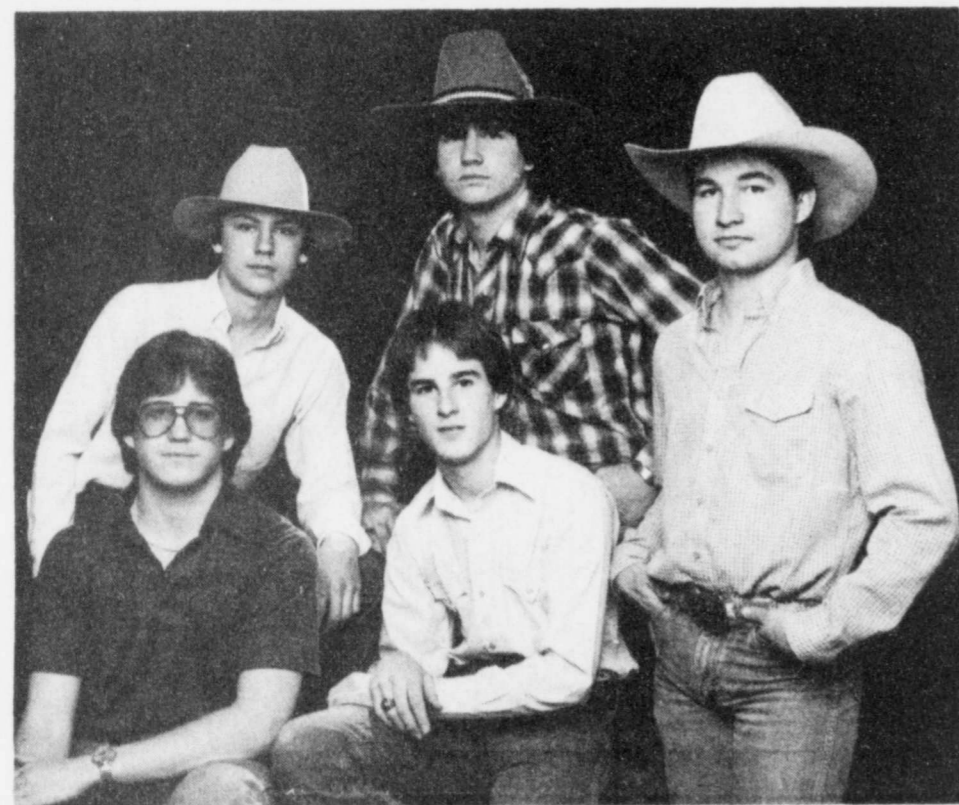

Local country band West Wind will start off the show with a 45-minute program of country music. The band features Tim Burns on bass, Brian Sanders on lead guitar, Roger Alldredge on rhythm guitar, Rob Pratt on piano, and Keith Owens on drums. Brian Sanders is the lead vocalist, but all the members sing. Floydada Livestock Sales Company auctions cattle

The Livestock Sales Co. had their biggest sale in 1974 and had 3,177 head of cattle at one sale. Most of the cattle come from within a 70 mile area from Floydada. Most of their customers are farmers and ranchers in this area.

Cattle are pinned and numbered by tags and branded and put into individual grouped pens. Cattle are weighed at the time of sale and sold by the pound. The cattle are seen by the State Brand Inspector and State Health Inspector.

The most kinds of cattle are stocker cattle that are light weight cattle off of ranches. Feeder cattle are bigger steers and heifers fowd from wheat farms and butcher cows and bulls. About 1300 head a week go through the yards and about 200 head an hour are sold.

Don McCandless is the auctioneer. Mrs. Ouida McCandless weighs the

cattle. LaNell McCandless writes the tickets as the cattle are sold and Aliene Hambright runs the office buyers and sellers sheets. Anywhere from 150 to 200 people attend the auction.

The auction is held on Wednesday but the cattle start coming in Monday and Tuesday. After most of the cattle are sold at the sales, most cattle go to feed yards in the Texas Panhandle, Oklahoma and Kansas or to area packing houses.

Buyers of feeder cattle usually take them to the North plains of the Panhandle. Butcher cattle go to the Texas Panhandle.

Stocker cattle buyers are mostly local ranchers. The stock yards employ seven full time employees and about 35 part time help during sales.

The public auction is for anyone who wishes to bring their cattle in for sale.

Dear Mr. Darnell,
It is with deep concern that we contact your office regarding the auto-pedestrian accident fatality on Jan. 1, 1984 that occurred in Lubbock involving Wendy Ruff, Floydada, (deceased), and Jeannie Sue Nicholson, Lubbock, driver of the auto.

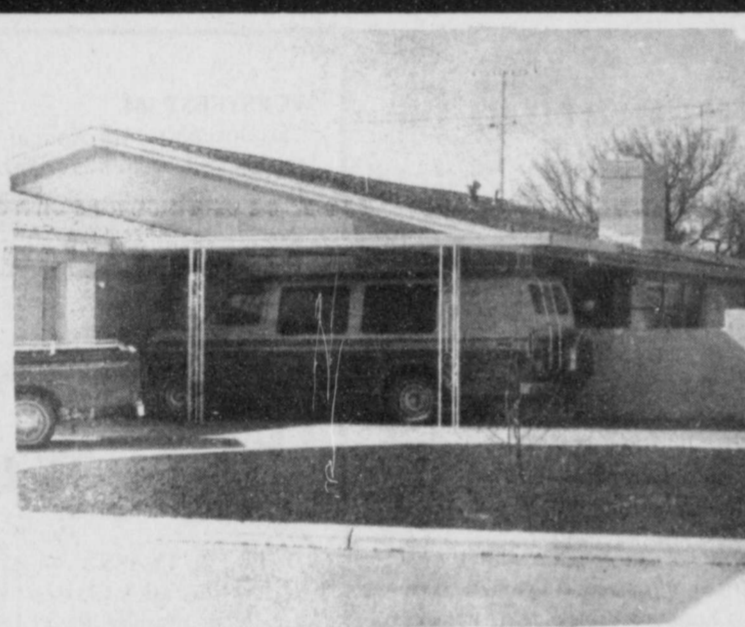
Being the parents of Bart Patzer, the key witness to the accident who was accompanying Wendy Ruff at the time of the accident, we are concerned as to the lack of communication from your office to Wendys parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Tipton, Floydada, or us as to what action, if any, is taking place. The only information we have to date is what we have searched out for ourselves. We feel the only humane thing to do is for your office to at least have the courtesy to inform and keep in touch with the Tiptons so they and others know someone is concerned legally.

We sincerely hope that we are wrong, however, it appears that a lack of action has occurred to date other than a grand jury hearing that is set for Feb. 13, 1984. We also sincerely hope that you have all the facts regarding the accident to present to the grand jury, as we do know some witnesses have yet to be contacted.

It seems a very unfair striking contrast to realize that when an individual receives a traffic ticket for speeding, you have 10 days to appear before a judge to make a plea otherwise a warrant for arrest will be issued and yet when a death of an individual occurs in a traffic accident such as this, 30 days have passed with very little if any legal or civil action has taken place to our knowledge.

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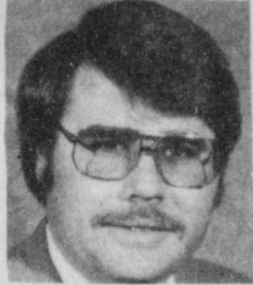

Floydada - Electronic hearing tests will be given at The Senior Citizens Center, on Wed., February 15th from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

Larry Lindsey, licensed hearing aid specialist, will be at 301 E. Georgia to perform the tests.

Anyone who has trouble hearing or understanding speech clearly is welcome to have a test using modern electronic equipment to determine if his loss is one which can be helped. Some of the causes of hearing loss will be explained and diagrams of how the ear works will be shown.

Everyone should have a hearing test at least once a year if there is any trouble at all hearing clearly. Even people now wearing a hearing aid or those who have been told nothing could be done for them should have a hearing test and find out whether the latest methods of hearing correction can help them hear better.

The free hearing test will be given Wed., from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. at the Senior Citizens Center. If you can't come in, call 983-2032 and arrange for an appointment at another time. In-home testing is also available.

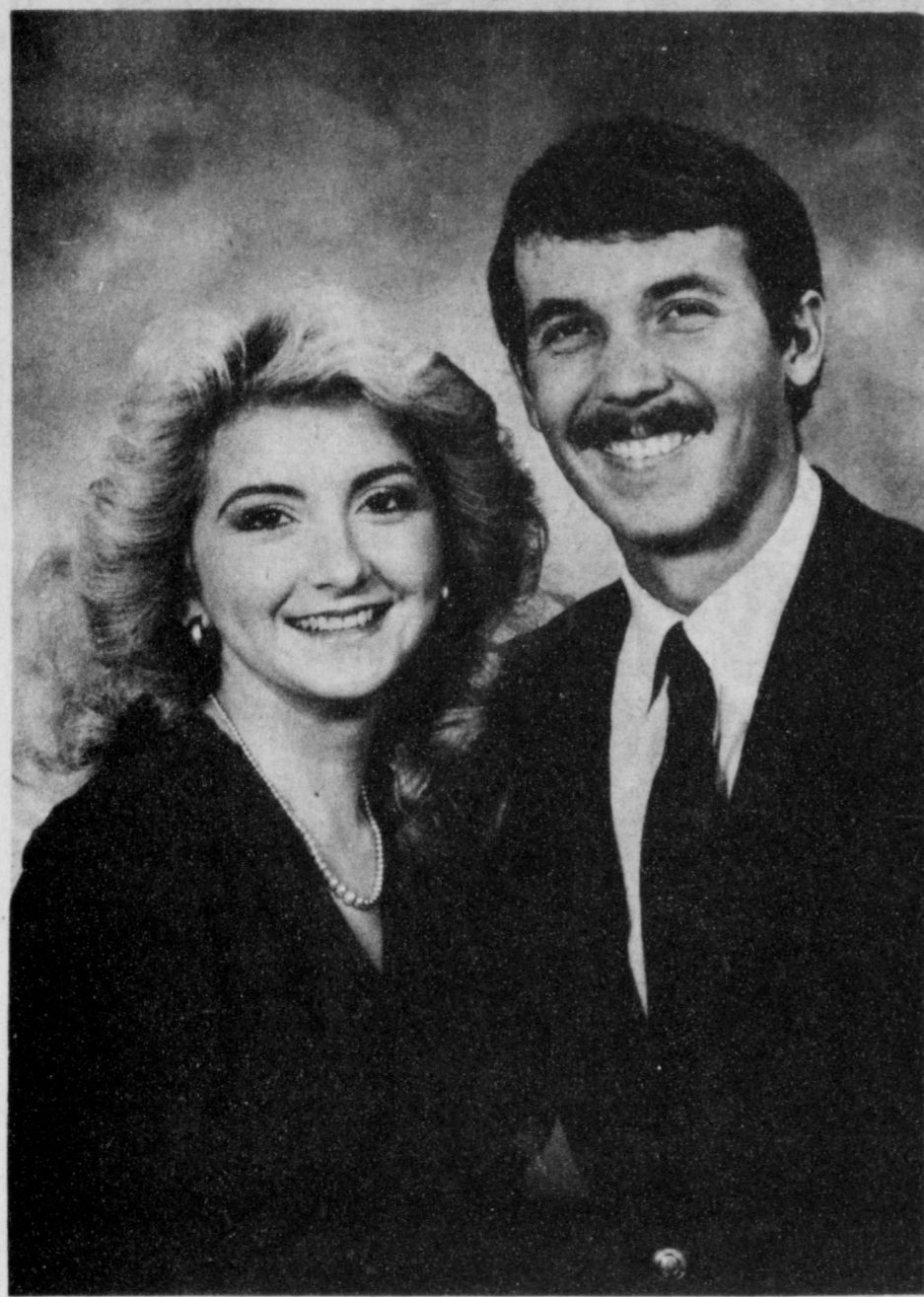
Love," on the flute and piano.

Richard Key to participate in Houston calf scramble

Richard Lynn Key, a 16-year-old FFA member from Lockney, Texas, will participate in the 1984 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo calf scramble on March 3 in the Astrodome. The calf scramble is an exciting part of the rodeo action starring Charley Pride and Reba McEntire as part of that matinee's performance.

Ricky, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Coffman, will compete for one of the 280 calf purchase certificates to be awarded at the 1984 Rodeo.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is the Southwest's premier charity event, with all net proceeds directly benefiting youth and education. The calf scramble is just one of the many programs aiding young people. The Show is the nation's largest donor of agricultural scholarships.

The calf scramble is a "year-long" event that begins with athletic competition in the Astrodome and ends with qualitative competition in the show ring.

It involves the turning loose of two dozen or so energetic youngsters and half as many wild, young calves in one arena. Those who manage to grab a

calf, halter it and drag it across the finish line are provided with a \$600 calf purchase certificate. The certificate, donated by a sponsoring firm or individual, is used to purchase a pure-bred, registered beef or dairy heifer.

The calf is raised by the winner for a special show ring competition to be held at next year's show. In accordance with the general rules of the livestock show and the scramble program, each project is closely supervised by a vocational agriculture teacher or county extension agent. Controlled learning experiences include proper livestock evaluation techniques, efficient cattle feeding and production methods, principles of economics and money management.

The calf scramble program typifies the purposes and goals of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Through the program, participants gain invaluable experience that many times serves to stimulate a career in agriculture.

Always a crowd-pleasing event at the Houston Rodeo, the calf scramble allows the viewing public to see firsthand what the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is all about.

County approved disaster

Dear Governor White:

This is in further response to your letters requesting that 25 Texas counties be determined natural disaster areas eligible for Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) emergency (EM) loan assistance. Your requests are based on damages and losses to crops caused by drought beginning May 1, 1983, and continuing through November 30, 1983; an early freeze in September 1983; hail storms on May 20, June 7-10, and October 16, 1983; and a tornado on September 15, 1983; and heavy rains in October and November 1983. Those counties are: Briscoe, Comanche, Concho, Crosby, Dallan, Dickens, Donley, Eastland, Fisher, Floyd, Foard, Hockley, Jones, Kent, Lamb, Menard, Mills, Motley, Potter, Randall, San Saba, Scurry, Swisher, Taylor, and Tom Green.

The Damage Assessment Reports (DARs) for the 25 counties have been carefully evaluated to determine the extent of damage sustained. Based upon the information in the DARs and other supporting information, we have determined that production losses sustained in 23 counties are sufficient to warrant a Secretarial natural disaster determination.

Seventeen counties are named due to losses sustained by drought beginning May 1, 1983, and continuing through November 30, 1983. Those counties are:

Comanche, Dickens, Donley, Eastland, Fisher, Foard, Hockley, Jones, Kent, Menard, Mills, Motley, Potter, San Saba, Scurry, Swisher, and Tom Green.

Briscoe, Crosby and Dallam counties are named for losses due to drought beginning May 1, 1983, and continuing through November 30, 1983, and an early freeze in September 1983.

Randall County is being approved for losses due to drought beginning May 1, 1983, and continuing through November 30, 1983; an early freeze in Floyd County is being approved for losses due to drought beginning May 1, 1983, and continuing through September 30, 1983; an early freeze in September 1983; and heavy rains in October and November 1983.

Taylor County is being approved for losses due to drought beginning May 1, 1983, and continuing through November 30, 1983, and a tornado on September 15, 1983.

By copy of this letter, we are directing the FmHA Administrator to immediately make EM loan assistance available to eligible farmers in the 23 counties.

We are deferring our decision on Concho and Lamb Counties pending receipt of additional information.

PIK commodities to count against limitation in 1984

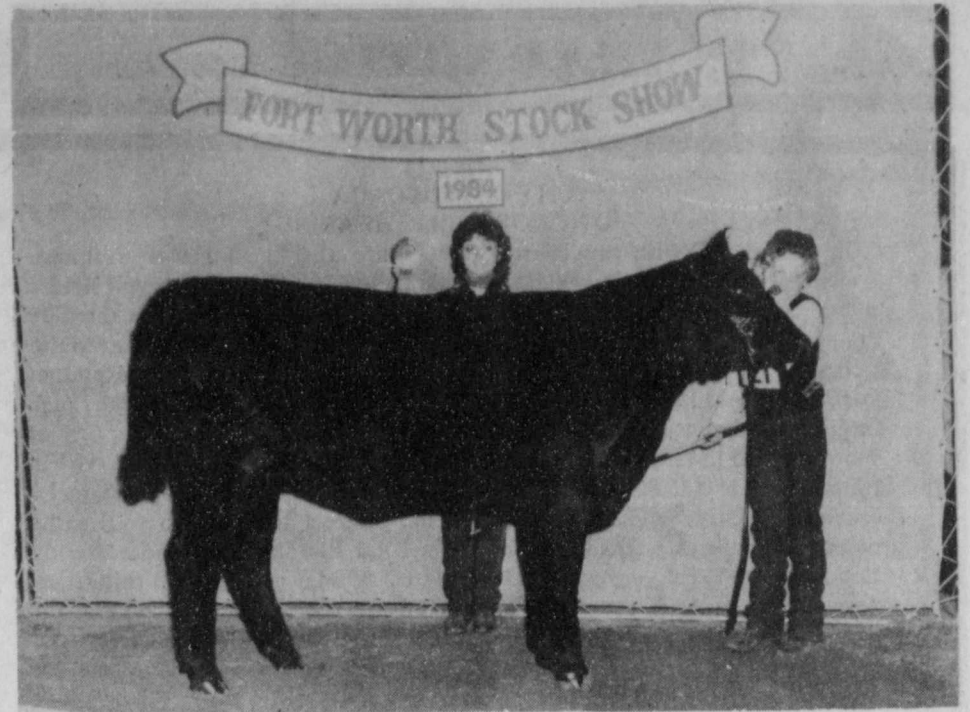
The value of commodities received by a farmer as payment-in-kind compensation in 1984 will be added to other program benefits in determining whether the farmer has reached the statutory \$50,000 payment limitation applicable to commodity programs, a U.S. Department of Agriculture official said.

C. Hoke Leggett, associate administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said the PIK compensation would be figured in with cash diversion and deficiency payments in arriving at the \$50,000

payment limit.

USDA on Jan. 4 asked for comments by Jan. 13 on proposed PIK program regulations for 1984. USDA evaluated comments submitted by the public and decided the proposed rule would be issued as a final rule with no changes.

Wheat is the only crop for which a payment-in-kind program has been announced for 1984.

Cotton crop headed for 'same song, second verse'

The 1984 cotton crop could be headed for the "same song, second verse" scenario-overproduction followed by lower prices.

"Because the 1983 PIK program reduced supplies and thus caused some strengthening in prices, many farmers will be inclined to plant more cotton in 1984," believes Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "That will bring prices down again by harvesttime."

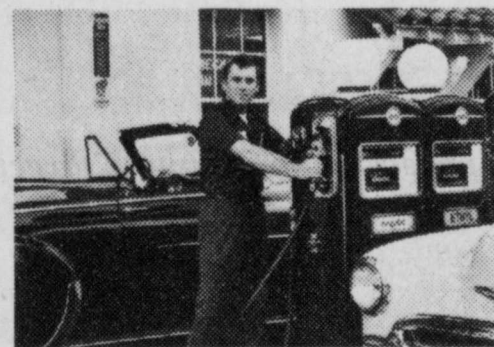
Anderson views the government's '84 cotton program as not sufficiently attractive to cotton producers to keep them from planting substantially more acres than in 1983. Such increased production in the U.S., coupled with an expected increase in foreign production, would cause the world crop to exceed consumption levels. This would also put pressure on the export market for U.S. cotton.

"Because the '84 cotton program allows for a large deficiency payment--the maximum is 26 cents a pound for eligible producers, many large-scale operators will probably reach the \$50,000 payment limitation," points out

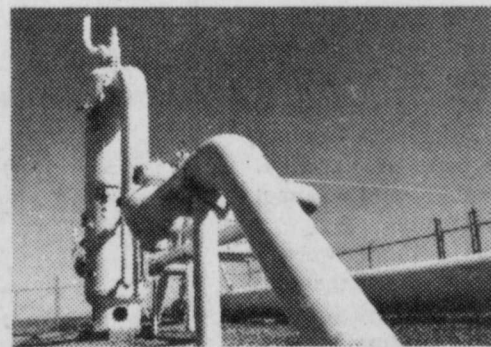
Anderson. "This drastically reduces the program's effectiveness to cut production."

With a base cotton acreage around 15.5 million with no paid diversion or other incentives to producers, Anderson speculates that planted acres will reach 12 to 13 million. This could mean a 13- to 14-million-bale crop. The economist pegs domestic use and exports at 11.5 to 12 million bales, so an average production year in 1984 could add 1 to 2 million bales to an already adequate carryover from the '83 crop.

"All this points to a weak cotton market in the second half of 1984," says Anderson. "So growers may want to take a hard look at pricing part of their expected crop fairly early in the year."
