The first house to be pre-wired for the service will be that of the George Sparkman family in the western part of the city. Sparkman was the first to sign-up for the pre-wiring and pay the

Ford last weekend completed the installation of equipment at the cable.

Locust Street a block east of Main Street and began receiving the television signals from Lubbock, New York, Atlanta and Chicago that will be fed out on the cable system.

City gets \$812,000 in Block Grant funds

The City of Lockney has received an \$812,000 Block Grant from the United States Department of Housing and

Urban Development. City officials announced that the grant had been approved yesterday.

Lockney will receive \$357,000 of the funds this year and \$455,000 next year. Although the money will be received over the next two years, it will take three or four years to complete the work the grant is funding.

The funds will be used for several

-- \$282,000 for street improvements. --\$163,000 for housing rehabilitation. -- \$120,000 for sewer improvements.

tion of housing -- \$65,000 for water system improve-

-- \$36,000 for general administration.

-- \$30,000 for code enforcement. -- \$25,000 for clearance and demoli-

With the funds included for general

administration, no tax money will be needed to manage the program. Officials say one of the main reasons

Lockney got the grant was because of the continuing efforts of Mayor Claude Brown to see that the grant was approved.

County studies bonds for industrial park

Two types of financing for industrial development in Floyd County were explained by a representative of the South Plains Association of Governments at a meeting in Floydada Tuesday night.

County officials and civic leaders from both Lockney and Floydada listened attentively as Sylvia Clark, Director of Economic Development, S.P.A.G., first outlined the grants and loans available to communities through the Economic Development Administration.

Floyd is one of six counties in the SPAG area that has been designated as a redevelopment area. It was designated by EDA as being economically

The second type of financing Clark outlined was the sale of industrial revenue bonds.

The issuance of revenue bonds for industrial projects has been in effect only since 1979 in the state of Texas. The Development Corporation Act allows Texas communities, particularly the rural areas, to take advantage of the lower interest rate and tax free bond financing.

Other states, including those bordering on Texas, have been using this

financial enticement since the 1960's. Now Texas is in a more competitive position nationally. Also the small

communties are more able to compete

with the larger communities. The funding can be used for local industry that is ready to expand or for an outside industry to locate in the community. The industry must have auditable books for over a three year period to be eligible.

A corporation, authorized by the city or county, is chartered to be able to sell the industrial revenue bonds.

The projects considered will be judged by the number of new jobs made available in the communities and the increased economy generated by the

new industry. Clark said that the Reagan administration is cutting back on many programs, "but it isn't going to hurt us that much, we're not going to be in

She was referring to the SPAG program. The Economic Development Department was founded in October of '80. Clark went in as director at that



Mayor Claude Brown addresses Chamber banquet

Hail hearing ends; decision due in summer

The public airing of the latest round of controversy over weather modification through cloud seeding for hail suppression ended last week after four days of testimony in the Texas Water

Commission hearing. The Plains Weather Improvement Association (PWIA) which had filed an application for a license to perform hail suppression cloud seeding, presented whether or not required pre-school evidence in favor of hail suppression to prevent crop damage from hail. Mothers are asked to bring the child's

The Citizens for Natural Weather (CFNW), an organization of farmers opposed to hail suppression, presented their case that hail suppression would have a detrimental effect on their farms and ranchland.

The outcome of the hearing, in terms of approval or rejection of PWIA's application for a permit, may not be known for more than 120 days.

Hearing examiner Jon Green may take as much as the four months to make recommendations to the Texas Water Commission. After Green makes his recommendation on the hail sup-

pression permit, attorneys on either TER: send address changes to the Lockney Beacon, P.O. Box 187, Lockney, Texas 79241. side of the controversy have 20 days to submit further comment before the Texas Water Commission in Austin. Even after the Texas Water Commis-

sion makes a determination on the hail suppression permit, the issue could end up in a court battle.

During the hearing, CFNW presented several witnesses who described the adverse effects of past hail suppression efforts. Ross Lumsden of Littlefield said his area experienced only one good year during the seven-year 1970-77 program originally conducted by PWIA.

During rebuttal testimony, Royce Carthel, PWIA president, pointed out that the earlier project was geared only toward hail suppression while the proposed project will be for rain enhancement at well.



Public libraries in need of **\$\$\$\$\$\$** for funding

Why should Texans be starving their public libraries?

This question is being asked by Books for Texans, an organization formed by Texas Library Association. Friends of Texas Libraries, Texans for Libraries, and the Trustees Roundtable of the Texas Library Association.

Leaders in Books for Texans are convinced that Texans will do something about the starvation diet for their libraries when they know the facts and reflect on just how important libraries are to citizens of Texas.

Texas now ranks 39th in the U.S. in state library support with 16 cents per capita. Largest per capita state aid is paid by West Virginia at \$3.61, followed by Georgia at \$2.47. Even states poorer than Texas pay significantly more in aid to their libraries. Alabama's state aid is 42 cents per capita; Arkansas 63 cents and Mississippi 53 cents.

As long ago as 1978, the Texas Conference of Libraries and Information convened in Austin to study library problems, recommended state support of \$1.00 per capita and urged the Texas Library and Archives Commission and the Texas Library Association to go to work to seek \$1.00 per capita funding "at the earliest possible date."

Wendell Mayes, Jr., Austin, and Wayne C. Sellers, Palestine, chairman and secretary of Books for Texans, have noted that an appropriation of \$1.00 per capita which can do so much for libraries is minuscule when compared to

the total state budget. "We can think of no appropriation which can do so much for so little," they said, pointing out that in 1979 Texas public libraries circulated 43 million items to the public, answered 71/2 million reference questions, hosted 3 million persons at library programs and

showed films to 5 million persons. "In many communities, public libraries are the only adult education facilities. Information ranging from performance of the stock market to how

Texas Daily Newspaper Association and the Texas Press Association, representing virtually all of the newspapers in Texas, have passed resolutions favoring the \$1.00 per capita support. Texas League of Municipalities has also endorsed the request.

EXEMPTIONS AND RENDITION DEADLINE APRIL 1st Shelia Faulkenberry chief appraiser for the Floyd County Appraisal District, today urged local citizens to apply for available exemptions which may help residents

save on their property taxes. Shelia noted that for the first time, taxpayers in Floyd County may apply for all applicable homestead exemptions or productivity valuation on their agricultural land by contacting the appraisal district office which is located at County Courthouse Room 107.

The chief appraiser explained that taxing jurisdictions in Floyd County are voluntarily participating in early implementation of the countywide appraisal office. Beginning next year, countywide appraisal will be mandated by law for all of the state's 254 counties.

According to Shelia, taxpayers previously had to file their property rendition statements and exemption applications with each jurisdiction which levied an ad valorem tax on their property. Additionally, if they thought the property was valued too high, a separate appearance was required before each jurisdiction's board of equalization.

"Under the countywide appraisal district, not only can applications be made at one place, but a single appeal of the property valuation can be made," the chief appraiser

Shelia said the following types of exemptions are available to property owners in Floyd county:

-General Homestead. Those persons qualifying for a residence homestead are entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the market value of the homestead for school tax purposes. An additional \$3,000 county homestead exemption from assessed value is available against the portion of the county tax rate for farm-to-market roads or flood control

-Persons 65 or older. Elderly citizens are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the market value of their residence homestead for school taxes. And, while an elderly citizen's property may increase in value through the years, the school taxes owed in any one year on the house and yard cannot be greater than the amount owed in 1979, or in the first year the property owner qualified for the exemption, whichever is later. An annual application to the appraisal office is required.

By local option, school districts, cities and counties may offer additional exemptions to elderly homeowners of not less than \$3,000 off the market value of the residence homestead.

-Disability Exemption. Citizens who are totally disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption are entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the market value of their residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only. A property owner may not receive both this disability exemption and the \$10,000 exemption for the elderly.

School district, cities and counties may offer an additional local option disability exemption of not less than \$3,000 off the market value of the residence

-Disabled Veteran or Qualifying Survivor. Certain disabled veterans or their survivors may be entitled to an exemption ranging from \$1,500 to \$3,000 from the assessed value of any property they own. The amount depends on the percentage of service-connected disabili-

This exemption may be applied against the value of any one property owned on January 1 of the year in which the pplication is made. The disabled veteran must be a Texas resident and complete an annual application at the appraisal district office. Only one property may receive the exemption, and VA or armed forces documents verifying disability are required.

Land which is being utilized for agricultural purposes may be eligible for tax relief. Qualified landowners hold the option of having an agricultural or open-space land valuation applied to their property. Details on what types of land may be taxed on productivity rather than market value are available from the appraisal office.

The chief appraiser added that a comprehensive 12-page pamphlet, entitled, Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities, is available at the appraisal district and from local tax offices. Information contained in the pamphlet is applicable to property taxes which are collected by all levels of local government including counties, cities, and school districts.

She said the publication was developed by the State Property Tax Board in accordance with the Property Tax Code which was passed by the 66th Legislature in 1979.

Jack Samford, tax assessor-collector for the Lockney Independent School District, announced today the availability of a 12-page pamphlet which may help district residents save on their property taxes.

The pamphlet explains how the property tax system in Texas operates and highlights possible tax savings available to citizens.

The publication was developed by the State Property Tax Board in accordance with the provisions of the Property Tax Code, which was passed by the 66th Legislature in 1979.

Resident homeowners are eligible for a \$5,000 school homestead exemption and certain disabled persons and those aged 65 or older may qualify for an additional \$10,000 exemption from the value of their property. "Taxpayers who were 65 or older on January 1 of this

year are also entitled to a school tax freeze on the tax bill for their house and yard. The elderly must make application to get the freeze in 1981 or retain one acquired in 1979 or 1980," the school assessor added.

Also, farmers and ranchers have the option of having their agricultural land taxed on its productivity rather than market value.

To qualify for exemptions and productivity valuation, however, application should be made to the Floyd County Appraisal District office before the district's rendition period ends on April 1.

"District residents are encouraged to review the pamphlet and make application for all tax relief to which they are entitled before the rendition period ends."

The Floyd County Appraisal Office is located in the Floyd County Courthouse directly across the hall from the Tax Office.

When I started thinking about a project I decided to try to make an oil rig. I guess what started my interest in the rig was because my daddy has a water-well drilling rig which I have been around all my life. It is similar to the oil rig, just smaller; but it works on the same principal. When daddy was a small boy he became interested in well drilling and he even built a small rig on his wagon. His little rig worked like a cable-tool rig and drilled about 8 feet deep out by the hen house. After hearing the stories of my daddy's little rigs when I was about 7 or 8 I decided to do about the same thing but my rig was built on a little peddeling tractor. It had about a 6 foot derick and I drilled holes about 5 feet deep all over the backyard.

Our family went to Post, Texas back in January to visit some relatives and my daddy and one of the relatives and I went out and looked at a real jack-knife rig that was drilling an oil well near Post.

While we were at Post, this relative who works for Continental Emsco Co., an oil well supply company gave me a copy of World Oil, a monthly magazine about oil well equipment.

I found a full page picture of a jack-knife drilling rig and I tried to build my project just like this picture.

Screwworm cases down but threat still present

(AUSTIN) - Despite great strides in eradication of screwworms this past year, that pest will continue to be a very real threat to Texas livestock producers, Dr. John Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission,

"Even though the U.S. and northern Mexico are virtually free of screwworms. livestock producers in Texas, especially in those counties adjacent or near to the Rio Grande River, need to be on the watch for possible infestations." Dr. Holcombe said.

"Cattlemen in this state are to be commended for their cooperation during the past two decades in regard to the screwworm eradication program. The program would never had succeeded without their help in reporting suspected cases all those years. But now is not the time to quit looking and checking animals for possible screwworm infestations. Rather than stopping, now is the time to redouble our efforts in this matter so that we can indeed continue to be screwwormfree." Dr. Holcombe explained.

be recorded in Texas. But we must continue our vigilance so that no cases can slip through undetected," Dr.

The sterile fly plant at Mission has been closed by U.S. Department of Agriculture officials because of the success of the program in Texas and northern Mexico. It is also feared that continued production at Mission would create a constant threat of fertile flies escaping to reinfest the now "clean"

Sterile flies are being produced near Tuxtla-Gutierrez, Chiapas in the heavily infested southern portion of Mexico. These are being dispersed to mate with native fly populations; such matings produce no offspring.

"This is a time for the Texas livestock industry to rejoice over the eradication of what once was a major pest and problem for cattlemen. But this is also a time to redouble efforts to make sure we do not again become re-infested," Dr.

Stenholm addresses Cisco farmers and ranchers on U.S. agricultural troubles

and ranchers from the 17th Congressional District inflation and the present system covering agricultural commodities were burdening the producers of the nation, Congressman Charles Stenholm told the audience "we have got to turn this country around fiscally and change farm programs that are not working.'

The Congressman spoke to the meeting of producers from his district in a grass roots forum organized by the Texas Farmers Union and at the Cisco Junior College.

"Everyone in the 17th Congressional District knows what the problem is," Stenholm stated. "We do not have enough money to pay our debts at the end of the year and put in a new crop at the beginning of the year."

The congressman said gross farm income lagged far behind other industries in the country while the net farm income was down 40 percent.

The current session of Congress will be taking up the 1981 Farm Bill beginning in March, Stenholm said. He predicted three types of bills could emerge. One would be an extension of the 1977 Farm Bill "with some increases in loan levels and refining of the farmer held reserve system, including cotton in the reserve." The second alternative would be to extend the current act for one year "as a simple

The thrid alternative will be "to come up with some new and different approaches," Stenholm remarked. "We are going to have to come up with a program which we can sell to both the American farmers and consumers," he

Regardless of which type of bill is adopted by Congress, Stenholm said government will remain active in the

> Congressman Stenholm said the current embargo on grain to the Soviet Union will be continued "until we can come up with an honorable way to come out of a difficult situation." He said he hoped to see the embargo lifted "but then sell to them at a higher price." Stenholm added embargoes would remain a fact of life and would have to be used on occasion but said the last one enacted against Russia "should have been a total embargo, not just on grain and American Olympic athletes."

> Speaking on the proposed budget cuts which will affect agriculture, Stenholm said three particular areas were of concern. He was critical of the called for reduction in the milk program stating the small producer will be made to suffer. "Is that the man we want to put out of business by lowering the price five percent when we know the retail price in the grocery store will not go down," Stenholm asked. "The family farmers who are in business now are the most efficient producers in the world," he added.

> The proposed cut in the Farmer's Home Administration (FHA) can be made at some levels, Stenholm said. "They should not hurt the production side of agriculture but it will affect some of the business loans the FHA should not have gotten into," he stated.

> On the proposed reductions in the Rural Electrification Administration (REA). Stenholm said those who wanted to do away with the program would have to be strongly opposed. "But more and more coops are going to have to stand on their own feet. Some are getting two percent loan money from REA when they can get by on five percent," he said.

question the need to report. Retirement may be years away and the individual may need every dollar now to live on. Also it may be difficult to hire and keep an employee who knows you will be repor-

However, keep these points in mind:

1. Social Security does more than pay retirement checks and provide Medicare protection for older people. It also pays monthly benefits if a worker becomes severely disabled for at least a year. But a worker first needs a certain amount of social security credit (called quarters of coverage) before benefits can be paid. That credit is based on reported earnings. Also the amount of the benefit is related to total reported earnings. So if you do not report wages, the individual may not have enough credit to get payments or could receive a smaller benefits.

2. Even though you and your employee may agree now not to report wages, this could come back to haunt you years later when you apply for benefits. When it is discovered you do not have enough credits, you may have to pay back taxes as well as a penalty. The statue of limitations does not apply if no tax return was filed.

If you employ a household worker, here's what you need to do: Contact any Internal Revenue Service (IRS) office and ask for the necessary reporting forms and information on how to complete them. You must complete IRS form 942 (employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employ-

ees) within a month after a quarter ends. Include the employee's and your share of the social security tax (6.65 percent each on wages up to \$29,700 for 1981).

Annual reports of 1980 earnings must be filed by April 15 by people receiving social security benefits who earned more than the annual exempt amount in 1980.

The 1980 annual exempt amounts were \$5,000 for people 65 and over and \$3,720 for people under 65

People who received some benefits in 1980 who earned more than the exempt amount are required to file a report of those earnings by

Those who received no benefits in 1980 are not required to file a report, but those people should file a report to make sure that any benefits that might be due for the year are paid.

A person who earned less than anticipated, for example, may be due some benefits. The only way these benefits can be paid is if the person files an annual report.

The general rule is that \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings above the exempt amount. A person can have substantial yearly earnings before all benefits are withheld. For example, a 65-year-old person whose monthly benefit rate is \$350 could earn \$13,400 before all benefits for 1980 were with-

People who are required to file an annual report should have received a copy in the mail. If they have not, they should contact the nearest social security office to obtain a copy. Those not required to file, but who wish to do so, can also get a copy security office.


