Quitaque will get bridges

QUITAQUE - About 95 percent of the residents of the Los Lingos Creek area in Floyd County near Quitaque are now pleased with the prospects of the replacement of two outdated bridges at a cost of \$948,118.43 by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

District Construction Engineer James Johnston of Lubbock said that a dispute had arisen among area residents concerning the use of detours while the bridge construction is in program, but that a meeting yesterday with about 25 persons, including the Floyd County commissioners, has erased

the problem. "We will have river-crossing detours on each side of the con-

"Of course, the detours are vulnerable to washouts and some will be left stranded up the road until the water drains. But we will replace the detours as soon as possi-

struction sites," said Johnston.



New tax bill causes concern

Concern this week led to confusion as officials of the newly formed Floyd County Appraisal District tried to figure the effect a new state house bill would have on them.

The confusion results from any layman trying to understand the workings of the legislature.

Three calls yesterday to Austin by this reporter resulted in a semi-knowledge of bill 602 which has passed, favorably, out of the ways and means

It is a taxing bill which would rescind bill 621 and restore the property tax to the way it was before the passing of Bill

If you are still with me. I will try to make this all clearer. Bill 621 is the one setting up the new appraisal district.

It is a 70 page bill that did a number of things one of which was that if the constitutional amendment was passed by the people in the November election it would set up a single appraisal district.

The amendment was indeed voted in by the people of Texas. The Bill 621 happened to be passed just shortly before the election so that it all came about at the same time.

Called the Peveto Bill in honor of its author, Bill 621 brought about the re-evaluation, the re-appraisal, and will lead by 1982 to establishing a single appraisal district and a single taxing

Now, as with anything of this scope, and as with anything dealing with taxes, there have been problems.

Lynn Nabers, representative from Brownwood, has introduced Bill 602 to the Ways and Means Committee, which would recend Bill 621 and restore the taxing procedures to the county tax

In talking with Cissy Woomer, from Nabers' office in Austin, she said "Lynn Nabers feels like there have been alot of problems in the #621 and that is has resulted in higher taxes." He has therefore introduced to recending Bill. She said that there is a three year phase-in period and that to go ahead will create more problems.

She explained that the next step in the progress of this Bill 602 will be to come before the Calendar Committee. They will vote whether or not to place it on the calendar. If it passes there it will be read on the house floor.

House members will then discuss the bill, make amendments and then vote on the bill as a whole with all the amendments.

This is called a second reading. If it passes that vote it will be read again the next day in what is called the third reading. If it passes there it goes to the Senate Finance Committee and the process is repeated. If the Senate passes the Bill on the third reading it will go to Governor Clements to be

Dear editor:

It's easy to criticize Congress but some people don't realize what a difficult job a Congressman has.

For example, recognizing that one way to offset inflation personally if you can't whip it generally is to in-

Congress the other day tried to give itself a \$1,000 a year raise, from the present \$60,662 to a more inflationfighting \$70,900.

Here's where the job becomes difficult, voting yourself a raise without letting anybody know how you voted. Some spoilsport de-

manded a recorded vote but his motion failed. By voice vote, in which everybody shouts "aye" and nobody can tell how you voted, the \$10,000 raise passed easily.

But before the raise becomes effective the Senate has to concur and the measure failed there because some complicated parliamentary procedure required a recorded vote and the Senators were too bashful to do it. All Senators and Congressman will have to get along the best way they can on \$60,662 a year.

On the other hand, the Supreme Court is not bashful. After examining the Constitution carefully and

judiciously, it decided Congress violated it by withholding previously enacted pay raises for Federal judges. Therefore, calling upon the wisdom of the Founding

Fathers, the Supreme Court ruled the Supreme Court members are entitled to a \$10,000 a year raise. Only a man with the farsightedness

of Thomas Jefferson could have foreseen that 200 years later a judge getting \$72,000 a year and free office rent needs a \$10,000 raise.

You can see why being a Congressman, serving at the mercy of voters, is difficult. A Supreme Court judge is

The Association of Texas Professional Educators (ATPE) in a recent hearing told a House committee that collective bargaining for public school teachers represents a divisive element in the important concept of team work necessary to upgrade the quality of public education in Texas.

Mike Morrow, executive director for ATPE which represents approximately 30,000 educators, 25,000 of whom are classroom teachers, testified against a collective bargaining bill sponsored by the Texas State Teachers Association. The hearing before the Employment Practices Committee of the House of Representatives brought into focus one of the primary differences between the two largest teacher associations in the state.

Morrow stressed that his organization supports uninterrupted education for students in the public schools. "As professional educators, ATPE members oppose this bill because we believe that it will open the door to illegal strikes for public school emThe TSTA bill does not

Happy Birthday, 4-12-1902. I am late with the greeting, but I must get it in as it may be my last one, as I am near 92 years old and almost blind.


I inked the forms and my cousin, the late Leslie Floyd, cranked the Washington press and printed Vol. 1, No. 1 of The Beacon.



DO YOU FALL FOR SUPERMARKET GIMMICKS?

Have you ever gone to the store for strawberries but went home with the little shortcake package and whipping cream, too? Perhaps you bought the extras just in the supermarket display. Do your children find great delight in picking out all the sugar-coated cereals the

store has to offer? This may happen because those cereals are displayed at children's eye levels. If so, you fell for marketing gimmicks. Not so bad, since all that is fun occasionally, but not so good if you sacrifice family nutrition with frequent gimmick buying - impulse buy-

To avoid this, take time to

plan purchases. Shop with a

list so you aren't vulnerable

to "point-of-purchase" influences at the supermarket. Read labels and study food advertisements. Understand as much information as possible about nutrition and need serving sizes. Also learn about the "cost per pound" or "cost per ounce" - and then you must figure how many servings that pound will make or how many ounces will make a serving. In addition, seek information from your County Extension Office about food buying and nutrition. Many booklets and pamphlets are available to the public at no charge through the County Extension Offices across Texas. Finally, be aware of supermarket gimmicks such as the strawberry shortcake displays and the sugar-coated cereal shelf

Other gimmicks include colorful banners, slogans and marketing products themselves - all of which induce a mid-hypnotic-trance in many consumers, according to one study. Remember, unless you're careful, these gimmicks can lead to the purchase of more high-profit eyeappealing, self-gratifying

and less nutritious buying. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agriserve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

On our trip to College Station two weeks ago the flowers were magnificent. We saw more of the red, Indian Blankets than we did Bluebonnets.

The fact that we as Texas motorists can enjoy this year's wildflower show is because of alot of hard work and research done by the Texas Highway Department over the last 50 years.

Fred Pass, editor of the Texas Almanac, said that "It was in 1929 that highway people observed they were creating an environment for wildflowers habitat along highway right of ways. These flowers thrive on poor soil where they don't have much competition from other vegetation. And since roadways are built largely of fill dirt with little topsoil, bluebonnets and other varieties began to take over on the sites. At once, a policy was distributed throughout the highway system that was designed to

preserve and protect the propagation of wildflowers alongside highways."

There has been some criticism of the Department for mowing the roadsides. But this "is probably the only thing that has allowed the flowers to survive. Otherwise, other vegetation would take over and crowd them out.'

Even with the price of gas, a short trip off the cap to see the roadside decoration is certainly worth it.

If you can't do that, perhaps the Ross' will allow you to have a look at their wildflower garden.





Which is better, the rotary or convention

CHICAGO - America's farmland is becoming the scene of an increasingly confusing battle during harvest time.



INTERNATIONAL HARVESTER'S AXIAL-FLOW combine harvested more wheat per unit area at both high and moderate feed rates during comparative tests with conventional machines. At moderate feed rates on four series of

trials, conducted by Kansas State University agricultural engineers, the Axial-Flow averaged a 4.5% yield advantage. The IH machine also consistently caused less crackage in all varieties of wheat harvested, the engineers reported.

TFU critical of Reagan energy policies

(WACO) — Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller criticized the Reagan Administration for "cutting out family farmers and ranchers in energy production and increasing their costs for providing food and fiber.'

Moeller testified at the Department of Energy Hearing in Dallas, on the National Energy Plan III.

Moeller criticized the administration's proposals for - recommending terminations of funding for gasohol loans, continuation of the Windfall for deregulation of natural gas.

"Gasohol projects, especially those involving small producers, are likely to founder without federal loan guarantees," Moeller said. Because commercial lenders are hesitate to finance alternative energy development, the proposal by the Reagan Administration to terminate the Farmers Home Administration's alcohol fuels and biomass programs will kill many worthwhile projects.

Moeller said the gasohol program could lead the U.S. to be more independent of imported oil. "Obviously this is one answer to the energy crisis. It is also in the consumers' interest to keep alcohol production in the hands of small producers rather than having another industry controlled by a few major corporations."

Moeller said Reagan Administration promises about income tax refunds being available to farmers was not enough inducement to guarantee development of gasohol. "By the very nature of the business, farmers are gamblers. But they are not willing to gamble

constructing an alcohol plant on the mere promise of an income tax rebate." The Windfall Profits Tax was also

criticized by the TFU President. "Obviously the President is not going to end the Windfall Profits Tax because they need it to help balance the budget." By deregulating oil prices and allowing the major oil companies to pass the costs through, all consumers are having to pay the bill."

The small royalty owners and independent producers are shouldering a which offsets any additional benefits they might get through an increase in their income." The TFU wants an

exemption from the Windfall Profits Tax for the small royalty owners and independent producers.

The TFU president said deregulation of natural gas prices could put many farmers out of business who rely on gas for their irrigation pumps. "Irrigated farming at this stage is marginal at best. If we double the price of natural gas, it will put a lot of them out of business," Moeller predicted. The TFU president said "the consumers of this state will have to suffer from higher food prices if we allow some of our most productive agricultural areas to be lost on account of farmers not being able to pay their gas bills."

There's always been the issue: "What is the best combine?" But now complicating that question is the more recent controversy: "Which is better, the rotary or conventional machine?"

Presently, four North Americanbased companies offer rotary-type combines. Two companies are standing by their conventional models.

In an attempt to put International Harvester's Axial-Flow rotary combine into perspective, IH engineers involved with its development reviewed recent test data and specific patented features. Included were Donald Murray, chief engineer; Richard DePauw, machine design manager; and Robert Francis, product engineer.

The men began with a discussion of

"IH conducted extensive tests during the Axial-Flow combine's development," said DePauw, "and the tests have been supplemented by outside results."

Kansas State University agricultural engineers, for example, made field comparisons of the IH rotary combine and conventional machines operating in small grains in Kansas in 1978. The conclusions were reported at the 1978 winter meeting of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers. The results included:

*The Axial-Flow combine harvested more wheat per unit area at both high and moderate feed rates. At moderate feed rates on four series of trials, the Axial-Flow averaged a 4.5% yield advantage over the conventional com-

*The Axial-Flow combine consistenly caused less crackage in all varieties of wheat harvested.

In summary, the Kansas State agricultural engineers stated: "Overall, we felt that the IH Axial-Flow Model 1460 combine performed very well. Although our experience thus far has been limited to this one machine, we are of the opinion that the development of the Axial-Flow principle for field combines will be recorded in history as a major milestone in the development of combines for small grain harvesting."

The Japanese government tested an IH 1440 Axial-Flow in very high moisture wheat in 1980. Typical of test results was one where grain moisture was 32.1% and straw moisture was 49.5%. The yield was 73.5 bushels per acre. Total grain loss from all causes, at an average speed of 3.4 mph, was only npared to crop yield

"In simple terms," Francis said,

"this means the Axial-Flow design reduces grain loss, crackage and dockage in the crops it is harvesting, regardless of conditions." The reason, he continued, is that the

single, large-diameter rotor is the only moving part in the entire threshing/ separating process. With its rasp bars, the rotor repeatedly threshes the crop as it swirls through the rotor cage.

"There is no cylinder, cylinder beater, beater grate, straw walkers or racks. These can cause grain damage and losses," added Francis. "On the other hand, the rotor's gentle rubbing action - repeated several times as the crop is moved in a spiral path over the concave and grate area - minimizes grain crackage while recovering a higher percentage of grain from the straw.

"Yet another concern to farmers is fuel consumption," Francis continued. "The best criteria for measuring fuel consumption is number of bushels or acres harvested per gallon of fuel. In a word, that's productivity.

"In our own tests, we consistently had more productivity per gallon of fuel

One example: a 1480 Axial-Flow combine and a conventional IH 915 machine worked in the same rice field. The Axial-Flow used 9.26 gallons per acre, while the conventional used 12 gallons per acre.

"Two IH combines also were compared in soybeans. The 1460 used 1.01 gallons per acre while the 915 consumed .08 gallons per acre."

"We are getting similar reports in other crops and in other countries." said DePauw.

One report received by the engineers was from a custom operator who had operated his own IH 1460 and a conventional, competitive machine.

The operator reported that he harvested almost 2,000 acres of wheat and over 600 acres of corn with his Axial-Flow. In wheat, the Axial-Flow harvested 1.305 acres per gallon; and the conventional combine. 1.096 acres per gallon. The Axial-Flow combine, therefore, harvested 19% more acres per gallon.

In corn, the Axial-Flow harvested 0.861 acres per gallon; and the conventional, 0.698 acres per gallon. Thus, the Axial-Flow harvested 23% more acres

Incidentally, the two machines used about the same amount of fuel for the season, just over 2,200 gal. But the IH periorty by increased productivity for the fuel used.

Reports from other countries include one from an Australian IH Axial-Flow owner. He said his IH Axial-Flow harvested 48 bags of sorghum per Imperial gallon of fuel. By contrast, his conventional combine harvested 46.5 bags per Imperial gallon. Again, the Axial-Flow combine's

design, according to DePauw, is the main reason it harvests more efficiently. And the design involves certain patented features. "The threshing-separating system,

the heart of the Axial-Flow combine, actually involves several patents," De-Pauw continued.

"Patents cover the conical front end of the rotor, which is the transition area between the feeding system and the rotor, and the impellers on the front of the rotor.'

grain dust explosions The elusive causes and specific conditions that may inevitably cause grain dust explosions in grain elevators and feed mills are virtually impossible to "nail down" in every case, but not from the lack of financial and manpower support of the grain elevator industry. Currently, more than \$1.6 million has

been pledged by firms in the grain industry to conduct research for the purpose of identifying these causes and conditions. All of this money has been made available by private industry, including many grain firms that have facilities in Texas. Texas Grain and Feed Association has provided a \$10,000 donation. Texas A&M University is among the twenty universities, private firms, and research organizations currently engaged in specific research projects.

"The National Grain and Feed Association, through its 52 member Fire and Explosion Research Council, is guiding the efforts for this unprecedented grain industry financed research program. Today, 20 research projects totaling more than \$500,000 in industry donated funds have been awarded," according to National Grain and Feed Association spokesmen. "The Council is sponsoring practical research that has the best chance of yielding workable results that can be put to use immediately by grain and feed firms to maximize safety," they emphasize.

From recent attention-getting head

lines and irresponsible statements made by various "headline grabbers" it would appear that there are more fatalities in the grain elevator industry due to dust explosions than in any other industry. According to USDA there have been 12 fatalities during 1979 and 1980 in grain elevator explosions, while the National Safety Council during 1979 reported a total of 13,200 fatalities in all industries with the construction industry responsible for 2,600, agriculture 1,900, manufacturing 1,800, and government related jobs 1,700. It would appear that with government related jobs accounting for 1,700 fatalities, more inspectors is not the answer. Until the conditions which prompt these explosions and the causes definitely identified, inspectors may be at a loss as to what to look for.




