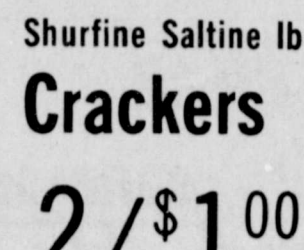

USDA Issues Production Costs

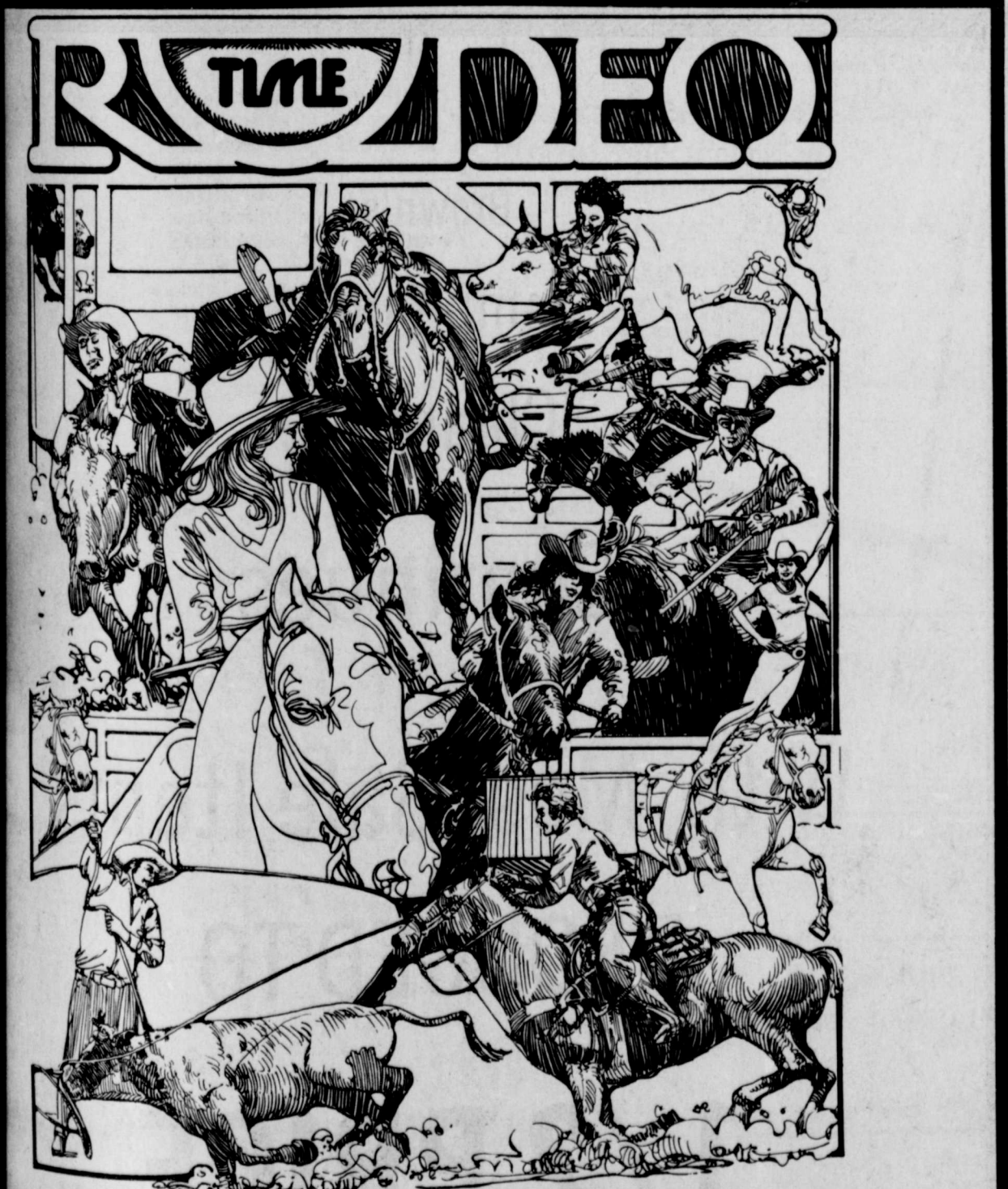
The Department of Agriculture has issued its annual forecast of crop production costs and one's surprise the figures show a substantial increase over 1979.

Following are the production figures for 1979 first crop: wheat, 4.5 bu. and \$5.00 bu.; corn, 22.5 bu. and \$3.05 bu.; soybeans, 15.5 bu. and \$6.97 bu.; cotton, 1.72 bales and \$9.50 bale; sorghum, 22.67 bu. and \$3.76 bu.

If pending legislation of prices is approved (HR 681) minimum loan prices would be \$4.07 on wheat, \$2.22 on corn and soybeans, \$6.88 on cotton, and \$2.56 on sorghum.

Secretary of Agriculture Bergland told the House Agriculture Committee he sees more legislation and that the department is studying the financing of the proposal and how it fits into the federal budget.

He had left Dallas two hours before we had left Fort Worth and he arrived in Chicago an hour before we did.

I believe today Braniff is about the largest carrier of passengers and at an early age, Tom, who was president of Braniff and the president of Capitol Airways, was killed near Lake Charles, Louisiana while on a duck hunt in a Capital Airline plane.

We landed in Springfield, Missouri to get gasoline and some rest from the heat. The tin goose Ford Tri-Motor had no ventilation except a small opening to turn as you wished to get air but I got very hot. The pilot said the inside temperature was 152 degrees. You started the motors by winding up a flywheel on the ground. When the three motors were started, we were to jump in and head for cool air which we hit at 12,000 feet. It was very cool until we started to land in St. Louis where it was 112 degrees but getting close to sundown.

By the time we left St. Louis, it was dark and the air was smooth. We landed in Chicago at 11 p.m. making the trip from Fort Worth to Chicago in eleven hours.

I had made reservations two weeks before at the Stevens Hotel and was told the rate would be \$2 a day. When we arrived we were shown a small inside room that hadn't been opened all summer. We went down to the assistant manager and asked for a fan or a cooler room. He told us there was none. My brother Nuck, who was a machinist by trade was a powerful man. He reached over the desk and picked up the man and told him either give us a cooler room or refund our money.

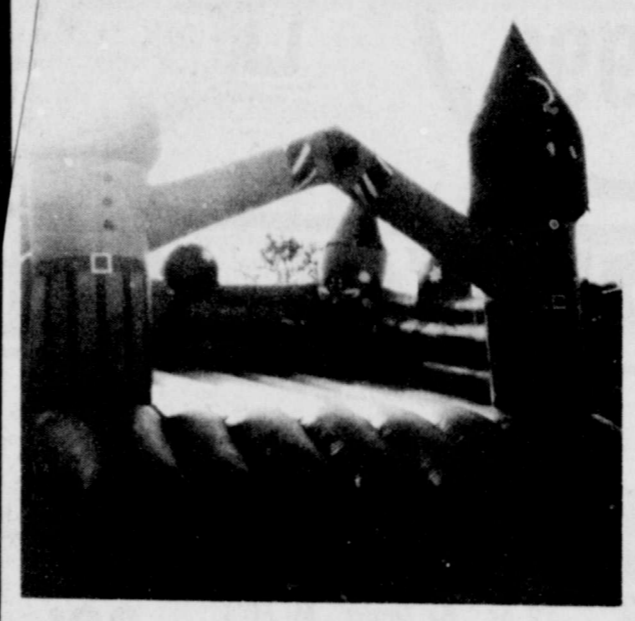

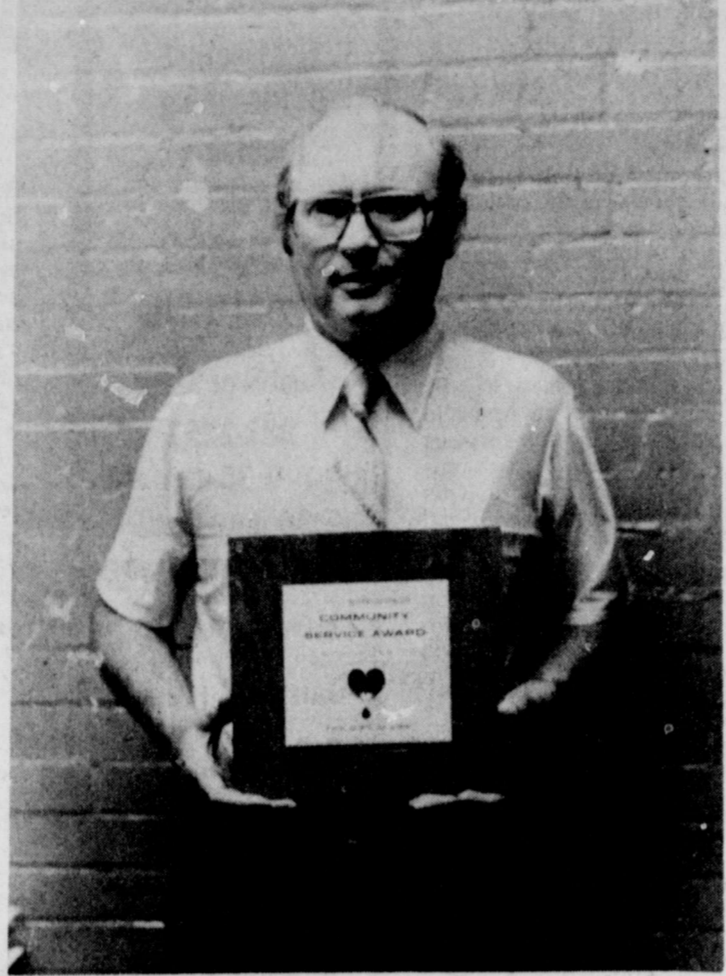

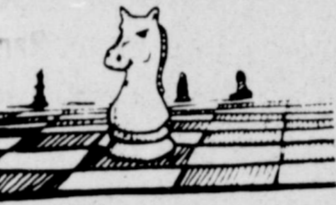
