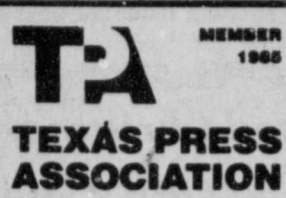
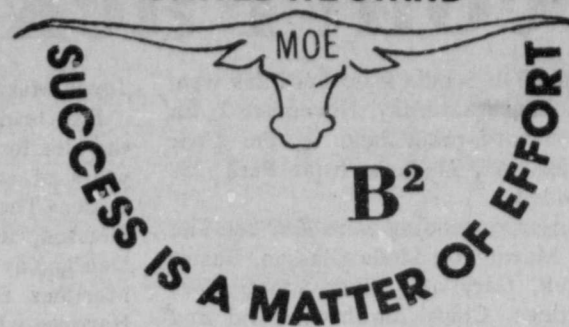

Bigham set to receive National FFA award

Gary Bigham of Lockney has been nominated to receive the American Farmer degree, highest degree presented by the National FFA Organization. Bigham was nominated for the degree by the Texas FFA Association. The nomination was approved at a recent meeting of the National FFA Board of Directors in Alexandria, Virginia, virtually assuring the awarding of the degree. One of 658 FFA members nominated for the American Farmer degree, Bigham will receive the degree in a special ceremony on Friday, November 15, at the 58th National FFA Convention in Kansas City, Missouri, pending a final vote of 114 student delegates representing nearly half a million FFA members.

Travel awards will be presented to American Farmer degree recipients to offset their travel expenses to the National FFA Convention in Kansas City. At the convention each American Farmer degree recipient will be presented a gold key and certificate. The travel awards and gold keys are co-sponsored by J I Case, A Tenneco Company, Racine, Wisconsin; Cyanamid Agricultural Division, Wayne, New Jersey; NA-CHURS Plant Food Company, Marion, Ohio; The Nation's Federal Land Banks, Denver, Colorado; The Nation's Production Credit Associations, Denver, Colorado, and Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc., Des Moines, Iowa.

The American Farmer degree is much sought after because it is only presented to approximately one member in 600 of the 434,090 member organization. It is presented only by the National FFA Organization to members who have demonstrated exceptional agricultural and leadership achievements.

Bigham is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Bigham of Lockney and is currently enrolled at West Texas State University and farms in the summer months with his father Bill and grandfather Al Bigham.

He earned the American Farmer degree on the basis of having a supervised farm employment record and also working his own portion of land for which he was responsible for the planting, harvesting and all other aspects of making a crop on said land.

Lockney High School agriculture instructor and FFA advisor is Randall Robbins.

To qualify for the American Farmer degree, FFA members must have advanced through a system of degrees unique to the FFA organization. FFA members begin as Greenhands and after one year of membership may be advanced by the local chapter to the degree of "Chapter Farmer". The third degree, that of "State Farmer" is presented by the State FFA Association to not more than three percent of the State's FFA membership in any one year. Only students who have earned the State Farmer degree are eligible for the American Farmer degree.

The National FFA Convention is an annual event and is carried out in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Education. This year over 20,000 FFA members, agriculture teachers, parents and guests are expected to take part in the 58th National FFA Convention, November 14-16, 1985.

The convention is conducted entirely by student members between the ages of 14 and 21. Six national FFA officers take charge of all business sessions and 114 official delegates represent the membership in voting and all issues of business.

In addition to the American Farmer degree, many other FFA awards are presented during the convention. Several guest speakers of national prominence address the convention audience and entertainment is interspersed with the business. The convention is the largest annual youth convention in the nation. It closes on Saturday afternoon with the installation of six new national FFA officers.

Army Cobra helicopter to land in Lockney

Students at Lockney High School will have an opportunity to learn about Army aviation on November 19. An Army Cobra attack helicopter and its two-man crew will be on display at the school from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The Cobra, on loan from Fort Hood, Texas, is part of the swiftest and deadliest Army maneuver units on the modern battlefield, the attack helicopter company.

The 10,000-pound combat helicopter with an average cruising speed of 130 knots saw extensive service in Vietnam. In recent years the TOW wire-guided

missile has been added to the Cobra to enable the helicopter to destroy enemy tanks and armored personnel carriers.

Two Cobra pilots, Chief Warrant Officer 3 Pete Lautzenheiser and Warrant Officer 1 Todd Miller, will explain how a high school graduate can become an Army aviator.

Sergeant First Class Kenny White, Army recruiter for Lockney High School, will also be present at the display to discuss the \$100,000 of flight training the Army can provide as well as other enlisted jobs available in aviation maintenance and air traffic control.

Horns one game away from title

The Lockney Longhorns moved one step closer to the 1985 district title last Friday night with a 27 to 12 win over the Lorenzo Hornets in Lorenzo.

The Horns took the lead with 7:38 left in the first quarter. Lorenzo had the ball on their own 20 yard line and fumbled. The Horns recovered and began their first scoring drive from the Hornets 17 yard line. Matt Mitchell took the first handoff and carried for another first down on the hosts seven yard line. Three plays later Mitchell again took the handoff and ran one yard for the Horns first score. Ben Schuster made the extra point and the Horns were in the lead to stay.

The Horns scored again in the first quarter. This scoring drive began on the Horns own 49 yard line and five plays later Matt Mitchell carried the ball six yards for the second touchdown of the night. Schusters extra point was again good and the Horns lead by a score of 14 to 0. With 0:48 left in the first quarter a field goal attempt was no good.

Lorenzo's first score of the night came with 5:04 left in the half, when Lockney fumbled the ball and the Hornets took possession on their own 16 yard line. Two plays later Ronnie Young escaped down the sideline and ran 70 yards for the touchdown. The extra point failed and at the half the score was Horns 14, Hornets 6.

Lockney dominated the second half of

the game and scored again with 10:35 left in the third quarter. Tony Banda returned a Lorenzo punt to the Lockney 37 yard line and two plays later quarterback Steven Cates hit Johnny Torrez for a 65 yard touchdown pass. Schuster again made the extra point and Lockney was ahead 21 to 6.

With 7:50 left in the third quarter Matt Mitchell took a handoff from Cates and ran 27 yards for Lockneys final scoring drive of the game. The extra point attempt failed but the Horns were leading 27 to 6.

Lorenzo's final score came with just 0:40 left in the game. The extra point failed and the Horns added another win to the list.

Players of the week include Randy Race and Johnny Silva as the offensive linemen, Matt Mitchell as the offensive back or receiver, Lupe Basaldua as the forcing unit player, Johnny Torrez on the secondary, and Rusty Teeter on special team. The Big Hits of the Week go to George and Lupe Basaldua. The Horn of the Week was David Sutterfield.

Of this weeks game with Ralls, Coach Bob Purser said, "Ralls is good. They have won six games and they have one of the best offensive rushers on the South Plains. They will be tough. At the beginning of the season they were picked to win district and the game will be one of the hardest hitting games we have played."

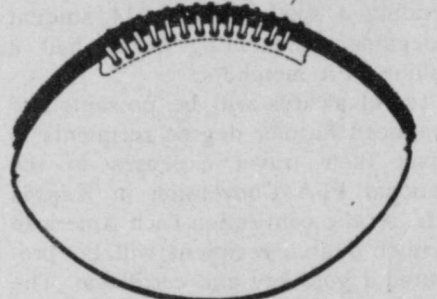

The Lockney Parent Advisory Council or P.A.C. group met last Monday for the first meeting of this school year for the purpose of electing officers for the 1985-86 school year.

Parent's suggestions help in improving the federal programs for their children.

Several guest speakers addressed the gathered parents. Superintendent of schools W.H. Hallmark spoke on the federal grant application that is filled each year. He told the parents that the application is on file and that they are welcome to view it at any time.

Terry Ellison discussed the tutorial program that is offered by the school system. The tutorial programs are in both junior high and high school and are for the students that are having problems in classes. The tutorial programs enable the students to get extra, individual help in the classes when they are having problems. Ellison said, "It is also the responsibility of the parents to encourage their children to attend the tutorial classes."

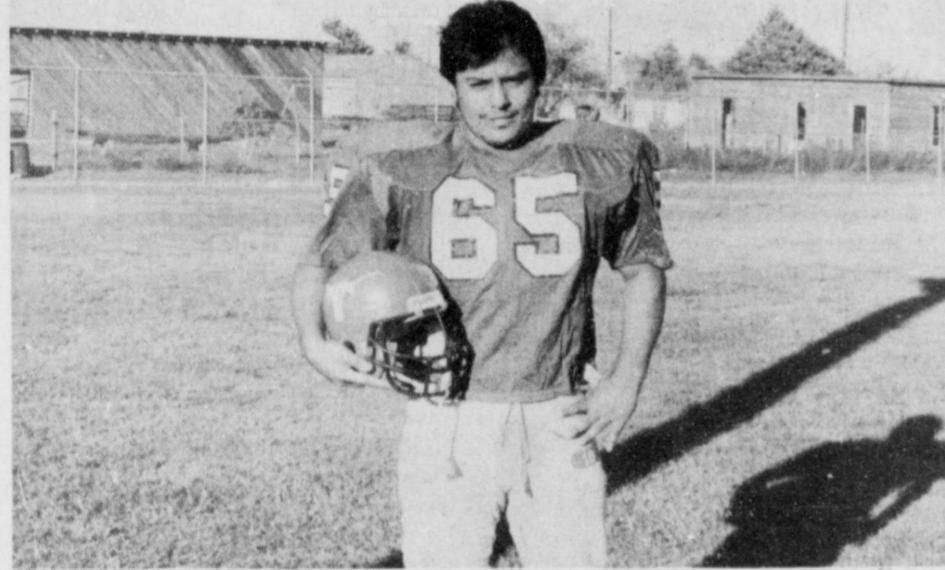

The First Step

On All Saints' Day, last November first, the Gospel to be read in Catholic churches was Matthew 5:1-12, "the Beatitudes". It is always amazing to me how one or the other of these sayings of Jesus will stand out, usually as a result of what's going on in my life. But each year it is the same. One of these blessings leap off the pages of the Sacred Scriptures demanding particular attention.

"Blest are they who show mercy" or "Happy are the merciful", those who know how to forgive - which is another way of saying: happy are they who can take the first step. There's nothing more revolutionary than someone who, right in the middle of a feud, suddenly turns around and forgives. We're all such monkeys by nature! What someone does to us we do to him - either the same thing or worse. And there's no way out, since we've drawn an infernal circle about ourselves and can only pace around it, calmly and coldly, forever. Indeed, how can we get anywhere, seeing that we've agreed to disagree once and for all?

There's only one solution, and that's for us to conceive the stupendous idea of starting to love someone who doesn't love us. Then we'll be doing something new. When we render blow for blow, we are just imitating the other guy; whereas if we don't strike back but rather forgive and show signs of love, and if we say, "Look, now, we can't go on like this. It's all too petty, too stupid. Let's make up: there's so much more to life!" If we do that, we produce something absolutely unprecedented on earth; we dynamite the prison which discord, slowly but steadily, built about us. As it is now, if we take someone's cloak, we can be sure he will refuse us his tunic (Matthew 5:40). That's how we expect him to act, and we are not the least bit surprised. But suppose he did give us his tunic, we would be stunned. Who ever heard of such a thing! Recall the Gospel text, "No one's ever done the like before", and we would say, "This man thinks for himself" and we, too, might start reconsidering the whole pattern and problem.

"Happy are the merciful" - those who manage to shake off the indolence that makes us follow suit all through life. Happy are those who break through the vicious circle of our tiresome squabbles, our rancor and our grudges. "You can't love only such as love you! Don't even the pagans do that?" (Matthew 5: 46-68). We must be different - original, as our heavenly Father is; merciful and, therefore, creative. God didn't let sin wall Him up in His heaven; He didn't conceal Himself behind a thunderhead, sulking because man was. When Adam hid among the trees, God didn't withdraw but took the first step, as He always does: "Where are you, Adam?" (Genesis 3:9) Come on, old man, let's start all over!" The only dealings that strike us as being sensible are invariably the ones that enslave us most: lending to people who will repay us in full, smiling at those who smile at us. But smiling at someone who will spit in our face and helping a man who will turn his back on us - those are free, creative acts.
