## Dimmitt Drama Wins Second In Region Contest

Dimmitt High School dramatists won their eighth second place in nine tries Friday at the Regional Play Contests at Lubbock.

This time they were nosed out by a Perryton production of "Dino." Other towns in the contest were Floydada, Ballinger, Olton, Denyer City, and Haskell.

Miss Jo Beecher was named top actress of the region from all the casts present.

On Saturday the cast took their play, "Death Takes A Holiday," to the Drama Festival at Portales given by the Eastern New Mexico University. There their play won a rating of excellent and Gary Wyatt was rated superior for his main character performance. Miss Beecher won another excellent rating for her performance.

The play was directed by Dimmitt High School Drama Instructor James W. (Rosy) Bates.

## Miss Schumacher Wins Second In Regional Spelling

Miss Yvonne Schumacher came close to winning the regional senior spelling bee in Amarillo Saturday, but she was tripped up by the word "eulogize" and had to be content with a second place.

Miss Schumacher, 13, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Andy Schumacher of Nazareth and her second place is the closest Castro County has come to the title in the past several years.

First place was won by Sam Hergert of Perryton. He defeated Miss Schumacher after a 15-round word contest where they were the only two remaining contestants. Miss Schumacher is in the seventh grade and has won the senior spelling bee for the past two years. She received an award this year a 24-volume Encyclopedia Britannica.

Betty Sue Holbrooks, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Holbrooks of Dimmitt, received the first place Junior County spelling bee trophy at Amarillo Saturday.

### Tragic Accident In Boxcar Saturday Causes Death of Glen E. Hammons

Glen Edward Hammons, 26-year-old truck driver from Dimmitt, was killed instantly about 8:30 Saturday morning when a load of steel grainery sections fell and caught him against the side of a box car.

The semi-circular sections, about eight feet tall, were stacked against each other on their sides with the curves toward the box car sides. The sections were being loaded on a Nelson Brothers truck for transportation to Nazareth by Hammons, Foy Beck and R. O. Nelson when the incident occurred.

The plates fell forward with the leading edge of the outside plate hitting Hammons on the left side of the neck and pinning him to the opposite side of the box car. Death was apparently instantaneous. Hammons' body was removed from under the plates by members of the Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Department.

Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. Monday at the First Baptist Church in Childress, by Rev. Murray Brewer, pastor of the Lee Street Baptist Church in Dimmitt. Interment was in a Childress cemetery.

Mr. Hammons was a member of the Masonic Lodge No. 879 in Dimmitt and lived at 706 West Andrews. He had lived in Dimmitt for 2 1/2 years and had spent his childhood in Childress. He was a member of the Armed Forces from January 14, 1953 to Decem-

ber 24, 1954. He was born in Childress on May 23, 1934.

He is survived by his wife Patsy; their sons Michael Glen, 3, and Mark, 6 months; his mother, Mrs. Bertie Ricks, his stepfather, Hiram Ricks, two sisters, Mrs. Naomi Norman and Mrs. Sybil Norman, and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. A. I. Hammons of Childress.

Dennis Funeral Home handled local arrangements for the funeral.

According to judges, the Bobcat Band did an excellent job on "Elsa's Procession to the Cathedral," a very complicated number, especially in the beginning.

## Scared Bootlegger Uses Darkness To Elude Observant Hart Deputy

The non-ending game of bootlegger-catching has developed a sixth sense in some of the Sheriff's department men. Take Granville Martin, known officially as the deputy sheriff from Hart. One of his favorite hobbies is grappling with the defilers of the liquor laws and he has developed considerable ability at distinguishing bootleggers from traveling people on the Umberger-Nazareth-Hart farm to market road late at night.

For instance, on Friday night, he passed a car that looked suspicious for some reason or the other so he stopped to flag the car down. He turned on his flashing red light and waved his arms. This made a good target for the car which tried to run him down as it went by but Martin jumped out of the way. He took a pot-shot at the trunk of the car as it went by, jumped into his own car and gave pursuit.

He caught up with the errant automobile within half a mile and the driver pulled over, jumped out of the car and took off across a field. Martin lost him in the dark. Eventually during the night there were eleven officers combing the area, but they were unable to find the culprit.

What was in the car? This: 93 pints of wine in loose bottles; 11 cases of wine, 42 pints of whiskey, 8 pints of gin, 8 pints of vodka, 28 quart bottles of beer, five cases of tall beer cans, and 2 cases of standard beer cans. No one has come to claim the car which had stolen license plates.

The shot by Martin saved the State Liquor Control Board a disposal problem—it broke six bottles of whiskey.

Sagging car springs might have something to do with Martin's bootlegger-sifting ability if they are all loaded like this one was.

Workouts in making draperies will be conducted by Castro County Home Demonstration Agent, Mrs. Sybil Stringer, beginning in May. Plans are under way for a workshop to be held in each commissioner precinct.

All interested women are eligible to attend. There will need to be at least eight women in a group. Each person attending will custom tailor a drapery of a yard length of cotton fabric.

Five afternoon meetings will be necessary; these to be held weekly.

A new coin-operated laundry will be opened in Dimmitt in the near future. Although it has no name as yet, it will be operated by Kenneth Forson of Dimmitt and Pat Forson of Lubbock, both brothers and sons of Claude Forson, local realtor.

The building will house thirty-two washers and nine dryers and plans are for it to be operated days and into the night. The modern 30x50 building is located adjacent to the Forson Real Estate building in South Dimmitt on the Hart and Springlake Highway.

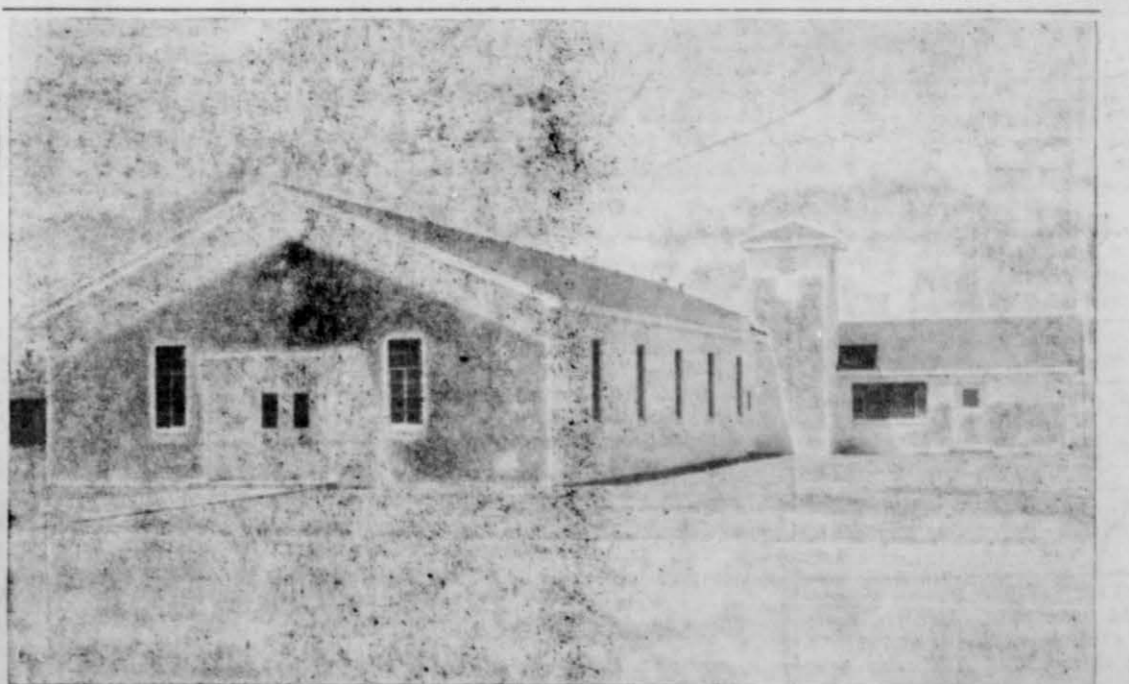
It is made of concrete tile with a brick and tile front and is designed for automatic washers and dryers. Equipment will be all new Maytag equipment.

Opening date is about the middle of next month, depending on arrival of equipment and how the half-completed building comes along. A 500 square yard black-top parking area will be incorporated into the construction plans.

This will be the only such laundry in Dimmitt. Cost to the customer will be twenty cents a load.

The brand-new Dimmitt Catholic Church will be dedicated Sunday.

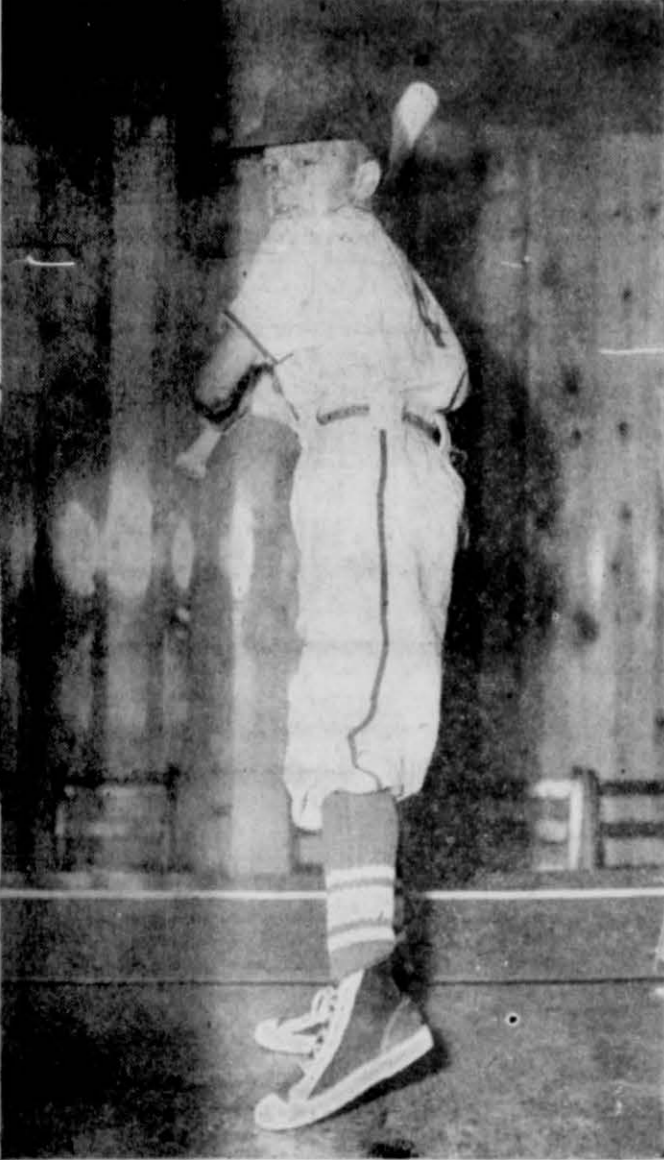

Confessions will be heard from 4 to 6 p.m. Saturday by Father Jesus Quintero, pastor of the new church.

A main feature of the big week end for the church will be an Italian spaghetti supper at the South Grade School in Dimmitt. It will be prepared by Mrs. Rose Acker, who has furnished many such meals for various causes in this area. The supper will begin at 6 p.m. and will be served by the ladies of the parish under the direction of Mrs. Acker. Mrs. Acker spent her youth in Italy and she prepares authentic Italian spaghetti. The meal will be open to the public at a cost of \$1.25 per

plate. The new church measures 40x100 feet and has an attached rectory and combination meeting and recreation room. It is located in East Dimmitt on Highway 86 and was constructed under the supervision of Paul and Herman Acker.

The newly established parish is a mission of the Nazareth Parish which is under Father Peter Morsch. Father Quintero is an assistant in the Nazareth Church and will serve as pastor here.

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## Jack Acker Drowned Sunday Night In Oklahoma; Services Wednesday

Funeral services for Jacob Paul (Jack) Acker, 22, of Nazareth were held Wednesday at 9 a.m. in the Holy Family Church in Nazareth with Father Peter Morsch officiating.

Young Acker drowned late Sunday night at a lake near Altus, Oklahoma.

His body was found by searchers at Lake Lugert, 23 miles north of Altus, shortly after midnight. He and Clyde Hoelting of Nazareth and Anne Johnson and Coveta McNabb, both of Wellington, had been boating on the lake Sunday.

Miss Johnson said Acker jumped into the water to retrieve the boat, which had begun drifting from the shore downwind with the two girls in it. Hoelting had gone to get the boat trailer to bring it to the water's edge and load the boat.

As Acker swam out toward the boat, he went under twice and began calling for help. Miss Johnson said he disappeared after he went under a third time.

Acker was born December 21, 1936, at Nazareth, where he attended elementary and high school. He won numerous 4-H honors while in school.

He was a partner with Jerry Wilhelm in the K&W Fertilizer Company at Nazareth. He also was a member of the Catholic Order of Forester and Sodality of

Children of Mary at Nazareth.

Funeral arrangements were by Dennis Funeral Home of Dimmitt.

Survivors are his mother, Mrs. Magdalena Acker of Nazareth; two brothers, Kenneth of Irving and Thomas of Nazareth, and three sisters, Mrs. John L. Dea of Lubbock, Mrs. H. D. White of 3303 Lewis Lane, Amarillo, and Miss Grace Acker of 811 West 14th, Amarillo.

## Dimmitt Postal Receipts Show Steady Increase

Postal receipts at the Dimmitt Post Office continue to increase according to figures released this week by Thomas F. Bice, postmaster.

Gross receipts for the first three months of this year were \$8,146.06. This is an increase of about 25 percent over the first three months of last year. However there was a similar increase in postal rates between these periods, which accounts for most of the change. Postal receipts during 1958 were \$34,395.58—a \$5,682.35 increase over the 1957 total of \$28,713.23.

**Walter Rogers' WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER**  
FAMILY FIGHT  
There was a behind-the-scenes fight between the three divisions of news sources and information that popped out in the open in connection with the appearance of Fidel Castro before the American people in convention in Washington. The Newspaper Editors Society had placed a ban on the leaking of the Castro speech. Radio and television people immediately charged the Society of Newspaper Editors with gross inconsistency, claiming that the ban was in direct conflict with the campaign being carried on by the newspapers for free access to the news. This was somewhat embarrassing because the newspapers had been waging a very splendid campaign against the suppression of news and information by many governmental agencies. It was obvious that something had to be done, so according to the newspapers, radio and television people were offered an opportunity to air the speech, but none of them wanted to do it by radio; they wanted to do it by television so the American people could see and hear the controversy in their own homes. Finally, the newspaper group agreed to permit the television network to film the Castro speech for later use, but at the time this letter was in Castro County, Texas, to-wit:

than the Messianic expectations. The earlier Messianic
hope had been centered in the glorious and blessed
future of the nation, and did not go much beyond the

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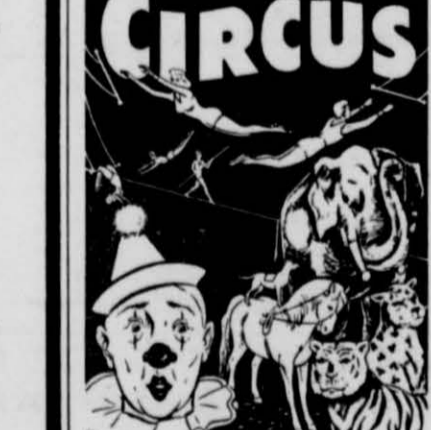
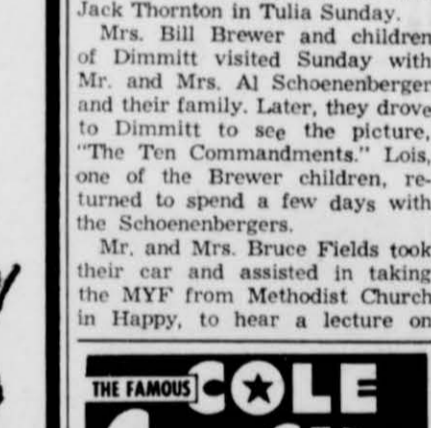
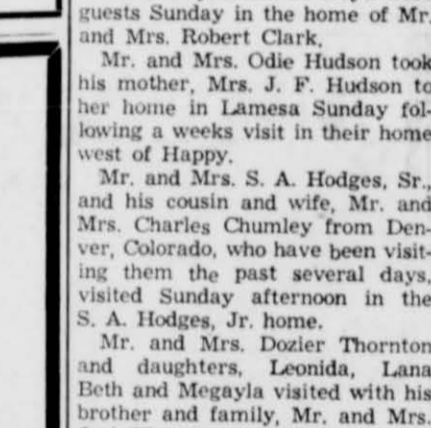

Grain Sorghum Production Increasing
Steadily Throughout Entire State

Texas farmers, leading the
nation in the fast move to sor-
ghum grain as a cash crop, are
furthering this advance through
growing acceptance of improved
hybrid sorghum seed recently de-
veloped.
Seed dealers of hybrid strains of
sorghum report Texas sales are
up from 50 to 75 percent on the
same period last year, indicating
that hybrids have not only taken
a foothold but that they are here
to stay.
Farmers have learned that
proven hybrids can increase their
grain sorghum production often as
much as 40 percent and have
given quick acceptance to the
scientific seed.
Last year, our state once again
tallied a big "Texas first" by pro-
ducing 44.4 percent of the nation's
sorghum grain—much of it from
hybrid seed stock. Texas produced
273,066,000 bushels of the United
States' 614,845,000 bushel total.
Certified hybrid sorghum seed
are grown by independent Texas
growers in accordance with the
certified seed program of the
Texas Department of Agriculture.
The program involves continued in-
spection and observation for ap-
proval as certified seed and can
yield a high return to the success-
ful grower.
However, the certified seed pro-
gram is not an easy proposition.
It is, on the contrary, a highly
scientific and comparatively ex-
pensive proposition which can
quickly discourage the inexperi-
enced or inefficient farmer.
The trend over the last two
years has been for the smaller
farmer to drop out of the certified
grower program. From an initial
number of about 200 in 1956, the
list dropped to 161 growers of
certified stock in 1958.
Planted acreage of certified
seed also decreased sharply from

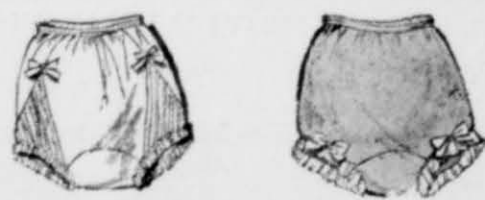

**Senator YARBOROUGH'S REPORT**

Many people have written me about my proposal to extend the provisions of the Korean G. I. Bill to "Cold War veterans."

This proposed new law would extend the educational assistance, vocational rehabilitation, home loan guaranties and mustering-out pay provisions through 1963. The main feature of the new measure is its educational provisions. The Korean G. I. Bill ended on January 31, 1955. The Yarborough Bill would provide 1 1/2 years of college training for each day of active military service for veterans, with a maximum of three years college training. The subsistence pay would be at the same rate as in the Korean G. I. Bill.

This Bill would also extend vocational rehabilitation and home loan guaranties and would provide for \$100 mustering out pay for veterans honorably discharged after the bill is passed. All these benefits would be extended through 1963, when the draft law ends.

The measure is now being considered by the Senate Veterans Affairs Subcommittee, of which I am chairman. I am pleased to report that in hearings held recently, the Yarborough Bill was endorsed by representatives of Universities and Colleges, state vocational training units, veterans organizations, veterans and their families and others.

Testimony before the subcommittee has shown that about one out of every two men who served in World War II, or 7,800,000 veterans, received educational training under the first G. I. Bill. Another two million veterans of the Korean Conflict also received this training under a similar measure. Educators tell me veterans made better grades and conducted themselves better at college than the non-veterans. When they finished, the training helped them earn higher income and pay more taxes than non-veterans, statistics show. And more than a fourth of the veterans who received this

training became engineers. One witness quoted Commission Report "The veteran's program was a major part of the national welfare program, economically, and national defense. It was a national organization, and the congress had to embark upon the momentous educational enterprise."

Another man told me that this program helped the producer of the national income, but, on the national income tax, the government collects more than any security New York stock market.
