Wheat Harvest Is About Over, **Yields Good**

The wheat harvest is drawing to a close in this part of Floyd County. Elevator men said Wednesday that it was 80 to 85 per cent complete, with a few green fields or muddy places yet to be harvested.

Yields have been good and local elevators will handle probably a third more wheat from the current crop than they did in 1959, The Beacon was told. However, lower acreage will prevent the county yield from reaching the high totals years ago.

Dry land wheat has pretty well averaged 15 bushels per acre, according to elevator men, while irrigated wheat is avera

ging between 40 and 50 bushels The grain is testing 60 pounds or better.

The best yield reported to The Beacon in this area is that from the Royce Carthel farm, west of Providence. He made 67 bushels per acre and the grain tested 64 pounds. The wheat was Tascosa and the foundation seed came from A.&M. College last year. Ted Boedeker, Carthel's father-in-law, bought
