Shaw named Businessman of the Month at Rotary

The Lockney Rotary Club, in their continuing program to promote the businesses of Lockney recognized Kelton and Sally Shaw as their business man and wife of the month for January.

Kelton is the owner, operator of Patterson Grain Company, Inc. He has been associated with the business since 1949 after his graduation from Texas A&M University. The company includes grain elevators in Lockney and the Lone Star Communities. Sally works in the office. In addition to owning the elevators Shaw also farms and raises cattle.

Patterson Grain is one of the oldest family-owned businesses in Lockney, having been founded in 1921 by Sally's father, Roy E. Patterson. He originally opened the business and established cotton gins. In 1937 the grain elevator was added to the business. Shaw purchased complete ownership of the business in 1970 after Patterson's death.

Sally is a Lockney native, having completed high school here and then

going on to Texas Women's University and Texas Tech. Shaw completed his last seven years of school in Lockney when his father came to Lockney as the pastor of the First Baptist Church. In addition to attending Texas A&M, Kelton also served as a B-29 navigator in the Pacific theater in WWII.

The Shaws were married in 1947. They have two children, Carlton and Amy. Carlton lives in Lockney and is associated with his father at Patterson Grain. Carlton and wife Louise have one child, Courtney Aaron. Amy graduated from Lockney school in 1983 and is presently a student at Baylor University.

In the past Shaw has served as a city councilman for several years. He has been a member of the Lockney School Board for the past 14 years, having been reelected to that position in March of 1984. He is also on the board of directors of the First National Bank in Floydada. He is a deacon in the First Baptist Church. He and Sally are very active in their church.

Cogdell Trust donates computer for hospital

Terry Keltz, administrator of Lockney General Hospital, addressed the issue of how the recent changes in medicare laws are affecting rural hospitals.

He prefaced his remarks with a recommendation that Medicare recipients obtain "Your Medicare Handbook" from the Social Security office in Plainview.

Keltz accredited the "catalyst of all this turmoil" to the Reagan Administration through its strategy of drastically cutting Federal spending.

"This has, of course, resulted in price freezes, reductions, and terminations of various government and non-governmental programs. He referred to the proposal recently made by President Reagan to his cabinet for the cutting of Federal spending that involves freezes on some programs at existing levels, deep cuts in many others, and the outright elimination of still others.

Reviewing some legislation in the recent past, Keltz said the Secretary of Health and Human Services, Margaret Heckler, presented Congress with a plan December 27, 1983. The plan, entitled "Hospital Prospective Payment for Medicare," after some revision, was made into law on April 10, 1983. The goals of the system were to control medicare payment to providers, to enable accurate budget development by "knowing what will be paid to hospit-

als," and to make inefficient providers more productive by limiting payment levels to providers. The system provides for hospitals to be paid for care rendered to patients based upon a predetermined, fixed schedule, according to Keltz, which may vary according to geographical location of the hospital, patient age, diagnosis, and specific treatments.

"There are some good things that can be said about medicare's PPS. It is controlling expenditures in the medicare program which will hopefully provide longevity to the program by creating an incentive for cost containment for hospitals," Keltz said. "However, there is something about the program that I am discovering people have a hard time believing."

Keltz went on to explain that PPS funds would be paid at a set rate and no more, even if a patient, an elderly person for example, did not respond to treatment within the prescribed time. He further explained that the hospital could not bill the patient for the remaining amount, because medicare law strictly prohibits it. He said, "The answer is, of course, that the hospital has to absorb the cost."

In 1984 the Deficit Reduction Act brought about two major changes, to which Keltz referred. The first, a fifteen

Coop gets new Big Wheels

The Lockney Cooperatives board of directors are proud to announce the arrival of their new Big Wheels fertilizer truck. The truck was delivered to the Coop last Friday evening and is ready for use now.

The truck has a 1600 gallon tank and 55 foot booms which will cover 16 rows at one time. The truck is also equipped with an acre counter.

The new truck will be used to put out liquid fertilizer and also yellow herbicides such as Treflan and Prowl. With the new truck, farmers can have both the yellow herbicides and liquid fertilizer put out in one application, saving the farmer time and money.

Coop manager Delton Stone said "There was a need in the community for

this type of equipment and the board of directors at the Coop felt there was a need to make the fertilizer department here stronger than it was." Stone also commented that area farmers with a total of 10,000 combined acres have expressed a desire to use the new fertilizer truck.

Robert Delgado, a longtime employee of the Coop, will be the operator of the new truck. He commented that "If I could keep the tank full all the time, the truck could cover 100 acres per hour."

The truck was expected to be in the field Monday of this week and is ready for use by area farmers. If one would like to have the truck used in his field, more information may be obtained by calling the Lockney Coop at 652-3377.

Keltz said with much enthusiasm, "I am happy to announce that, thanks to the Martha Ann Cogdell Hospital Trust Fund, we are now in the process of purchasing an IBM Mini System 36 to meet our data processing needs. The new computer will allow us to retrieve information vital to managerial decisions in minutes, and it will also give us the capacity to monitor accounts receivable, on a daily basis if we choose."

Keltz concluded, "To some the outlook for health care organizations looks gloomy. As a manager of a small rural hospital in Lockney, Texas, I am excited because the future presents a challenge to survive that adds meaning to each day as we strive to meet the demands of an ever changing environment."

The construction of an interstate highway in Florida is playing havoc to the Florida panther and its habitat. Work to complete Interstate 75, which runs from Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan to Naples, Florida cannot start. The widening of Alligator Alley, a two-lane toll road, would complete I-75 eastward to Interstate 95 in Fort Lauderdale.

Complicating construction plans is the road's path through Big Cypress Swamp, one of the region's most sensitive wetlands and home of the Florida panther. Today, the panther is on the government's list of endangered species and its sanctuary is being squeezed by the advance of civilization. In the past ten years, seven panthers

have been killed on south Florida highways. State officials estimate that there are 20 to 30 panthers left.

Florida and the Interior Department already had planned to buy 165,000 acres of land around the road to protect the panther's habitat. However, with the widening of the Alligator Alley, the state is asking for more. It also is seeking 40 new bridges solely to allow safe passage for panthers and other animals. Such a plan would cost from 18 to 24 million dollars or almost 1 million per panther.

However, regardless of the cost, it would be an endearing act to protect such a lithe and mobile animal from civilization.



Turner is featured artist

Don Turner, a native of Turkey and a western artist, will be featured in a show of his bronze sculptures and art works at the First National Bank in Lockney on Friday, January 11, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Turner is the cousin of **Billy Joe Turner**, manager of Lockney's Consumers Fuel Association.

Turner terms himself first and foremost as a cowboy but his accomplishments as an artist are renowned. He says his art is a natural outgrowth of years of watching, listening and learning to be a cowboy. When in high school he was more interested in drawing than in studying and in time his ag teacher found it better to encourage his interest in drawing than to discourage it.

After his graduation from high school in Turkey, Turner became a full time cowboy with a rope in one hand and a sketch book in the other. He worked for a rancher who showed Hereford cattle; He, in turn, showed some of Turner's drawings to the staff of **Cattleman's Magazine** in Fort Worth. For the next three years he was the staff artist for that magazine even though he had no formal training in color, form or style.

Turner found himself missing the life of a cowboy and returned to ranch work, working for **John Woodward** at **Tarzan** in **Martin County**. While working there he met **Bobby Sale** of the **V-Bar Ranch** in **Stanton**. Sale was a collector of Paul

Tadlock bronzes. One day he showed Turner's drawings to **Tadlock** who encouraged him to try bronze work.

To day, Turner has made eight bronzes. In November of 1984 he received an invitation to the **Tucson Mountain Oyster Club Western Art Show**. This show is by invitation only and recognized him as an outstanding Western artist.

From idea to finished product a bronze sculpture takes a considerable amount of time. First Turner starts with an idea which he translates to numerous sketches and, if it happens to be of a horse or cattle, he also takes photographs from every angle possible. Next comes a wire skelton and finally he uses wax from the bone structure out to the finished piece. At this point the piece goes to the foundry to be cast in bronze. A three to four week wait follows before the piece is ready for show and sale.

Of himself and his work as a cowboy and an artist, Turner said, "First I'm a cowboy and second I'm an artist."

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


