Work of Transformation No Christian Scientist claims to have attained perfection. He claims perfection for God's image and likeness but not for mortal man. The imperfections of mortal existence must give place to the eternal realities of man's spiritual being. Paul tells us not to be conformed to this world but to be transformed by the renewing of the mind. That which exists in thought finds expression in word and deed, and sooner or later the effect is manifest on the body. The real work of correcting the evils of mortal existence begins in thought, and Christian Science teaches that one must not think that which he does not wish to see manifest in his daily life. No evil is ever really overcome until it is rooted out of consciousness and good takes its place. From the human point of view this work of transformation and regeneration seems an almost impossible undertaking, but Christian Science shows how it is possible to make a beginning and present results are sufficient to convince the student that he has started right and all that is required of him is that he build well on the foundation which is laid.

The wise Christian Scientist does

not claim for himself anymore than has been accomplished. He has a perfect model, but he does not claim to have demonstrated perfection. He ha entered upon the great work of working out his salvation from all evil, He does not cover up the imperfections of that all evil mut be recognized as such and overcome with good. "He that covereth his sins shall not prosper; eliminated from consciousness, hence his mental activities must be such as will bring out a higher degree of perfection. He understands that to acknowledge the reality of sin and sick-ness is to build up in consciousness that which must be torn down before the perfect model can appear. All the claims of evil must be dealt with as false claims. They must be intelli-gently denied and their falsity demonstrated.

The teaching of Christian Science concerning evil is not always understood, and it is sometimes said that the adherents of this faith do not attach sufficient importance to evil. The reality and power of good is the only foundation upon which one can build with any degree of safety and the wise builder is ever watchful that he be not deceived by evil or permit it to interfere with his work. Sheep Raising Profitable.

Editor Hesperian:

Dear Sir: It may be of some interest to you and your readers for me to give you my experience and some data relating to sheep raising on a small scale.

Will say that on the 10th day of August 1910, I purchased 20 ewes paying \$80 for same, borrowing a buck. The following February these 20 ewes raised me 21 lambs all of which lived to be grown sheep. The first week is June, 1911, I sheared \$15.75 worth of wool from the 20 ewes.

I lost one of the ewes and several young lambs during the bad weather last winter but succeeded in raising 12 lambs that are now nearly grown, making me 52 sheep up to August 10th, 1912.

In June, 1912, I sheared \$53.59 worth of wool from the 40 head. Kharkof Wheat.

tion, "The Earth," published in Chicago:

In 1912, H. M. Bainer, demonstrator of agriculture for the Santa Fe Railway in the Panhandle of Texas, distributed 1,000 bushels of kharkof seed wheat among his co-operators. The wheat was distributed in lots of five bushels, the farmer contracting to cultivate the ground according to Mr. Bainer's method, and if he made a crop to pay the loan in kind. One hundred and eighty-three farmers applied for and received loans. All have not reported the result of the experiment, but the most of them have, and 110 have paid the loan. The wheat returned is to be distributed again this year. Practically, every co-operator who borrowed this seed last year will sow again this year, using the seed grown last year. The farmers found Mr. Bainer's method of cultivation so successful that this year they severally will plant from 100 to 500 acres. Kharkof wheat planted and cultivated by Mr. Bainer's method yields from three to five bushels per acre more than other wheat planted and cultivated by the old method on the same farm.


