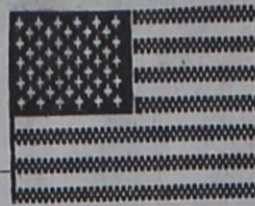
She was also a school teacher in various places.

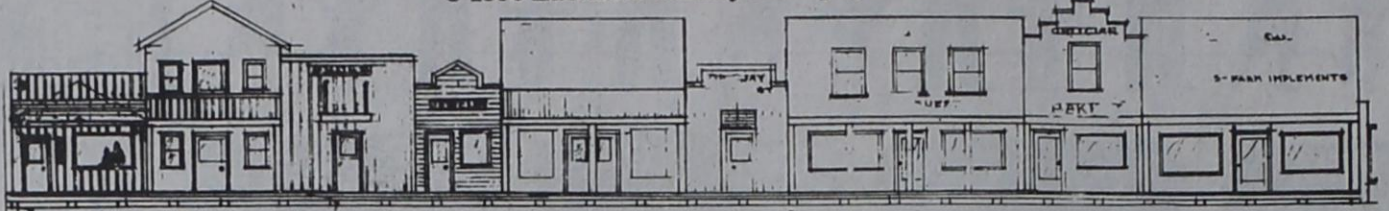

Development Corporation In Baird Met July 13

B A I R D - The Development Corporation Board of Baird met Wednesday, July 13, at Baird City Hall. Members present were Larry Newton, Kim Vestal and Steve Bowen. The meeting was called to order by Kim Vestal at 7:09 p.m.

There were no citizens present to be heard.

Nicki Harle present-

ed the board with a report on the feasibility of land development on the south side of the railroad tracks in Baird. Harle's assignment was to find out the steps to be taken to purchase the land south of the tracks and if commercial development in the area would be beneficial to the community.

Harle said she had spoken to Jacob & Martin Engineering firm and they recommended that a site assessment be done before any action was taken. This would give the board proof of any apparent environmental concerns with the property and then the board could request a feasibility study. The feasibility study would assess the amount that it would cost to develop the area which is now approximately 200 acres of pasture land. Harle recommended the board have the engi-

neers to do a site assessment and fee appraisal on the property.

Bowen made a motion which was seconded by Vestal to have the Jacobs and Martin Engineers perform the Site Assessment and Fee Appraisal at the cost of \$2,800. The motion passed.

Bun Barry, Baird Chamber of Commerce President, gave an update report on a loan for the "Arch's" project that had been approved by the Development Board during its last meeting in the third week of July. The Arch's in the 100 block of Market Street has been a Baird landmark since the building burned sometime before 1920. It was used as a theater before burning.

The property is now owned by K.D. Griffin and the Board approved a no-interest loan to the Baird Chamber of Commerce to develop the property for public use. A cement slab and public restrooms will be built inside the old walls with a metal roof so the area could be rented for use as a flea market, farmer's market, special events such as weddings, receptions, dances and open air meetings.

Barry said that there was some concerns expressed after the loan was announced of using public funds to develop private property. He said there will be an agreement signed between Griffin and the Chamber that would eliminate any concerns. The chamber will garner all revenue until the note is paid and then Griffin will be paid a percentage of the proceeds with the Chamber remaining as property manager.

Barry spoke of how the downtown area needed the public restrooms and how this project would utilize an unused space in the main business district that has done little but grow weeds for many years. Barry is also working to have the structure classified as a historical building. Vestal adjourned the meeting at 7:59 p.m.

Set aside a quiet time for your child to study, have a certain place for him or her to study, provide a variety of reading material and encourage the child to read more than just school books, set clear rules for homework and study time, be a guide, review the homework together after the child has completed it.

If you are a positive influence in your child's studies by encouraging the child in his or her studies, talking positively about school, helping your child be independent by budgeting time and making decisions on his/her own, setting realistic goals together with the child, teaching by example, expressing your love for the child will do well at school and grow into productive citizen.

Watch quality TV programs with your child and discuss them together. If your child does have a problem, listen carefully to the child, then set up a meeting with teacher or school counselor. Schedule a follow-up meeting to discuss your child's progress.

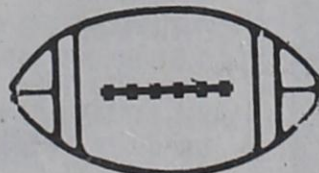
The Baird Booster Club will be hosting "Meet the Bears" night, Friday, August 16 at 7:30 p.m. in the Bear Stadium.

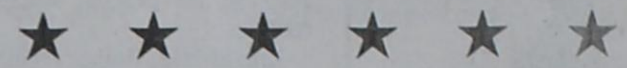

Lee Harris Attended 67th Annual Meeting

Les Harris, a volunteer fireman of the Baird Volunteer Department of Baird attended the 67th Annual Texas Fireman's Training School, July 21-26. The school was attended by nearly 2,000 students representing about 750 cities from more than 25 states and was held on the Texas A&M University campus.

Firemen chose their course at the school from a list including Fire Fighting, Fire Prevention, Fire Department Officer Training, Fire Dept. Pump Maintenance, Specialized Fire Protection and Disaster Rescue Training.

Fireman Harris was sponsored by Callahan-Shackelford County Far Bureau and Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies by contributing toward the cost of the school. Since volunteer firemen are interested in attending this school to help do a better job of fire fighting and fire prevention, 125 County Farm Bureaus and the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies in the statewide program have sponsored 125 firemen at school.

"The Farm Bureau Insurance Companies believe Volunteer Fire Departments have been very effective in reducing the amount of loss involved by fire areas," said President Bob Stallman of Columbus. "It is our hope in sponsoring this program that the fireman will help the Baird Volunteer Fire Department to better serve the residents of Callahan-Shackelford Counties."

Another feature of the Breakfast gives those attending an opportunity to learn about different businesses and organizations. Business representatives give two to three minute presentations on their particular



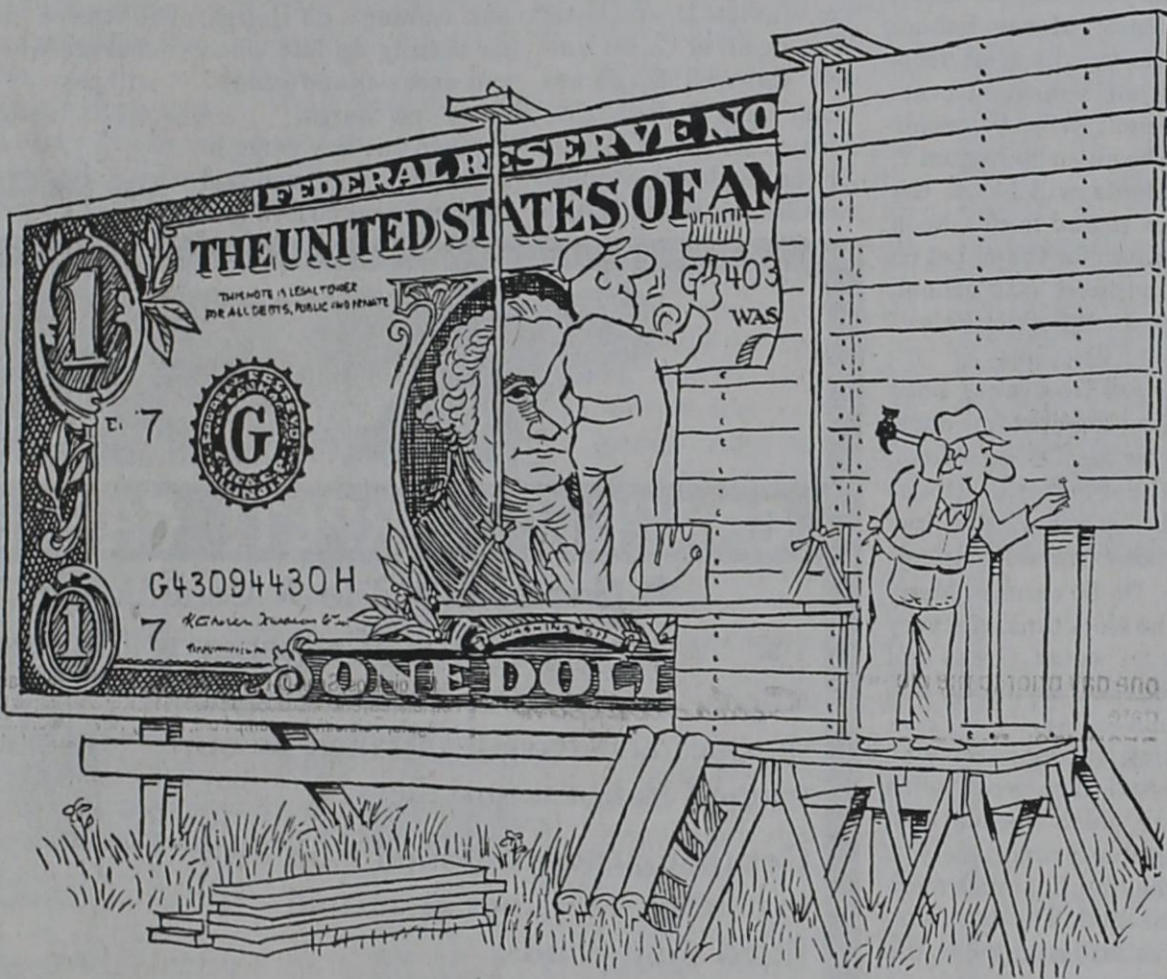

School Budget To Be Presented To Public

The official proposed budget for 1996-97 for Baird ISD was presented to the Board of Trustees at the June and July regular meetings. It will be presented to the public at an open meeting on Thursday, August 8 @ 7 p.m. in the school library.

Even with the increase in teachers' salaries, the expenditures for the new budget are down about \$54,000 from the current budget. Total proposed expenditures are \$2,736,675 while estimated revenue is \$2,739,536. This includes all funds, not just the general operating fund. Most employees will receive a raise, with teacher receiving increases of from \$1390 to \$4587. Support per-

sonnel receive a prorated portion of a teacher's raise based on the days worked.

For next year, school officials are not recommending a tax rate increase. With the increase in property values and the effective tax rate, we should be able to generate the same revenue without a tax rate increase.

The amount of local funds collected this year will affect the amount of money the state will give the district over the next two years. We are looking at two more years down the road and want to keep our school district as sound as possible over the next three years; and to do that, we

GRINDING IN THE NIGHT

An estimated one in 20 adults and three in 20 children unconsciously grind their teeth at night. It is the sound of bruxism. While the noise may disturb spouses or children, it has a far more distressing effect on the sleeper.
Nocturnal grinding can exert thousands of pounds of pressure per square inch on the surfaces of teeth. It can be rough not only on teeth but on the supporting bone, the gums and jaw joint.
For many years, bruxism was attributed to the release of tension from emotional stress. However, many dental authorities today believe that the causes exist in the patient's mouth.

Night grinding may be an unconscious effort to correct irregularities of the chewing surfaces of the teeth. Dentists term this a malocclusion. They grind away to eliminate a spot that is too high or to find a comfortable place to fit the upper and lower teeth together.
If you have this nightly grind problem, your first stop should be your dentist's office...before you do any serious damage to your teeth.

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ORNERY TOENAILS

People ordinarily take toenails for granted, remembering to trim them from time to time -- sometimes only when they begin to wear holes in socks. No wonder that it comes as a painful surprise when a toenail becomes ingrown. This occurs when the side of a nail grows into the skin. The result usually is swelling, redness and pain. That isn't all: piercing of skin can lead to infection. In some people, heredity may make nails more likely to grow inward. Sometimes it's injury, tight shoes or fungus infection that triggers the process. Often, it's failure to trim toenails straight across.

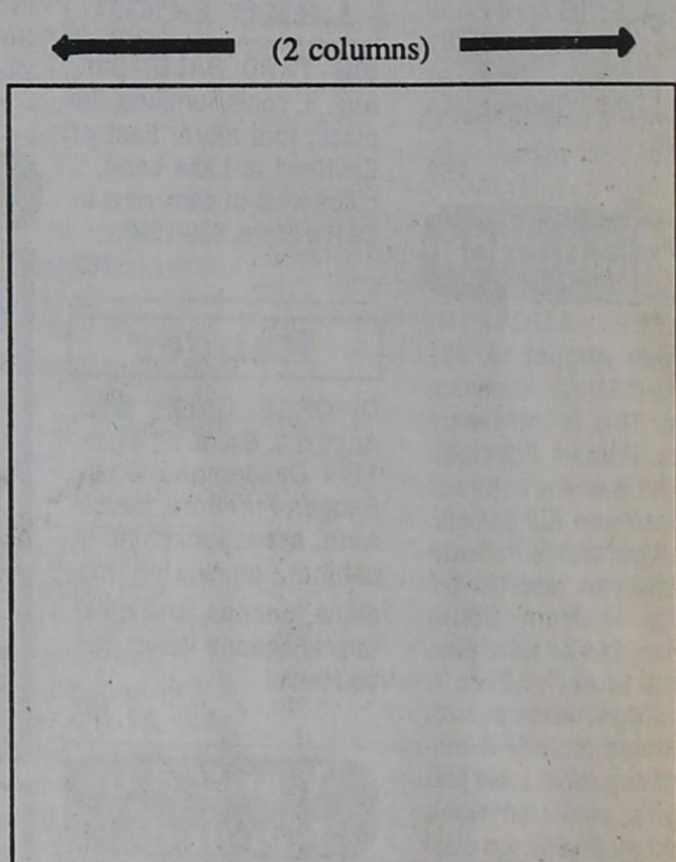
The podiatrist frequently treats ingrown toenails. Relief often is provided by removing only the ingrown side of a nail. Other cases may call for further steps. The most important safeguard against developing an ingrown toenail is to trim nails straight across, not contouring corners, so that they have a better chance to grow straight.

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Moseley Named To 5th Court Of Appeals

Moseley, who was regional director of the Federal Trade Commission in Dallas from 1983 to 1987, is a co-founder of the Federalist Society, a conservative organization made up mostly of lawyers which "looks at the role of judges in society as being to determine what the law is, not what the judge thinks it ought to be."

"I'm excited to have the opportunity to go into the Court of Appeals," Moseley said. "It's been a life-long dream. I grew up in

the Court of Appeals. My mother was clerk of the Court of Appeals in Eastland County."

Moseley, a graduate of Eastland High School, graduated from Baylor University in 1976, and entered law school after his junior year. He finished Baylor University School of Law in 1978, ranking in the top 15 percent of his class.

He joined the law firm of Locke Purnell Rain Harrell in 1987 where his duties included commercial litigation involving breach of contract, fraud, deceptive trade practices, franchising and dealer termination, eminent domain, real estate, construction, oil and gas and insurance defense.

As a regional director for the FTC between 1983 and 1987, he was responsible for enforcing federal antitrust laws in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana. In that capacity, he was responsible for 18 office employees, including nine attorneys.

Commissioners Agree to Terms With Citizens EMS

Callahan County Commissioners, holding a regular meeting Monday, July 22 agreed in principal to contract terms with Citizens EMS ambulance service.

Clyde City Administrator Tim Powers, Citizens Emergency Medical Service Administrator Ron Young and Clyde C.P.A. Lynn Reeves met with county commissioners at the courthouse in Baird Monday morning to discuss the ambulance service contract.

Once the contract is agreed to by Callahan County along with the cities of Clyde and Baird, Citizens EMS will become a private non-profit entity. The ambulance service will continue to be partially subsidized by those three entities which sign the contract.

The ambulance service will continue to be stationed in Clyde and will continue to serve the northern and western portions of the county.

Callahan County Judge Bill Johnson said commissioners agreed to subsidize the ambulance service at \$1,750 per month, an

increase of \$250 from the \$1,500 per month subsidy the county now provides. The contract length agreed to is three years, Johnson said.

Johnson said commissioners will sign the contract with Citizens EMS once it is completed.

Other items brought before commissioners' court included: —Commissioners agreed to maintain the \$10.00 county road and bridge fee for 1997. The \$10.00 fee is paid when county vehicle license plates are registered with the county. The \$10.00 fee is applied to each vehicle registered in the county.

—Commissioners reviewed and signed the minutes of the previous commissioners' court meeting. Commissioners also agreed to pay all approved bills.

—Commissioners held a budget workshop to discuss the 1996-97 county budget. Judge Johnson said appraised values in the county are up slightly. The county judge said there will not be an increase in county tax rates this year.

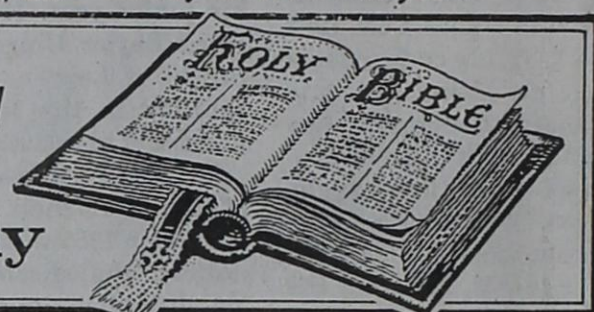

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Ranch Estate Planning Seminar Set For August 11 & 12

A properly drawn estate plan may save many ranch families over \$200,000 in estate taxes." This statement made by Wayne A. Hayenga, Texas Extension Economist and Attorney, assumes a lot of information a married couple who "like each other" and want to take care for each other, who have a ranch worth \$1 million or more, and want to pass it on to their children.

This is an eye opening fact for many ranchers. In fact, many people only worry about estate planning if they hear of a friend's "problem" in selling a ranch to pay estate taxes. "But," Hayenga continued, "for many families the estate tax savings are not as large as income tax savings if they have a properly prepared estate plan."

A two-day seminar talking about these complicated tax topics will be held at College Station on August 11 & 12 at Texas A & M University in conjunction with the Annual

Beef Cattle Shortcourse.

The seminar is structured to help ranchers learn how to lower their tax burden and ease administrative burdens that affect passing their estates to their loved ones. In addition to discussing estate planning systems, tax savings possibilities will be discussed using corporations, partnerships and trust when family members are involved in the business.

Making gifts to avoid estate taxes will be discussed also. "There are three problems with making gifts--the first is dying poor; the second is the adverse income tax consequences the gift can cause the recipient; the third is when somebody other than your intended beneficiary ultimately gets the gifted property."

Two problems that affect family operations--planning for inflation and growth needs of the business will be discussed. Another topic, how to be fair among all children when one child is

interested in the ranch and others are not, will be addressed.

The speaker, Wayne A. Hayenga, is a Professor and Extension Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. An agricultural economist and attorney, Dr. Hayenga, works extensively with farmers, ranchers and family-owned firms in financial, business and estate tax planning. He is a member of the Texas and American Bar Association and the American Agricultural Law Association. He is active in the Agricultural Law Committee of the State Bar of Texas.

Dr. Hayenga is an excellent communicator. He delivers a top-notch education program, emphasizing key points with an entertaining style, illustrating estate and income tax law provisions with practical examples that make learning a pleasure. His teaching makes full use of his broad background and practical experience as a farmer, lender and lawyer.

GOOD NEWS... On July 24, the U.S. Senate Veteran's Affairs Committee voted to roll back the starting date of the Vietnam War to February 28, 1961 from the previous effective date of August 5, 1964. At this time, we do not know how soon V A will put this new date into effect, but we do know that it will help some Veterans to establish wartime service. Wartime service is necessary on many claims and especially on outpatient care at V A facilities. Stay tuned.

V A EXPENDITURES... An earlier column carried word of the \$1,773,129 benefits paid in Callahan County during fiscal year 1995. A report has

been prepared by your County Veterans Service Office for presentation to Congressman Charles Stenholm of the 17th Congressional District on the total V A expenditures in the 17th District. This report reveals a total of \$113,988,942 for the year and a Veteran population of 6,700 in the district. Howard, Taylor and Tom Green counties pulled \$647,783,807 of the total due to the V A Medical Center in Big Spring and the large populations in Abilene and San Angelo. Total Texas expenditures were \$2,760,813,131 for Fiscal year 1995.

Baird Independent School District Technology Budget Cut

Recently the State Auditor published a report entitled "199 Savings Profile System". Although John Sharp, State Comptroller, questioned the methods used by the state auditor the proposed budget for the Baird ISD 1996/97 budget took into consideration most of the suggestions. The areas where expenses are being trimmed are administrative, maintenance, and extra-curricular. The budget for teaching supplies and materials has been maintained. The budget for expanding technology has been cut significantly during '95 and in the

proposed budget for 1996/97. Technology is one area that is regrettable because we will just get further behind.

As patrons look at the proposed budget a logical question would be "If you are cutting all these expenses why is the budget only slightly less than last years budget?" The state legislature has mandated teacher pay raises (95/96 & 96/97) that offset the reduction in expenditures. The proposed budget for 96/97 is \$54,000 less than 1995 with a mandated increase in teacher salaries of over \$90,000.

The state aid to Baird ISD is based on local tax effort. This budget

year is the last of the bi-ennium and the next two school years (97/98 & 98/99) state funding will be determined by the local effort in 1996/97. If we do not maintain our present tax rate of \$1.01 per \$100 of evaluation BIRD would be forced to increase taxes in the next two years to make up for lost state aid.

The Baird ISD is a community service and makes every effort to provide the highest quality education for the least dollars. The budget is a difficult item to understand if you do not work with it every day. Interested patrons are invited to the superintendent's office for a review of the budget procedures and the proposed budget.

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



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52nd Annual Fisher County Fair & Rodeo
