

GENERAL ELECTION COMES NOVEMBER 8

EVERY MAN IN WEST TEXAS SHOULD GO TO THE POLLS.

This Section Will Not Get Proper Number of Voters Unless Every Man is Counted.

The general election in Texas will be held November 8th, which is a little more than a week hence.

This election is of more importance than the average election, from the fact that in the redistricting process which will be gone through by the Thirty-second Legislature, the number of qualified electors will be taken into consideration in the rearrangement of Senatorial Districts. The Constitution of the State of Texas, section 25 of article 3, provides that the redistricting of the state senate shall be made on the basis of the number of qualified electors in the state. Just how the provision, "qualified electors," will be construed by the next legislature is an undetermined question and one left entirely to the will of the legislature. Up to the present time, the only rule followed in determining the number of qualified electors was the vote cast at the general election preceding the redistricting of the senate.

When the senate was redistricted ten years ago there was no poll tax requirements for suffrage in Texas, but since then this requirement has been made. It is possible therefore, that the Thirty-second legislature may take the poll tax payments as qualified electors in the rearrangement of the senatorial districts.

In this event, it will be necessary in order for West Texas to have her share of the senatorial districts for a full showing to be made in the payment of poll taxes.

If the old method of determining the qualified electors is followed, as indicated above, then it is necessary for a full vote to be cast at the general election on November 8th, 1910, in order for West Texas to get her full representation in senatorial districts.

If the legislature should adopt the poll tax provision as its guide for qualified voters, as the basis for senate redistricting, then it is important that there should be a full payment of poll taxes. There is no way of knowing which plan will be adopted by the thirty-second legislature and therefore, every voter in West Texas in particular, and the entire state in general is confronted with two important and sacred duties.

1. To vote at the coming general election regardless of party affiliations.
2. To pay his poll tax or, if exempted, to secure a certificate of exemption both of which must be secured before February 1, 1911.

The few senatorial districts in West Texas makes it imperative that action should be taken, as above indicated, and with this opportunity afforded, it is therefore up to the voters of West Texas to bear these facts in mind and to vote in the general election and then pay their poll tax in order that the representation from West Texas in the next senate may be materially increased.

REV. GROVES' FAREWELL SERMON.

After a Pastorate of Thirty-nine Years Rev. J. S. Groves Retires Next Sunday.

Next Sunday night Rev. J. S. Groves, of the Presbyterian church will deliver his farewell sermon as pastor of the local church and will retire from the ministry. Rev. Groves was ordained into the ministry 39 years ago last February and has never been without work since that time, except for the short vacations he has taken during the summers. As pastor in Canyon his work has been very successful and there is a deep feeling of regret among his parishioners that Rev. Groves should be forced to give up his work by ill health. They are happy, however, that he will remain in our midst and will continue with pastoral calls and other work he will find to do among the members of the Presbyterian church and strangers in the city.

The new minister, Rev. C. Kilbourn, will arrive this week and will preach at the Sunday morning services. As will be remembered he is the son-in-law of Rev. Groves.

GREATEST NORMAL BUILDING IN WEST

CONTRACTOR KING COMPARES IT WITH OTHER BUILDINGS.

Praises Given for Auditorium, Swimming Pool and Gymnasium.—Best West of Mississippi.

In passing through Amarillo Monday, Contractor King gave the following interview with a Daily News reporter in regard to the Normal building:

"The people of the Panhandle do not know the extent of the West Texas Normal School buildings, according to Jno. F. King, of Ft. Worth, contractor for the building, who was in Amarillo yesterday en route to Ft. Worth to buy finishing material for the building. 'Why, it is the best normal school west of the Mississippi river,' said Mr. King, 'and it would take any other school ten years to reach the place it now occupies.'"

"The auditorium will have a seating capacity of 1,600 people, two hundred more than the federal census gives as the population of Canyon, and more people than can be seated in the famous Garrick theatre at St. Louis. The swimming pool which has provided for the students holds 90,000 gallons of water, and a gymnasium second to none in the state, and a balcony for spectators has been provided."

FIRE DOES DAMAGE TELEPHONE CENTRAL

BUILDING ALMOST DESTROYED EARLY YESTERDAY MORNING.

Large Force of Men Moving Switch Board and Wires to Room Over Thompson Hardware Co.

Fire very nearly wiped out the telephone central in Canyon yesterday morning at 5:30 o'clock. The night man, Lee Dunham, built a fire in the stove and had hardly waited ten minutes until he heard cracking above him. Running to the back of the building he discovered that the whole attic was on fire. He rapidly called Manager E. W. Thacker, Fire Chief Miller and several others of the department. The alarm was given and in a short while the department was on the scene and had the fire under control. The building is a complete wreck, but it is thought that the switch board and connections were not greatly damaged.

After a little work, Manager Thacker succeeded in getting connections with Amarillo where General Manager Horace Gooch was notified. He drove down immediately and with a large force of men is overseeing the moving of the office to rooms over the Thompson Hardware Co. If there is no more damage to the connections than thought at this time, the lines will be in working order in a few days. The toll line was connected up at once and is in operation at the Baltimore hotel.

PIANOS ORDERED FOR NORMAL.

Large Grand Piano will be Placed in the Auditorium—Uprights in Music Rooms.

The local board of the Normal have given orders for the purchase of a large Grand piano to be placed in the auditorium and for two uprights, one for the music room and one for the literary society rooms. The purchase of the pianos has been left with President Cousins. The local board is anxious that the auditorium be well fitted up and desire that the president get the best possible instrument for the auditorium.

FOUND DEAD IN BED.

J. Rusk Died Wednesday Morning of Heart Failure.—An Old Resident of this County.

J. Rusk, an old and respected citizen of Canyon and Randall county, was found dead in bed Wednesday morning by his wife. It is apparent that he passed away about daylight, as he was still warm when his wife called him. Death had come without a struggle. His hands lay crossed on his breast and no signs of struggle were on his face.

Mr. Rusk was born in Indiana seventy-two years ago. He served in the northern army in the civil war. He came to Randall county about twenty years ago and has lived in Canyon for the past nine years. He had been married three times, being survived by his third wife. He is the father of nine children all of whom survive him. Mr. Rusk was a quiet unpretentious man who gained friends everywhere he went. It was a great shock to the neighborhood when the news was announced Wednesday morning that he had passed to the great beyond.

The funeral will be held this afternoon at three o'clock from the residence, conducted by Rev. J. M. Harder.

J. H. SEVALL DIED SATURDAY.

Well Known Canyon Business Man Passed Away Suddenly at his Home Oct. 22.

Mr. H. J. Sevall, of Canyon, Randall county, Texas, passed from this life into the final home at 8 o'clock Saturday morning, Oct. 22nd, 1910, after an illness of about two weeks. Mr. Sevall was one of Canyon's best business men, loved and honored by all.

He was born in Morgan county, Ohio, April 3rd, 1857. Moved to Missouri when about 12 years old, living there until a young man. In 1889 he came to Texas, going back to Missouri remaining there two or three years, then to Illinois for a few years, then back to Texas living here until his death. The girl is now 14 years old and lives in Missouri. The boy is here with Mrs. Sevall. Two children were born to his present wife. Hence 5 children were born unto him all living.

He was a good citizen, an obedient son and a kind father and husband. Mr. Sevall was not a member of the church but expressed himself as not afraid to die. So, as we all love him, we hope that in the hours of suffering he looked up to God who made him, and to Jesus who died to save a lost world and took him as his own Savior.

His last words were, when I said, "It seems to me, Mr. Sevall, you could trust Jesus who died for you and loves you," he replied, "That is the settlement of all mistakes." I have never heard more powerful words fall from the lips of the dying in defense of the true religion of Jesus Christ.

The funeral service was held at home at 8:30 a.m. The beloved order of Odd Fellows took charge and carried the body to Amarillo to be buried by his second wife who sleeps in the Amarillo cemetery. The Odd Fellows provided nobly for Mr. Sevall's needs during his sickness, showing real friendship—love and truth exists in the heart of Canyon City lodge, hence the greatly endeared themselves to the hearts of all his relatives.

May the blessing of God rest on the bereaved family.

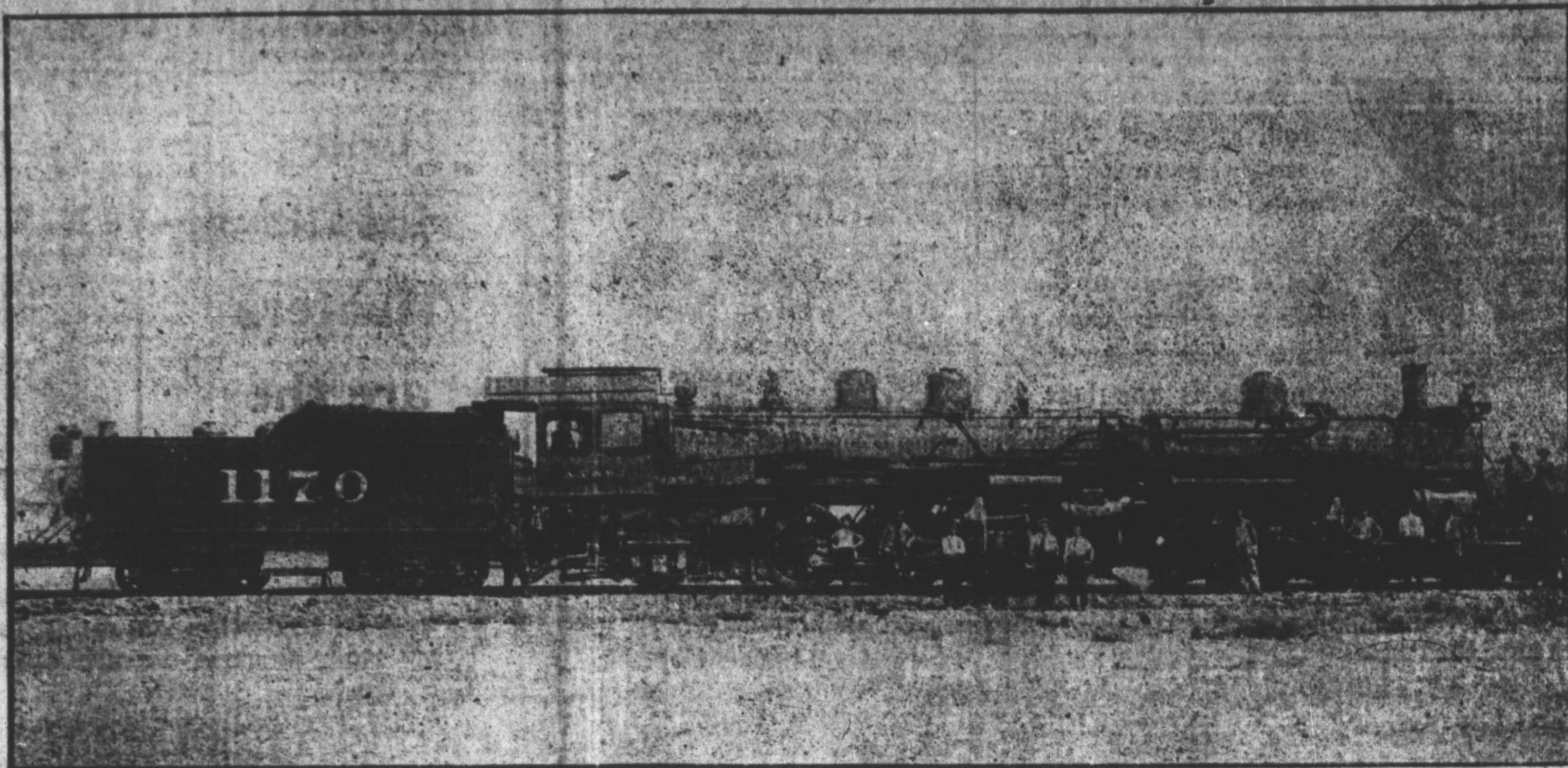

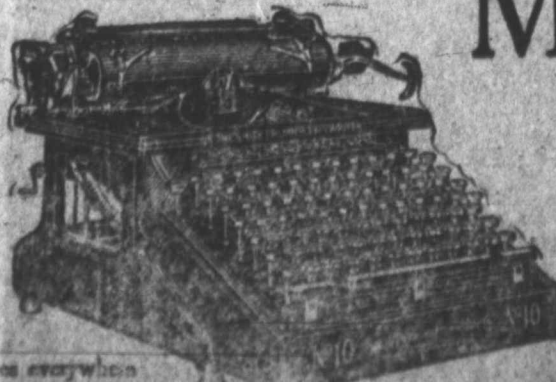

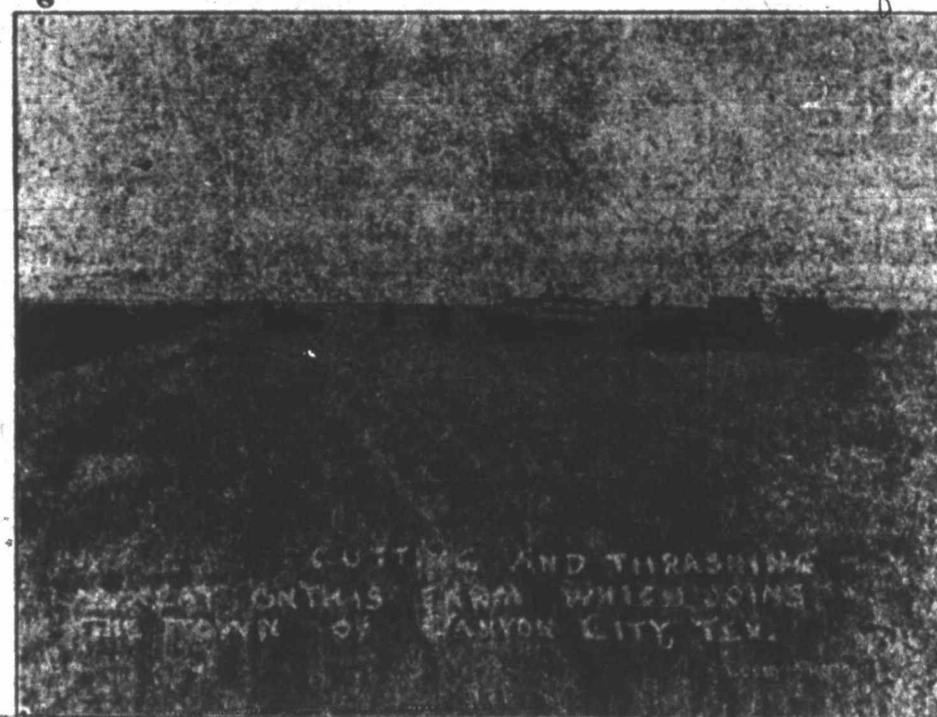
