Despite the seeming enormity of the income tax bite, it takes about ten average income tax payments to equal the salary of a postal employee or send one soldier through basic training.

Two Dimmitt Teachers Win Scholarships

Mrs. Inez Robinson to Continue Science Studies At University This Summer

Mrs. Inez Robinson is a woman who feels keenly her responsibilities as science teacher in Dimmitt High School. She has brought the latest in teaching methods and science curriculum to the local school system—and this summer she will be assisted in her work for the second time through a scholarship.

The scholarship will be about \$700 for her studies at the University of Texas, one of the leading centers of studies in the sciences in the state. Mrs. Robinson is one of about 60 teachers selected for the summer studies from throughout the state. Specifically, she will be attending a study course known as the Summer Institute of Science Mathematics Teaching Center at the University and her scholarship is sponsored by the National Science Foundation.

Mrs. Robinson holds a masters National Science Foundation.

Mrs. Don Smith to Study At Peabody With \$9,000 Grant In School Psychology

A \$9,000 fellowship is quite a windfall—and very few high school teachers every get such an opportunity for continuing their education.

But Mrs. Don Smith, an English teacher in Dimmitt Public Schools, had such a thing offered and she accepted it last week.

A fellowship is similar to a scholarship and the funds will be payable in amounts of \$1,800 the first year, \$2,000 the second year, \$2,400 the third and \$2,800 the fourth year.

Mrs. Smith will go to Peabody College in Nashville where she will take the Training Program in School Psychology sponsored by the National Institute of Mental Health. This means that she will work first on her master's degree then her doctorate.

Mr. Smith will also leave the Dimmitt School System where he teaches the sixth grade to continue his education.

When Mrs. Smith completes her final year, which will be internship, she hopes to work as a public school psychologist or counselor. When her course is finished, she will also be qualified to teach on the college level.

Mrs. Smith graduated from Arkansas State Teachers College in Conway and from Little Rock High School in Little Rock, Arkansas. She holds a bachelor's degree in mathematics with a minor in English.

Since her work starts with the fall semester, this will be Mr. and Mrs. Smith's last semester with the Dimmitt School system. "We have liked Dimmitt," Mrs. Smith says, "but an opportunity like this is something we simply can't ignore."

By observing and considering recommendations being made by similar committees in other counties, the local group recommended that the state establish a minimum salary of \$4,200 for teachers holding bachelors degrees, and annual increases through the next ten years making it possible for a teacher to earn a maximum salary of \$7,200 with a masters degree.

The group agreed that, while teacher performance is an important factor in determining a salary scale, years of experience and hours of college work are the only realistic ways by which the effectiveness of teaching can be determined. Furthermore the study group decided that continuing effort

to improve the competence of teachers is necessary and should be controlled by local school officials.

The committee's report has been submitted to the state committee and will be integrated with reports from similar committees in the other 253 counties. The compendium of this and the other three sub-committees reports will later be submitted to the state legislature for action.

The Castro County committee was composed of Mrs. Charles Martin, chairman; Mrs. W. E. Beecher, D. C. Lawrence, A. R. Bostick, Mrs. Bose Abram, Mrs. Leo Witkowski, and Mrs. L. Eual Robinson.

There are seventeen teacher vacancies in Castro County according to a report from the Hale-Aikin Committee of twenty-four currently studying the needs of schools in the county.

Not only are there seventeen vacancies, but fourteen additional teachers are working without proper certificates, meaning that the county is short some thirty-one qualified teachers.

To meet future instructional program and service needs, thirty-eight more teachers will be needed for the period of 1958-1963.

The Hale-Aikin Studies conducted in each of the 254 counties of the state has been completed recently in Castro County. The county committee was divided into four sub-committees, one of which was to study the teacher need, both present and future.

"The state recognizes several factors as of major importance in the recruiting of qualified teachers into the teaching field," a committee spokesman said. "These factors are salary, job satisfaction, opportunity to make a career of teaching, opportunity to continue learning, love of children and desire for service, teacher retirement benefits, and tenure, contractual relations, adequacy of facilities, and other working conditions. The local committee found that an increase of salary and provision of living quarters are needed to promote living conditions in this county to a level which would attract young people to choose teaching as a career. It also found that while in most instances tenure, contractual relations, load and facilities were satisfactory in Castro County, there are conditions in the county which need state control. It was found that teacher retirement benefits are not equal to retirement provisions of industry and the armed forces.

"From the study of teacher turnover in this county for the past two years, it was found that in the majority teachers had left the county for increased pay, either in the teaching field or in industry."
