FARMER'S CONGRESS—AMARILLO.

All the arrangements are perfected for the first annual Panhandle Farmer's Congress, to be held in Amarillo on Friday and Saturday, August 11 and 12. The list of speakers includes some of the best authorities in America in their particular lines, offering practical instruction on a range of topics that has never been approached in the western country, and which will be of priceless value to the people of the plains country.

Perhaps the most noticeable figure is that of H. W. Campbell, whose theory in regard to soil culture in the semi arid belt has been found so valuable the past two years, and whose experiment station at Bovina is under close observation in all parts of the great prairies where the conditions are the same.

Col. Parker Earle, of Roswell, perhaps the greatest authority on apple growing in America, and a man of international reputation, will speak on "The Horticultural Future of the High Western Plains."

Prof. Alfred Gaskill, of the United States Division of Forestry, has been assigned by the Secretary of the Interior to speak on "Forestry and its relation to the Farmer and Citizen of Semi-arid America."

J. B. Buchanan, of Ft. Worth, will speak on "Kaffir Corn and Hogs," one of the phases of development that appeals most strongly to the western farmer.

W. S. Marshall, of Channing, will speak on "Alfalfa," and his address will be founded upon actual experience.

A. H. Leidigh, director of the experiment station at Channing, will speak on "Cereals on the Great Plains."

Congressman John H. Stephens, of Vernon, will speak on "What the Government is Willing to do for the Farmer."

Prof. J. C. Craig, of the Texas A. & M. College, will speak on "Forage Crops."

One of the representatives of Swift & Co. will speak on "The Value of Kaffir Corn for Feeding."

John S. Kerr, of Sherman, will speak on "Small Fruits."

In the Round Table which will conclude the program, Judge O. H. Nelson will speak on "De-horning," and there will be addresses on cotton and many other topics of real interest.

There will be many other features to interest the visiting farmers and sightseers. All of the farmers in the Panhandle are invited to bring samples of their produce which will be properly displayed and accredited.

District Court

Convened Monday morning and grand jury sworn in with R. W. O'Keefe as foreman.
