No serious injuries in Lockney, Floydada school-bus accidents

LOCKNEY COACH TURNS IN 'SOME PIECE OF DRIVING' TO BRING BUS UNDER CONTROL

Two failures in two separate Lockney-area school bus accidents resulted in minor injuries to passengers in one bus and both buses being taken out of service.

Friday Independent School District drive shaft snapped while driving junior varsity football play game in Idalou about 5:45 p.m.

The bus went out of control but remained upright, coming to rest in a cotton field. Two students sustained bruises.

Earlier the same day, a U-joint holding the rear suspension of a Floydada Independent School District bus, carrying students from the junior high to Della Plains, snapped while

crossing a railroad track, causing the drive shaft to disconnect. No injuries resulted from that incident.

Elogio Mata, a 15-year-old sophomore student at Lockney High School, and David Balderas, 17, an LHS junior, were examined and released at Health Sciences Center Hospital in Lubbock following the Lockney bus accident.

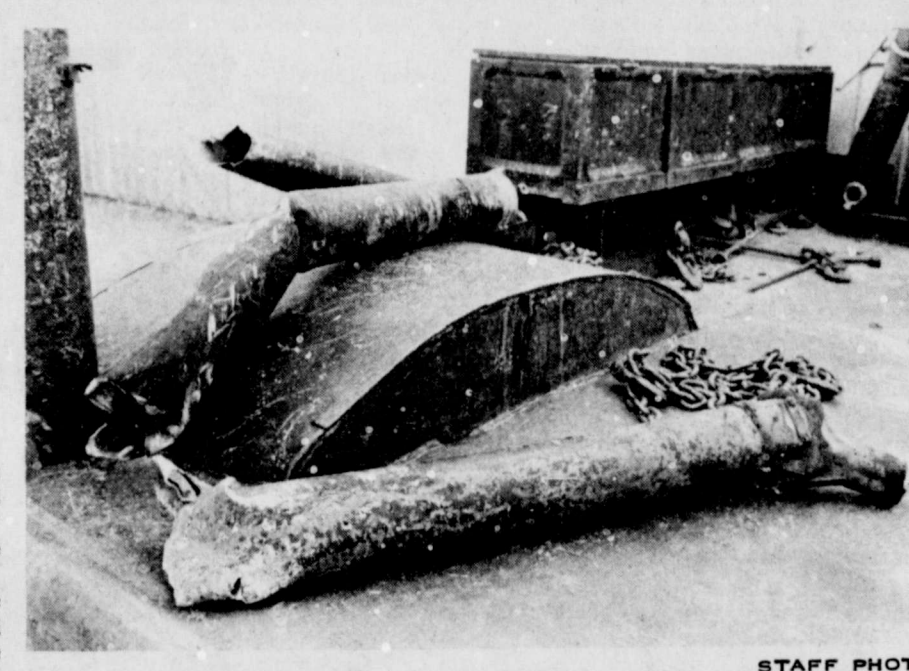
The accident happened at the intersection of FM 789 and US 62-82, about 5:45 p.m. Thursday. The school bus, driven by Lockney coach Ed Koester, was carrying the 23 members of the Lockney junior varsity football team to a game at Idalou.

According to reports from the Lockney school superintendent's office, the drive shaft of the 1968 International bus broke and apparently hit against the bus's brake system. The bus had a dual air-over-hydraulic brake system, but the broken drive shaft apparently broke both air lines, leaving the vehicle without brakes.

The brakesless bus, travelling south on FM 789 south of Petersburg, crossed a railroad track, a normally busy four lane highway, and a deep ditch before coming to rest in the cotton field.

Richard Ellison, the Lockney garage owner who brought the bus back to town Thursday night, said it was "some piece of driving" by Koester, to keep the bus upright. "I don't see how he made it," Ellison said.

Both Ellison and school superintendent W.H. Hallmark said there was no evidence of driver or mechanic error. And both agreed that it was extremely fortunate that there were no serious injuries.

Lockney city councilman Jerry Perry officially resigned from the council Thursday morning during the regular monthly meeting. Perry is moving to Floydada in December.

A former councilman, Pat Frizzell, was appointed to serve the remainder of Perry's term.

Perry called the Lockney council "the best group I've ever worked with." The retiring alderman said "I don't think any city in the country has a better group. We'll really miss living here... Lockney has accepted us better than we ever dreamed of," Perry added.

In other business Thursday, the council "paid the bills," approved the previous meeting's minutes and passed a resolution allowing certain commercial and industrial natural-gas customers in the city limits to continue to use existing gas lights.

Windmill man Johnson just missed 'forest of windmills' in Lockney

The windmill equipment that was the beginning of R.W. Johnson's twenty-six years' windmill work came to Lockney before he arrived here. His brother-in-law brought it here from Hamilton and later sold it to R.W.

R.W. and his machinery just barely missed being here at a time when Lockney was known as "a forest of windmills." He came here in 1953. The town's windmills thinned out, say some people, from 1940 to 1947.

This going away with windmills in Lockney did not offer discouragement to the windmill man. There was work aplenty. Every farm and ranch in Floyd County and all the adjoining counties had at least one windmill.

"I imagine I have taken care of seven or eight thousand windmills since 1953 when I came here," he says, "and they were all types."

Among the ones with an interesting beginning was the one John Stevenson put down on his place in an early day in the Lone Star community.

"John paid the well-digger twenty-five dollars and feed for his horses to get him to dig the well. The hole was put down by a rig that was a horse-pulled turn-table which operated the tumbling shaft that drove the spudder. Button Stevenson lived on the place when R.W. went there to work on the well.

It was necessary to "bail out" the well because the water had a bad taste.

The bailing bucket came up with frogs in it. This was not unusual since the well was uncased.

"There were frogs of every description. When we went to the house, Button's wife asked him what he had found and he told her, 'Not a thing.' He knew if he told her what he had found, she wouldn't use the water."

Once when the windmill man was called to work on the Carthel windmill in the Prairie Chapel community, it was necessary to pull the sucker rod. They found the leathers looked good. The water looked clear and measured all right. Since they had the sucker rod out, they put new leathers on and lowered the rod back into the well. It still did not pump water.

"I knew that something had to be keeping that windmill from pumping water. Since I was thirsty, I took a big drink of some of the water that had pumped from the well before it stopped pumping. I then went to work putting the rod back to bring the bottom valve up. When we brought that bottom valve up, we found a water dog lodged in the bottom cylinder. I suddenly felt a little sick over the good drink of water I had taken, so I spit the rest of the afternoon," he remembers.

From time to time, he worked on every type of windmill — Eclipse, Monitor, Challenge, Star, Baker, Dempster, and the first steel-wheel Aermotor.

"Dempsters and Aermotors are still

used more than any other type. They are about the only ones that parts can be bought for. The parts have gone up about five times of what they once were. It's hard to get parts for them. You can put in a submersible pump cheaper than you can put in a sucker rod now," Johnson explains.

Submersibles are easier to work on, the well man says. It is possible to pull a submersible quicker than to pull a sucker rod and put on leathers. Most submersibles are in a barrel. In a windmill, the sucker rod is in the way. There is nothing in the way in working on submersibles. One can be pulled in the time usually used in moving a well house from a windmill.

"The main thing wrong in using a submersible is their freezing when the switch is not pulled during freezing weather," he says.

One observation the windmill man has made in his years of work is the lowering water depth.

"When I first started, water was from 135 to 175 feet from the top. Now it is 350 to 400 feet to water. Water has gone down two or three feet a year for the last 25 years."

"The old spudder-type well digger can't be used any more, because it can't handle the sand in the lower depths. Now they drill with a rotary rig."

"Another change is in the water itself. A lot of water now has contamination. It smells and tastes bad and it

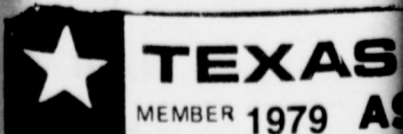

Pregnancy and clothing

Pregnancy affords homewerers a time to treat a wardrobe for specialized needs, a clothing specialist says.

However, an understanding of maternity patterns is crucial to sewing success, explains Becky Culp, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Consider the following points:

- 1) Buy a maternity pattern by your regular size before pregnancy because ease has been added for the ninth month of pregnancy.
- 2) Major pregnancy growth areas — bust, waist, hips, front waist length and crotch length — have added ease.
- 3) Maternity hemlines are cut longer in front so that hemlines will hang straight. More length is always needed for a larger curve.
- 4) Continue to make alterations you normally make — such as shoulder length or slope — except when accommodated by maternity growth allowances.

For example, a "Misses size 10" maternity pattern measures approximately five inches (12.7 cm) larger at the bustline than a standard "Misses size 10," seven

inches (17.78 cm) larger at the waistline, 10 1/2 inches (27.17 cm) larger at the hipline, 5 5/8 (14.2 cm) longer in crotch length and 5/8 inch (1.5 cm) larger in the armhole.

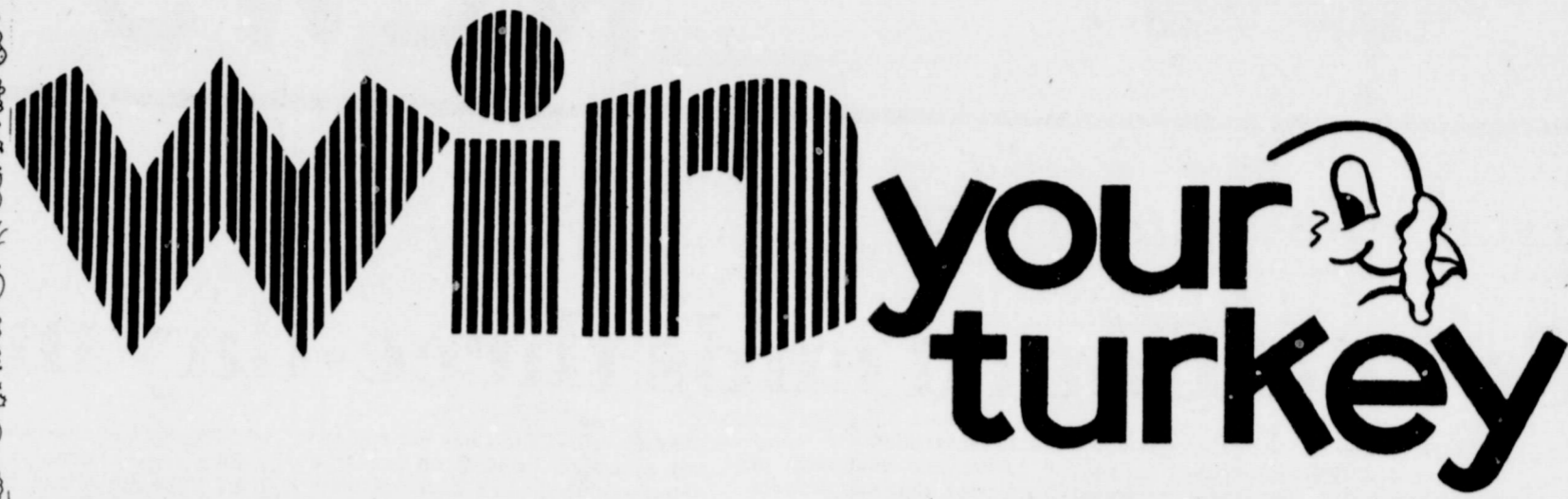

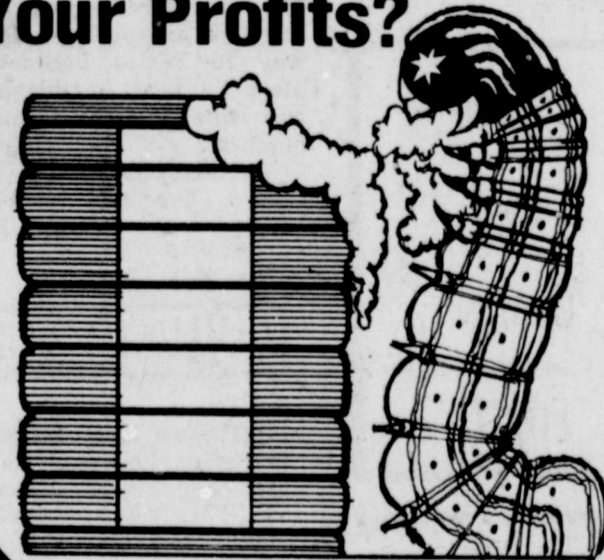
Social Security Some significant changes in the nation's Social Security System went into effect at the beginning of this calendar year. As part of the new regulations, persons under 65 receiving Social Security payments are able to earn \$3,480 this year - without losing any benefits. Previously, only \$3,240 in other earnings was allowed. Persons 65 to 72, on the other hand, can now earn \$4,500 - up from \$4,000. The higher limits are expected to provide additional benefits of about \$300 million this year to an estimated 1.5 million older Americans. In addition, the Social Security tax rate has been increased to 6.13 per cent for employees and employers. The tax rate for self-employed workers remains unchanged at 8.1 per cent. Another change this year involves the maximum amount of earnings that are taxable for Social Security and count toward benefits - an increase from \$17,700 to \$22,900 in 1979.
