

## CASES TRIED IN DISTRICT COURT

SECOND WEEK OF COURT WAS A VERY BUSY ONE.

Petit Jurors Were Dismissed Wednesday.—Grand Jury Returns A Number of Indictments.

A large number of cases on the district court docket were taken up this week. No cases of importance, however, have been up for consideration. The petit jury was dismissed early in the week, and the grand jury was also dismissed after returning a large number of indictments. The following business has been under consideration for the week:

On Friday the case of L. T. Lester et al vs. John Hutson was called and by the attorney of the plaintiff announced that the case had been settled.

In the case of Frank Fisher vs. W. B. Skinner, a motion to quash the citation thereon was upheld by the court.

In the case, Fulton Lumber Co. vs. J. E. Berry et al, the motion to strike out the plea of intervention filed in the cause was overruled.

In the case, L. T. Lester vs. Jasper N. Haney, the defendant was granted leave to amend.

The case of J. H. Dunbar vs. L. T. Lester was dismissed by motion of the plaintiff.

In the case, Ella Burnham vs. H. S. Burnham, a divorce was granted the plaintiff and she was given custody of the daughter, Ruth. A division of the property was also approved by the court.

On Monday the petit jurors drawn for the second week of court appeared for service. Jack Brock was fined \$25 for contempt of court in not appearing as a petit juror.

The case of the State of Texas vs. W. C. Hambleton was continued until the next term of court by agreement of both parties.

The case of J. E. Rogers vs. R. T. Williams was continued to the next term of court.

In the case, Woods Mercantile Co. vs. First National Bank of Canyon, was dismissed for non-appearance of the plaintiff.

The grand jury reported to the court Monday.

The petit jury for this week was dismissed for the rest of the term.

In the case, David Thomas vs. J. R. Hall, judgment was rendered for the plaintiff.

Geo. L. Ditto was appointed by the court Tuesday morning to serve as riding balliff for the grand jury.

The grand jury reported Tuesday morning to the court a number of indictments.

The grand jury did not have a committee to examine the county books and accounts, but recommended that a committee consisting of S. B. Lofton, Geo. A. and Chas. R. Burrows be appointed to examine into a written report unto the county finances, of the town of Canyon and the accounts of said town.

The county buildings and the house were examined and found in good condition. It was found that the jail be connected with the city sewer and the doors of the school building be hung on outside.

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## CAPTURED—BUT MAKES ESCAPE.

Charles Myrtle, Who was indicted for Boot Legging Escapes After Landing in Jail.

Charles Myrtle was arrested Wednesday night eleven miles southeast of town on indictment of the grand jury on the charge of breaking the local option law. Deputy Sheriff Jowell went out after him and brought him to Canyon. On being taken to the jail the deputy went into the cell to start a fire. The door of the jail cannot be locked from the inside and while Mr. Jowell was fixing the fire in the dark his man made a break and came up missing when a good warm fire had been started for his comfort. He has left for parts unknown.

A new road was ordered beginning at the town of Umbar on Section No. 76, block B-5 and continuing west.

Building will be Complete as Soon as Seats for the Auditorium Come and are Placed.

The 200 mark at the Normal was reached Wednesday when a young lady enrolled as number 200. When the school opened with 150 it was thought the 200 mark would be reached by the beginning of the second term, but one month of the first term is yet to pass and from four to six are enrolling every week. With the opening of the second term the number bids fair to even reach the 300 mark.

The dedication-services of the Normal will now be governed by the arrival of the opera chairs of the auditorium. These have been ordered several months and are expected any time. The contractor will have the building ready to turn over within two weeks. Only a few men are now at work on the finishing touches.

The large auditorium was completed this week except connecting the lights and the seating. It is a magnificent room. Folding chairs have been provided and chapel will be held there in a few days.

The workmen are putting the finishing touches on the gymnasium. The lockers are being placed. The swimming pool will be ready for use in a short time.

Work on the athletic grounds is progressing fast. The twelve tennis courts are laid off, work has started on the grandstand, and the quarter mile track has received its first grading.

The electric light company is building a line out to the Normal so that lights will soon be accessible all over the building.

The heating plant is proving very satisfactory. Two large boilers have been installed, under ordinary condition one will heat the building, the other being held in reserve.

**FIRST FOOT BALL IN CANYON.**

Amarillo Couldn't "Come Back"—Score 36 to 0 in One-sided Battle Last Monday.

In a fierce one-sided gridiron battle Monday afternoon, the Normal eleven dragged the laurels of the Amarillo High School team thru the dust of the Normal campus to the score of 36 to 0. When the two teams trotted out upon the field, many were the forebodings of the coming disaster as it was evident that the neighboring gladiators had that hard look of veterans after their game with Lubbock of last week. But Canyon went at it with that essential and necessary "ginger" which completely overwhelmed the visiting team, causing their line to weaken and their fast backs to lose heart.

At some stage of the game each man of the local team was well in the lime light. They tackled fiercely and cleanly like fiends during the five times Amarillo possessed the ball; they took every advantage on offensive play and carried the coveted pigskin in their machine-like precision, making the required ten yards time after time, but were especially strong in recovering punts and fumbles of both teams. The five linemen did extra good work, making big holes through which long gains were made and blocking their opponents on the line of scrimmage so that Amarillo was compelled to use end runs.

The visiting team played in hard luck throughout the entire game, getting possession of the ball only five times during the fifty minutes of play. They varied from the hard straight foot ball toward the more open game, running good interference. But they could not stop the steady advance of the blood-thirsty Normals. The forward pass was tried twice but was uncompleted each time. These boys ase to be complemented upon the plucky determined game they put up and the lack of that squabbling and slugging that ruins a clean fame in the face of defeat.

Canyon received the ball at the east goal and began hammering the line from the start. By means of end runs by Harder and line bucking by Rowan the ball was advanced clear across the field and Stalnaker made a beautiful goal from the field. After a few more minutes of straight foot ball, Canyon punted, Amarillo fumbled and Vaughn fell on the ball on the 5 yard line. In the next Canyon fumbled, Cousins recovered and was through the line like lightning for a touchdown. Try at goal went wild and first quarter ended Canyon 8, Amarillo 0.

Amarillo stock went up after 8 minutes of play in the second quarter when they got the ball for the first time. Being held for downs and Richards taken out on account of injury, this said stock went away below face value. In 2 minutes more Rowan ran 35 yards to a touchdown through the line. Goal kick fails, 2nd quarter ends, C. 13, A. 0.

Amarillo received the ball on 5 yard line but was held. After 3 minutes Rowan placed the ball just over the line. Stalnaker kicked goal. Along at the last of this quarter Cousins pulled off a beautiful quarterback run through a broken field from the 40 yard line for a touchdown. Stalnaker kicked goal. 3rd quarter ends, C. 25, A. 0.

In the last quarter Rowan scored on a short run and the most sensational play was made by Harder with 2 minutes. He ran 85 yards dodging five tacklers to plant the ball behind the opponents goal. Last quarter ends, C. 36, A. 0.

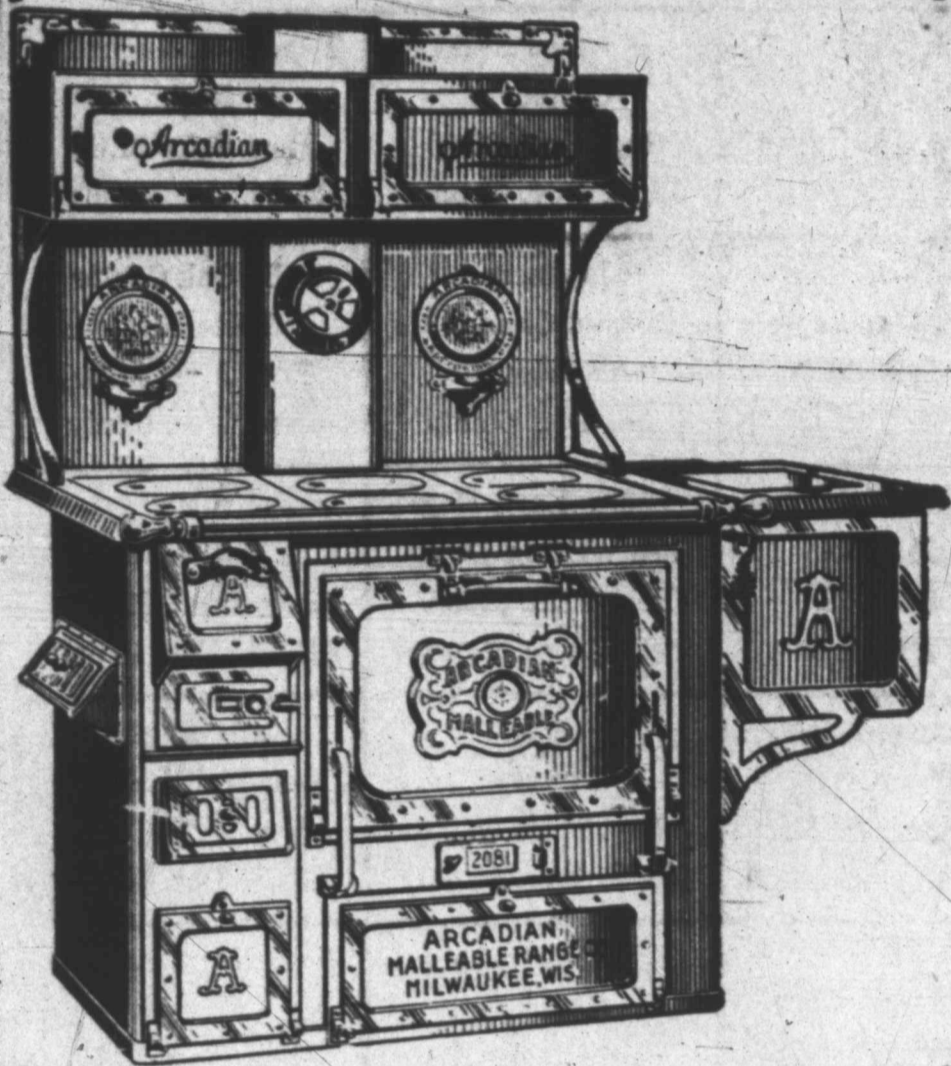

## PALO DURO CANYON AS NATIONAL PARK

CONGRESSMAN JOHN H. STEPHENS WILL INTRODUCE BILL.

Writes Amarillo Parties to Send Representative to Red River Improvement Congress.

Congressman John H. Stephens has written to Amarillo parties asking them to send a representative to the Red River Improvement Congress this week to present their claims of the Palo Duro canyon as a National Park. Mr. Stephens is unable to attend the congress and as he is interested in the park asked that Amarillo send a man to represent him. The Daily News, of last Friday has the following:

Mr. Stephens has been at work on the bill for past four years, the plan to have a National park having been originated by himself and Colonel Charles Goodnight. The Red River Improvement Association was formed by Mr. Stephens and Mr. Sheppard for a dual purpose. Mr. Sheppard's intentions were to get steamboats placed on the river north of his district and Mr. Stephens for the purpose of getting his bill for the creation of the park through congress.

A story sent out from Amarillo was recently printed in leading newspapers of Texas, stating that an effort was being made to interest Mr. Stephens in the matter. The story was either sent out by an enemy of the congressman or by a person ignorant of the true status of the matter. It created a false impression in the matter for Mr. Stephens has given much attention to the project.

Pictures of the canyon furnished by ex-Mayor Haney of Canyon have been placed in the room of the committee on appropriations in Washington, and are declared to be the most picturesque in that chamber and they are used by Mr. Stephens in his argument for the bill.

It is regarded as certain that the Chamber of Commerce will send a representative to Sherman in order to interest members of the Association in the proposition and it is likely that with a democratic house the appropriation for the National Park will go through and the Palo Duro Park become as famous as the Grand Canyon of Colorado.

### Shot a Deer.

R. D. Scruggs and J. J. Boydston, of Hereford, have been hunting in the canyon east of town the past week and last Friday shot a small deer. There were three in the bunch but the other two got away. Reports come in that several other deer have been killed at other places in the canyons.

## Good Form

There is always a welcome place for a good listener. If you are in this class there are a few rules to be kept in mind. First pay strict attention to the talker. So unconscious are the perpetrators of these tricks that they will actually find fault with other people for like habits and be ignorant that they themselves are guilty of similar bad breeding.

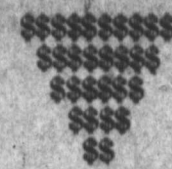
It is really ill bred to have these restless habits, no matter how unconscious one is of possessing them, for anything is ill bred that gives annoyance to others.

The brusque, rough woman who confounds a pleasant manner of speaking with insincerity is greatly to be pitied, for she has thrown away her scepter and lost her crown.

**GOLDEN AGE FOR LAWYERS**

Naples, It is Assorted, Once Had  
Thirty Thousand Attorneys to  
Spare.

Recent statistics show that the number of physicians in proportion to the population is greater in the United States than in any other country. The actual proportion is one physician for every 568 persons in the United States, which gives twice as many physicians to the thousand of population as England, four times as many as France, and five times as many as Germany.

If the annual output of graduates by medical schools continues at the present rate, says the Dietetic and Hygienic Gazette, the overcrowding will soon be as serious as it is in the legal profession; more serious, in fact, since the physician's field of activity is daily becoming more restricted as the result of the progress in preventive sanitation.

The lawyer, thanks to the increasing multiplication of laws, the enormous amount of litigation, and the opportunities there are for men of legal training in political and business life, is not likely to want for occupation. The plethora of lawyers recalls a similar state of affairs which existed in Naples in the eighteenth century under the Spanish rule and of which Joseph Addison gives an account.

"It is incredible," he says, "how great a multitude of retainers to the law there are at Naples. It is commonly said that when Innocent the Eleventh had desired the Marquis of Campio to furnish him with 30,000 head of swine, the marquis answered him that for his swine he could not spare them, but if his holiness had occasion for 30,000 lawyers he had them at his service."

It seems to have been a golden age for lawyers, for, as the author says, "there are very few persons of consideration who have not a cause depending; for when a Neapolitan has nothing else to do, he generally shuts himself up in his closet and falls a tumbling over his papers, to see if he can start a lawsuit and plague his neighbors."

**NEED IMMENSE LOT OF COAL**

Seven Thousand Tons Used Up by  
Liner in Single Trip Across  
the Ocean.

When we feel poor at the prospect of filling the cellar with coal for the winter we may well be thankful that it is not the cellar of an ocean greyhound that we have to fill. Such a ship as the Mauretania uses in each trip across the Atlantic 7,000 tons of coal. Taking the average carload as 25 tons, this is about 280 cars, or a train two miles long. It is said that for every 1,000 persons carried across the Atlantic 10,000 men are engaged in mining and handling the necessary coal, and that their labor supplies the means of living for an additional 20,000 persons. When stowed away in the hold, this vast quantity of coal occupies an almost negligible part of the total capacity of the ship.

**Plan For Mothers and Teachers Club.**

There was recently organized in connection with our public schools the Mothers and Teachers Club.

The object of this organization is the more perfect training of our children through the medium of our public schools. It is no reflection on our school system to say that it is not as good as our children deserve. It is not enough that our schools should be only as good as the average school in towns the size of ours. We have not discharged our obligation to our children, to our country, and to our God until we have given them the very best opportunities of which we are capable and no parent is worthy of the name who does not regard the office of parenthood as the highest and holiest of life. The man who gives more thought and attention to the raising of cows, the selling of land, or the vending of merchandise than to the training of his own children ought not to have any children. The Mothers and Teachers Club believes in boys and girls as well as in corn and hogs.

To this end we are of the opinion that a closer relation between the home and the school would not only conduce to the welfare of both these institutions but would materially benefit the children. We believe that the teacher and parent should come face to face in a discussion of those problems which deal with the making of men and women. We believe there should be a unity of purpose as between the home and the school and this directed by enlightened and intelligent sympathy. We believe there should be friendship and fellowship between teacher and parent if the welfare of the child is to be conserved. We believe in the more perfect equipment of our schools—in more books, more comfort, more regard for health, and more beauty indoor and out. We believe that our own public school, though moving forward as best it can under the circumstances, is handicapped by a lack of the very things that are essential to progress. We believe that many of our boys and girls are dropping out of school to rove our streets for no other reason than the unattractiveness of the school environment. Instead of bringing to school glad hearts and eager minds they go, like dumb-driven cattle, to a place of dullness and drudgery.

Mother, how important is your child anyway? Is he worth enough that you can go once or twice a month to the school building to study his welfare and promote his interest? Is there enough in Johnny and Mary to challenge the joint consideration of their mother and their teachers? Of course you cannot afford to neglect giving Fido his dinner on time nor fail to provide for Puss her quota of nice, fresh milk at regular intervals, but could you not get Daddy to look after these very necessary matters once or twice a month while you go to the school building and find out that your child's teacher is not such a hyena as you had supposed?

If you can believe that the school is instituted and maintained to supplement and aid the work of the home and that the future welfare of the child is at stake in his training, come out next Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock and align yourself with that institution which stands unequivocally for the best interests of all the people in the community.

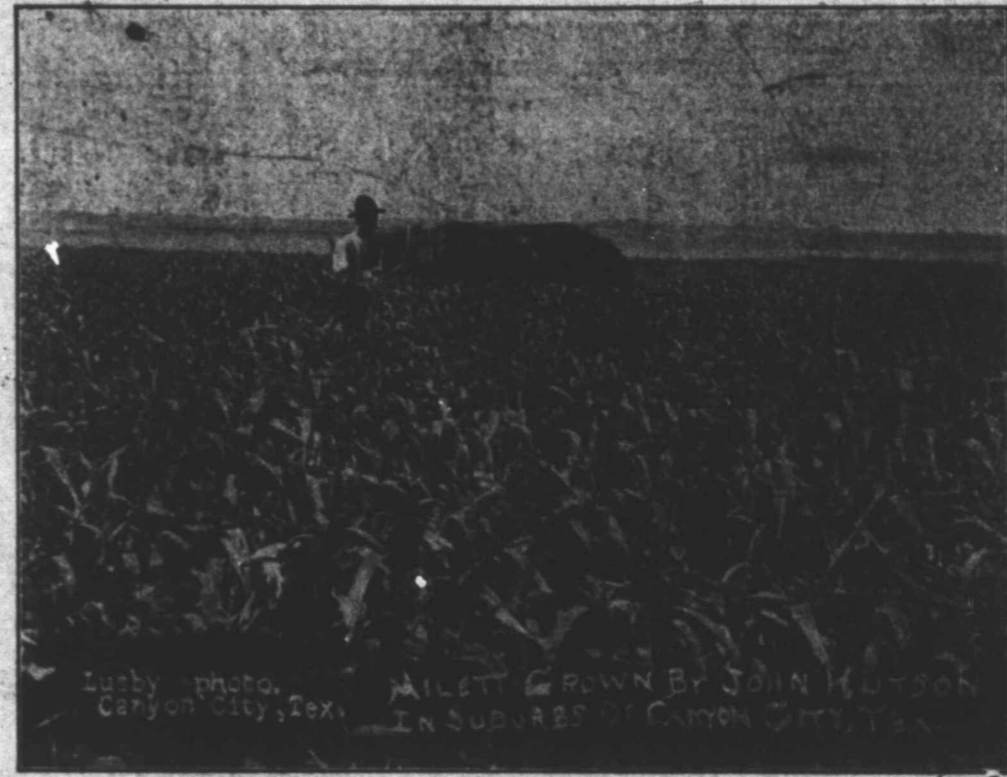

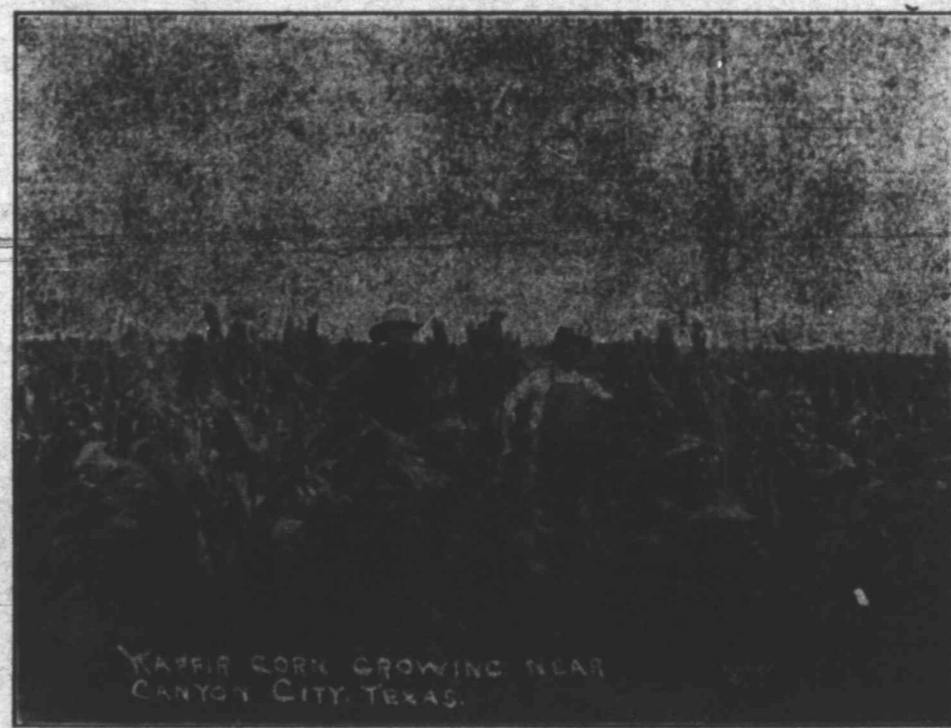
