

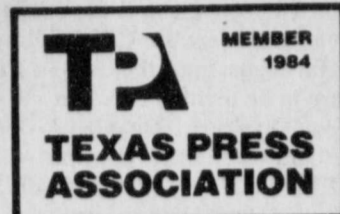

Brown's Store featured as the Business of the Week

Brown's Department Store, featured as the Business of the Week, is owned and operated by Claude and Wilma Brown. Reminiscing, Claude said, "I suppose it is the oldest business in town under the same operation." Wilma laughed and reported that "it feels like we have been working forever."

Claude, a native of Lockney, began working in a tailor and cleaning shop part-time while in high school. During World War II, while serving in the Air Force, he continued working in a tailor shop on base. In 1946, starting with \$600 that he had saved while in the Air Force for 3½ years, Claude and Wilma purchased dry-cleaning equipment and opened a dry-cleaning establishment in Lockney.

A men's department was added in 1949 and in 1956 a larger department store was established. In 1960 Brown's Department Store moved to its present location. The Outlet Store emerged at this time to fill the vacancy previously housing the department store.

The Browns have raised a family as well as a thriving business. Three generations of Browns are now serving the community. Ann Race, daughter of the couple, works in the store and is joined by her son, Karl, who is employed during the summer and attends Texas Tech in Lubbock as a junior during the school year.

In 1965, the Browns bought a farm outside of Lockney which is farmed by

their son-in-law, Billy Karl Race. Race also works in the store during the infamous Brown sales.

The Browns have made civic contributions to Lockney. A 32nd degree Mason, Claude has also served two terms as Rotary president and currently is a member of the Rotary. He has been a member of the VFW and was awarded Outstanding Citizen of the year in 1958 by the Chamber of Commerce. Claude served two terms as president of the Chamber of Commerce, six years on the City Council, and was elected to serve 16 years as mayor of Lockney. Wilma has been a past president of the BPW. The Browns are active members of the First Baptist Church.

Brown's Department Store and The Outlet Store offer everything for the entire family in the way of dress and sportswear. Clothing begins with infants sizes and runs through the adult line. A shoe department features dress, casual, work shoes, and boots to fit all sizes and needs. Household articles and a new line of gift items are available to the customer.

"The store just built itself through the years," stated Claude. "We have stayed here because we like the people. In fact, we experience good trade throughout the county." Family oriented, the Claude Browns strive to serve Lockney and the surrounding community with good service and quality merchandise.

4-H skit wins 5th at State

The Lockney 4-Hers returned from College Station last Thursday evening from state 4-H competition.

The Lockney 4-H skit "Floyd County 4-H Laugh-In" received a 5th place overall and won 2nd in the skit category in the state contest. Lockney competed against 22 other teams from all over the state.

Members of the cast included Rusty Teeter, Monty Teeter, Scott Howard, Lisa Terrell, Shawnda Brock, Libby Williams, Sherre Kinard, Heather Holt, Clay Adrian, and Gwen Lane as the accompanist for the group.

The skit was written by Charlotte Mitchell with the assistance of Gayle Jackson and Mary True.

Charlotte Mitchell, director of the skit made the following comments on the Lockney 4-Hers' performance at the state contest: "The kids gave an excellent performance, under considerable pressure. They were very professional in their presentation and I am very proud of each and every one of them. They worked very hard to put this skit together."

Also journeying to A&M for the state meet was Earl Broseh, who presented a demonstration on the uses of the forest in the natural resources division. He received 3rd place overall out of a field of 17 teams participating. Earl was the first place individual in that same division.

While in College Station a western band comprised of three boys from Lubbock, one from Post, and Earl Broseh, who organized the group, played for the general assembly of 4-H state contest both nights before a crowd of about 2500 people each night. Juanita Broseh, the Lockney boy's mother, said the boys were very well received by the crowd and "the boys were very excited by the reception" from the crowd.

The Floyd County 4-H rifle team also participated in the state meet. The team placed 21 out of 28 teams. Even though they did not place any higher, residents of Floyd County can be proud they were represented at the contest by so many qualified teams.

Members of the rifle team include Matt Mitchell and Wymond Rexrode of Lockney and Kim Zimmerman and Don Chessir of Floydada.

Floyd County was well represented at this year's state meet, having had 22 young men and women making the trip to A&M to participate in the contest. These kids have worked hard this year and are to be congratulated on a job well done.

Eddie and Cheryl Teeter, Charlotte and Warren Mitchell, Buster Terrell, Kenneth and Juanita Broseh, Sandy Adrian and Boo Boo Lane of Lockney accompanied the participants to College Station.

City Council approves paving application

In the regular monthly meeting of the Lockney City Council held June 7, the council passed a resolution to apply to the Texas Community Development Program for funding for 1984 community improvements.

The City of Lockney will be applying for funds to pave three streets in southeast Lockney. They include Southeast Second from Shurbet to Spruce, Southeast Fourth from Shurbet to Poplar, and Southeast Sixth from Shurbet to Locust. This paving will connect existing paving on these streets and on Sixth the entire street will be paved completely.

Barbara Ellis of Parkhill, Smith, and Cooper was present for the meeting to discuss this proposed program with the council. Should Lockney be approved for these funds, approximately 5,400 linear feet of paving will be constructed.

Ellis also informed the council that they expect to be able to publish requests for bids on the HUD housing project very soon.

In other business the council approved calling for bids to repair the 200,000 gallon water storage tank in west Lockney. The Water Tank Service Company has inspected the tank and has recommended that the tank be recoated with epoxy on the inside and to

repaint the outside. This company has serviced the water tanks in Lockney for many years prior. They redid the tank in 1963. Their work has a 20 year warranty, and they have notified the city officials that they can do the work on the tank for approximately \$21,980.00. But due the amount of repairs, the city is required to call for bids.

The council approved the audit report during the meeting and also approved the issuing of a permit to Jim Warren for the purpose of selling Bibles and other religious and education materials in the Lockney area.

During the department reports, Alderman Paul Reecer reported that the Fire Department is presently working on the plans for the vehicle building they have requested to store the old ambulance, the portable generator, and other equipment.

The council approved giving \$25.00 to the Floyd County Sesquicentennial Committee which will be used to mail information on the sesquicentennial to Lockney residents.

Present for the council meeting were Mayor J.D. Copeland, alderman Reecer, Pat Frizzell, and Kenneth Wofford, city secretary Erma Lee Duckworth, and city attorney Paul Lyle.

The Lockney swimming pool opened its doors for the summer on June 1. The pool has a new look this year thanks to the Lockney Rotary Club who donated \$500 to repaint the pool. A new slide has also been added and the old slide cut off to make a short slide in an effort to provide more fun for swimmers.

Admission prices are the same this year at a cost of \$30 for a family pass and \$15 for individual passes, annually. Daily admission prices are \$1 for children under 12, and \$1.25 for all others.

Native hired as police chief

Tim Thompson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Thompson, has returned to become the new city police chief. Regarding his new position, Thompson smiled and said, "I am glad to be home. Lockney is a good town, filled with good people. You realize this after you have been away awhile."

Formerly the chief of police of Briscoe, Arkansas, a town with the population of 600, Thompson has been in law enforcement 1½ years. He also worked with the Arkansas Sheriff's Association for 1 year. Attending the Arkansas Law Enforcement Training Academy, Thompson also has had training in jail standards, radar certification, and DWI enforcement. Darlene, his wife, is a certified dispatcher and served as a jailer in Prairie County, Arkansas. Thompson is eagerly looking forward to working with the citizens of Lockney and cooperating with the Floyd County Sheriff's Department.

Floyd County Sheriff Fred Cardinal is equally optimistic. In an interview with The Hesperian, Cardinal stated, "I believe that this situation will work out real well. Tim has been a chief of police and knows what cooperation means. It is my opinion that the departments will work closer and have more and better communication. Mrs. Thompson will

serve as a reserve dispatcher which will be an additional asset."

Thompson requests the cooperation of the citizens of Lockney. Thompson added, "There are some changes which need to be made which will be enforced gradually. Initially warnings will be given until everyone becomes accustomed to the new enforcement of existing laws. For instance, U turns can be made at intersections, but no longer in the middle of the block. Citizens will be asked not to pull across the street into a parking place. Stop signs need to be observed." Thompson also asked that "customers do not back out of Pay-N-Save across the street and proceed south." He also stressed that "public drinking will no longer be tolerated. The enforcement of these laws will be made with the best interest and safety of the general public." Thompson added that "solicitors will be required to have a permit issued from the city."

Again, Thompson emphasized that "he will appreciate any help from the citizens of the town. The police department cannot be all places at all times. The Lockney Police Department will be here to protect and serve the people and will work with the citizens in any way we can."

PERSPECTIVES

An interesting new study on the effect of religious broadcasting on churches has been released. Some of the conclusions probably surprised the people who conducted the research, the National Council of Churches.

The study found that religious broadcasting is most often viewed by people who claim a strong affiliation with the church, and who come from a conservative religious background. There has been some fear in recent years among the mainline denominations that religious TV programs were drawing money and people away from established churches. But the study found that the opposite is true. People who watch such programming are more likely to give money to the church and attend on a regular basis. The study also found that religious broadcasting serves a need for shut-ins, especially ones who once attended church.

The kicker to the research was the finding that the more people watch regular TV, the less likely those people are to be strong church people. Of course, no one claims to watch too much TV, and there are always exceptions in a study like this, but it would seem that

watching television could be hazardous to our spiritual health, unless you are watching religious material.

I think the reason for such a thing is obvious. The scriptures remind us that we are to set our eyes on things above and to concentrate on them. Since most of today's secular TV does not do that, it would follow that if we were watching more and more television, we are thinking less and less about God. Eventually he will become superfluous.

Television is an amazing invention, but I have noticed that it is also addictive. I know people who set their schedules by the TV Guide. I myself have been tempted to set aside activities in favor of a program I wanted to see, and often, when I am tired, I use the television much as others might use a tranquilizer.

The solution, I think, would be for us all to watch less TV, and when we do, try to watch a little more uplifting material. Perhaps those who feel they should be more active in church could start with a review of their viewing habits. At any rate, the little black box will have to be dealt with.

Official Olympic torch to pass through Saturday

Of local interest concerning the 1984 Olympics, an official Olympic torch will pass through Crosbyton on Saturday, June 16.

The official Olympic caravan will reach Crosbyton about 10:45 on that day and the entire caravan will eat their noon meal in Crosbyton.

According to information received in Crosbyton the "professional runner" will carry the torch through the canyon into Crosbyton and will be followed by six vehicles including a police car, an emergency medical vehicle with a doctor and nurse, and a department of public safety car. Following behind the torch bearer will be the other 30 vehicles which make up the official caravan.

The caravan includes three vehicles especially made for food preparation so members of the caravan will be provided with their own meals.

The caravan will leave Crosbyton and will make its way to Lubbock and they are scheduled to reach Lubbock at about 2:30. In Lubbock they will be traveling a route from the Lubbock County Courthouse traveling west down Broadway to Texas Tech University.

The caravan will journey to Littlefield for an overnight stay before leaving the state of Texas at about 1:15 Sunday afternoon.

This is possibly a once in a lifetime experience to see the official Olympic torch passing through Texas and our area.

Olympic coins available

The First National Bank of Lockney is one of almost 6000 financial institutions across the nation who are taking part in the Olympic coin consignment program.

Thus far, the Lockney bank has sold 7 sets of the coins including five sets of three coins and two sets of the two silver coins.

The coins available include 1983 and 1984 silver coins and a gold \$10 coin. The coins are available in sets or separately. Each of the silver coins is \$32 each or may be purchased as a set for \$64. The gold coin alone is \$352 or may be purchased in a set with the two silver coins at a cost of \$416.

The public's initial response to the Treasury's first-ever national coin consignment program has been overwhelmingly positive according to Dean Mitchell, Director of the Olympic Coin Program. Mr. Mitchell reports that the Rayne Bank and Trust Co. in Rayne, Louisiana, sold out their first order of gold and silver coins within hours after the shipment arrived. When Linda

Brooks at the Rayne Bank called the Treasury to re-order, she told officials "they were gone before we had a chance to advertise their availability."

Two years ago, Congress passed legislation authorizing the production of the gold and silver Olympic coins to commemorate the 1984 Summer Games in Los Angeles and to raise funds for the nation's Olympic effort. Three coins have been struck, 1983 and 1984 Olympic silver dollars and a 1984 gold \$10 coin. The gold piece is the first such coin to be issued by the U.S. Mint in 50 years. Proceeds from the sale of these coins are to be divided between the Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee and the U.S. Olympic Committee. To date, the coin program has raised more than \$38.8 million.

The Treasury's decision to go nationwide with the consignment program was a result of a successful marketing test conducted by the Mint early this year with banks in Des Moines, Iowa.

Meters to be installed soon

Residents living or having property along the same side of the highway where the Mackenzie Transmission Lines are installed and had water taps made on the lines will have meters set soon. A check valve will be installed which will keep water from being siphoned or drawn back into the transmission lines.

If you had a tap installed and want to start using treated water from the Mackenzie Water Treatment Plant you

must call 633-4318 or 633-4326 or come by the office. Residents or land owners will pay the Water Authority for the cost of the meter and for its installation. The minimum monthly charge will be \$25.00, for the first 2,000 gallons of water and a charge of \$2.00 per thousand gallons used thereafter.

Those who do not have taps on the water lines and would like to have one should call one of the above telephone numbers and taps will be made as soon as possible.

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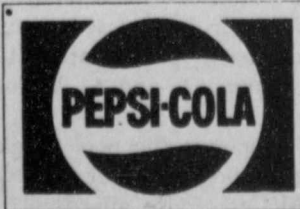

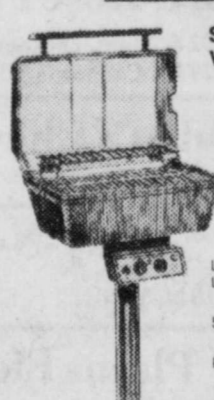

In times like these...

The possibility that the U.S. might be drawn into a Persian Gulf war is getting closer to reality. What alarmed the White House was the bombing by Iranian planes of a Saudi supertanker, a 212,000 ton Yanbu Pride. The bombing took place barely 50 miles from Ras Tanura, the region's main oil port. Then two days later, on May 18, Iraq boasted that its planes had attacked two tankers south of Kharg Island, Iran's principal oil terminal. This brought to 10 vessels hit in the gulf since March.

Iraq's leader Saddam Hussein began ordering the attacks in March in an effort to cut Iranian exports. Iran's Ayatollah Khomeini intends to pressure Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, and the United Arab Emirates to end the 700 million dollars in monthly aid they give Baghdad.

Pentagon officials have expressed

doubt that Iran or Iraq could blocked the Strait of Hormuz. The Strait is the 35 mile-wide entrance to the Gulf. What does worry them is that Kuwait and Saudi Arabia are in danger of being drawn into the Iran-Iraq War.

Administration officials indicated that the U.S. would take military action only in conjunction with allies such as Britain and France, both of which have warships nearby, and at the request of Arab governments. The U.S. could count on a five-ships naval task force of its own already in the gulf. A seven-ship battle group, led by the carrier Kitty Hawk is in the northern Arabian Sea, but too far from gulf oil terminals to deter attacks.

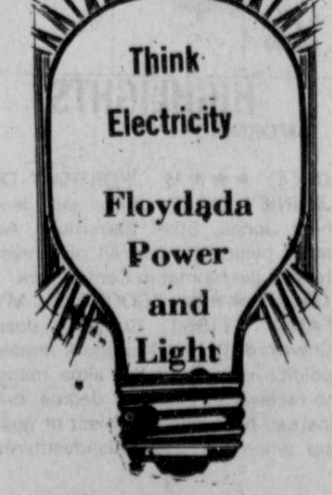
