

WILL SEND A BIG DISPLAY TO SHOW

PANHANDLE WILL BE REPRESENTED AT CHICAGO LAND SHOW.

Canyon Raised \$300 this Week for the Undertaking and will Send Good Samples.

The National Land and Irrigation Exposition, held in the Coliseum at Chicago in October of each year, has assumed country-wide interest because of its value as a medium for placing the undeveloped districts of the United States before intending emigrants and seekers after land opportunities. Its importance rests upon the fact that it is backed by the largest financial interests, the most powerful publications, the United States Government, and general public opinion. At the exposition last year the Texas Panhandle was represented in a modest way, but it is now planned to place an exhibit at this year's show that will give a definite and comprehensive showing of the magnificent possibilities of this country.

At a special general meeting of the Texas Panhandle Publicity association held in Amarillo on Tuesday, it was decided to raise a fund of \$3000 in order that no feature of the exhibit this year would be neglected. The plan as outlined at present is to take a space immediately on the right of the main entrance, in order that no one entering or even leaving the great coliseum, can possibly overlook the displayed products of the Panhandle. It has also been determined matter of the highest possible class and put out a special number of the Texas Panhandle Magazine, founded, owned and operated by the association. Every district will be called upon to bring forth its products of the field, orchard or garden, and there is absolutely no doubt that when the decorator has completed his work the Panhandle display in the coliseum will be a credit to the association and its members.

The secretary of the association, Walter E. Gunn, left the general meeting of the association on a trip through the Panhandle and arrived in Canyon Wednesday morning. The public spirited citizenship of this city approved of the plan outlined above, as they have always endorsed every proposition for the public good, their city, and the general advantage of the country districts. A committee was secured, and a subscription list circulated, with the result that in practically half an hour an aggregate of \$300.00 was subscribed. This effort speaks well for Canyon and the men who have its material welfare at heart. It is a true indication that our citizens are willing to take up the responsibilities of developing and colonizing the Panhandle.

It is interesting to note that since the organization of the Texas Panhandle Publicity Association, six million people have been impressed by favorable stories published in the large daily, weekly and monthly journals of the northern, western and eastern states. All the districts that are today inviting and securing the greatest tides of emigration, are those which have some general campaign for the promotion of those interests best calculated to arouse the enthusiasm of people seeking lifetime opportunities. For years

the Panhandle depended upon individual effort, but today it has organized in its twenty-six counties to maintain an emigration and publicity office in the Peoples' Gas Building, Chicago, to publish its first magazine of general circulation, to send out unlimited literature, and to keep in touch with those who seek to leave the high priced lands of other sections, for those that are cheaper and of as great fertility. Let us express the hope that our city will continue to take its place among the other cities, towns and villages of the Panhandle, and will continue in a general broad, sane, clean way to boost the intrinsic value of our lands, and magnify the interests in life we can offer to the people who must sooner or later leave the congested urban and agricultural centers of the northern states.

The Leader Sold.

A deal was made this week whereby the Leader store was sold by the stockholders to Joe Foster, of this city, and Jas. Redfearn, of Plainview. Stock has been taken and the new firm is in charge of the business. We are glad to say that Mr. C. P. Hutchings, the manager of the old corporation, will not leave Canyon, but will devote his entire time to insurance. He is a good business man and has a host of friends in the city.

The members of the new firm are well known in Canyon. Mr. Foster has been in business several years in the city and was formerly owner of the Normal Grocery. He is a progressive business man and his many friends are glad to see him in business again. Mr. Redfearn is a Canyon boy, but has been in the grocery business in Plainview for the past six years. The new firm will continue to carry goods furnishings and dry goods but will add a complete stock of groceries.

Investigating Gold.

J. R. Marmion, of Palestine, field agent of the Texas property of White, Phelps & Cox, was in the city Tuesday to investigate the gold discoveries made on the canyons last fall. Mr. Marmion is an experienced gold miner and the company has waited over eight months in order to send him here. Mr. Marmion's mission was strictly confidential and he would disclose nothing of gold possibilities when interviewed. He will recommend that samples of the ore be sent to Denver for assay. A report will be given out in about a month as to the results of the assay.

Some Big Fish.

Monday afternoon Messrs. Winkelman, Cassles, Morelock and Bond went to the creek east of Canyon and brought back 34 and one-half pounds of fine fish. The biggest catch of the day was made by J. E. Winkelman, who landed a 5 1-2 pound rock bass. The fish was the largest caught around Canyon for three years.

Tuesday Mr. and Mrs. Winkelman gave a fish dinner to a few friends and the "big one" was served.

Wheat and Oats Good.

Peter Myers was in the city Wednesday and says that he has begun to thresh near Happy and that the wheat and oats are good. Wheat is making 10 to 15 bushels and oats will make from 15 to 20 bushels.

MEETING FOR MEN ONLY NEXT SUNDAY

POPULAR AMUSEMENT SERMON HEARD BY HUNDREDS ON WEDNESDAY NIGHT

Canyon's union campaign for Christ is rapidly drawing to a close. During the past week Evangelist "Bob" Johnson has continued his appeals to the unsaved. Although many people have already made profession, Mr. Johnson declares that Canyon is far behind any town he has ever worked.

However, even a casual observer may see that the meeting has just begun. In the points of interest and attendance the meeting has never suffered, except in the latter part of last week when excessive rain fell cut into the attendance. During this time the meetings were held in the Methodist church.

On Wednesday evening Evangelist Johnson delivered his sermon on the subject of popular amusements to an audience of about seven hundred people. This famous discourse compared very favorably with that sermon on Booze, and produced a like result, for when the evangelist had finished the sermon and called for his hearers to publicly denounce the evils, fully two thirds of the audience responded. In the discourse Mr. Johnson discussed cards, theatres and dancing, emphatically denouncing them as strongholds of the devil.

"I am not here from choice, but am forced here by the practices of society," said Mr. Johnson, "and I want you to know

that this subject has burned its way blood red into my heart."

He declared that the theatre should be shunned because of its immorality. "You can take the leg show off the stage and the theatre will die," said Mr. Johnson. Many of the famous actresses and actors of the time will tell you that they had rather see their children dead than go upon the stage.

He scathingly denounced cards and dancing, proving that the parlor table is the kindergarten of the gamblers' hell, and that the ball room was the recruiting station for the brothel.

The sermon was nearly two hours in length and there was never a quiet moment. At times the people were silent as he pictured the end of the way of the transgressor, again they laughed and cheered as he mimicked the red-haired, raw boned "caller" at the dance.

Mr. Johnson had but one point in view and that was to condemn these amusements. This he did without trimming or hedging for anyone. He won many new friends for the fearless manner in which he spoke.

"A minister of the gospel should hit the devil between the eyes and take the consequences. It may mean a change of church but I would change if I could help some girl to keep her virtue.

The results of the prohibition election last Saturday for the adoption of an amendment to the state constitution prohibiting the manufacture and sale of liquor was defeated by over 6,000. Randall county piled up a good majority of 328 to 96 in favor of the amendment. All of the northern counties went dry.

Third Alfalfa Cutting.

PRESERVE ALL MOISTURE NOW

KEEP ON CULTIVATING ROW CROPS IT INCREASES YIELD.

H. M. Bainer Writes Able Article on Late Cultivation and Early Plowing.

Now that our recent rains have been general, our crop prospects are exceedingly good. But to make these crops the best, we must do our part. Experience has taught us that rain and weather do not always produce the best crops.

While many of our row crops—kaffir, maize, broom corn, sorghum, etc., have become too large to straddle with the two horse cultivator, we can increase the yields very much by cultivating lightly between the rows. This is especially desirable now, after the rains; it keeps crusts from forming, besides killing some weeds, and in this way saves the moisture for future crop use. The yield can often be increased from one-half to double by late cultivation.

Any one-horse cultivator or harrow that will work the surface from one to two inches in depth will answer the purpose. A weighted mowing machine wheel dragged between the rows will do a great deal of good. Deep, late cultivation is not advisable.

It is well also to remember that weeds allowed to grow in the rows, do not preserve the moisture by shading the ground. As a general rule, the weeds get as much of our moisture as our crops. Weeds also destroy the physical condition of our soils, poisoning them for crop production. It is well to look upon weeds as dangerous poisons and moisture consumers.

It is advisable to disc all small grain ground as soon as possible. This will pay, whether the ground is to be prepared for fall crops or not. Experience tells us that fall preparation of ground pays. This is especially true where the preparation is deep and requires time to get settled before planting time.

By discing now, the moisture will be preserved so plowing can be done any time this fall. It may be necessary to re-disc this ground later to insure late fall plowing, however.

Deep fall plowing for wheat should be done early. Ground prepared deep between now and August 15th is more likely to insure a crop than that worked deep later. All deep plowing especially, should be well harrowed or packed immediately. Plow one-half day and harrow or pack at once, do not wait until the entire field is plowed and then harrow it. Moisture goes out of freshly plowed ground very rapidly, unless it is worked at once.

It is up to us to make a good crop this year and begin preparation for a record crop next year. Whenever we begin doing the right kind of deep preparation long enough ahead of time, we are practically going to insure crops. H. M. Bainer, Agricultural Demonstrator, Santa Fe Ry. Co.


