DeWayne Brown, Manager of Farmers Grain Co. in Hart was elected president of the Texas Grain and Feed Association at the annual convention in Corpus Christi April 9.

Total attendance at the convention was 1,135. The theme of the convention was, "United We Stand."

Brown is the third Castro County man to serve as president of the TGFA. The late Otto Dinwiddie of Farmers Grain Co. in Hart was president in 1948, and Fred Bruegel Jr. of Bruegel & Sons, Inc., in Dimmitt headed the organization in 1979-80.

The Texas Grain and Feed Association was founded in 1898. With a membership of more than 1,350 companies, it's the second largest state association of its type in the US. Members represent grain elevators, feed mills, and flour mills in the state of Texas. Firms selling equipment and supplies for these firms are associate members. A trade show with 135 booths was held in conjunction with the convention.

Brown, a graduate of Dimmitt High School, has a degree in finance from Texas Tech University.

He started in the grain business in 1960. He was employed with Bruegel and Sons in Dimmitt, then moved to Farmers Grain Company of Hart in 1962.

He has been president and director of the Panhandle Grain and Feed Association. He has served as director of

the National Grain and Feed Association for eight years. Brown was president of Hart Lions Club, and was named Man of the Year in Hart in 1969.

He has served on the board of directors of the Texas Grain and Feed Association since 1972, was second vice-president in 1981, and vice-president in 1982.

New officers and directors elected at the convention were: Larry Alley, Temple, first vice-president; Bill Hutson, Fort Worth, second vice-president; Frank Bailey III, Fort Worth, director; Wayne Slovacek, Deer Park, director; David Swinford, Dumas, director; and Bob A. Roberts, Lytle, director.

Commissioners study flood risk

Wayne Boggs of the Texas Department of Water Resources met with Castro County Commissioners Monday and discussed the Federal Flood Insurance Program.

Commissioners were concerned with the area directly affected by the Flood Control Dam on Running Water Draw at Sunnyside.

Boggs advised commissioners that to qualify for the federal program they would have to pass a resolution and a court order "to a letter." "Specifications must be followed."

Commissioners asked Boggs what the county's liability would be now in connection with the dam and possible damages as a result of rains.

"If the county is required to maintain the dam, as long as maintenance requirements are met the county shouldn't be liable for damages," Boggs said.

Boggs said he would send additional information to commissioners about surrounding counties in the federal program.

Commissioners passed a motion to advertise for bids on the roofing of the library. Specifications will be published in the News and may be picked up at the County Judge's office.

County Surveyor John Alldredge met with commissioners to discuss a boundary discrepancy in the northeast corner of the county which adjoins Swisher and Randall Counties.

Alldredge will meet with Swisher County Commissioners, then the counties will decide what to do about the boundary.

'Run for Life' is Saturday

The First Annual "Run for Life" is scheduled Saturday and area runners are invited to participate in the event sponsored by the Dimmitt Chapter of the American Cancer Society.

The Run for Life will feature three distances, the 10K (6.2 miles), the 5K (3.1 miles) and a "One Mile Fun Run." Runners will compete in 15 different age-sex divisions. The first 200 entrants will receive a "Run for Life" souvenir T-shirt.

Entry forms are available at Dimmitt Printing. Those entering by Friday will pay \$6 to enter, and a late registration fee (day of race) will be \$7.

All proceeds will go to the American Cancer Society.

The event is Co-sponsored by Dimmitt Kiwanis, Rotary, and Lions clubs, Young Homemakers, Alpha Chi Omega, and Adidas.

The one mile run begins at 8 a.m., and the 5K and 10K races begin at 8:30 a.m.

Races will start at City Hall in Dimmitt, and late registration will be from 7 to 8 a.m. Saturday.

Pioneer Bethel homemaker gets top Extension honor

Millie Lust, 87, who has gone "from lye soap to microwave cooking" in the Bethel Extension Homemakers Club, was named Tuesday as the county's Extension Homemaker of the Year.

She was presented an engraved silver award tray by County Extension Agent Teresa Nutt during the Texas Extension Homemakers Association Spring Dinner Tuesday evening in the courthouse community room.

Also recognized at the dinner — which featured a picture-book buffet of homemakers' favorite dinner salads — were the Extension Homemakers of the Year in the Sundowners Club, Oleta Raper, and the Town and Country Club, Ann Pevehouse.

Mary Jean Huseman, a senior honor student in Nazareth High School and County Gold Star 4-H Girl, received the 1983 Extension Homemakers' Scholarship of \$150. The scholarship was presented by Margaret Womack.

Mildred Bradford presented the program, a review of Judith Martin's book, "Miss Manners' Guide to Excruciatingly Correct Behavior."

Nell Ingram emceed the annual dinner, which was held in the evening for the first time. More than 50 homemakers and guests

attended — the largest attendance in years. This year's Homemaker of the Year traced through her own experiences the dramatic change in lifestyles here through the years, as reflected in homemakers' club projects and activities.

"As an early club member, I helped in preparing meals for local farm auctions," she recalled. "We canned for less fortunate community members, bringing produce from our own gardens. We helped each other on 'butchering days,' even to canning beef roasts. In the earlier years of club work we had many more club projects, such as canning, making cheese, soap, quilts and bread."

"Many of our projects were for others," she explained. "One I helped supervise was a project to make several quilts for Boys Ranch. I've led projects of crocheting and knitting. For several years our club also prepared meals for the Farmer-Businessman Dinners as a money-raising project."

Mrs. Lust, a pioneer school teacher at Bethel (the land for the school and church building was donated by her family), has been active in Bethel community life and projects ever since she moved to the community as a new

graduate of West Texas Normal College in 1918.

She has had children, grandchildren, and now great-grandchildren in 4-H, and has worked with them in their projects. With knitting as her main hobby, she has made at least one afghan for each member of her family and also knits baby blankets for each new great-grandchild.

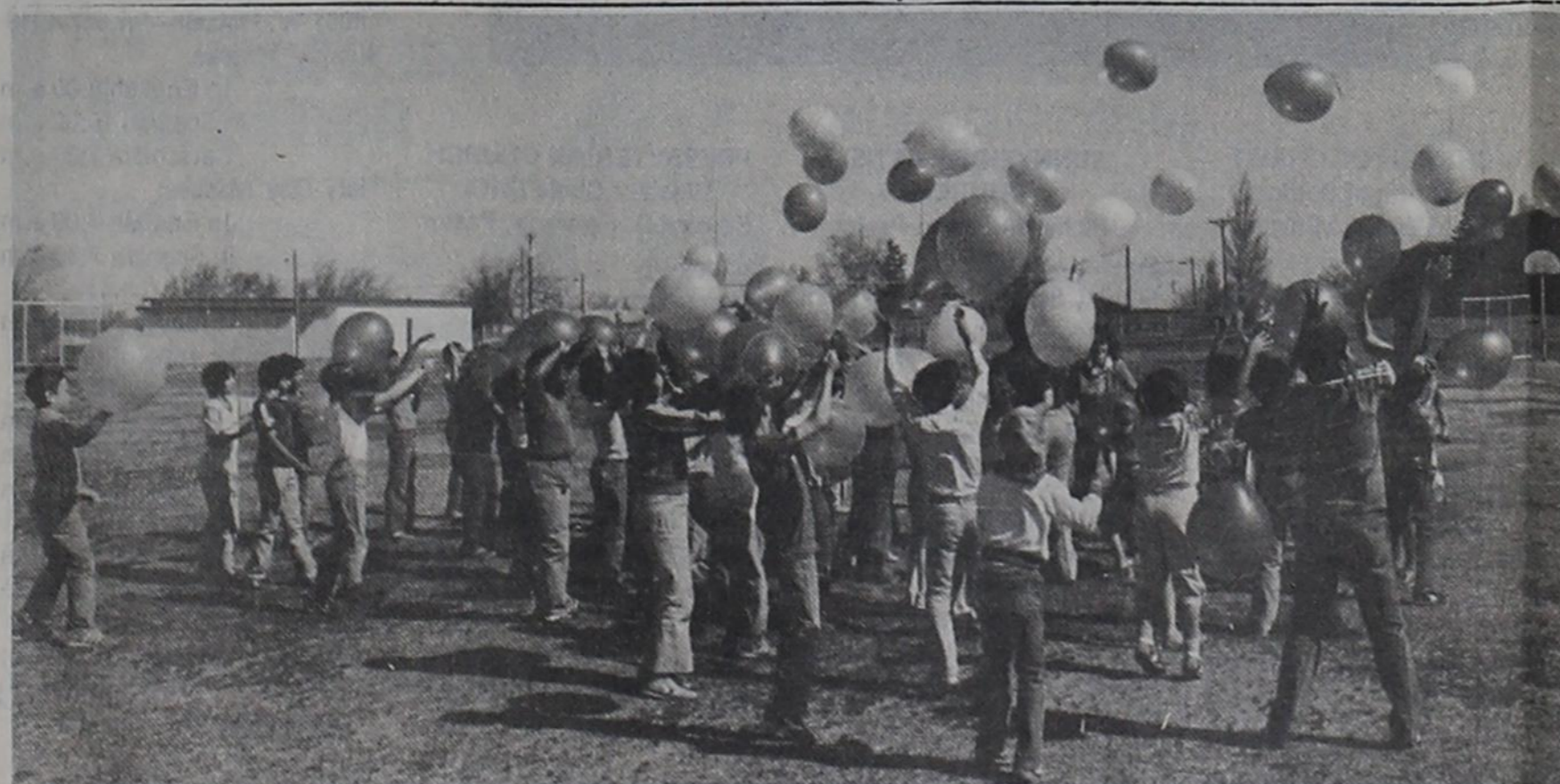

Accepted bid level is 20%

Richard Lyng, Deputy Secretary of Agriculture, recently announced that the government will accept all bids on all grain up to and including 20%, for the "Reserve PIK" program.

The government, in an effort to acquire more grain to fulfill PIK agreements, offered to buy from farmers their grain which was under loan.

On 1981 and older wheat, the government will accept bids up to and including 25%.

The purchase of this loan grain is expected to provide the government with 735 million bushels of corn, 210 million bushels of wheat and 145 million bushels of grain sorghum.

Lyng said that this extra grain will fulfill PIK agreements in all cases but wheat.

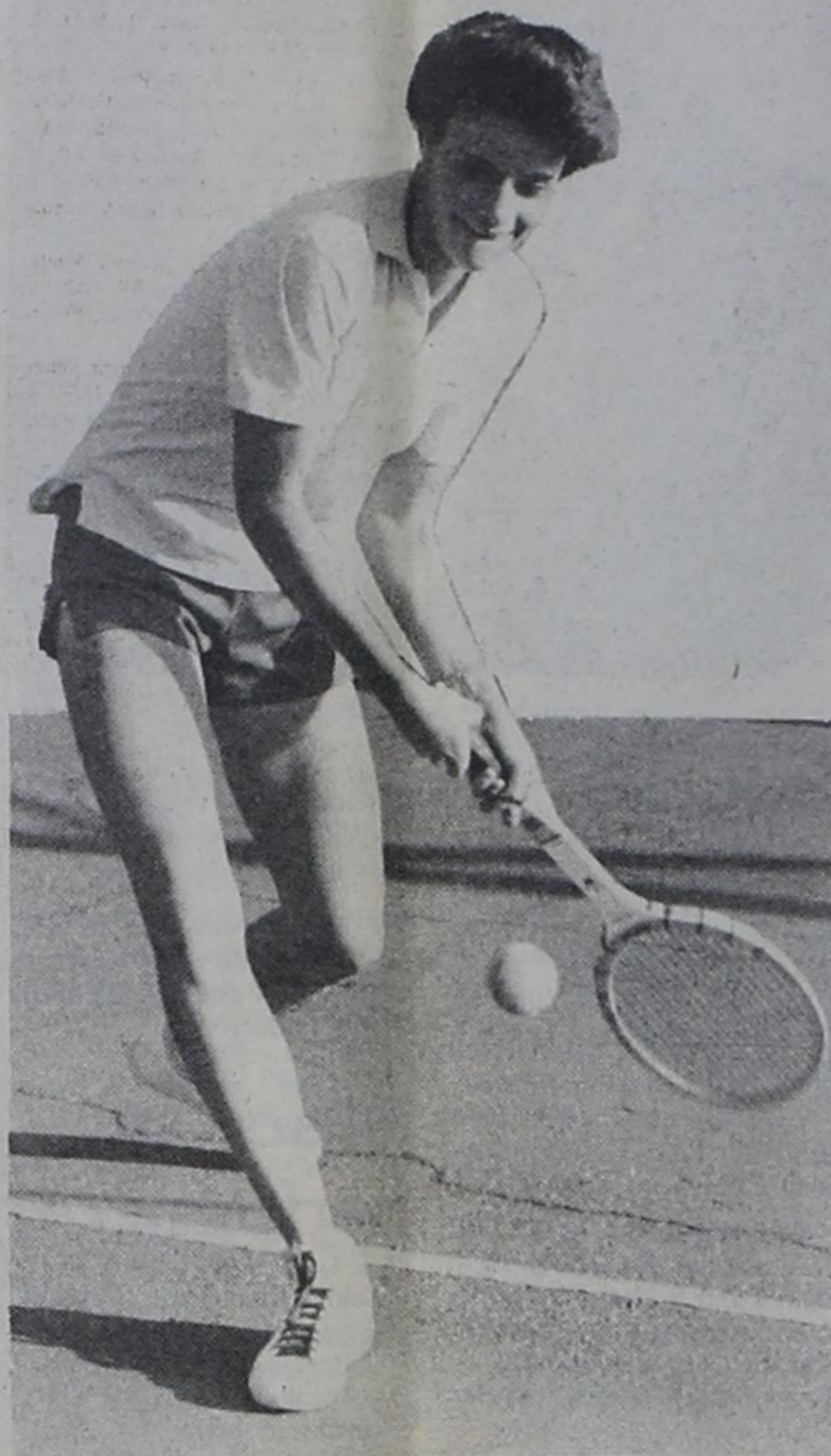

of doubles action Friday to Tornilla's Angelica Jimenez and Yvonne Quintanilla.

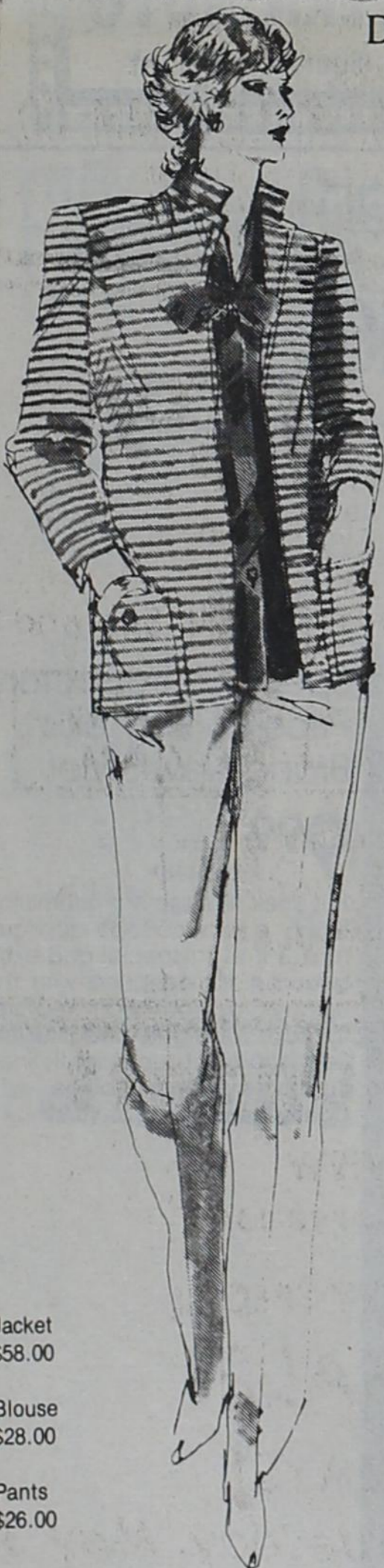

A diaper and baby food shower honoring Kelly Quisenberry and her new son Daniel Slade will be given Saturday at 2:30 in the home of Terri Louder.

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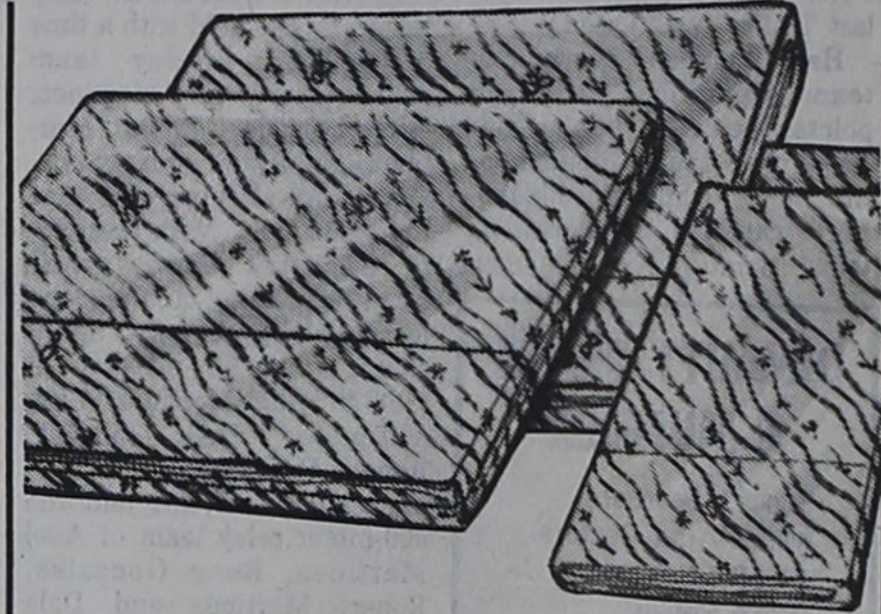
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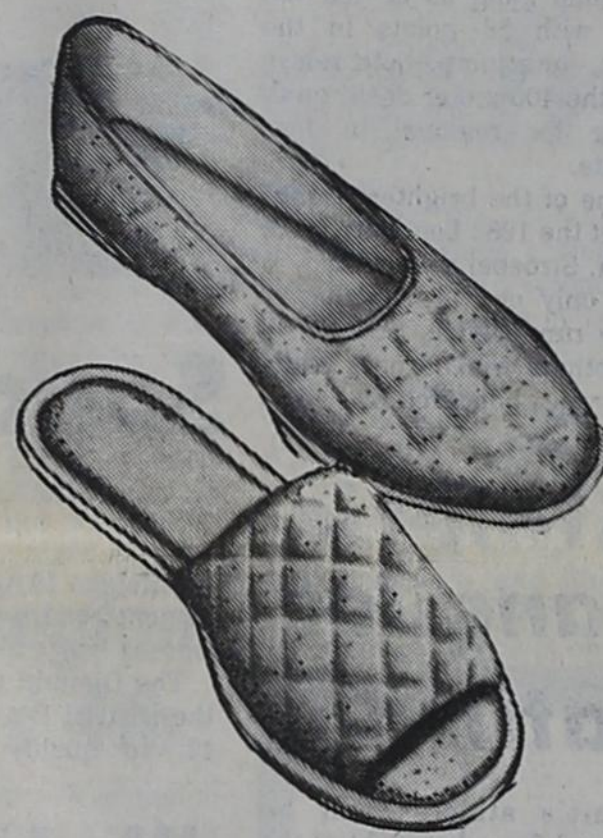
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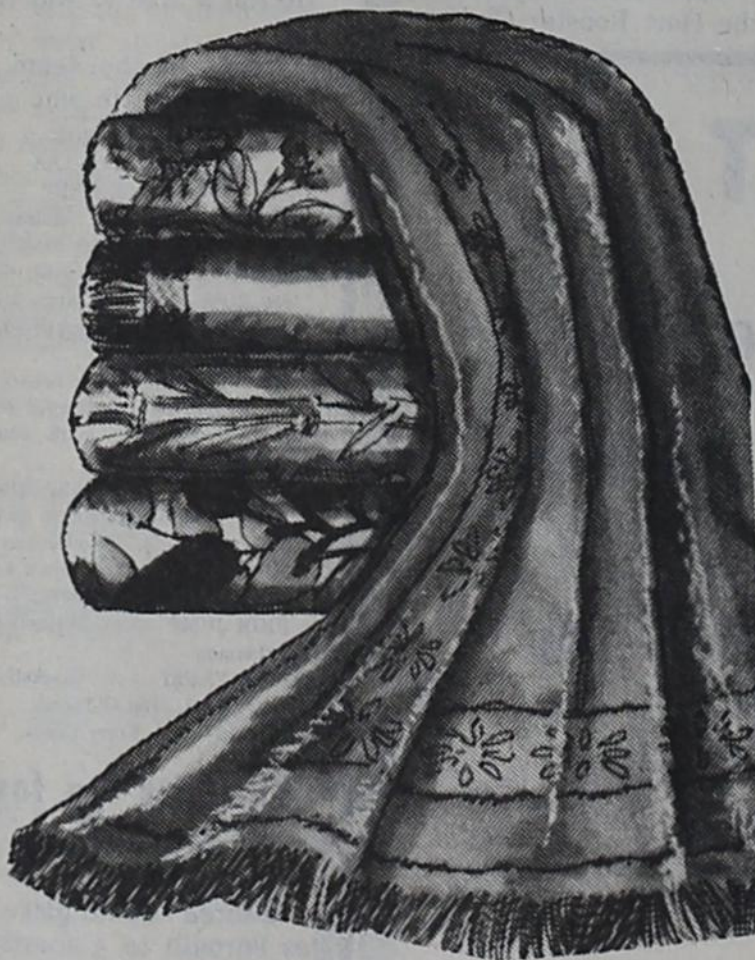
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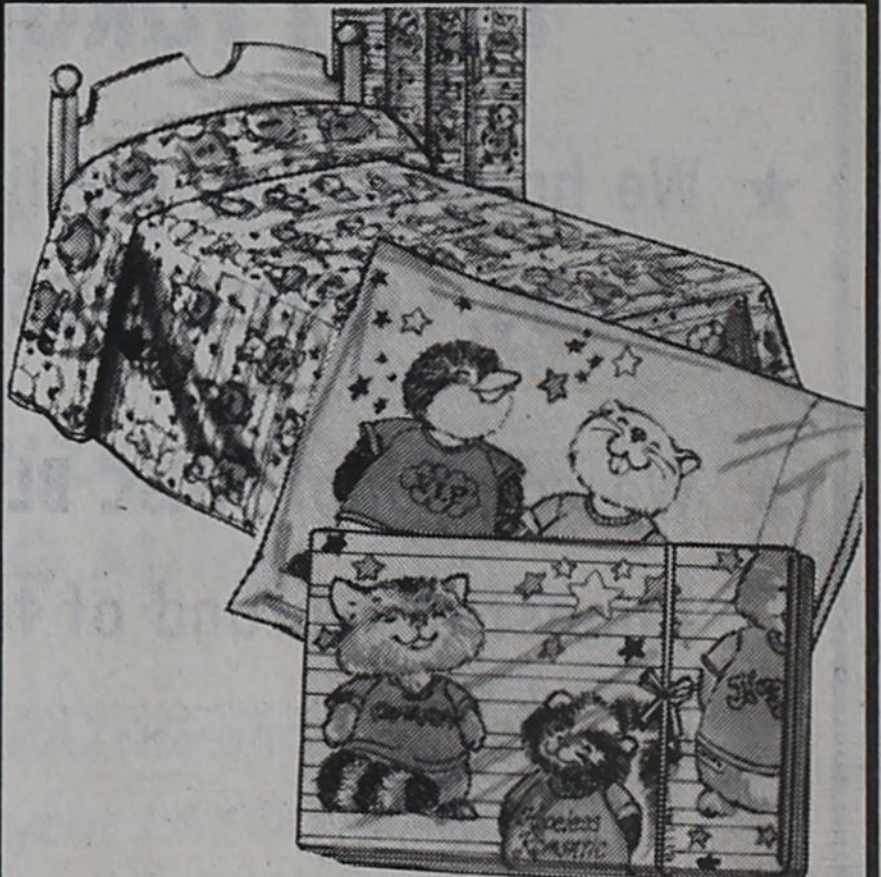
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
