





Let's Break With Tradition!

Tradition is a wonderful thing and sometimes serves a useful and valuable purpose. But it can be a detriment to progress if followed to excess. We think the latter is true of a situation that exists in the Lockney Independent School District.

Since the Lockney School District and the six contiguous rural school districts were consolidated as a rural high school district in 1946, it has been the custom to elect one trustee from each of these seven original districts. The custom was first adopted presumably to appease those who were not pleased with the consolidation. But whatever usefulness it had in the early years of the new district has been lost and we believe that now this method of electing trustees is a hindrance to proper representation.

Why limit our choice of a trustee to one small segment of the people in the district, sometimes numbering not more than 50, when the choice can be made from the entire population, numbering probably more than 4,000 persons. Many times the board-appointed nominating committee has trouble finding a person willing to run from one of these rural districts. Furthermore, there is no lawful way to elect one man from each of the original districts unless these men just happen to get the most votes. Under the law, anyone can file who wishes to do so, and the candidates with the majority of votes win even if two of them live on the same block.

From another standpoint, this traditional way of electing trustees does not give fair representation. The Lone Star district, consolidated only two years ago, and having more population and more valuation than any of the original districts with the possible exception of Aiken, will never have a representative on the board if the present method is continued. Then the city of Lockney, with more than half of the population of the entire district, has always had only one representative on the board though it has most of the population and much of the valuation.

This is not to be construed as saying or meaning that Lockney has been mistreated by the school board, nor is it intended as criticism of the school board, nor any member of the board, past or present, nor the administration. The affairs of the district have been very well managed, as far as we know. We're just saying that the old way of electing trustees has lost its usefulness.

Let's forget about boundary lines that no longer exist. Let's take the restrictions off of the selection of trustees. After all, most people have forgotten the bitterness that came with consolidation. We all have the same desire—to have the best school possible. We think it's time for a change. Let's vote for school trustees on their individual merit - not on where they live.







In rare instances, where a taxpayer's surname is unusually long, one or more letters at the end of the surname may even be dropped.

The IRS representative advises taxpayers to endorse their refund checks exactly as Then, if letters are drawn. omitted at the end of a surname, a second endorsement should be made showing the full surname.

Surplus Of Feed Grains Will

Depress Prices College Sation - Feed grain prices in the 1958-59 marketing year are expected to average a little below the 1957-58 level, Richard Barkley principally as a result of large supplies, predicts John Mc Haney, extension economist.

High yields have helped to boost feed grain production and stocks. McHaney points out. Near record yields in 1956 were followed by record yields in 1957 and 1958 and total utilization this year is expected to be 16 million tons below total production plus imports. This is expected to bring carryover stocks up to a record of about 75 million tons, a 27 per cent increase ,at the beginning of

the 1959-1960 marketing year. However, he adds, better quality of the 1958 corn and grain sorghum crops will make a larger percentage of these grains eligible for price support. Coupled with the six per cent increase in the number of grain-consuming livestock to be fed, this will help to give some strength to feed grain prices. The seasonal rise in the price of corn the first six months of 1959 probably will be much less than the 28 per cent rise



Farm Bureau Endorses Gas **Tax Revenue**

Waco - Governor Daniel's proposal to tax natural gas as means of raising needed revenue has been strongly endorsed by the Texas Farm Bureau. J. H. West, president of the state's largest farm organiza tion, declared that the tax is fair and equitable because it does not place an undue burden on Texans, while at the same time, gives the people of Texas an opportunity to benefit from the "irreplaceable" natural resource now being shipped out

of state. The revenue-raising proposal, HB 43, has been introduced in the House of Representatives in Austin by Rep. George Hinson of Mineola. The proposed tax is a "severance beneficiary" tax on natural gas at the rate of 3 per cent of value, which would raise \$41 million over the next biennium. Show officials have pointed out and emphasized several changes in the rules for this year's show. The show barn will open at 7 a.m. on Monday, March 9, all animals must be in place by 12 noon and must Hays, Lockney, remain until 11:30 a.m. March 11. Sifting will begin at 1 p.m. Willis Cooper, Floydada. Monday

Entries must be in the Floyd County agent's office by March 2, and entry fees will be charged as follows: \$1.00 for steers, 50 cents for barrows, 50 cents for wether lambs.

Barrows in the show must weigh at least 180 pounds and not more than 240 pounds. If there are five or more barrows of the same breed and weight there will be a class for that breed and weight. Swine in the sifted sale must weight 170 pounds to be eligible to sell. Lambs in the fat class must have their lamb teeth and will be sifted if they weigh more than 130 pounds.

Prizes in each class will be as follows: 1st, \$5; 2nd, \$3; 3rd, \$3; 4th, \$2; 5th, \$2; 6th to 10th, ribbons. Grand champions will receive \$5 and banner and reserve champions \$3 and banner.




