



Sibley given additional appointments

State Sen. David Sibley was given three new appointments on Friday by Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock.

Sibley was named to the Advisory Commission on State Emergency Communications for a six-year term to expire Aug. 30, 2003. The 17-person commission includes appointees by the governor, lieutenant governor and speaker of the House of Representatives, as well as representatives from various state health. public safety and intergovernmental agencies.

The panel will oversee the administration and operations of a statewide 911 emergency communications network.

Sibley was appointed to the Research and Advisory Council on Worker's Compensation for a term to end Jan. 1, 1999. The council monitors the state's worker's compensation system and recommends possible legislative changes.

Sibley also will serve on the Computer Network Study Project Advisory Committee until Feb. 2, 1999. Sibley sponsored Senate Bill 294 during the past legislative session, which authorized a feasibility study for public school computer networks.

Sibley already is serving on a number of interim committees. On Thursday Sibley was named chairman of the Governor's Task Force on Illegal Gambling. Other interim appointments include the chairmanship of the Senate Interim Committee on Economic Development and of the Senate Interim Committee on Electric Utility Restructuring. 

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


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Political Pot Perking

BRYAN -- Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro kicked off his race for Governor Monday promising Texans that he'll be a governor who will put the needs of Texas families first.

Mauro made the announcement on the steps of the Carnegie Library surrounded by members of his family and longtime family friends.He was born in Bryan, and attended Texas A&M University. His family has lived in Brazos County for five generations.

Mauro unveiled "Texas Families First" , a plan that will let Texas families keep more of the money they earn, choose their own doctors, send their children to world-class schools and live in safer neighborhoods.

"Texas Families First is my first and only priority," Mauro said. "I have no other agenda. No matter what kind of family you have, when our families win, Texas wins."

"Texas Families First" will put more money in the pocket of Texas families, he

The plan includes the Texas Family Tax Cut, which will eliminate the motor vehicle sale tax. Texas has the 3rd highest motor vehicle tax in the country.

Bush has Gov. proposed raising the tax 12 1/2 percent. Mauro's tax cut would allow a family that purchases a new Dodge Caravan to keep \$1,375. A family that purchases a used 1994 Ford Pickup would save \$625.

He also promised to pass a constitutional amendment that would prevent the Legislature from taxing food and prescription drugs.

"Texas families should keep more of the money they earn, and be able to spend it the way they want," Mauro said.

"Texas Families First: will give Texans more control over their health," he said.

HMO members. "Insurance company and managed care bean counters make decisions about your health and your life that a doctor should be making," Mauro said.

The Patient Protection Act, which Gov. Bush vetoed, would have allowed HMO members to choose their own doctor or medical specialist and it would have required HMOs to pay for medical care at

Comprehensive Cancer Care Centers designated by the National Cancer Institute.

Mauro also promised to enforce clean air standards that President Bush passed and make neighborhoods safe from toxic waste sites. Gov. Bush has cut funding for hazardous waste clean up by 56 percent.

"Texas Families First" will give Texas school children more chances to succeed, he

It will pump \$2 billion in to a program to build new schools and provide new technology for older ones - without raising taxes. The

program will help solve overcrowding in Texas classrooms. Last year, Gov. Bush gave class size waivers to 483 schools.

Mauro also pledged to certify teachers in the subjects they teach and reward them with a \$5,000 pay raise.

"I am not going to turn up the burner on education; I am going to light a whole new fire," Mauro said. "It's about our kids, and it's about time."

"Texas Families First" will make Texas neighborhoods safer by putting more cops on the beat," he said.

Mauro declared a War on Gangs and noted that Texas is now second in the number of reported gang members.

"Gangs are just juvenile vigilantes," Mauro said. "We are going to run them out of Texas."

Mauro also promised to fight all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court to the early mandatory release of felons from Texas prisons.

"When it came to taking the fight all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court, Bush blinked," Mauro said. "I won't."

Gov. Bush promised to retroactively end the early mandatory release of Texas prisoners, but since he took office more than 42,000 felons have been released into Texas neighborhoods, Mauro

Want to show your appreciation for certain employees or customers by giving them a gift? If so, you may want to do it in such a way that you can deduct the cost of the gift for income tax purposes. The applicable rules are quite strict.

Employees. The first rule relates to gifts made to employees. Companies that choose to give a cash gift to employees can deduct the entire amount, but the gift is treated as a bonus and must be included as compensation subject to payroll taxes. This seems to detract from the notion of a gift.

Gifts other than money must also be included in compensation unless the item is relatively inexpensive, such as a holiday turkey. (The cost of such nominal gifts is still deductible as a business expense.)

Customers. The second category relates to gifts made to customers. To preclude abuse, Congress limited these gifts to \$25 per individual customer per year. This limit was established in the early 1960s and has never been adjusted for inflation. A business concerned with its image might have difficulty finding suitable gifts in this price range today.

However, gifts to business entities that are not for the personal use of some easily identifiable persons are not held to the \$25. Since the rules in this area can be complicated, no gift over \$25 should be made without first checking the tax treatment.

The rules create a few other exceptions. Promotional items costing \$4 or less, that clearly show the taxpayer's name, are not included as part of the \$25 limit. Packaging, engraving, and mailing costs are also excluded from the limit. And, if the expenditure does not qualify as a gift, it may qualify as an entertainment expense.



I'm living with 11 members of my family-kind of communal to save money. However, every time I get close to the \$469 needed to purchase a professional quality camera, something arises and wipes out my savings. It's very hard existing on the \$640 a month I receive from disability, but hopefully my publications and cards could get me off S.S.I. If you were to decide this cause to be worthy, I promise you my photography would be used to convey to those who are dying that there is tremendous beauty and hope ahead.
