## THE TEXAS PLAINS and ITS RAINFALL.

Not very far back in the history of this "our country," the United States, all that portion west of the "Father of Waters"—the Mississippi River—was considered as dry, arid soil unfit for almost any purpose save grazing and as a breeding place for grasshoppers. This contention gradually gave way to experience but later on the same position was taken with regard to that vast scope of country covered by what is known as the "Louisiana Purchase." "Where not swamp, it is a dry, barren wilderness," said one of this country's great men in Congress at the time negotiations were being carried on with Napoleon for its purchase. History now refutes this also. Even worse things were said of the Llano Estacado—the Plains Country. On account of its size and supposed sterility, it was put down on the early maps as the "Great American Desert." And the strange part of it is that even until recent years, within the memory of some who are yet young, this was taken to be true. As recent as twenty years ago, Texans accepted this dogma as gospel truth, and only ten years back the Plains country was considered as only fit for pasture purposes. The chief reason, no doubt, for its remain-

ing so long practically unknown as to climatic conditions, even to Texans, lay in the fact that during some season of the year water was not to be had on the major portion of it. Twenty years ago nothing was known of the pure fresh water sea that underlayed the Texas Plains and it is to this discovery more than any other that the development of these vast prairies began. Then came the railroads, towns sprang up as if by magic, people began to turn the virgin soil and test its capacity and now the experiments have proven successful, almost an empire in size extends the welcome hand to farmers in search of homes.

Those of us who have been here for any length of time are familiar with all these things. If this knowledge extended to folks of the Middle States, we would witness such a rush of people down here to buy homes as was never before seen anywhere, but they don't know the real condition of things here and it remains for us who seek to develop this country to bring the facts before them. One of the first things to impress upon their minds is, that we have sufficient rainfall to insure staple crops. And perhaps the best way to do this is by comparison.

By referring to the tabulated statement at the top of this article, it will be observed that the Plains rainfall comes, the bulk of it, within the growing

season, April to September inclusive. This tabulated statement shows that we really have more water for the crops, at the time actually needed, than the same authority shows for the Central Western portion of Texas, which is now and has been for years a proved agricultural section. Again in comparison, take the Government report for the same period of time at the following points and the showing made is as follows:

The general average for all of these points in round numbers is 21 inches and while the general average of the Plains for the time cited is a little below this, yet this discrepancy is

more than compensated for from the fact that the days and nights are much cooler here and the evaporation not near so rapid as in lower altitudes. Then, again, the rain on the Plains is more evenly distributed as to amount falling at one time and the overflow or waste need be little if the ground be properly prepared to receive it. These conditions taken in connection with a soil that is unsurpassed for fertility, ought to and will make of this Plains country a good farming belt.

**A FAMILIAR TEST.**

Down where the editor of The News hails from, the Twentieth Senatorial district, it has, ever since the day of the old Greenback party, been a battle ground royal in politics. The "Greenbackers" were much in evidence for about four years, beginning with 1882, sending Col. G. W. Jones to Congress and electing many other officers. Then the Democrats got it in for each other. It was Cleveland and Anti Cleveland, goldbug and free silverite 16 to-ners. Then came the Hogg and Clark bitterness, followed by Populist victories here and there. Four years ago Populism was in the evening of its finish and two years past, under the name "Independent ticket," it entered the night of its oblivion in so far as the old Twentieth is concerned.

Many good citizens who had followed the fortunes of populism until all hope departed, had determined to cast their lot with Democracy this year; some of them have even announced for office, subject to primary action, but, alas for them, the powers that be refuse the olive branch—they insist on the old familiar test, as follows:

"I am a white man and a Democrat; I did not vote against the nominees of the Democratic party in the last general election, and I will not oppose or vote against the nominees of the Democratic party in the next general election."

"Which test shall be printed at the top of each ballot, and no ticket shall be counted if said test is torn off, mutilated, or defaced; said ballots shall be prepared by the primary committee as provided by Sec. III of the general election law."

"Be it further resolved that by the term 'Democrat,' as used in the test, is meant one who subscribes to the principles of the Democratic party and affiliates with its organization, national, state and county."

are announced subject to Democratic primary action, and that at least five of them were at no very distant time leading Populists. The News man is well acquainted with each one of them and knows them to be as good citizens as any in the county and as well qualified for the offices sought as they need be, but in view of the test adopted they had as well give up the fight right now.

**Senator D. E. Decker.**

This week The News adds the name of Senator Decker to its announcement column. He is serving his first term and desires re-election. Like his opponent, Judge Veale, he is a native Texan. Upon leaving Georgetown University, where he finished his education, he entered business life through the country newspaper channel, founding the Tribune at Quanah. He next entered the profession of law in which he has been quite successful. He has stayed with Quanah and Northwest Texas and the people have stood by him in all his political aspirations. He has been county attorney, district attorney and Representative, and his people said "go up higher" and he entered the State Senate where, he says, he wants to remain for another term. In so far as The News knows, he has done his whole duty as a public servant; his ability is unquestioned and he seems to have used it for what he believed to be the best interests of his constituency. He has some ideas about legislation which The News indorses and some it doesn't, but then it is hard for men to agree upon all things—unreasonable even to expect it. On the Terrell election law monstrosity, he lined up with The News exactly when just before the late special session he said:

"The thing that the legislature should do when it meets in Austin is to repeal all that portion of the Terrell election law that covers all elections not state and then adjourn.
