Track Times Dip; 'Horns 7th At Angelo

The Longhorn track team placed seventh out of 15 entries in their division of the San Angelo Relays last weekend. The field of entries at San Angelo was "super strong," according to LHS track coach Roland Murray, who was quite pleased with the Longhorns' performance at the meet.

Lockney's middle-distance specialist Curtis Ford remained undefeated this year at the 440-yard and 400-meter

distances, winning the metric "quarter" in 50.7 seconds, a season's best for him.

Matter of fact, all the Lockney placings at Angelo earned "season's best" tags.

Danny Delgado was clocked in 2:04.8 and placed third in the 800-meter race. Joe David Gonzales went the same distance in 2:07.3 and placed sixth, a

pleasant surprise for Coach Murry and the Longhorns.

The Lockney 440 relay team notched a 44.9-second time, good for fifth place. Team members are Ford, Cecil Clark, Oseas Alaniz and Danny Riddle.

The "mile-relay" team (distances at Angelo were metric, so make it officially 1600 meters) placed sixth with a 3:31.3

effort. That was 5.5 seconds better than the team's qualifying time in the preliminaries. Split times were as follows: Danny Delgado 53.1; Ford 51.2; Gonzales 53.1; Clark 53.9.

The LHS trackmen scored a total of 23 points in the big meet.

They'll compete Friday and Saturday in the Amarillo Relays.

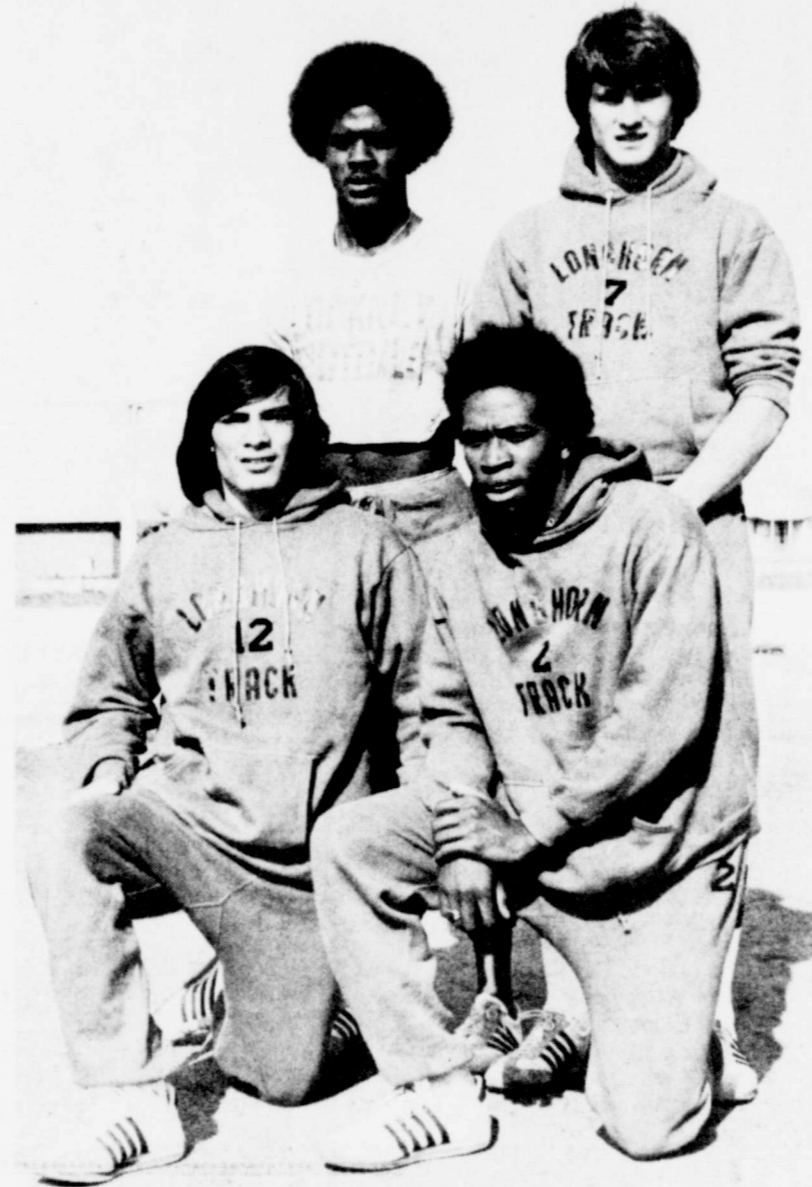

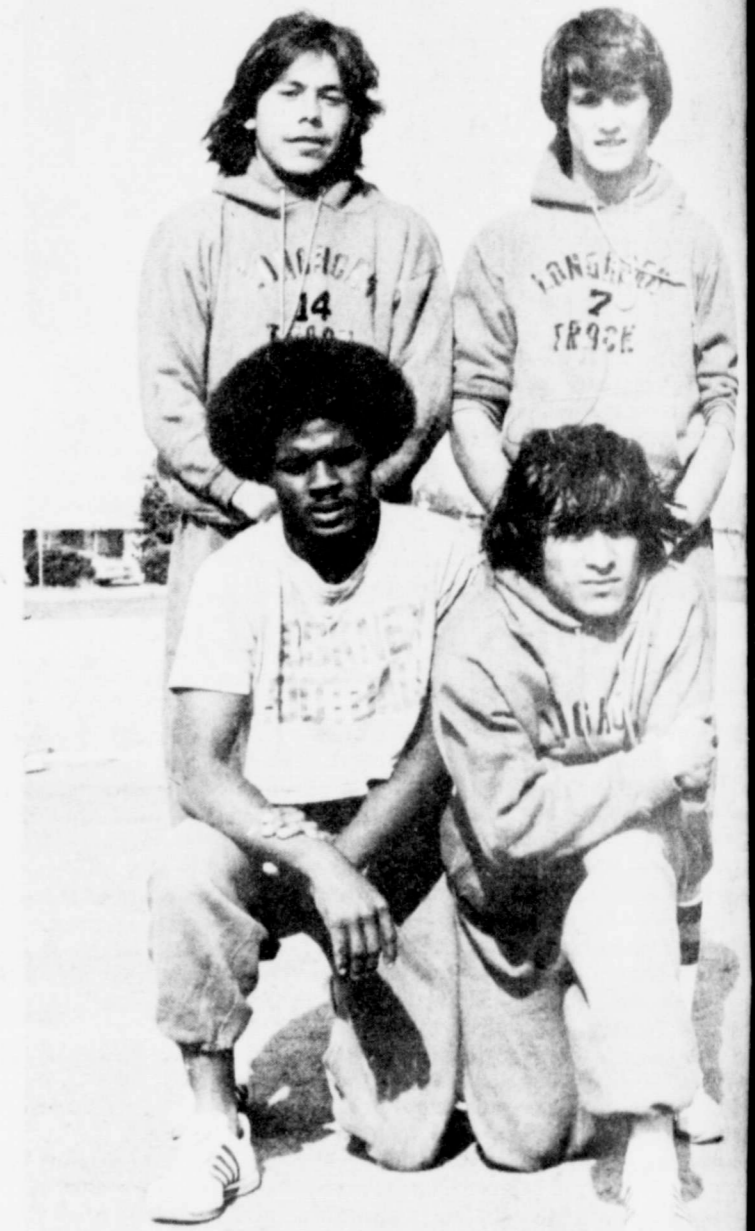
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Coach Marsha Sharp said the LHS girls' track team has performed well so far this year and said she believes that Lockney is beginning to build a respectable girls' track program.

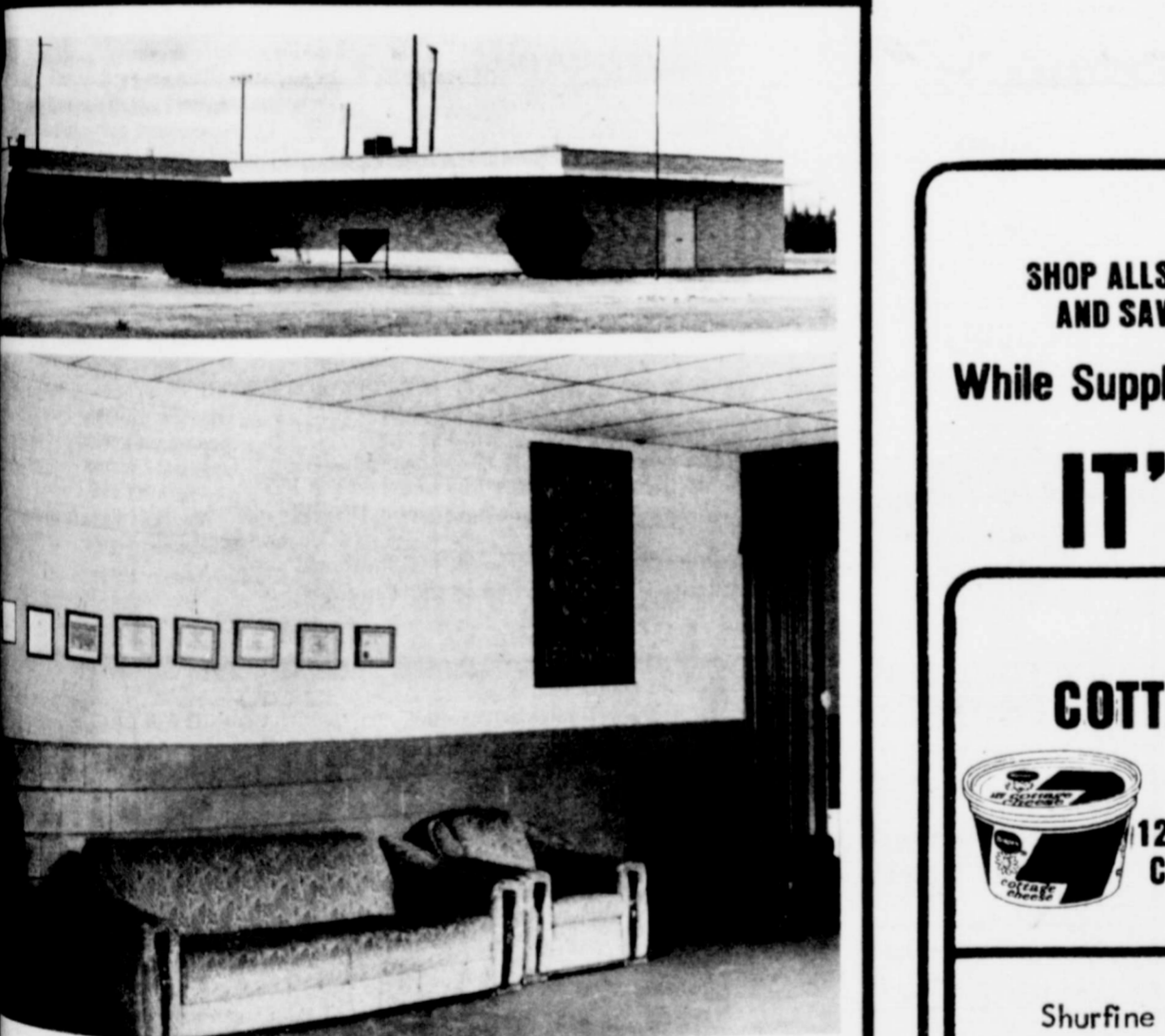

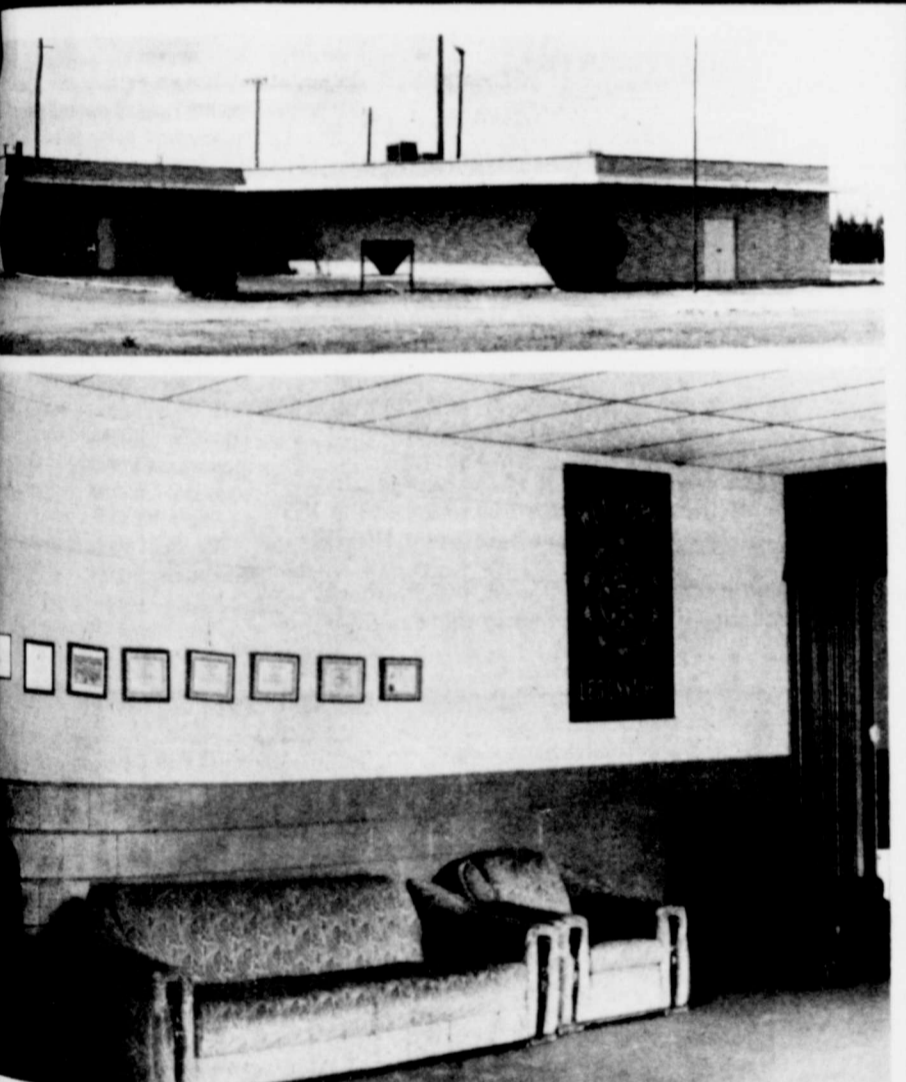

A statement of objectives should include desired rate of return on the investment, risk, willingness to borrow, desire for liquidity, tax shelter and inflation protection. Transaction costs, including holding expenses and management fees, and personal satisfaction desired from ownership should also be examined, says Floyd.

"Once you've established your investment objectives, compare them to actual performance of various investments," suggests the economist. "This allows you to determine which investments are best suited to meet your needs. The only relevant performance measure is that of individual experience, but each investor's evaluation will vary."

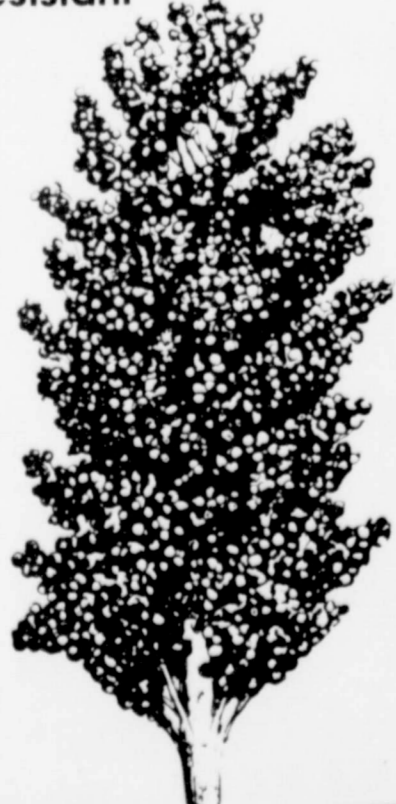

--The telephone pole was approaching fast and I was attempting to swerve out of its path when it struck my front end.

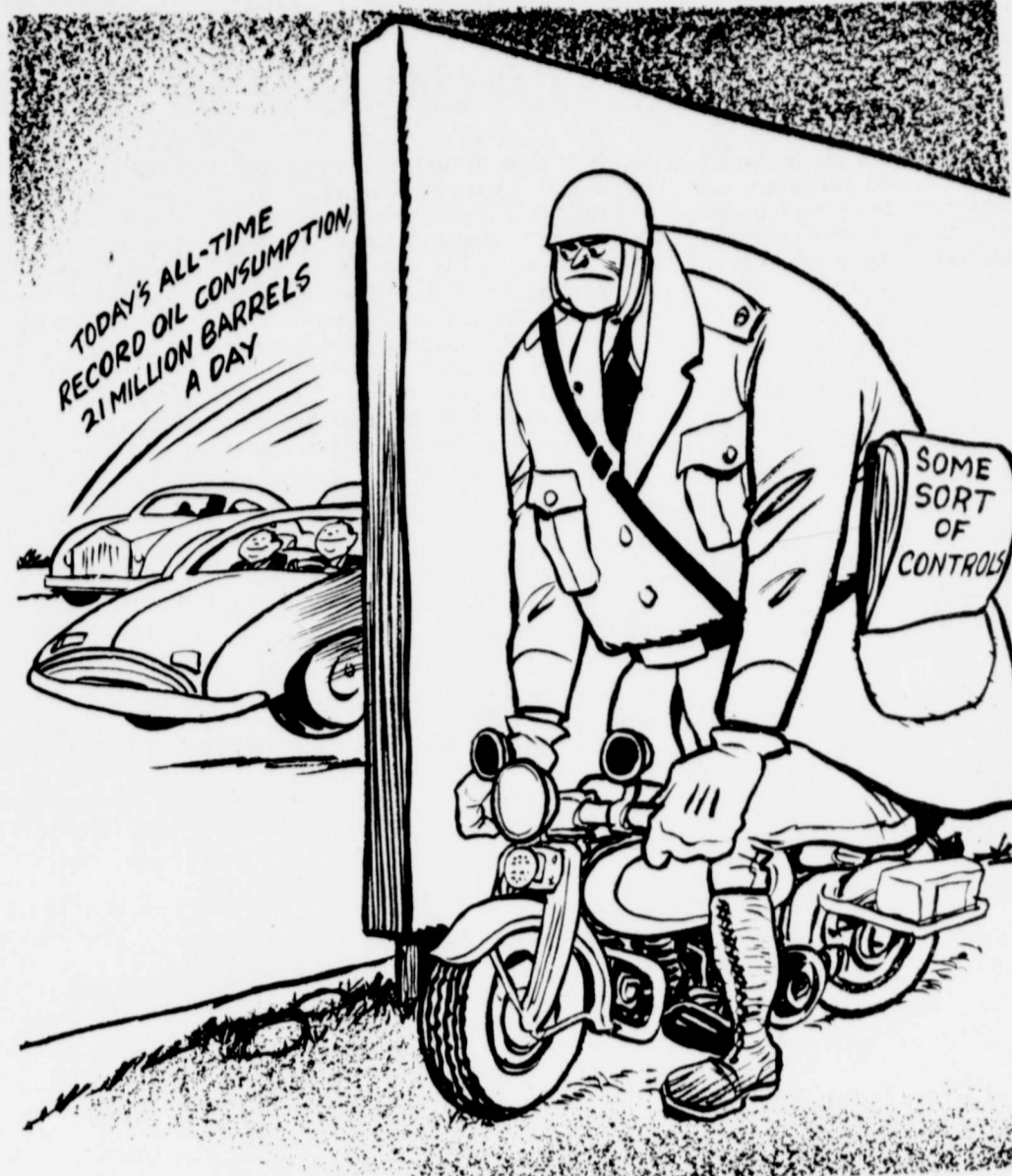
--I was on my way to the doctors, with rear end trouble when my universal joint gave way, causing me to have an accident.

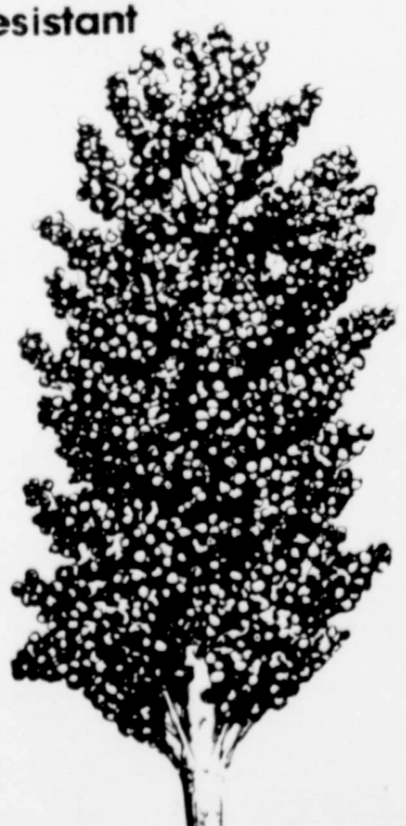

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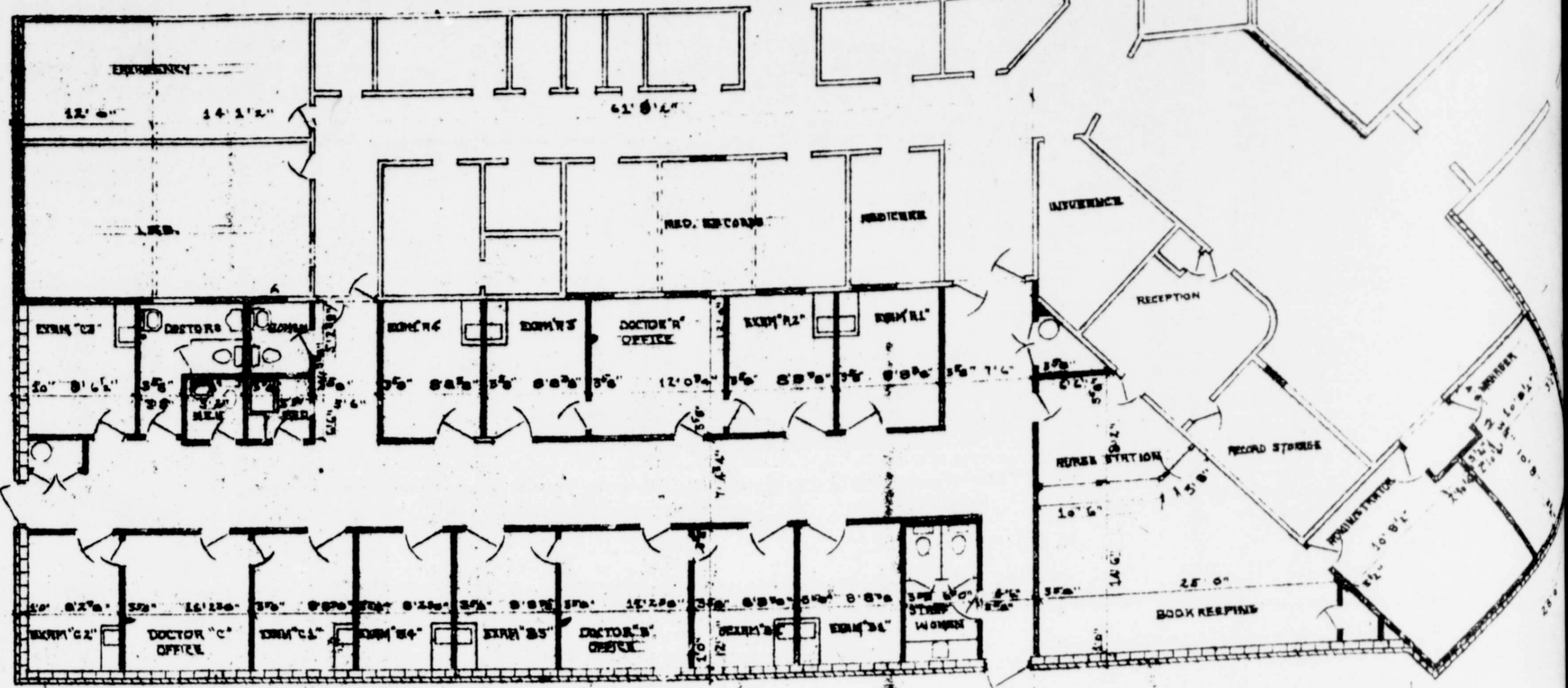

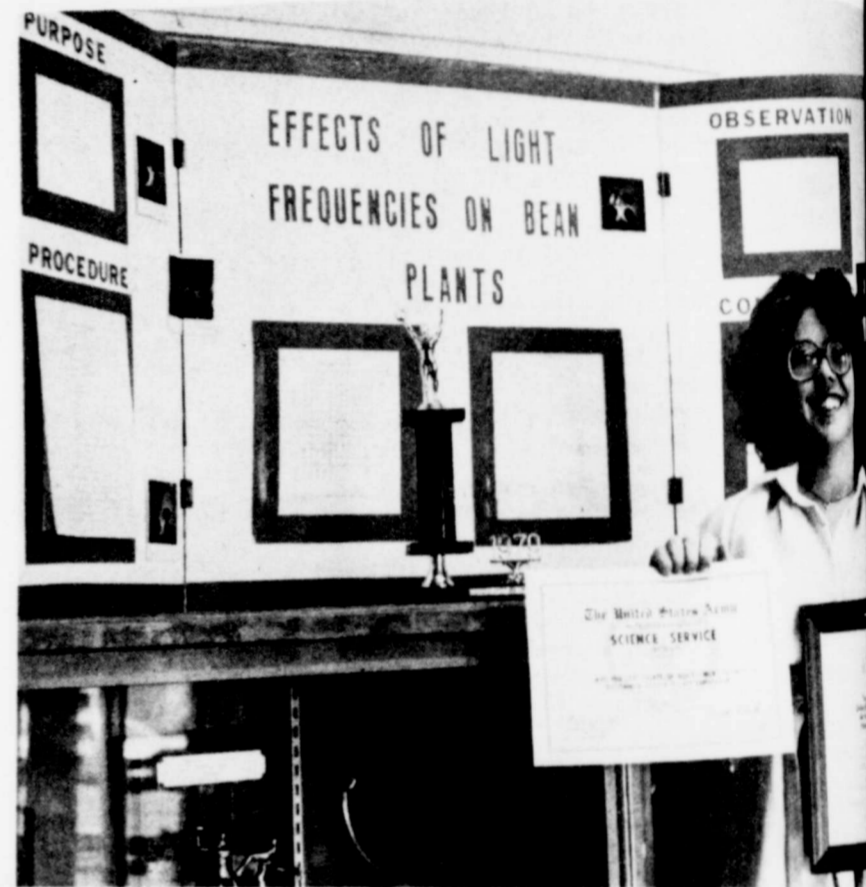
