Cattlemen are Fortunate.

In these days of prosperity for the beef trade, the man so fortunate as to be the owner of a promising bunch of cattle ought to be regarded as a capitalist. For a time, the market prices were scarcely on a parallel with the rates charged by the retail butchers, but the disparity has gradually worn away. A month or half ago shipping and dressed beef steers brought \$6.70 to \$7.30 per hundred, but last week they sold at 7.35 to 8.25. While the packers would have been willing to advance the price of meat accordingly, they realized that the limit which the customer would pay had about been reached and that any further raise would simply have resulted in a curtailment of business. The "beef trust" agitation, too, appears to have had some effect, though the packers maintain as strongly as ever that there was no agreement between them.—Stock Journal.

Few Buffalo Left.

The total number of buffalo or bison, both full and mixed blood, in the United States is 1143, according to a report submitted to congress by the interior department, based on correspondence with various states. Of this number 72 are running wild, of which 50 are in Colorado and the remainder in the Yellowstone national park. The number of buffalo or bison domesticated or in captivity, including full and mixed blood is 1071. The total number of the pure blood buffalo in the United States is 986 and the mixed bloods 175. The total number of buffalo or bison in Canada is 669. Of these 600 are pure blood, running wild. In countries outside of North America the interior department estimates that there are 128 buffalo or bison, all of which are believed to be in captivity. In the United States the domesticated buffalo appear to be increasing.—Texas Stock Journal.

Advanced the Price.

The price of all lands in Lynn county thrown on the market for sale has been fixed at \$2.00 per acre, and over in Terry the price is \$1.50 per acre. The meeting of the Northwest Texas Fair Association to be held at Quanah Aug. 19-22 will be the best in the history of the Association. Arrangements are already under way, and a number of new and interesting features will be introduced for the entertainment of the people. 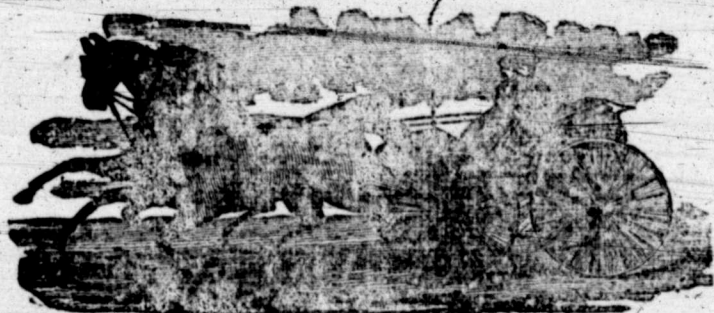

The Monument to General Beauregard.

At the approaching reunion of the Louisiana Division of the United Confederate Veterans one of the most important matters will be the completion of the collection of the sum requisite to erect a monument to General Beauregard. The South owes Beauregard a statue. He was one of the most distinguished of the sons of the south, one of the six full generals in the service of the Confederate States.

Pierre Gustave Tontant Beauregard was born near New Orleans in the year 1818. At the age of 20 he graduated at West Point with high rank and was placed in the engineer corps. During the Mexican war, at the siege of Vera Cruz, in reconnaissance before the battle of Cerro Gordo, and in battles in the valley of Mexico he served with great distinction. He was wounded in the assault on Belen Gate. He was twice breveted for gallantry in action. At the outbreak of the civil war he had just been appointed superintendent of the United States military academy at West Point, which position he resigned to enter the Confederate army.

At the first battle of Bull Run, at Shiloh, where he was second in command to General Albert Sidney Johnston, at Charleston, at Drury's Bluff, at Petersburg, General Beauregard served with great distinction. He fortified Charleston so impreguably that it resisted every assault by land and sea. Admiral Du Pont's squadron and Admiral Dahlgren's fleet and General Gilmore's army attacked the city in vain. After the war, General Beauregard was offered the chief command of the Romaninan army and the chief command of the army of the Khedive of Egypt, both of which offers he declined.

As in the pictures of history the pictures stand out of Caesar at Pharsalia, of Napoleon at Austerlitz, of Lee at Chancellorsville, so is fixed the figure of Beauregard at Bull Run. No Confederate veteran or son of Confederate veteran nor reader of history can forget the little general waving his red cap at the soldiers of the Georgia regiment who were the first to drive back the Federal line into that retreat which ended in the twenty-mile run to Washington. "Gentlemen of the Eighth Georgia," General Beauregard cried, "I salute you. History will never forget you."

The South owes a statue to Beauregard in memory of his distinguished services to the Confederacy.
