## Abilene to Brownwood

A special from Brownwood to the Dallas News, dated June 11, relating to the proposed Santa Fe cut-off from the Panhandle to the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe says:

"A surveying corps, consisting of sixteen men, has arrived here and on tomorrow or next day will begin locating the Pecos and North-western Road from here to Abilene, which is supposed to be the Santa Fe cut-off. A. P. Kittrell, field engineer, has been busy all today getting things in shape to start out tomorrow. The route will be the same as surveyed for the Santa Fe cut-off some months ago. Chief Engineer F. M. Jones will be here by tomorrow.

**WHY NOT MR. BRYAN?**

Some months ago the News foreshadowed the coming over of the Cleveland element of the Democratic party to Mr. Bryan. This was ridiculed at the time by some of our exchanges as well as by some of our friends in this county.

Last week the Democrats of "old Missouri," in State convention assembled, at the suggestion of Ex-Governor Francis and other Cleveland men, unanimously indorsed Mr. Bryan as the Democratic head of the ticket for 1908. South Dakota, on a like occasion, fell into line and last but not least to follow suit to indorse this peerless man was our old reliable sister state of Arkansas.

Years ago the old Burnet Bulletin, at that time steered by the News editor, was among the very first papers in the State, if not the first one, to advocate Bryan for President on the Democratic ticket. What a storm of abuse was heaped upon Bryan then and by Democrats, too! It will be remembered by some that Joe Bailey denounced him as a populist, refusing for a long time to permit his, Joe Bailey's name, to go upon the same ticket with him. The Bulletin editor, then Democratic chairman, of his county, was actually petitioned to resign by many Democrats upon the grounds that, championing Mr. Bryan through the columns of his paper, he had become imbued with socialistic principles.

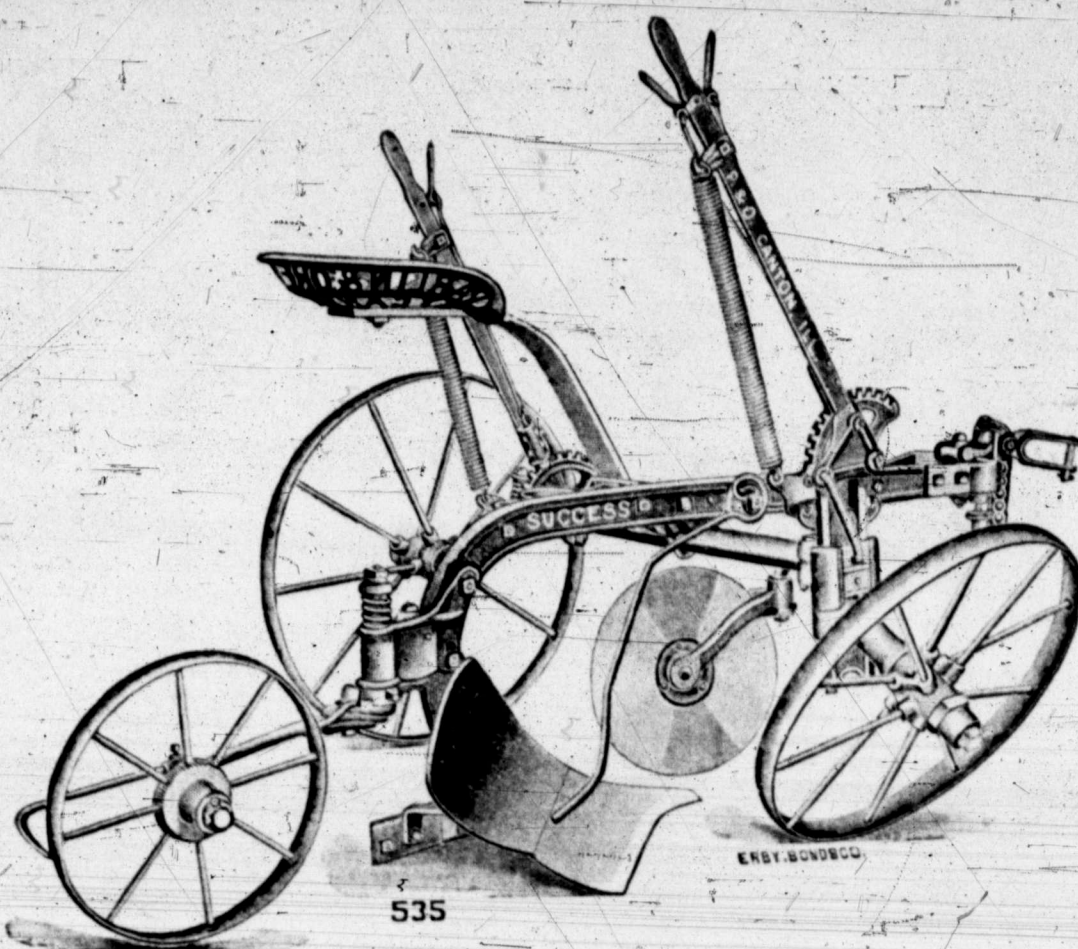
