PROSPERITY ABOUNDETH.

It rained Friday and nearly all Friday night and again on Sunday. The fall, all told, was several inches and it puts the finishing on all this season's grain crop and also the fall forage crops. These are and will be no doubt the best and most prolific on record. The grass has been good all along from the beginning, green all summer, and these rains will impart to it a freshness and a growth that should satisfy the most exacting.

And again these rains have put a fine season in the ground for the sowing of wheat. Where the ground has already been turned over in preparation for this crop, sowing should begin as soon as the condition of the ground will permit. The most successful wheat raiser this writer ever knew, always began sowing wheat on the full moon in September, rain or shine, wet or dry, and he made wheat when all his neighbors failed. He always said that he preferred to sow in the dust but he sowed as previously stated, anyway. It was not so much that the moon had anything to do with it, although the sower mentioned in this instance had a decided

leaning that way, but it was rather based on the theory that the grain should root before freezing weather. And if this be important in lower altitudes and farther south, it is surely so here. To those who have their ground broken and ready for the seeder, and all who contemplated sowing could have been thus fixed had they but tried, these good rains are a special blessing.

Not only Randall County crops are in apple pie order, but everything else about our little commonwealth is in fine "kilter" and prosperity aboundeth.

A bit of what writers call "humane interest" comes out of the fever situation in Louisiana. A number of towns ordered large quantities of sulphur for fumigation and received bills for the same, but across the face of them the Union Sulphur Company had written the word "paid." Possibly corporations have no souls, as is so often claimed, but one thing is certain, there are several towns in Louisiana that are not likely to forget the kindness of the Union Sulphur Company. —Coleman Voice.

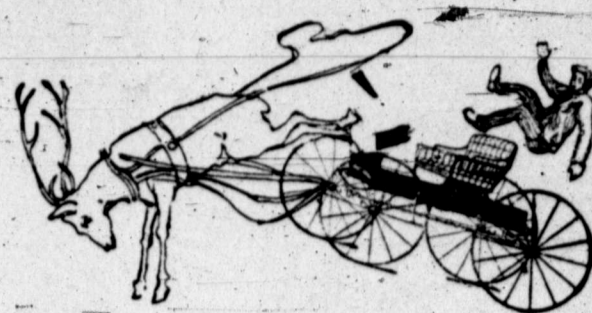

Late Railroad News.

Saturday last the promoters of the new road met with the citizens of Plainview and in addition to right of way through Hale County, previously agreed to, the promoters required at the hands of Plainview \$25,000 cash and an option to purchase 30,000 acres of Hale County land. According to The News information, which it considers good, the bonus was agreed upon and a committee was also appointed to secure the land options. These are to be gotten as soon as possible. It is thought that it will be done in a few days, by the first of Oct. at the very outside, and then Plainview with the Tallmages will enter into a contract by the terms of which the latter will get the bonus in cash, the right of way and the options and in consideration therefor will put up a forfeit of \$35,000 for the completion of the road to that town.

Tulia has entered into practically the same agreement except that her cash bonus will be \$20,000.

It would seem from this that the promoters are in dead earnest about the matter. Anyway, by October, The News is now of the opinion that such action will have been taken as will enable a close observer to predict with considerable degree of certainty as to whether or not the road will be built and, if so, when.

Another Bank.

Canyon City is to have another bank. Among the incorporators are R. W. O'Keefe, Dr. Black, I. L. Hunt, W. C. Baird and Chas. Burrows. The charter provides for a capital stock of \$30,000.

Union printers are striking all over the State. Those of Dallas walked out this week. They want an eight hour day.

Coffee Bros. have the contract for two new houses to begin at once. One of them is for the county judge and is to be in character a duplicate of the Reese Huff residence now in process of construction; the other is for Travis Shaw and is to be a modern cottage of three rooms with other accessories, to cost about \$900.

R. W. O'Keefe bought through L. G. Conner, from J. W. Reid the lot upon which his, Conner's, office is now situated at \$500, and the Dr. Stewart lot joining said corner lot on the south at \$300. This time Conner will have to move his office and do it between now and the first.
