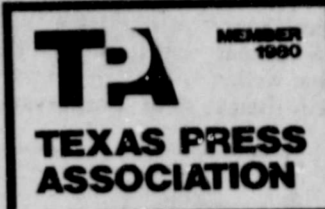

Three of six Floyd County Democratic races are contested

Three Floyd County races in the 1980 Democratic primary election are contested, and three incumbents are running unopposed for county office on the Democratic ticket. There are no Republican candidates for county office, so the Democratic nominees are virtually certain to win the November general election.

Monday was the last day for candidates to file. The first primary election is May 3. If runoffs are necessary, the second primary will be June 7.

Races for two county commissioner posts and one justice of peace spot are contested. Only the incumbents are seeking re-election for sheriff, county attorney, and county tax assessor-collector.

Candidates for commissioner, precinct three commissioner hopefuls are Thomas E. Warren and Larry Noland. And in the running for justice of peace,

precincts one and four, are Walter Hollums, Linda S. Morris and Joyce Lipham. Hollums currently occupies the peace justice's office, having been appointed to serve after the death of H.E. Porter. The three JP candidates are seeking to serve the remainder of Porter's term, which expires in 1982.

Rippetoe to speak at C of C banquet

Mrs. Johnston celebrates hundredth birthday

A Lockney woman, Mrs. Dora Levena Burns, Johnston, was 100 years old Monday (February 4). A resident of the Lockney Care Center for the past 15 months, Mrs. Johnston marked her 100th birthday anniversary while a patient in Lockney General Hospital.

they were married by a Rev. Shipley. The Johnstons lived in and near Hollis until March 12, 1968, when Mr. Johnston died. Mrs. Johnston moved her things to Silverton, where she stayed at the home of her daughter, Girtha Mae Vaughan, most of the time (she frequently visited for a month or so at a time in the homes of her other children).

Mrs. Johnston was visited on her birthday by three of her children, Mrs. J.E. Vaughan of Silverton, Mrs. J.C. Meeks of Granite, Oklahoma, and Mrs. Gene Smallwood of Winnsboro. Another daughter, Mrs. Ted Crownover of Dumas, and a daughter-in-law, Mrs. J.D. Johnston of Plainview, visited her Sunday.

Mrs. Johnston pulled cotton "until she was past 60 years old" and made pillows, rugs, quilts, and other items to keep busy. She was in good health until that unlucky Friday the 13th of October, 1972 — she was her yard looking at the flowers she loved when she fell and broke her hip. She has been in failing health since, but she vowed she would live to be a hundred, and her granddaughter, Mrs. Homer Ragland of Lockney, reported that she was quite alert on her birthday.

Grandchildren who visited her Sunday were Mr. and Mrs. Dale Smalts and Carol of Hereford, and Mr. and Mrs. Donald Johnston of Plainview.

The Johnstons had eight children, three boys and five girls. Two of the boys died when they were very young, and the other, J.D. Johnston of Plainview, died in March 1970. The girls are Girtha Mae Vaughan of Silverton, Arrena Bell Vaughan of Hollis, Oklahoma, Catherine Meeks of Granite, Oklahoma, Nancy Smallwood of Winnsboro, and Dephena Crownover of Dumas.

The centenarian has 15 grandchildren, 29 great-grandchildren and two great-great-grandchildren.

Numerous cards and flowers were received from South Carolina, Kansas, Texas and Oklahoma. Mrs. Johnston is especially proud of the birthday card she received from President Carter.

Mrs. Johnston was born in Hopkins County on February 4, 1880. On January 4, 1904, she married Daniel Thomas Johnston. The couple were sitting in a buggy some eight miles southeast of Hollis, Oklahoma, when

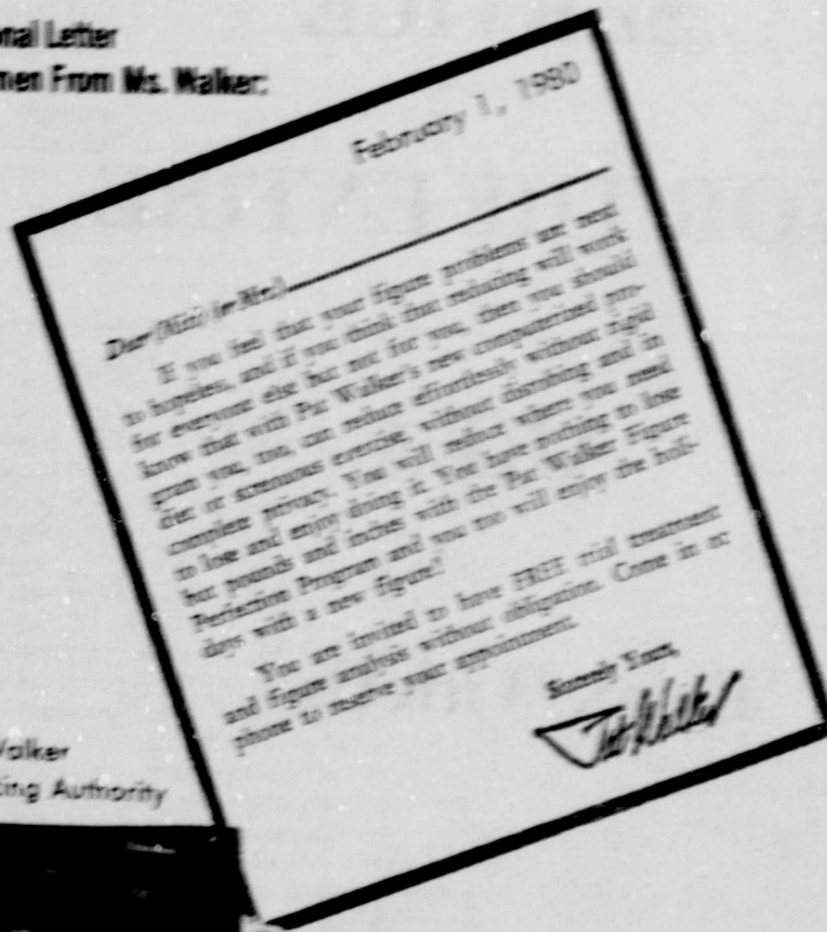

PEANUT BUTTER SANDWICH COOKIES

Crust:
One 8-oz. carton (1 cup) favorite flavor yogurt
1 cup milk
One 3-3/4-oz. pkg. vanilla instant pudding and pie filling mix
1/2 Savannah or Country Oats and Nuts Crisp, crushed

Combine all ingredients except cookies in small mixing bowl; beat at low speed on electric mixer about 2 minutes. Layer pudding mixture and crushed cookies in 4 quart glasses or dessert dishes. Chill; serve within 3 to 4 hours after assembling. Makes 4 servings.

SCOUT S'MORES

Country Oats and Nut Crisp, Chocolate Chip Cookies or Scoop Cookies
Peanut Butter
Marshmallows

For each serving, spread 2 cookies with peanut butter. Spread 1 marshmallow on long stick or fork; toast over campfire or gas range. Sandwich marshmallow between cookies. Makes 1 S'More.

VARIATIONS: Omit peanut butter; substitute Thin Mint Cookies for cookies listed in recipe.
Omit peanut butter; sandwich one 1-inch square milk chocolate, candy and toasted marshmallow between 2 cookies.

CHOCOLATE CHIP FOUR-LAYER DESSERT

Crust:
One 8-oz. pkg. Chocolate Chip Cookies (18 cookies)
3 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted

Layers:
One 8-oz. pkg. frozen non-dairy whipped topping, thawed
One 8-oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened
1 cup confectioners sugar
3 cups milk
Two 3-3/4 to 4-1/2-oz. pkg. instant pudding and pie filling mix, any flavor

For crust, place 6 cookies in blender container. Cover; blend about 15 seconds or until finely chopped. Empty into medium-sized bowl; repeat with remaining cookies. Combine chopped cookies and butter; mix well. Reserve 2 tablespoons mixture; firmly press remaining onto bottom of ungreased 11x7-inch baking dish. Bake at 350 degrees F. about 5 minutes. Cool thoroughly.

For filling, combine 1 cup whipped topping, cream cheese and sugar in small mixing bowl; beat at medium speed on electric mixer until smooth. Spread evenly over cooled crust. Combine milk and pudding mix in small mixing bowl; beat at low speed on electric mixer about 2 minutes or until thickened and smooth. Spread evenly over cream cheese mixture. Spread remaining whipped topping evenly over pudding; sprinkle with reserved crust mixture. Chill about 4 hours or overnight, as desired; cut into squares to serve. Makes 11x7-inch dish of dessert. **MICROWAVE OVEN DIRECTIONS:** For crust, cook at HIGH about 3 minutes, rotating 1/4 turn after each minute of cooking. Cool thoroughly. For filling, prepare as recipe directs.

WICKIWAPOO WAGTAIL PIE

Crust:
1/2 Thin Mint Cookies
1/2 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted, cooled

Filling:
1/2 cup milk
2 tablespoons cocoa
1/2 tablespoon instant coffee powder or crystals
One 11-oz. pkg. marshmallows (about 37 marshmallows)
1 cup heavy cream, whipped
or 2 cups prepared non-dairy whipped topping

For crust, place 6 cookies in blender container. Cover; blend about 15 seconds or until finely chopped. Empty into small bowl; repeat with additional 6 cookies, reserving 18 whole cookies. Combine chopped cookies and butter; mixing well; firmly press onto bottom of well oiled 8-inch glass pie plate. Bake at 375 degrees F. about 5 minutes. Cool about 15 minutes; arrange reserved cookies around inside edge of pie plate to form side crust, pressing cookies gently into bottom crust. Chill.

For filling, beat combined milk, cocoa and coffee powder in 3-cup glass bowl at HIGH about 1 minute or until cocoa and coffee are dissolved. Add marshmallows; continue cooking at HIGH 2 to 3 minutes or until mixture is smooth, stirring occasionally, or cool about 5 minutes; place bowl in pan of ice water about 10 minutes or until slightly thickened, stirring occasionally. Proceed as recipe directs.

BOOKS HELP CHILDREN COPE WITH CRISIS

Books can help children cope with a crisis in their lives. For example, in your child having problems with any of the following situations:

- acceptance of a new sister or brother
- death of a family member or friend
- parental divorce, separation or desertion
- adjustment to a new school
- relocation to a new neighborhood
- temporary separation from family, as in the first time at school or a day-care center, or the first time to spend the night at a friend's house.
- fear of the dark or of the doctor or dentist

Reading books that deal with the problem can help a child cope. Technically it's called "bibliotherapy" — a method parents can use to help a child cope with family

crisis. It works because books to the child's parents and child's story in the book relates to the child's problem situation. Books can often words what the feeling. Books also child know he is not alone who has that particular problem. He may read the book times. To find books with specific problems the librarian at library or school suggestions. Be as appropriate as your child, too. Also, ask your teacher for ideas you can use to help your child. Bibliotherapy is a method of parent-communication, and handling of and crisis coping children.

Buddy Holly

reminiscing...

Twenty years have passed since '50s pioneer rock n' roll artist Charles Hardin (Buddy Holly) was killed in a plane crash following a musical performance in Clear Lake, Iowa. What has happened in the lives of the people closest to him and some reasons for the intensity of his continuing popularity twenty years later is the subject of "Buddy Holly: Reminiscing," premiering Monday, Feb. 11 at 7 p.m. on KTX-TV 15.

Although Holly was part of the music scene for only 18 months, he left behind a legacy of nearly 50 songs including such great hits as "That'll Be The Day," "Peggy Sue," and "Not Fade Away." But his brief recording career ended suddenly when Holly, along with singers Ritchie Valens, The Big Bopper (J.P. Richardson), and their pilot died in a plane crash February 3, 1959, shortly after performing at the Surf Ballroom in Clear Lake.

"Buddy Holly: Reminiscing" examines the life and music of this remarkable artist by focusing on the changes that have occurred in the lives of members of Holly's band (The Crickets), his widow, and in the world of music.

The program features rare '50s film performances of Holly, plus exclusive interviews and musical performances by Holly's band. In addition, Holly's protegee, now country recording superstar, Waylon Jennings and other '50s contemporaries make appearances. Also included are highlights of the Buddy Holly Twentieth Anniversary Memorial Concert held in 1979 in Clear Lake featuring Wolfman Jack and The White Sidewalls.

"Buddy Holly: Reminiscing," presented by the Iowa Public Broadcasting Network was written, produced and directed by Douglas Brooker. The program was distributed to local public television stations by the Public Broadcasting Service.

"We are so appreciative of the time and work put in by these people to help the West Texas Rehabilitation Center," executive director Shelley V. Smith said. "We know how much love has gone into making each one of these beautiful quilts and afghans. The money we

receive will mean many hours of treatment for the handicapped."

Rehab '80, the tenth annual telethon benefiting WTRC, raised more than \$800,000 in gifts and pledges. This year's budget for the facility in Abilene, San Angelo and Snyder will be approximately \$2.7 million.

In 1978, more than 7,000 handicapped children and adults were treated at the West Texas Rehabilitation Center without charge.

Programs which promote Texas fruits and vegetables will be discussed by Paul Bailey of Austin, marketing specialist with the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Reports on vegetable research projects will be given by scientists and specialists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Tech, and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said Dr. Roland Roberts, Extension area vegetable specialist.

Roberts also will have an exhibit and poster presentation on innovations in onion production.

The conference is sponsored by the High Plains Council with cooperation from The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Deaf Smith County Vegetable Crops Committee, The Fanhandle Economic Progress Program of Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Tech University.

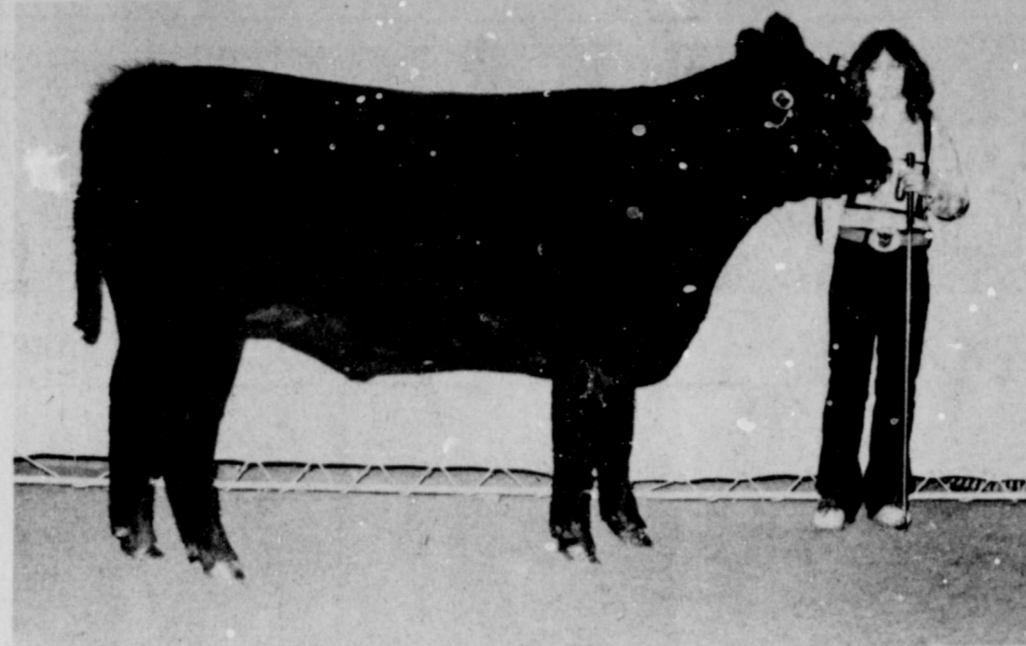

National agricultural transportation policy recommended

A rural transportation task force is states trying to resolve varying state regulations of the road" for railroads and truckers doing business in the United States.

The Rural Transportation Advisory Task Force, a joint team co-chaired by Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland and Transportation Secretary Neil Goldschmidt, recommends:

- Incentives to encourage states to increase truckload limits to 80,000 pounds and length limits to 65 feet on interstate and other major
- highways, along with incentives to states trying to resolve varying state regulations.
- Regulatory reforms to permit railroads and shippers to enter into negotiated or regulated contracts.
- Use of long-term loans to finance rail rehabilitation on lines serving ports.
- Immediate acquisition by railroads of a demonstration, free-running fleet of 500 fifty-foot, wide-door, general-purpose boxcars and 500 covered hopper cars to augment the railroads' indi-

dually-owned car fleets.

- Continuation of federal financial assistance for railroad branchline rehabilitation projects.
- That the Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC), Department of Transportation (DOT) and Department of Agriculture (USDA) monitor the effectiveness of the task force's recommendations and write a report to Congress each year.
- That the federal government take more responsibility for interstates and other major highways, thereby releasing more state funds for the maintenance and upgrading of non-major highways.

—That the secretary of agriculture be given authority to develop and regulate standard contracts of haul for trucking fresh fruits and vegetables. Loading and unloading responsibilities would be imposed on shippers and receivers.

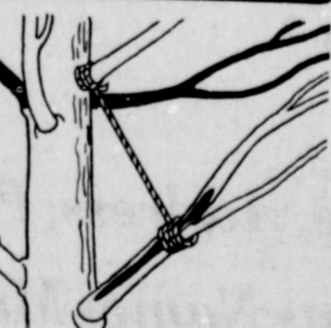
"The recommendations are part of the final report by the task force, which deliberated ten months to establish the policy," said P.R. Smith, assistant secretary of agriculture for marketing and transportation.

Smith said the report defines agriculture's transportation needs and suggests solutions to problems, based on public hearings the task force conducted during 1979. Discussions focused on rail shortages, rail branchline abandonments, several highway and waterway bottlenecks, and problems between shippers and carriers.

"The task force set forth guidelines for an adequate railroad transportation system, including changes in federal regulation of railroads," Smith said.

Congress formed the task force, he said, in response to agriculture's special transportation needs. Members were from agricultural and transportation organizations as well as from the academic community.

Most authors agree that children can handle a painful truth or reality better than they can handle a half-truth or avoidance of the subject of divorce. Through open and honest discussion, children and parents can better cope with the disorganization and reorganization of their family unit — although divorce is still a difficult and emotional experience for all family members.

Both of the parents and all of the children should be involved the first time the children are told. This as-

sure the children that both parents are still involved with them — and that all the children are getting the same information. This talk together also prevents children from hearing the news from a brother, sister or person outside the family.

In the discussion, parents should acknowledge the decision to separate and that adults can make mistakes. Assure the children that they are not to blame for the divorce — and that neither parent is to blame. Reassure them that both parents still

love them as always.

Dr. Lee Salk, a leading child psychologist, recommends focusing the first discussion on the facts of the divorce and the children's worries about the future. In this first talk together, create an atmosphere that will invite future questions by the children. Remember that children may want to ask questions and discuss aspects of the divorce again and again.

In his book, "What Every Child Would Like Parents To Know About Divorce," Dr. Salk suggests several important questions that occur to children, although concerns

vary with each child and among different ages.

These are some of the questions children have:

Who will take care of me? Will I be left alone? Will I still be able to be with you?

What will happen if I get sick? Will we live in the same house?

Who will feed me? Will you still be my Mommy and Daddy?

Will I be with my brothers and sisters?

Most authors think it's advisable for children's friends and teachers to know, since children's behavior often is affected by a divorce. Parents may need to help their children share this information with those people. Pre-adolescents and adolescents may find it especially difficult to tell their friends. However, if children can talk to others who have gone through the divorce experience in their family, it can help them understand the situation and the feelings involved.

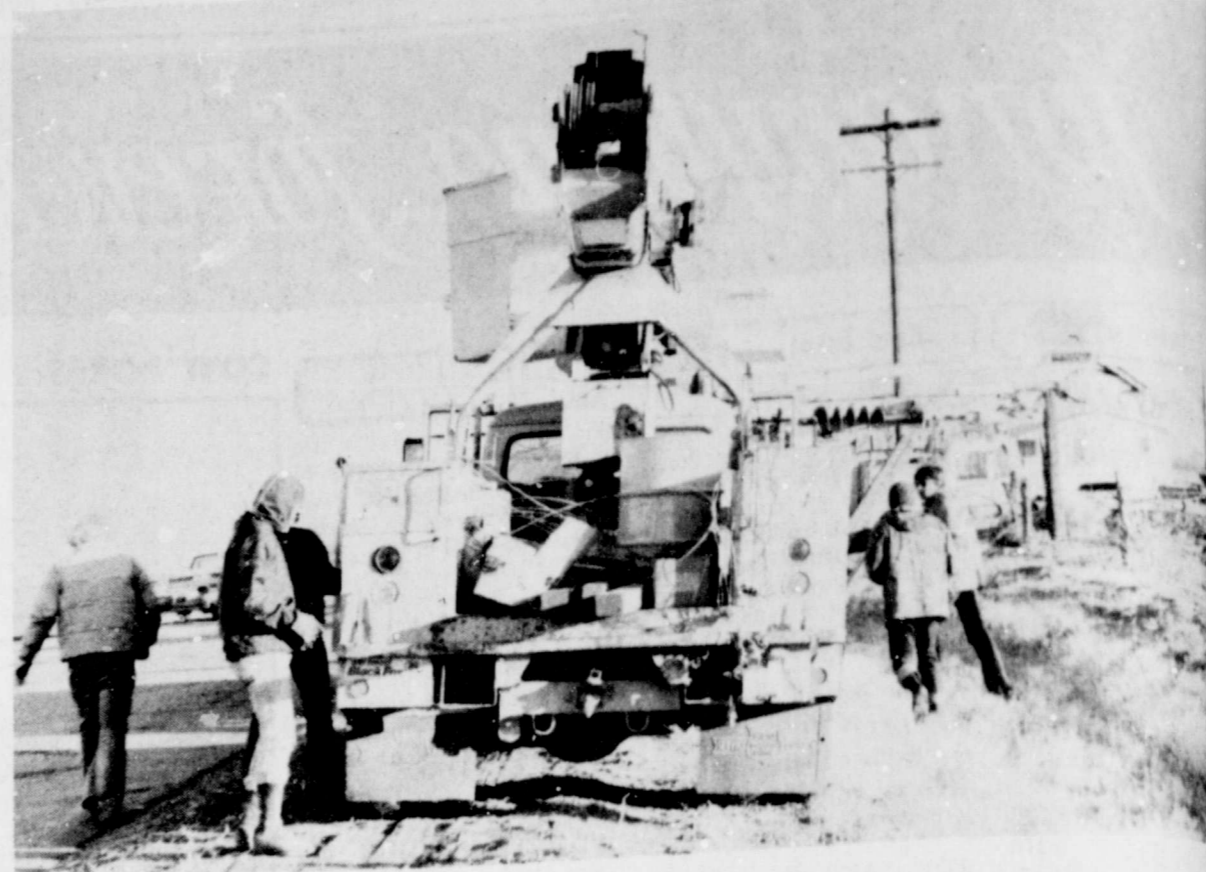
The United Methodist Youth are having a Valentine bake sale February 9 at Buddy's, Piggly Wiggly's and Kirtley's.

Feelings

Children have them, too

All people have feelings or emotions — even children. In expressing their emotions, children usually imitate their parents and other family members, so it's important to provide them with examples, says a family life education specialist.

Examples that help the most are those that show children how to express emotions in positive ways. Cindy Wilson explains. Mrs. Wilson is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

First, remember two important points:

Everyone has feelings, and we can express them in appropriate ways in society.

Parents confuse children when they follow the old idea of "Do as I say, not as I do."

Below are suggestions for helping children to express their emotions effectively:

1) Encourage and allow children to label their feelings correctly, to accept them and discuss them.

2) Assist children in expressing their feelings.

3) Avoid shaming children for their feelings. Anger is a natural feeling, for example, and it is not bad or naughty.

4) Help youngsters learn the difference between emotions and behavior — and to use appropriate behavior.

For instance, anger is OK, but hitting someone is not OK.

5) Teach your children to develop appropriate emotional outlets — and to use these outlets in place of inappropriate behavior.

Ideas for appropriate emo-

tional outlets are playdough or clay for pounding, and a punching bag or a pillow for punching.

For sadness, suggest a story, a walk or a bicycle ride.

Also, avoid constant use of food to ease emotional pain — or to celebrate feeling great.

DANGER — INSULATION HEALTH HAZARD MAY EXIST

Danger, your insulation may pose a health hazard — if it's urea formaldehyde insulation, and if it's not installed properly, warns a housing and home furnishings specialist.

Though urea formaldehyde is an excellent insulative material, improper installation of it may cause the release of formaldehyde gas into living areas which, in

turn, can cause health effects, explains Mrs. Yarnall, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.


