Peanuts Profitable Crop.

Plainview, Tex., Apr. 20.-Sam Howard, who lives seven miles southwest of Plainview planted one acre in peanuts last year and after properly cultivating, raised 55 bushels of peanuts. He sold every bushel for \$1.25 per bushel, which brought \$68 .-75. He also planted three acres and gathered 30 bushels of beans off the three acres. He sold the beans at \$3.00 per bushel, thus bringing him \$90. Off of the four acres of peanuts and Mr. Howard found both peanuts and beans very easy to sell for this good price.

Any farmer can make money on the plains with peanuts, whether dry or wet year. Twenty acres bringing in \$68.75 per acre would look good to anyone.

Peanuts are fast gaining in favor as a commercial product and the small expense and amount of trouble that the growing of this vegetable entails is causing it to gain favor with the truck growers of this year. It is estimated that for each \$1000 worth of nuts, there is at least \$1000 worth of hay, and one county alone in South Texas this year produced and shipped \$35,-000 worth of nuts, which of course did not include the portion held out for seed, hay, etc.

Broom Corn in Panhandle.

The big broom corn brokers of Illinois are looking to Kansas, Oklahoma and the Panhandle of Texas for the future supply of broom corn.

They declare that the days of Illinois supremacy in this product is at an end. For the past twenty years Mattoon, Ill., has been the broom corn center, and Coles county, Ill. has raised more broom corn than any similar area in the world. But the farmers have banded together and agreed not to raise broom corn for less than \$120 per ton guaranteed in advance. W. M. Checkley, a prominent broker of Mattoon, replied to their threat as follows: "If you cannot raise broom corn for less than \$120 a ton, you had better quit because the farmers in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas can raise it for less than \$100 a ton. The land in those states can be bought for about one-fourth of the value of Illinois land. Labor is cheaper and market conditions are becoming equally good. In my opinion, Illinois must cease to raise broom corn, for it will no longer pay."-Dalhart Texan.

Umbarger Issues Defy.




C. O. Keiser came from Keota, Iowa yesterday on matters of business.
