Lockney city councilman Jerry Perry officially resigned from the council Thursday morning during the regular monthly meeting. Perry is moving to Floydada in December.

A former councilman, Pat Frizzell, was appointed to serve the remainder of

Perry called the Lockney council "the best group I've ever worked with." The retiring alderman said "I don't think any city in the country has a better group. We'll really miss living here .... Lockney has accepted us better than we ever dreamed of," Perry added.

In other business Thursday, the council "paid the bills," approved the previous meeting's minutes and passed a resolution allowing certain commercial and industrial natural-gas customers in the city limits to continue to use existing gas lights.

# ndmill man Johnson just missed 'forest of windmills' in Lockney

by Felicia Applewhite The windmill equipment that was the beginning of R.W. Johnson's twenty-six years' windmill work came to Lockney

before he arrived here. His brother-inlaw brought it here from Hamilton and later sold it to R.W. R.W. and his machinery just barely missed being here at a time when

Lockney was known as "a forest of windmills." He came here in 1953. The town's windmills thinned out, say some people, from 1940 to 1947. This doing away with windmills in

Lockney did not offer discouragement to the windmill man. There was work aplenty. Every farm and ranch in Floyd County and all the joining counties had at least one windmill. "I imagine I have taken care of seven

or eight thousand windmills since 1953 when I came here," he says, "and they were all types." Among the ones with an interesting

beginning was the one John Stevenson put down on his place in an early day in the Lone Star community. 'John paid the welldigger twentyfive dollars and feed for his horses to get him to dig the well. The hole was put down by a rig that was a horse-pulled turn-table which operated

the tumbling shaft that drove the spudder. Button Stevenson lived on the place when R.W. went there to work on the well.

It was necessary to "bail out" the well because the water had a bad taste.

The bailing bucket came up with frogs in it. This was not unusual since the well was uncased.

"There were frogs of every description. When we went to the house, Button's wife asked him what he had found and he told her, 'Not a thing.' He knew if he told her what we had found. she wouldn't use the water."

Once when the windmill man was called to work on the Carthel windmill in the Prairie Chapel community, it was necessary to pull the sucker rod. They found the leathers looked good. The water looked clear and measured all right. Since they had the sucker rod out, they put new leathers on and lowered the rod back into the well. It still did not pump water.

"I knew that something had to be keeping that windmill from pumping water. Since I was thirsty, I took a big drink of some of the water that had pumped from the well before it stopped pumping. I then went to work putting the rod back to bring the bottom valve up. When we brought that bottom valve up, we found a water dog lodged in the bottom cylinder. I suddenly felt a little sick over the good drink of water I had taken, so I spit the rest of the afternoon," he remembers.

From time to time, he worked on every type of windmill - Eclipse, Monitor, Challenge, Star, Baker, Dempster, and the first steel-wheel

Aermotor. "Dempsters and Aermotors are still

used more than any other type. They are about the only ones that parts can be bought for. The parts have gone up about five times of what they once were. It's hard to get parts for them. You can put in a submersible pump cheaper than you can put in a sucker rod now,' Johnson explains.

Submersibles are easier to work on, the well man ways. It is possible to pull a submersible quicker than to pull a sucker rod and put on leathers. Most submersibles are in a barrel. In a windmill, the sucker rod is in the way. There is nothing in the way in working on submersibles. One can be pulled in the time usually used in moving a well house from a windmill.


"The main thing wrong in using a submersible is their freezing when the switch is not pulled during freezing weather," he says.

One observation the windmill man has made in his years of work is the lowering water depth.

"When I first started, water was from 135 to 175 feet from the top. Now it is 350 to 400 feet to water. Water has gone down two or three feet a year for the last 25 years.

"The old spudder-type well digger can't be used any more, because it can't handle the sand in the lower depths. Now they drill with a rotary rig.

"Another change is in the water itself. A lot of water now has contamination. It smells and tastes bad and it SEE WINDMILL MAN, PAGE 3






turns pipes black or a rusty brown. I think this comes from the deeper strata. When water was 135 to 140 feet below the surface, it was good water. When we had to go deeper for water, it was bad right off.'

There is a strata of good water east of Lockney which is about 65 to 90 feet from the surface. This strata goes three miles east of Lockney and "plum" back to Muncy. It's just good well water -a strata to itself. Shallow water has not lowered more than a foot. A well at Munch is 76 feet to water. This strata reaches to just before you go over the hill at Frank Brown's place. There are some four-inch irrigation wells in this section.

At the time that R.W. Johnson came to Lockney to be a windmill man, he had worked 14 years shovelling gravel in a gravel pit in Hamilton, so the hard work climbing windmill towers and wrestling with block and tackle was no challenge. However, he says now that the distance from the bottom to the top of a windmill seems just a little farther. He is thankful that he has had few accidents.

"I have never been hurt but one time and that was five years ago. A four-by-four broke and dropped the pump back into the well. The broken four-by-four struck me, breaking my arm and bruising my leg. I was away from work four months. Of course I had the end of my thumb cut off, but I have been fortunate. Our son was injured when a short two-by-four fell and struck him, cutting a gash in his head." Once Johnson had 43 wells at one time waiting for him to get back into

pumping condition. Others were added as he took care one at a time on the first long list. It was very coid weather. Frost froze on his cap bib as he worked. "At the time I smoked a pipe. Mr. Carthel said if it hadn't been for that pipe, I would have frozen to death.

# ELECTS NEW SLATE OF OFFICERS Cotton Board ends three-day meet News Summa STATE EXPENDITURES ABSTRACT

PHOENIX, November 2 - The Cotton Board ended its three-day annual meeting here today after adopting a series of recommendations to strengthen the organization's overview of Cotton Incorporated's research and promotion activities and electing a new slate of officers.

Outgoing Cotton Board Chairman, L. Don Anderson, of Lubbock, asked the Cotton Board not to nominate him for a second one-year term because of the press of personal business.

Anderson stated that the Cotton Board had spent many hours addressing each and every point and recommendation raised in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's general audit report released late in August. Actions taken by the Cotton Board

included: - A scheduled four meetings each year

between members of the Cotton Board and CI to discuss allocation funds and to review programs and budgets

- The hiring of a certified public accountant firm to review and evaluate whether CI's accounting system meets prescribed accounting standards, and to perform the annual audit of CI

- Utilizing the cotton industry's Communications and Liaison committee as a board of review to consider suggestions or c riticisms regarding the administration of the research and promotion program

- Implementation of procedures to provide for increased security of collec-

tion and refund information - On-site review and evaluation of selected CI projects throughout the year by representatives of the Cotton Board. USDA, and other appropriate indivi-

duals - Prohibited CI from referring foreign mills to specific suppliers of U.S. cotton In addition to actions taken by the Cotton Board at its annual meeting, it developed improved reporting and administration procedures for Cotton Incorporated. CI's Board of Directors adopted these procedures at a meeting in Dallas recently.

Succeeding Anderson as chairman is Murray R. Williams, Altus, OK. Mr. Williams is a cotton producer and

former CI director. Other officers elected are Even Whittington, Greenwood, MS, vice chairman; Glen Stevens, Fresno, CA, secretary, and Marshall W. Grant,

Garysburg, NC, treasurer. Anderson pointed out he had attended 34 meetings and had traveled more than 35,000 miles during the past year, dischariging his duties as Cotton Board chairman. "I just didn't feel that I could put the amount of time into the Cotton Board that is going to be necessary in the days ahead," he said.

The Cotton Board collects and administers the per bale assessment from cotton producers. Its twenty members and alternates are selected by the Secretary of Agriculture from nominees submitted by the Certified Cotton Producer Organizations. The Cotton Board

Will farmers someday grow their own fuel? Current widespread interest in the area of on-farm fuel alcohol plants indicates that this could be a possibility in the years to come, according to state agriculture commissioner Reagan V. Brown.

Much emphais has been placed on mixing ethanol derived from grains and other farm products with gasoline to produce gasohol. This would help American motorists stretch increasingly tight and expensive gasoline supplies. But for many farmers, the best answer may be to produce alcohol for their own use on the farm, he says.

Commercial ethanol used in gasohol ideally should be 200 proof, which means the product is 100 percent alcohol and contains no water. But for on-farm usage where long storage periods are not required, 160- to 180-proof alcohol can often be utilized. Additional research is needed to establish the feasibility of using pure ethanol in farm vehicles and equipment, how-

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### USDA announces 1980 loan rate

LOAN RATE ANNOUNCED: USDA has announced a 1980 loan rate of 48 cents per pound for upland cotton, 2.23 cents below the 1979 level. The rate is the minimum provided by law. A seed cotton loan program similar to that available in 1979, with recourse loans available to borrowers, also was announced. USDA also said there would be a zero set-aside for cotton, feed grains, and wheat. The target price for cotton is 57.7 cents per pound and the national program acreage is 10,634,181. SPECIALIST TO ASSIST CCI ON EUROPEAN MISSION: Dr. Andrew Jordan, National Cotton Council manager of processing technology, will observe the U.S. bale package as it is received by European customers on a special visit as technical consultant for Cotton Council International. He will be in Sweden, Belgium, France, The Netherlands, and Germany November 6-17. When he returns from the visit, Jordan will report to the Joint Industry Bale Packaging Committee on bale packaging and improvements that may be needed.

**EXPORTS CONTINUE TO CLIMB:** Sales of 187,900 running bales of upland cotton during the week ended October 21 brought the season's total orders to 5,555,800. The principal buyers were China, 95,000 bales; Japan, 26,000; Korea, 13,600; and Taiwan, 11,200. The week's exports totaled 92,600, bringing the season's shipments to 1,167,400 bales.

DUST INSPECTIONS PUSHED: A union official recently said his group plans to ask the Occupational Safety and Health Administration to "schedule an inspection of every cotton mill in the country to assure compliance" with the cotton dust standard. Discussing the current controversy surrounding Cotton Incorporated, cotton producer Joe D. Unfred of New Home, President of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., says what the cotton industry and everybody in it needs to do is follow the advice offered in a song that was popular during World War II.

The song was one of many musical review numbers concocted to entertain and bolster the morale of a people separated by war from their loved ones and beset by shortages of gasoline, food and other less essential items.

The lyrics, set to a bouncy tune, went something like this: "You gotta accentuate the positive; eliminate the negative; latch onto the affirmative, and don't mess with Mr. In-Between."

"If enough of us set out to resolve the Cl issue by that formula," Unfred believes, "we can build on CI's good points, correct its bad points and get on with the business of creating a stronger more profitable cotton industry, which is what CI is all about."

CI has made mistakes, Unfred admits. But he goes on to express the opinion that all of CI's sins together aren't grave enough to outweigh more

than one of CI's major accomplishments.

"To me as a producer and to the industry as whole," he explains, "the fact that several major retail chains now offer 100 percent cotton shirts and 100 percent cotton sheets is far more important than the fact that CI executives traveled on the Concord instead of a less expensive flight.

"To me as a producer, the fact that several thousand bales of U.S. cotton were sold into new export markets is more impressive than the fact that the sales allegedly were the result of referrals made in violation of the CI charter.

"And," Unfred continues, "the great improvement seen in cotton handling efficiency as a result of CI's engineering research on the module builder and gin module feeders means more to me than any of the staff personnel problems that have been making headlines.

"The mechanisms are in place and the wheels in motion to 'eliminate the negative' aspects of CI," Unfred concludes, "so all we need to do is to put emphasis where emphasis belongs and start accentuating the positive instead of the negative.'
