Why not try the Newspaper Men?

We do not wish to criticise such men as Carnegie, Rockefeller, Morgan, and others in their philanthropic desire to better mankind through churches and educational institutions, yet we believe if they would widen out their charity and take in the scribes and newspaper men they could do a good deal of good. Dry Farming Explained.

Altogether "dry farming" is attracting more attention in the semi-arid belt than anything which has ever come before the citizens of that portion of the western states. By "dry farming" is meant cultivation, without irrigation in any form whatever of those millions of acres of semi-arid lands, in the great West, which are now turned over to cattlemen, the prairie dog, rattlesnake and the owls. A small portion of these lands have been placed under ditches and are being irrigated producing heavy returns on all crops. But if the efforts of those interested in "dry farming" prove successful, there will be added to the cultivated hundreds of millions of acres of land now considered valuable only for grazing purposes.

The system used in dry farming is simple. Late in the summer the soil is ploughed very deep. It is then layed over in loose furrows, and when the meager rainfall comes, the loose soil retains the moisture where it would not even remain damp in hard ground. To prevent evaporation the soil is loosely scratched. The following

spring the crop is put in the same manner as in other states. Crops are raised only every other year however under this system, the ground being permitted to rest each alternating year.

Already several small farmers in eastern Wyoming have succeeded in securing a yield of 35 bushels per acre of first class wheat, where formerly no wheat whatever was grown except under the irrigation ditch. Equally as large crops of corn, alfalfa and sugar beets are promised to those who follow the same course of cultivation.

Those who have been experimenting with the system for several years declare their lands to increase in power to hold water from year to year, and state that with five years of dry farming, they will produce equally as well as the best lands in Iowa and Illinois under the most favorable conditions.—Globe Democrat.



RAILROAD NOTES.

The "Southern" railroad project has taken an altogether new turn if the following special dispatch to the Dallas News is worthy of credit. This special comes from Austin and reads like unto this:

"Considerable activity has been noticed in the matter of building the Colorado, Texas and Mexico, which was projected four or five years ago, twenty-five miles of the grade completed and then the project dropped. It has been revived and work is to be carried on out of Abilene on a large scale. For various reasons the construction was abandoned in the early life of the company, but it has a new lease, and at a meeting of stockholders on the 10th inst., arrangements were made for building the line as originally planned.

"The charter calls for a line from Washburn, on the Fort Worth and Denver City, a short distance below Amarillo, 400 miles south to Comfort, on the San Antonio and Aransas Pass, crossing the Texas and Pacific at Abilene, to use the twenty-five miles of grade completed. It has been suspected that one

of the trunk lines is behind the road and constitutes the new life injected into it, as a statement has been made that ample capital has been secured to push the road to completion."
