GOOD RECORD MADE IN BIBLE SCHOOL

PLACED IN FRONT RANK BY NATIONAL ORGANIZATION OF THE CHURCH.

Bible School in the Local Christian Church is Thoroughly Graded and Organized.

The Bible school of the local Christian church has recently received a certificate from the National organization of the Christian church for having what is known as a Front Rank Bible school. In order to receive such a certificate six things were necessary: A thoroughly graded school; adult classes organized; teachers' training class; monthly conference of teachers and officers; fifty per cent of those present having bibles and using them; foreign, home and state missions and benevolences observed by the school. The local school met all these requirements and were thus admitted to the National organization as a Front Rank school.

The school has an other enviable record, which no doubt is not equalled by many schools in the state. There are as many enrolled in the main bible school as there are names on the church roll. This, of course, does not include the 25 on the cradle roll and 8 in the home department. In all there are about 87 enrolled in both the church and bible school.

The school maintains two rolls of honor. The first was started January 1st when a star was offered to the ones reading through the New Testament since that date and two stars for those reading the whole bible. To date a star has been placed before the names of 8 of the members. The other roll of honor was also started January 1st and requires that the student shall be present, not tardy, has bible, studied lesson, and for adults, has read at least 7 chapters in the bible during the week. The student must make this record for four Sundays before his name is placed on the roll, and if he fails one Sunday, must begin over anew to be reinstated on the roll. At present there are 31 on the roll.

It was through the persistent efforts of the pastor, Rev. J. J. Hutchison, that the school has been brought to so high a standard and placed in the Front Rank class. Mr. Hutchison has been pastor of the church three years and during that time not only the bible school has grown, but the church has also grown materially. To aid him in this good work is W. T. Moreland, the superintendent, and the following corps of loyal teachers: Dr. U. T. Miller, Mrs. Garrett, J. A. Crawford, Miss Addie Money, J. P. Winder, Miss Avis Baird and Miss Earlene Garrison.

Moved From Virginia.

A. E. Brown arrived in the city Saturday with his car of goods from Virginia. Mr. Brown came here last fall and bought the old reunion grounds southeast of the city. On this place J. W. Hancock, who moved here during the winter from Virginia, has built a good 7 room house for Mr. Brown. Mr. Brown let a contract this week for a deep well to be put down on the place. When complete, the residence will be entirely modern and up-to-date.

PUG CAVET MAKING GOOD.

On Way Home From Training Camp Pitches 17 Innings, Allowing 4 Hits and 1 Run.

A letter was received by a number of the boys this week from "Pug" Cavet, of the Detroit American baseball bunch. The letter was written just after the team had reached Detroit from the spring camp in the south. On the trip, Pug pitched seventeen innings and allowed only 4 hits and 1 run. He stated that his arm was not in good condition this spring either, but hoped to soon be in shape. He had just had a talk with the owner of the team and was assured that he was making good and would stick with the team throughout the season. It made Pug mighty happy to hear these words.

Cavet is the first man in the Panhandle who has ever made an American league team, and his Canyon admirers hope he will soon be given a chance to show his ability.

The egg hunt at F. Schaeffers Sunday was attended by about 50 people.

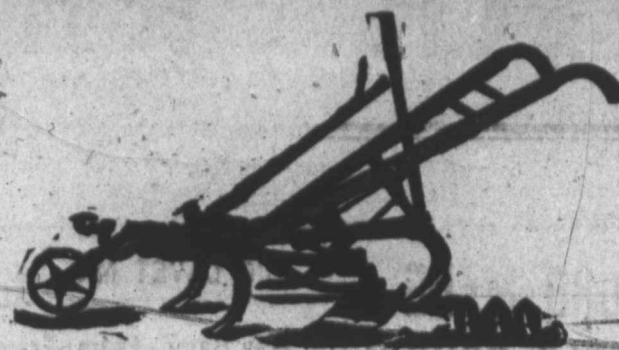
The Fairview ball team was again beaten Saturday by Béula by the score of 18 to 12.

THE TRUSTS AND THE FARMERS.

Mr. Editor: I have noticed for thirty years or more the farmers or many of them at least, were becoming dissatisfied with the lives that they are living on the farm. I remember a little more than fifty years ago the general statistics of the country showed that there were eighty-five per cent of the wealth of the country in the hands of the people, but it is claimed now that there are just a few men, and they are about all in Wall Street, who own and control eighty-five per cent of all the wealth of the country. About fifteen per cent is among the people. It is evident that all the farmer needs at the hands of the general government is a square deal, and they can hold their own against the combine, world, the flesh and the devil.

Proposed Amendment To The State Constitution Prohibiting The Manufacture, Sale, Barter and Exchange of Intoxicating Liquors Except for Medical, Scientific and Sacramental Purposes.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2.

A resolution proposing to amend the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Article 16, Section 20, thereof by striking out and repealing said section, and substituting in lieu thereof a new Section 20, prohibiting the manufacture for purposes of sale, barter or exchange, and the sale, barter and exchange of intoxicating liquors, on and after the second Tuesday in January, A. D. 1912, within this State, except for medical, scientific and sacramental purposes, and providing that the Legislature of the State of Texas, shall, at noon on the second Tuesday in January, A. D. 1912, by authority of this section, meet in session in the city of Austin, and pass efficient laws to enforce this section; providing, further, that this section shall not prevent any session of the Legislature from passing any law to enforce the same; and, providing, further, that all laws in force when this amendment is adopted, providing penalties or forfeitures in relation to the manufacture, sale or transportation of intoxicating liquors, shall remain in full force and effect until modified or repealed.

SEC. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday in July, being the twenty-second day thereof, A. D. 1911. At said election the vote shall be by official ballot, which shall have printed or written at the top thereof in plain letters the words "Official Ballot."

Said ballot shall have also written or printed thereon the words "For Prohibition," and the words, "Against Prohibition."

All the voters favoring said proposed amendment shall erase the words "Against Prohibition" by making a mark through the same, and those opposing it shall erase the words "For Prohibition." If a majority of the votes cast at said election shall be "For Prohibition" said amendment shall be declared adopted. If a majority of the votes shall be "Against Prohibition" said amendment shall be lost and so declared.

All the provisions of the general election laws as amended and in force at the time said election is held shall govern in all respects as to the qualifications of the electors, the method of holding such election, and in all other respects, as far as such election laws can be made applicable.

SEC. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SEC. 4. The sum of five thousand (\$5000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of such proclamation, publication and election.
