Kansas City Stock Report.

Kansas City Stock Yards
November 11, 1901

Cattle receipts during the past week have been only moderate and with the exception of stockers and common feeders all kinds of cattle have been in active demand. There was a noticeable falling off in the receipts of cull lots of range cows during the past week and all grades of cows were wanted at prices that ranged from steady to 20 cents higher as compared with the prevailing values of the week before. The highest advance secured was on stock cows and heifers the best heifer calves having sold at all the way from 4.50 up to 5.80. The best offerings of feeders sold up to 4.40 and all good lots were readily disposed of at satisfactory prices, but there was little demand for the commoner grades and local dealers accumulated some holdings that they were obliged to carry over the end of the week.

Corn fed cattle and desirable grass heaves sold well although the former showed a weaker tendency towards the close of the week. The top price for the week was reached on Tuesday when a lot of 1877 lb natives brought 6.00, and while there are no toppy grassers offered, competent salesmen quoted them as worth 5.00. The first fed steers of the winter were received in the Southern yards and consisted of four loads of the A. G. Pangill cattle from Kaufman, Texas, 2 loads of which averaged 991 lbs and sold at 4.50 and 2 loads 1064 lbs that realized 4.65. Range cattle were well received and sold generally at 3.00 to 4.00 and 50 to 60 cents higher than at the low time in October. The poorest of the Southern cows sold at 1.75 to 2.25 and fair to good lots at 2.40 to 3.00.

There was little change in the hog market during the week and the closing prices were about like those of the previous week. The consensus of opinion is that there will be little if any greater reduction in hog values for some time to come and that there need be no fear of not receiving remunerative prices for hogs fed on high priced grain. The best heavy hogs sell at 5.90 to 6.00; mixed and medium weights at 5.70 to 5.90; lights at 5.25 to 5.80, and desirable pigs at 5.00 to 5.35.
