being used for football practice. He was told that the swings and other recreational equipment would be replaced on the site soon, somewhere in the neighborhood of the Scout hut. He recommended this as a temporary arrangement and discussed a long range plan including the acquiring of land in west Lockney for a park.

The directors discussed the matter of celebrating the 50th anniversary of the incorporation of the city at the Floyd County Fair in September. President Claude Brown appointed Leon Wofford as chairman of a committee to investigate the staging of a barbecue. Other committee chairman included J. B. Seale, parade committee; Willis Reynolds, publicity; R. L. Knox, general chairman; and Barry and Arthur Barker Jr. were asked to prepare a float for the occasion.

## Bunch Trial Underway At Lubbock

The trial of Glenn Hollis Bunch, former Silverton High School agriculture teacher, is underway in 72nd District Court at Lubbock. Bunch is charged with murder in the shooting of his brother-in-law, Wayne Bearden, 20, an employee of a Brownfield oil firm.

Eight jurors had been selected up to Tuesday evening in the case and the remaining four were expected to be named Wednesday.

The slaying occurred on October 25 of last year, nine miles south of Silverton on the Floydada-Silverton highway. Bearden was struck by four blasts from a shotgun. Bunch claimed the shooting was accidental.

Presiding at the trial will be 110th District Court Judge L. D. Ratliff of Spur. John Stapleton, also of this district, will be the prosecutor. The trial was moved to Lubbock County on a charge of venue after agreement by both prosecution and defense.

Bunch is well known in this community.

### School District Buys Dodson Land

A contract was signed Wednesday wherein Mrs. Frank Dodson agreed to sell to the Lockney Independent School District five city blocks at the extreme western edge of the city. The consideration is \$20,000.00. The land is legally described as blocks 7, 8, 10, 11 and 12 in the Wilson addition and is approximately 19 acres. Attorney Wilson P. Kermickel of Lockney handled the legal details.

Supt. H. H. Nicholas said that the land purchase did not necessarily commit the school board to an expansion program to include a new high school building, but that the board felt it wise to purchase the land at this time and if they do not use it, they will dispose of it at some later date.

### Anti-Daniel Forces Control County Meet

The anti-Price Daniel forces controlled the Floyd County Democratic Convention last Saturday as was expected and a slate of delegates antagonistic to the Governor will attend the state Democratic convention from Floyd County.

The county convention was held in the district court room at Floydada with some 250 persons present. Sixteen of the 21 voting precincts of the county were represented.

Ben Ayres, county Democratic chairman, was named chairman of the meeting and Tommy Assister was named secretary. The conservative group, headed by 18 delegates from the West Lockney box, offered a slate of candidates who would support Governor Daniel but were outvoted. The delegates were instructed to vote as a unit but otherwise uninstructed. However, it was generally understood that the delegates would go to the state meeting determined to oppose Governor Daniel. The Floyd County delegates are: Walter G. Collins, chairman; B. A. Robertson, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Barnard, W. L. Davis, Ray Sissley, Ben Ayres, Ernest Carter and G. B. Johnston Jr.

Mrs. Tom Karrh of Hale Center, a district PTA officer, will teach the course. Quite a few have already enrolled for the course. The local organization is planning a parliamentary procedure course at a later date.

### Seed Meeting Is Set For Tonight

The 11th annual seed meeting, sponsored by the Aiken Elevator and the Paymaster Farm, north of Aiken, will be held tonight (Thursday) on the Paymaster Gin yard. The program gets underway at 8 o'clock, according to Charlie Andrews, Aiken Elevator manager.

Free watermelon will be served to everyone attending and the whole family is invited, Mr. Andrews said.

On the program will be Jack King, Lubbock Experiment Station; Archie Martin, Hale County Weed Control District; and Harold Ellison, assistant Floyd County agent, who will show film on fertilizer demonstrations. F. L. Montandon will be master of ceremonies.

Styles, Roberts, Gee and Messersmith, an architect firm of Lubbock, has been employed by the Lockney School board Supt. H. H. Nicholas said Tuesday. The contract was signed in the regular board meeting Monday evening of this week. The board also hired three teachers and made other preparations for the new school term starting September 2.

The architects will submit to the board preliminary plans for a new high school building and also for an addition to the present facilities. Mr. Nicholas said. The board wants to study the costs of both plans before making a decision on which course to follow.

The board employed Wayne Coleman of Plainview to teach English in junior high, Miss Myra Applewhite to teach Spanish in high school and Mrs. Lucy Dean Record to teach public school music to the four first-grade sections. Mr. Coleman is the son of H. P. Coleman of Lockney and has taught in the Plainview school system for a number of years. Miss Applewhite is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Applewhite, both of whom are employed in the local school system. She has taught several years but spent last school term at Colorado State working on her master's degree. She is employed this summer at a girl's camp.

Mrs. Record will teach the same course she taught last year in the first grade sections. The board voted to discontinue the football camp, held each year just before school starts, due to the costs involved. Mr. Nicholas said.

The board approved a budget for the new school year totaling \$299,806.08.

Mr. Nicholas reported to the board that the school received last Saturday two new 54-passenger Ford buses.

The faculty is complete except for one teacher. Mr. Nicholas said. Needed is a home economics-science combination teacher replacing Mrs. J. C. Lewis, who resigned.

All members of the board were present.

### New State Bank Is Asked At Floydada

Austin — Application for a new state bank, to be known as the American State Bank of Floydada, was announced Thursday by State Banking Commissioner J. M. Faulkner.

The proposed bank would have capital of \$150,000, surplus of \$100,000 and reserves of \$50,000, Faulkner said.

The application listed Walter A. Woodrum, who served with banks at Spur, Crosbyton, Lubbock and Muleshoe, as the proposed president. O. M. Watson Sr., who was with the First National Bank of Floydada for 31 years, would be vice president and cashier.

Falkner said no date for hearing on the application has been set.

## EDITORIAL

When thou hast eaten and art full, then thou shalt bless the Lord thy God for the good land which he has given thee. — Deuteronomy 8:10.

**VOTERS OF THE STATE** will approve or reject nine constitutional amendments in the general election on November 4. This issue of The Beacon carries the full text of a number of these amendments while The Hesperian at Floydada has the remainder. So that you may be fully informed we urge that you read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before you go to the polls to cast your vote.

A brief digest of the nine different amendments follows:

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 1)** — Provides for annual sessions of the legislature, changing the compensation, per diem and travel expenses of members of the legislature and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol Building.

**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR 2)** — Authorizes each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct.

**NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 30)** — Provides that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

**NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR 31)** — Provides that any District, County, or Precinct official serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unexpired more than one (1) year of the term for which he was elected.

**NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 48)** — Provides that a Home Rule City may provide by Charter Provision, and a City operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both not to exceed four years.

**NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR 17)** — Provides for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows.

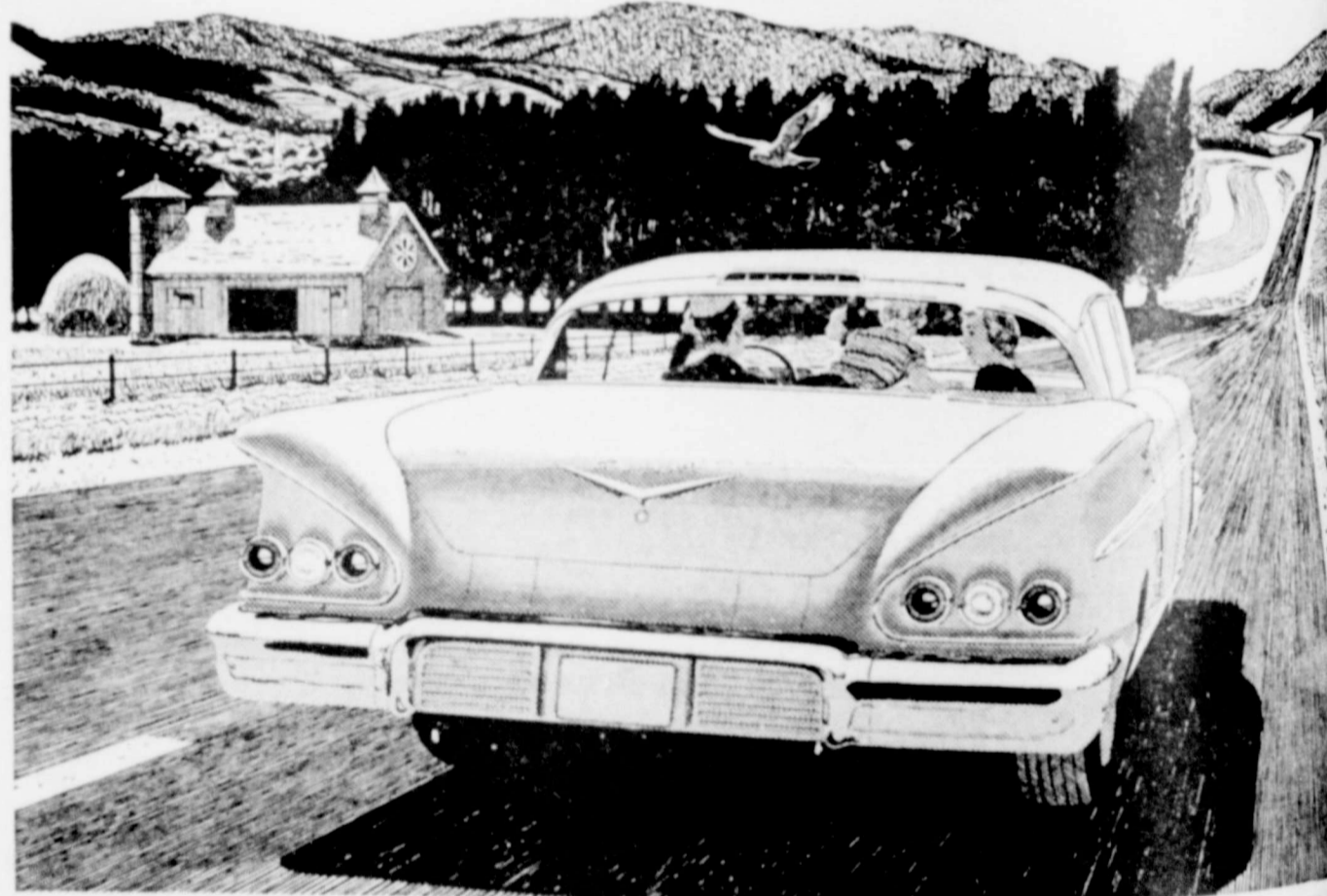
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**SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS**



Since there are some 290,000 acres of cultivated land under irrigation in the Floyd County Soil Conservation District, we might ask the question, "When should we irrigate?"

We all know that maximum yields are obtained when our crops are not allowed to suffer from lack of moisture. We know also, that if we irrigate too frequently it is very expensive. With these thoughts in mind, it is easy to figure the importance of knowing when to irrigate.

The "feel" method is a easy and very simple way to determine when to irrigate. Dig a hole beside an average plant, take a handful of soil in the area where most of the roots are, usually one foot deep, squeeze firmly to determine moisture condition. If it is found that the soil forms a pliable ball and ribbons easily between the fingers, and has a sticky feeling, then it is still too wet to irrigate. The soil is ready to irrigate when it is somewhat pliable and will ball under pressure. If the soil appears hard, has loose crumbs on surface of the soil, and will not form a ball, then it is too dry for the crop and should be irrigated immediately.

Technicians at the Soil Conservation Service office will be glad to give on-site assistance with this and other irrigation problems that you might have. Our phone number is 3-2352 in Floydada.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

HJR #48—Number Five on the Ballot.

By majority vote of the qualified voters in each municipality, and any vacancy or vacancies occurring on such governing body shall not be filled by appointment but must be filled by a special election called for such purpose within one hundred and twenty (120) days after such vacancy or vacancies occur.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

AND PROVIDING FOR AUTOMATIC RESIGNATION WHEN SUCH OFFICERS BECOME A CANDIDATE FOR ELECTION TO ANOTHER OFFICE AND PROVIDING FOR A LONGER TERM OF OFFICE THAN TWO (2) YEARS, EITHER ELECTIVE OR APPOINTIVE, OR BOTH, BUT NOT TO EXCEED FOUR (4) YEARS; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, THAT TENURE UNDER CIVIL SERVICE SHALL NOT BE AFFECTED HEREBY. **FROM THE County Agent's Office**

**COTTON INSECTS** — Light infestation of bollworms have been found in several fields in the county. Increased bollworm activity usually follows irrigation in a week or ten days. Cotton should be checked for eggs and small worms during this period. The cotton is developing nicely throughout the county with parts of the county receiving 6 to one inch of rain over the weekend.

**CUCUMBERS** — The plants this year have not grown and developed as they should have and yields will be cut sharply and many deformed cucumbers are noticed. These plants have been thoroughly checked and no diseases have been found. The trouble seems to be hot weather and high winds, possibly later planted cucumbers will make much larger and higher quality yields than early planted cucumbers.

**INSECTICIDES** — We have received some reports of near fatal accidents with the use of cotton poisons. All insecticides are poisonous and should be handled as such. It might be a good idea to tell your wife or someone the kind of poison you are using, so if something happens the doctor can be told. The doctor needs to know the kind of poison so he can properly treat these cases. Be sure and follow the instructions and precautions on the label.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

SJR #3—Number Nine on the Ballot.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3** proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 5, to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas; authorizing the Commissioners Court of said county to assess and levy taxes on property outside the incorporated limits of such city; further providing that any enabling Act shall not be invalid because its anticipatory character.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another section to be designated as Section 5, which shall read as follows:

"Section 5. (a) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of two hospital districts, one to be coextensive with and have the same boundaries as the incorporated City of Amarillo as such boundaries now exist, or as they may hereafter be lawfully extended, and the other to be coextensive with Wichita County.

"If such district or districts are created, they may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed seventy-five cents (\$75) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of taxable property within the district; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property taxpayers in the boundaries of the City of Amarillo.

"If such tax is authorized, no political subdivision or municipality within or having the same boundaries as the district may levy a tax for municipal or hospital care for newly indigent, nor shall they maintain or erect hospital facilities, but the district shall by resolution assume all such responsibilities and shall assume all of the liabilities and obligations (including bonds and warrants) of such subdivisions or municipalities or both. The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge such obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the district to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements and initially equipping the same, and such bonds shall be payable from said seventy-five cents (75¢) tax. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the district.

"(b) The Legislature may by law permit the County of Potter (in which the City of Amarillo is partially located) to render financial aid to that district by paying a part of the expenses of operating and maintaining the system and paying a part of the debts of the district (whether assumed or created by the district) and may authorize the levy of a tax not to exceed Ten Cents (10¢) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation (in addition to other taxes permitted by this constitution) upon all property within the county but without the City of Amarillo at the time such levy is made for such purposes. If such tax is authorized, the district shall by resolution assume the responsibility, obligations and liabilities of the county in the manner and to the extent hereinabove provided for political subdivisions having boundaries coextensive with the district, and the county shall not thereafter levy taxes (other than herein provided) for hospital purposes nor for providing hospital care for individuals of the county.

"(c) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a hospital district within Jefferson County, the boundaries of which shall include only the area comprising the Jefferson County Drainage District No. 1 and the Fort Arthur Independent School District, as such boundaries existed on the first day of January, 1957, with the power to issue bonds for the sole purpose of purchasing a site for, and the construction and initial equipping of, a hospital system, and with the power to levy a tax not to exceed twenty-five cents (25¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of property therein for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on such bonds.

"The creation of such hospital district shall not be final until approved at an election by a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting at said election who have duly rendered their property for taxation upon the tax rolls of either said Drainage or said School District, nor shall such bonds be issued or such tax be levied until so approved by such voters.

"The district shall not have the power to levy any tax for maintenance or operation of the hospital or facilities, but shall contract with other political subdivisions of the state or private individuals, associations, or corporations for such purposes.

"If the district hereinabove authorized is finally created, no other hospital district may be created embracing any part of the territory within its boundaries, but the Legislature by law may authorize the creation of a hospital district incorporating therein the remainder of Jefferson County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided by Article IX, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, except that such district shall be confirmed at an election wherein the resident qualified property taxpayers who have duly rendered their property for taxation on the county rolls, shall be authorized to vote. A majority of those participating in the election voting in favor of the district shall be necessary for its confirmation and for bonds to be issued.

"(d) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Act shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of the state at the general election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

There are many new pharmaceutical agents available to combat fatigue, but, according to Margaret Spader, home service editor, a cup of hot tea is as good an agent as has been offered. Taking a few minutes every day to sit down and refresh yourself with a stimulating beverage, a snack of food, or, food for thought.

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## JOYCE WILSON MAKES TRIP TO DENMARK

Following are excerpts from a letter written by Mrs. Joyce Wilson to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John T. Carthel, Lt. and Mrs. C. E. Wilson and their daughter, Lesca are living in Hahn, Germany while he is doing service with the U. S. Air Force. They have made several interesting trips into other countries while there. This is the latest one:

On June 15 about 2:40 p. m. we left our new home in the housing area at Hahn, Germany and drove toward Denmark. It was cloudy and cool. Farmers along the way were cultivating

or hoeing foot-high potatoes and cutting hay with hand scythes.

At Koblenz we went by a fair ground where they were displaying new machinery and three buildings of flowers, handwork and the like. We crossed the Rhine and drove toward the Autobahn, a super highway built by Hitler. There were many shrubs with flat white flowers. We passed a chair lift that took people up to one of the castles on the Rhine. We passed a nursery where about fifty men and women were planting tiny evergreens. Along the Autobahn were many big beautiful trees. Often there were paved parkways going back in the trees, furnishing places to eat in relative privacy. Across the countryside were picturesque hay stacks, we walked out in a field of a kind of beet or turnip, something for cow feed. The hay, after it is cut, is forked up on wooden frames — a kind of triangle that allows air to go under, so it will cure faster.

From Dortmund toward Hamm there was a lot of heavy industry — some enormous brick smokestacks. On further, we passed many dairy farms, much grass and many trees. We passed the large headquarters of the Canadian Army.

We left the Autobahn and drove to Bielefeld to spend the night. We had to look a long time, as it was late, but found a nice room in a downtown hotel. It was a room with two good German beds and a small shower for 19 marks or nearly \$5.00. The bathroom was down the hall. We slept well.

We were up and on our way pretty early the next morning. We bought some delicious apricots, cherries and bananas at a little outdoor fruit market. Many gardens were blooming, peas, beans, potatoes. The rye was headed out. Then we were in the land of the red brick — nearly every home had a red tile roof and red brick walls — not only homes, but enormous barns that joined the houses, some making a complete square with a small yard inside.

Just before Bremen we passed a small oilfield. We drove north toward Bremerhaven until we saw the sign to the Army POL Post, then drove west and got gas there with our gas coupons. Then we drove back to the Autobahn and toward Hamburg. This was a stretch of farmland — much very tall rye, and people were thinning beets or turnips. There were many trees, evergreens, elm, aspen or birch and perhaps cottonwood. There were big potato patches. We saw a hay rake like ours, only with a large horse pulling it. There were many Holstein cows.

We spent the night at Rendburg in a quaint thatched roof hotel. We took pictures of the rhododendron, cosmos, and giant ruffled petunias in front of the hotel before we left.

Very soon we had to stop for some ships that were going west on the Nord Ostsee Canal. The two sections of the bridge swung around until they were parallel to the banks — quite a sight! A big ship carrying many Mercedes cars came by, then an enormous empty British ship came by.

The farms were much larger here and there were many big farm homes. We passed a German Plane and war school for children — guards in front and high fence all around. Then there was a long stretch of road construction — we drove on dirt. So much of the work is done by hand, I believe first

they lay a layer of large ball size stones, then sand, then small stones or large gravel, then tar. (Anyways similar to that—with hand scoops, etc. We passed a Royal Air Force field and saw our first tent hanger. The countryside reminded me of the waste or grassland down near the Texas coast. There were beautiful white clouds and blue sky.

Flensburg and into Denmark finally! We had no wait at the border — beautiful brick buildings and a special building for tourist information. The girls there spoke British English.

The country was beautiful — fenced in green pastures with Brown Swiss and Guernsey cattle grazing lazily in the warm sunshine. Lilies were blooming everywhere. Tall gray green rye divided the pastures. There were lovely huge deep red-leaved trees and many thatched roofs.

At Haderslev we saw an old cathedral, one of the few old things in Denmark, our guide book said.

We drove on the first 3 lane highway we've seen. Through Kolding, then across the longest deep water bridge in Europe to the middle island — Funen.

There were lilac hedges, rolling hills, cauliflower, cabbage orchards in bloom. At Odeuse we drove to Hans Christian Andersons home, then to the Open Air Museum where we had a meal at a restaurant there. This museum was a collection of typical Danish buildings from all over Denmark, from very old to new — barns, farm homes, Dutch windmill that used to grind grain, an open air theatre with grass covered tiered seats in a semi-circle. (Two men were directing the erection of sets for a play that night.) Then there was the restaurant — our meal there was a memorable occasion.

There were two large rooms, one dark and one light. We sat in the light one. As it was mid-afternoon, only another couple were there. There were girl waitresses dressed in colorful costumes, and they spoke quite good English. They suggested we have the special dinner, so we did. They soon were friends with Lesca, and brought an enormous glass of milk, rice, a boiled egg, toast, and banana. She ate almost all!

Well! The first part of our meal was called the cold table — a natural wood affair as big as a small boat almost, that held nine different dishes of fish, meats, sauces, salads, even raw egg and raw beef. With this we had three breads — dark brown Danish rye, plain

rye and white homemade, with a big bowl of soft yellow butter! There was pickled herring, smoked salmon and eel, sardine tartar sauce, mustard sauce, many others I couldn't remember from one hearing. That was like nothing I had ever experienced before!

Then when we were almost satisfied, she brought a long loaf of beet pickles and long cucumber pickles, potatoes fried in butter, a big bowl of sausage balls atop cooked and slightly pickled (with red currant juice) red cabbage, then a platter of fish fillets and a platter of pork chops in a delicious brown sauce. Those were the hot dishes!

After more visiting, and Lesca going walking with the girls, she brought us a huge lazy Susan filled with fine cheeses and different crackers (called cheese and biscuit plate). I recognized only two of the cheeses, but all were super delicious! We bade them farewell after many thanks, (approximately \$1.75 each person for dinner) and sat in the car to think about it.

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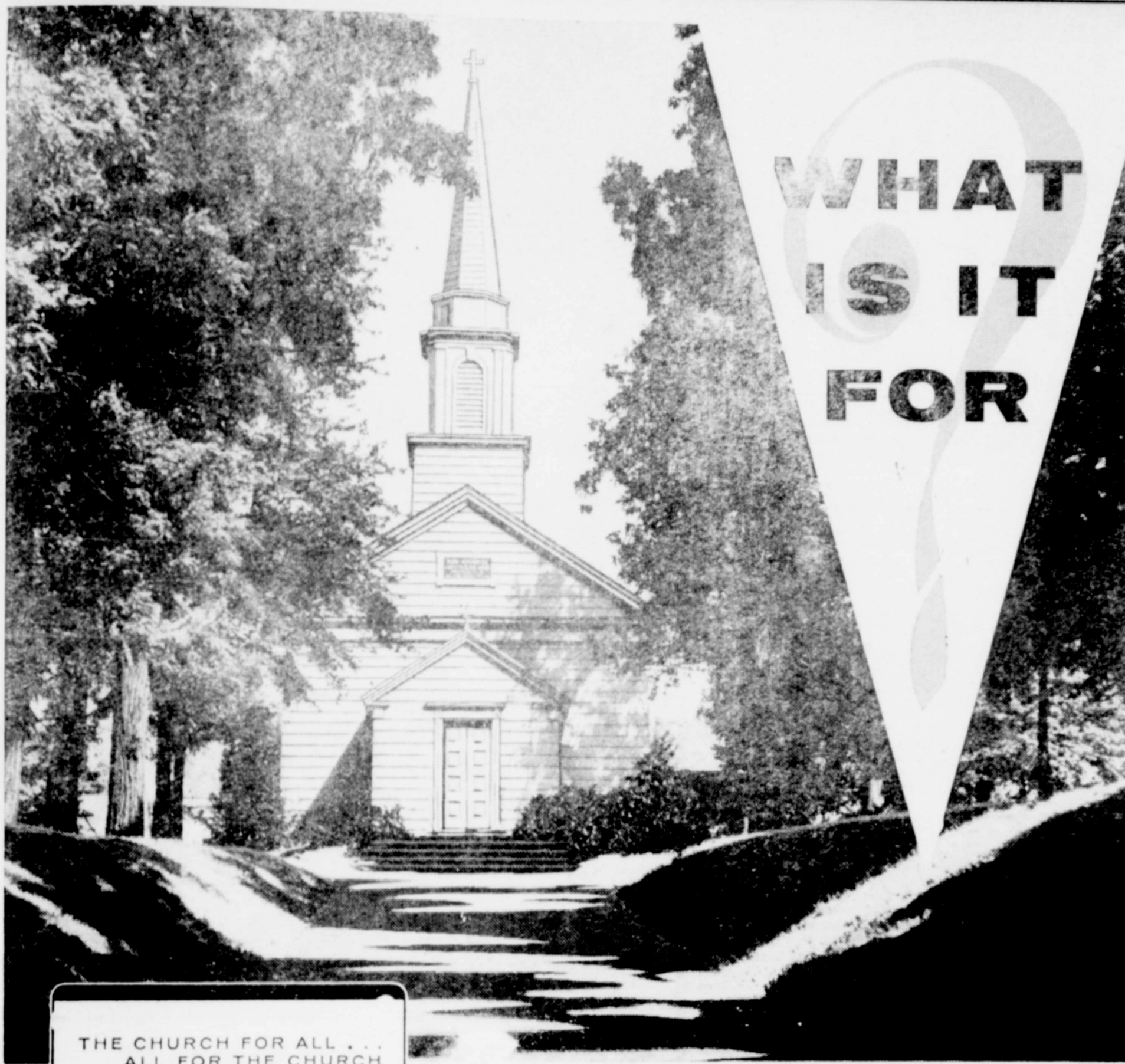
