During our second year we had to be divided. Miss Joy Henderson and Mrs. Ted Sheffy were our teachers. Our class welcomed Blanche Ballard, Jerry Brown, Shirley DeLozier, Bobbie Hoyer, Frankie Lilley and Joe Lee Wilcox. Besides increasing our class, we were honored to have Casanova, the Second.
