An application of insecticide at this time can be an effective measure, Campbell says.

Houseflies actually are a pest at night, the entomologist says. "They're a little like chow bugs and they'll crawl into your ears and nose and they'll bite you," he says.

If you choose to spray at night, the insecticide will be more effective. Spent wisely, the insecticide control will more than pay for itself.

If you apply a dust to it — one: sanitation — you'll find it's much easier to control them when they're concentrated

## Quitaque will get bridges

QUITAQUE — About 95 percent of the residents of the Los Lingos Creek area in Floyd County near Quitaque are now pleased with the prospects of the replacement of two outdated bridges at a cost of \$948,118.43 by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

District Construction Engineer James Johnston of Lubbock said that a dispute had arisen among area residents concerning the use of detours while the bridge construction is in program, but that a meeting yesterday with about 25 persons, including the Floyd County commissioners, has erased the problem.

"We will have river-crossing detours on each side of the construction sites," said Johnston.

"Of course, the detours are vulnerable to washouts and some will be left stranded on the road until the water drains. But we will replace the detours as soon as possible."

The first bridge being replaced is 3.9 miles south of Quitaque on FM 1065 and the second is 1.3 miles further south.

"The two original bridges were constructed in 1950 and no longer meet weight standards. They have a 28,000-pound capacity and are only 20 feet wide," said Johnston. "We are widening them to 34 feet."

Concho Construction Co. of Dallas has contracted for 175 working days to complete the bridge construction project here. "They hope to be out of there by Christmas," he said. "It should take about nine months to do the job."

## Medical workshop is planned

The South Plains Emergency Medical Services and Texas Tech University-Health Services Division will co-sponsor a two day workshop in Floydada on May 20 and 21.

The workshop will be held at the Regional Training Center with registration beginning at 9:00 a.m.

The workshop is being offered to all R.N.'s, L.V.N.'s, E.M.T.'s, E.C.A.'s and to M.D.'s who hold a current Texas license. It will include Plainview, Lockney, Matador and other area towns.

Speakers for the two days will include M.D.'s, R.N.'s, and E.M.T.'s, and will deal with the subject of trauma in the small communities with emphasis on stab wounds, gun shot wounds, burns, chest and head trauma, anaphylactic shock as well as communication skills.

Registration fees will be \$20 to cover the cost of speakers, materials and etc. and \$12 to cover the cost of a catered lunch on both days.

Many months of preparation and coordination have gone into preparations for the workshop, which will be the first in a series to be held in the outlying areas of Lubbock in order to assist in continuing education at the minimum of expense for Medical and Para-medical personnel.

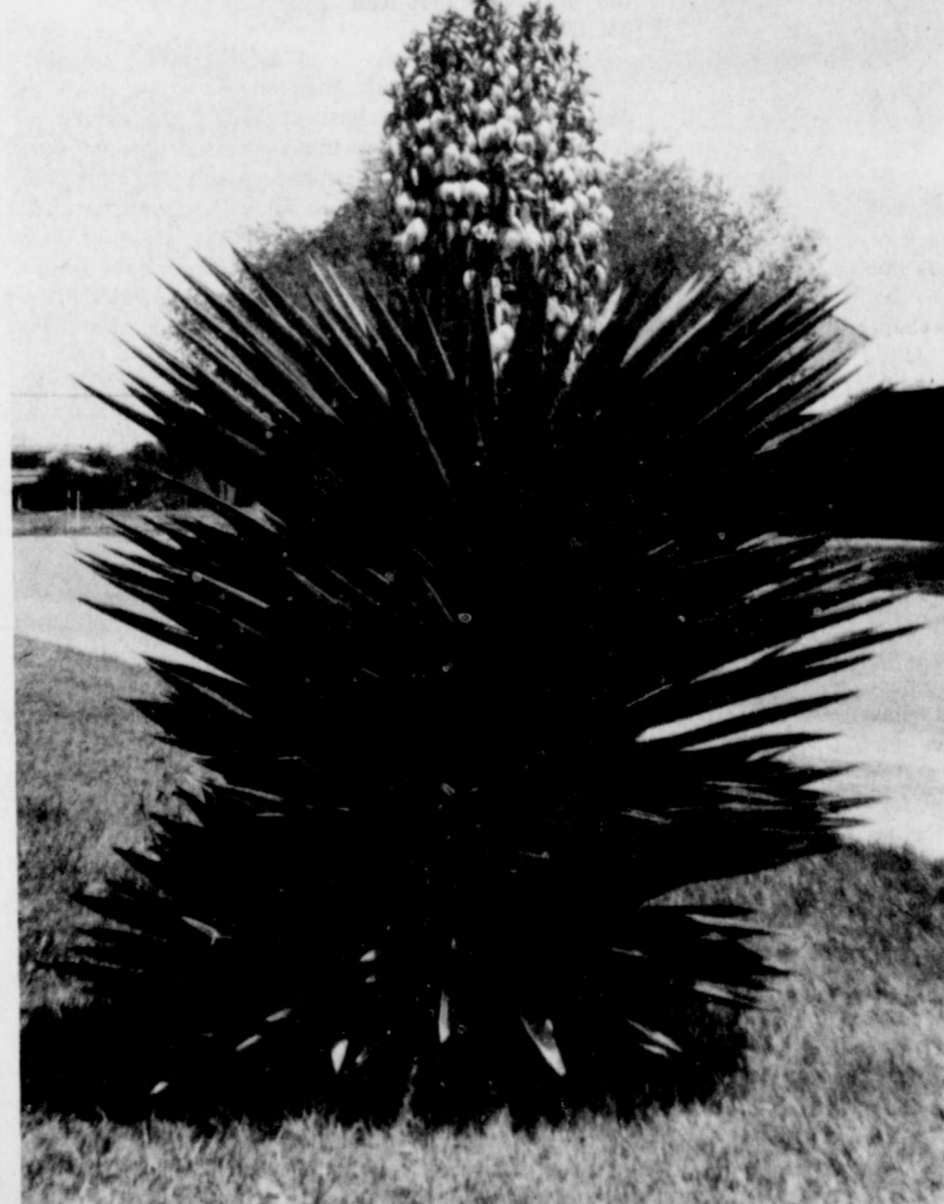

## Colorful proof that Bluebonnets will grow this far north

A parade of wildflower enthusiasts have been admiring Bluebonnets at the S.W. Ross home on Houston Street in Floydada.

"Most of the flowers are volunteers," Mrs. Ross said. Small bunches of the plants scattered along the fence and sidewalk attest to the fact that the seeds, carried on the wind are planting themselves.

A few years ago Ross, challenged by the opinion that Floydada is too far North to support the Bluebonnets, broadcast seed into his backyard.

The flowers not only came up but they have thrived.

As one of the original board members of the Mackenzie Water Authority, Ross, has been broadcasting Bluebonnet seeds at the lake site.

"If they'll grow here, they will grow at the lake. 'Someday it (the park area) will be covered with the Bluebonnets,'" he predicted.

The Bluebonnet, state flower of Texas, belongs in the pea family.

The name comes from the tiny, deep

blue blossoms in the shape of a bonnet. They grow one above the other along the stem. It is an annual flower which blooms in the spring and is killed by the first frost in the fall. During the summer it drops seeds from which the next years flowers grow.

Wildflowers over the entire state are in abundance this year. The weather has favored the billions of seeds lying dormant by the side of the roads.

Conditioned by nature to survive the past two years of dry spells they have simply awaited the right conditions.

The mild winter and timely rains we have experienced this past year plus the most important factor...no late frost... has produced a bumper crop of wildflowers.

On our trip to College Station two weeks ago the flowers were magnificent. We saw more of the red, Indian Blankets than we did Bluebonnets.

The fact that we as Texas motorists can enjoy this year's wildflower show is because of a lot of hard work and research done by the Texas Highway Department over the last 50 years.

Fred Pass, editor of the Texas Almanac, said that "It was in 1929 that highway people observed they were creating an environment for wildflowers habitat along highway right of ways. These flowers thrive on poor soil where they don't have much competition from other vegetation. And since roadways are built largely of fill dirt with little topsoil, bluebonnets and other varieties began to take over on the sites. At once, a policy was distributed throughout the highway system that was designed to preserve and protect the propagation of wildflowers alongside highways."

There has been some criticism of the Department for mowing the roadsides. But this "is probably the only thing that has allowed the flowers to survive. Otherwise, other vegetation would take over and crowd them out."

Even with the price of gas, a short trip off the cap to see the roadside decoration is certainly worth it.

If you can't do that, perhaps the Ross' will allow you to have a look at their wildflower garden.

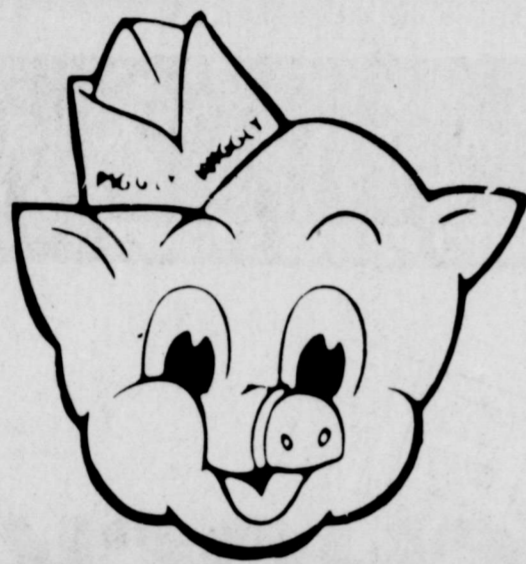
