Henry Knight has bought the barber shop on the south side from W. N. Newberry and is now in charge. Mr. Knight was formerly a barber in the city.


E. L. O'Grady and wife left for Ft. Worth this week. Mr. O'Grady was foreman of the plumbing work on the Normal building and his work here is all completed.



THE NEW CRAVEN MILL AT CANYON

The accompanying cut shows one of the best and most up-to-date mills in the state of Texas. Mr. J. F. Craven organized the Craven Mill Co. by associating with him some of Canyon's strong financial men.

Mr. Craven is one of the best practical mill men in the southwest. He personally superintended the construction of the building and installation of the machinery, which for strength, convenience and finish in all departments is first class. The wagon approach is on the south. The railroad siding on the north. The power house on the west, the ware-room on the east.



The machinery was purchased from the Montpelier Cup and Metal Works, builders of the Sunflower mills, through their southwestern representative, Mr. A. L. Simcoe, whose office is in the Board of Trade building, Kansas City, Mo. Before purchasing the machinery Mr. Craven visited Montpelier, Ind., and made a careful inspection of the Sunflower mills, both in material and workmanship as they were being constructed. And being familiar with all the machinery manufactured by the old line companies Mr. Craven was convinced after the most critical examination that the Sunflower mill was the most economical, convenient and best mill built in America. A brief description will be interesting as this is the first mill on the Sunflower system in the state of Texas.

The building is of heavy frame fifty feet long by thirty wide with a basement of concrete nine feet deep. The first story is fourteen feet high, the second fourteen and the attic to the comb is ten feet.

The ware-room is thirty by fifty feet. The storage bins have a capacity of nine thousand bushels. The system of handling grain is very complete, both through wagon scales and Avery automatic scales while the grain is in motion.

The cleaning is both by the wet and dry system as conditions require. The wheat first is cleaned on a double milling separator which removes all foreign impurities then it is scoured and polished on a double scourer, after it is polished dry it is passed through an automatic tempering and washing process and again scoured and polished on a finishing machine. All dirt is removed before the grain enters

the mill. A magnetic separator is used to catch and remove all metallic substances that might injure the delicate machinery in the system. One of the true principles of good milling is to clean the grain before it is put in the mill.

The Craven Milling Co. has spared no expense to do this perfectly on an invincible line of cleaners. All cleaners have dust collectors attached. The Sunflower mill has ten pairs of 9x1 rolls, four pairs corrugated for reducing the wheat and six pairs smooth for the reduction of the product to flour. There are five bolting sifters in two sections each, arranged so that each roll's stock is scalped, graded and bolted separately, giving an advantage of classification of the different products so that each can be milled according to its special requirements. These sifters have fifty screens clothed with the best grades of silk bolting cloths. This bolting system contains over five hundred square feet of bolting cloth.

There are two Sunflower purifiers which remove the impurities from the product before being ground into flour. This is done by silk screens and air currents which purifies and removes all particles from the product that would injure the flour. This combination of machinery is all contained in one steel frame and driven with one belt.

In a nutshell the explanation would be, the wheat enters the head of the machine where the first reduction is made and is ground, separated, classified, purified, graded and bolted through the entire system, the different grades of flour sent to their respective packers, the feed and bran sent to their dust-

ers to be finished and the dust collected from the air all automatically.

This is one of the most-unique, beautifully finished mills ever erected.

And Canyon can be proud of this achievement of her citizens in securing such a plant. Their

brands of flour will be: 1. Patent The Elkhorn, High Patent White Seal; 2. Patent Red Rose and Purity.

The power is furnished by a Fairbanks fifty-horse power Solar Oil engine.

There is a storage tank for fuel with a capacity of nine thousand gallons of oil. The power transmission is provided with friction clutch connections so that any department can be stopped or started without interrupting the work of the other departments. Everything is arranged for economy, safety and convenience.

The mill will be equipped with machinery for grinding feed and making fancy meal for table use. This consists of one corn separator, scourer and polisher, rolls, bolters and aspirators on the Sunflower system.

The patrons of the Craven mills are invited to visit the mill and see how clean and pure their daily bread is manufactured from the grain to the flour sack.


