Montgomery of Caldwell county. He is driving a herd of 1000 head of cattle which he will take to Cheyenne, but he will stop a month near the line of this county and Shackelford, to gather up a herd which he turned loose upon the range some time ago. Mr. Montgomery has been a pretty heavy loser in horse flesh in this county, having bought 300 head late in the fall and they being very pool on their arrival, the severe storms were too much for them. He lost all but about 50 head. This is about the only loss in horses in this county; horses which were acclimated, although turned out poor in the fall, have wintered well. Mr. Montgomery reports the losses in cattle quite heavy in Caldwell. He informs us that Mr. Ellerson will drive nine herds north this season, each herd to contain 3000 head and upwards, making all 27,000 or 30,000 head, a number of which are already on the trail. The first herd contained 3,400 head.

Extreme Wildfire Danger Predicted For Large Portion Of Texas Texas Forest Service urges caution

COLLEGE STATION. Texas-- Texas Forest Service (TFS) warns that extreme wildfire danger could occur in areas west of Interstate 35 on Thursday. Elevated to critical wildfire danger could be experienced through Friday evening.

The extreme wildfire danger is predicted to begin Thursday morning.

Dan Byrd, a National Weather Service meteorologist working with TFS, said the combination of strong winds and relative humidity values in the single digits to low teens could create an extremely dangerous situation for the affected areas. Winds are predicted to gust as high as 50 to 60 mph over portions of the Permian Basin and 35 to 45 mph as far east as Interstate 35.

Fire behavior analyst Darrell Schulte said that wildfires that start on Thursday could spread from two to four mph, or about 15 miles every minute. Flame lengths could reach as high as 20

Since Jan. 22, 2009, the beginning of the winter wildfire season, TFS has responded to 565 wildfires for 104,633 acres. During the same period, local fire departments have reported an additional 4,118 wildfires for 100,061 acres according to an online

GROOMING The district's dress code is established to teach grooming and hygiene, prevent disruption, and minimize safety hazards. Students and parents may determine a student's personal dress and grooming standards, provided that they comply with the following: We expect students to come to school in clothes that are clean and neat, and we expect students to exhibit basic cleanliness and grooming that will not be a health or safety threat to themselves or to other students or staff. While we understand students' desire to express themselves in their clothing and grooming styles, we

lewd, offensive, vulgar, or obscene or that advertises or depicts tobacco products, alcoholic beverages, drugs, or any other substance that students are prohibited from having or using at school. The principal makes decisions about dress and

accessories (i.e. jewelry, rings, or belt buckles) that:

A. Are lewd, offensive, the established dress and

vulgar, or obscene B. Advertise or depict tobacco products, alcoholic beverages, drugs, or any other illegal substance

Refer to satanic, cult, or gang activities 2. Shorts are allowed for PK-12 grades.

3. Shorts and skirts should not be shorter than fingertip

4. A blouse or shirt that is in tank top form must have at least a 2-inch strap. Less than 2 inches will not be permitted.
5. Students will not be

permitted to wear seethrough clothing or have midriffs exposed.

6. Undergarments may not be worn as outerwear. 7. Pants, shorts, and slacks must be worn at the natural

waist

8. Students must wear shoes at all times. Cleats or spikes on shoes will not be permitted indoors.

9. Extremely torn clothing will not be permitted.

10. Students will be required to wear their hair

well groomed and clean at all times, and extreme modes of hair design and color will not be permitted. 11. Boys' hair must be out of student's eyes and may not extend past the earlobe or below the shirt collar.

Male students must be clean-shaven; neither hair nor sideburns should extend below the earlobe.

12. Capri pants must come below the bottom of the

13. No jewelry may be visible in any pierced area of the body except for the ear. Males are not permitted to wear earrings during school hours or at any schoolsponsored activity on or off campus after hours.

Sponsors of extracurricular activities may set individual dress and appearance standards for designated school-approved uniforms with the approval

15. Students may not have or wear hats, caps, sweat bands, visors, head coverings, or bandanas in the school building—(neither males nor females).

16. Sunshades may not be worn in the building or classroom during school hours unless a physician has prescribed them for

indoor use.

17. Any disruptive or distractive mode of clothing or grooming, in the principal's judgment, that adversely impacts the educational process is not

grooming codes may result in disciplinary action.

If your child comes to school wearing clothes that violate the dress code or in any other way violates our dress and grooming standards, she or he will be placed in in-school suspension until she or he is in compliance. We will make efforts to notify you as soon as possible; and if the student changes clothes or otherwise comes into compliance with the dress and grooming standards, she or he will return to regular classes immediately.


Callahan County Fire Tuesday amaim



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

"I was particularly pleased to have ACU students receive two of the only three awards given in the Feature Writing category, one of which will be one of only 12 considered for national honors," said Bacon.





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
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
